

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Cancer Society Presents Stand On United Fund

A statement on the attitude of the American Cancer Society toward participation in United Fund drives was issued Friday by President Sam Kimmell of the Eastland County Unit. The statement follows:

"At one time many ACS Units participated in local UF Drives. However, because of an apparent lag in interest in cancer control programs throughout the Nation, our National Board of Directors (in 1957) and our Texas Division (in 1958) adopted a resolution that there would be no new participation in UF Drives. All Units had to conduct their independent Crusades in 1960 and thereafter.

"As I have already indicated, in most communities where the ACS was a participating member of the UF support of the program of cancer control through education, service and research was not sufficient to permit necessary expansion. As a result, the nationally coordinated research program and the local service and educa-

tion programs had to be either limited or delayed.

"Our Boards of Directors at every level of organization feel certain that there is room for both United Funds and national health agencies to advance their programs and raise funds, each in its own way, each enriching the community it serves. And there can be no doubt that United Funds are effective instruments for meeting pressing local needs in a convenient manner.

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

LEGAL NOTICE

In compliance with the Texas Election Code as amended which fixes a minimum of 50 voters for each precinct, ascertained by the number of preceding Presidential Election Year, the Eastland County Commissioners' Court passed the following order:

Effective January 1, 1968, all qualified voters now residing in Precinct No. 7 at Kokomo shall vote in the Gorman Election Precinct, it being the intention of this court to annex the present Kokomo Precinct with the Gorman Precinct; it is further ordered that the Election Precincts of Pioneer and Nimrod be annexed to the present Rising Star Election Precinct and voters who now reside in the Pioneer and Nimrod Precincts shall vote in the Rising Star Election Precinct after January 1, 1968; and it is further ordered that the Scranton Election Precinct be annexed to the Cisco Election Precinct and voters now residing in the Scranton Election Precinct shall after the 1st of January, 1968, vote in the Cisco Election Precinct.

It is further ordered that various Election Precincts of Eastland County be renumbered as follows:

- Precinct No. 1 -- Eastland.
- Precinct No. 2 -- Olden.
- Precinct No. 3 -- Ranger.
- Precinct No. 4 -- Desdemona.
- Precinct No. 5 -- Gorman.
- Precinct No. 6 -- Carbon.
- Precinct No. 7 -- Rising Star.
- Precinct No. 8 -- Cisco.




