TRAIN RUNS INTO WAGON, TEAM AND MARION MITCHELL

Marion Mitchell, of west of Spur, was injured, his wagon wrecked and team cut loose Thursday of last week when the passenger train ran into them at the crossing just east of the

Mr. Mitchell was on his way from the Swenson gin to the cotton yard. The wind was blowing almost a gale and the sand was in the air, and for these reasons he failed to note the approach of the train as he neared the railway crossing. He stated that as his team started across the track they stopped, causing him to notice the approaching train just as the engineer pulled the whistle open. He, seeing that it was impossible to back off the track, struck the team and jumped from the wagon. The engine struck the back end of the wagon and throwing Mr. Mitchell into the air. He was injured in some manner on the foot, knee, arm, shoulder, and back of the head, but not seriously. The wagon was totally wrecked, harness torn and team somewhat bruised. It was a narrow escape for Mr. Mitchell, and his prompt action and good judgement in this emergency probably saved his life.

COTTON MEN ADVISE PLANT-ING LONE STAR OR ROWDEN

In conversation with experienced otton men we have been informed that the character of cotton seed planted, as well as the manner in which the ground is prepared and cul-tivated, has much to do with the quantity and quality of the staple produced, and also the price received

in the sale of cotton.

A cotton buyer told us this week that he could get bids on staple produced from Lone Star and Rowden seed produced in other sections of the country, and that he was unable to get a price for the staple produced from Mebane seed in this section. He stated that Lone Star cotton seed produced a language of the stated that the start of the stated that the start of the start produced a longer staple and in as large quantity as other seeds, and that it would bring five cents and more per pound above the price of

We also talked with a farmer, Mr. Tree of west of Spur, who told us this year he had Rowden seed from which he had one-inch staple, but that he failed to get a better price than other farmers from the staple of Mebane seed which produced a shorter

Mebane seed has been highly rec-commended for this country in the past, but if it is a fact, as is stated by cotton buyers, that Lone Star seed will produce a longer staple in as great quantity, and will not the farmer at least five cents a pound more than other staple, it is very evident that Lone Star is the seed to plant

Since there may be competition on the part of cotton seed salesmen with reference to the different kinds of eed, and in some instances just any kind of seed may be merely branded to suit the desires of the purchaser, the proposition of best kind of seed,







Washington alone of them failed to reach seventy. The first Adams outlived retirement by twentyfive years and Jefferson, who died on the same day with Adams, July 4. 1826, the fiftieth anniversary of Independence, outlived retirement seventeen years. Monroe, who retired at sixty-seven, died July 4, 1831.

Since Jackson, no president except Wilson, Buchanan, Taylor and the first Harrison has sat in the White House when sixty-one years old. Of all who have served in that time, ten retired or died in office before reaching fifty-seven, and only two outlived retirement twenty years. Not one lived to be eighty, and only five passed seventy. Polk outlived retireinent less than six months, and died at fifty-four, younger than any other ex-president. Few presidents in the last fifty years have lived to see three of their successors, and several have not seen two, though Pierce saw four.

Although the average length of human life in the United States is greater than it was when the republic was young, distinguished public men have hardly shared in the boon of lengthened days. The presidency, indeed, while never exactly what everyday folk call a soft snap, was a far less exacting office in early times than it is today. The Napoleonic war gave Washington, the first Adams, Jefferson and Madison a good many trying hours, but they all had their periods of respite. Washington. wherever he happened to be as chief magistrate, managed to escape now and again to the spacious and dignified quiet of Mount Vernon. John Adams, the first president to occupy the White House at Washington, the domestic arrangements of which appeared "impossible" to his thrifty and orderly New England wife, often returned to the quiet of his home at Quincy. Jefferson found repose at Monticello, and Jackson made the long journey to the Hermitage, where rest awaited his coming.

All of the early presidents were safe from intrusive messages by telegraph or telephone, and they received mail in no masses as now daily pursue a president on vacation. stairs which are sharp and steep. Dexter Pratt, Longfellow's blacksmith friend, succeeded Torrey Hanof Thomas Brattle, who built the Buick automobile. house. Pratt had lived there a long time when Longfellow came to Cambridge in 1836. After the death of Dexter Pratt in 1847, the property passed through various hands until, in 1870, friends bought it for Mary Walker, an escaped quadroon slave, a woman of refinement and beauty, who had been a servant in several Cambridge families, and afterward taught

school in the South. After her return to the North two of her three children were found and returned to her through the efforts of. General O. O. Howard. They were then a grown man and woman, although when she last saw them they were children.

While she occupied the house many Harvard students lived there. Now, purchased from the heirs of the escaped slave, it has become one of the show places of Cambridge.

Longfellow, in the Knickerbocker Magazine, in 1840, first immortalized the place. He made a word picture of the village smithy and the blacksmith, and also made a pen and ink sketch of the chestnut tree and the smithy. The tree up to 1876 spread its branches in front of the house.

Peru Alarmed Over Chinese.
