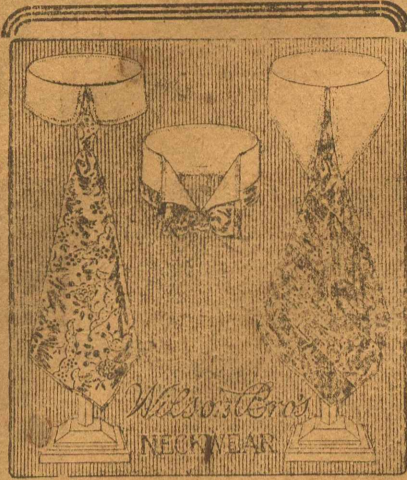

LOOKIN TO THE IDEAL XMAS ENTERTAINMENT

What is the original Christmas idea? Is it a religious festival or an occasion for frivolous hilarity? If the former, have we not departed far from the true spirit of Christmas in our celebration of it? These points were ably and interestingly discussed by Rev. E. M. Douthitt at a meeting of the local pastors and Sunday school superintendents held in the directors room of the Spur National Bank on Monday, December 11th. It was unanimously agreed by those present that it should be the aim of our Sunday schools, in their Christmas entertainments, to get back as nearly as possible to the ideal Christmas spirit. In order to do this, it was decided that these entertainments be held simultaneously on the night of Christmas Eve.

Some doubt was expressed as to the propriety of having these entertainments on Sunday. It was felt, however, that if every effort possible was made to give them the religious and sacred character proper to them, they could in no sense be a desecration of the Sabbath. It was suggested that all possible preparations be made on Saturday, leaving only the necessary final arrangements for Sunday afternoon. Everybody is further urged to attend the entertainment given by their own Sunday school, and to be as quiet and decorous as on any other occasion of religious worship. Children are especially asked not to bring fireworks or other kinds of noise-makers with them.

BOUGHT FARM HOME AND MAKING IMPROVEMENTS

H. N. Patton recently bought a quarter section of land five or six miles east of Spur. A farm home has already been built and land is now being cleared for cultivation. Jesse Fletcher will cultivate the place another year.

This is one of a great number of places being improved for cultivation another year with in the Spur country, and as said heretofore there remains only a very few years until there will be no more raw and unimproved lands within this territory. FARMERS WILL BUILD NEW GIN IN SPUR

A number of farmers of the Spur country are now organizing a stock company for the purpose of building a new gin in Spur for the next season. This company will be confined strictly to farmers and the formation of the stock company at this time is encouraged by the large increase in acreage of farm lands now under way.

One half of the stock in the company has already been spoken for and the other half will be taken readily by farmers of the surrounding country. At the present time there are four gins in Spur, but since thousands of acres of new land will be put in cultivation for another year it is expected that the five gins will not be able to handle all of the cotton to be ginned by the farmers of the surrounding country.

The fact that hundreds of new farm homes are being built and thousands of acres of new land being cleared for cultivation another year encourages the further building and development progress of the town in supplying the demands not only in gins but mills, factories, mercantile establishments and roads.

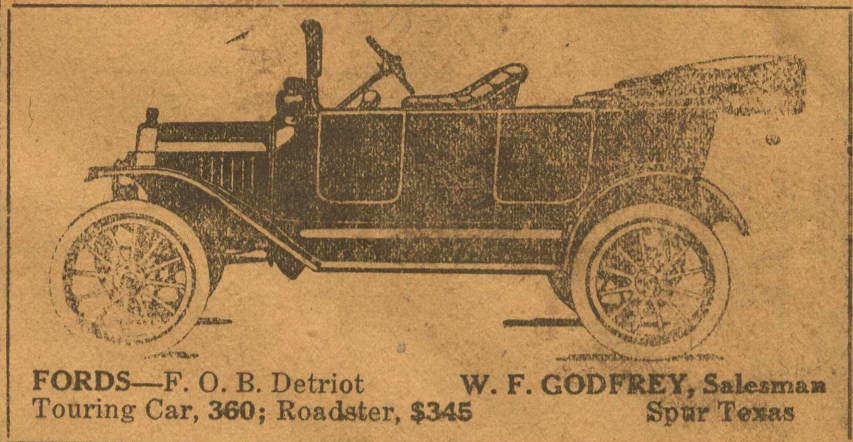

SPUR DELEGATES ATTEND A. & M. MEETING

Mayor F. W. Jennings and Clifford B. Jones returned last week from Wichita Falls where they attended the West Texas A. & M. College Meeting, they being delegates from Spur. Attending this meeting were delegates from a number of Western Texas towns. Plans were formulated and a bill drawn to be presented to the next legislature asking that a branch of the A. & M. College be established in Western Texas. It is very probable that this branch of the A. & M. will be established, and at this meeting it was asked that a "locating" committee composed of the Governor, the Commissioner of Agriculture and one other be appointed by the legislature to select a suitable location for such a branch. A number of towns will ask to be selected as the place for locating this branch college, and among which will be Spur. Spur's location at the foot of the plains where the varied climatic and agricultural conditions exist is the logical place for the establishment of such an institution and we have little doubt but that Spur will be selected as the site for the location of this branch college if it is created by the next legislature.

OVERSTREET BABY DIES FROM SWALLOWING BONE

The little child of Mr. and Mrs. Grover Overstreet died Monday as the result of swallowing a bone which lodged in the windpipe. The child was brought to the Standifer Hospital for an operation, but on account of the serious condition of the child, Dr. Montgomery, a specialist in surgery of the throat from Stamford, was sent for and rushed through the country in autos. However, the child did not survive the operation. The little body was interred Tuesday in the Dickens cemetery.

Notice is Hereby Given That Any Person Who Cuts Wood of Any Kind Whatever From Any of Our Lands Any Where Now or Hereafter will Be Prosecuted to the Fullest Extent of the Law Without Favor or Consideration

IN Some localities in past years, the lands have been shamefully cut over, regardless of our rights, and those of purchasers of land not occupied. Many otherwise honest men, have come to think that what others have done, without a penalty resulting, they can also do, and there is an increasing disposition to appropriate wood wherever it can be found, no matter to whom it belongs. This must and will be stopped. We must protect the people who have already bought Spur Lands, and those who will hereafter buy them, from this wood cutting.

Some people pretend to think there is no objection to it. This is, therefore, public notice that no one has our permission to cut, saw, grub, break down or gather wood of any kind whatever from our lands anywhere, and that prosecution will certainly follow trespassers hereafter without favor.
