# Wood Cutting Prohibited On Spur Lands!

Notice is Hereby Given That Any Person Who Cuts Wood of Any Kind Whatever From Any of Our Lands Any Where Now or Hereafter will Be Prosecuted to the Fullest Extent of the Law Without Favor or Consideration

> Some localities in past years, the lands have been shamefully cut over, regardless of our rights, and those of purchasers of land not occupied. Many otherwise honest men, have come to think that what others have done, without a penalty resulting, they can also do, and there is an increasing disposition to appropriate wood whereever it may be found, no matter to whom it belongs. This must be stopped. We must protect the people who have already bought Spur Lands, and those who will hereafter buy them, from this wood cutting.

> Some people pretend to think there is no objection to it. This is, therefore, public notice that no one has our permission to cut, saw, grub, break down or gather wood of any kind whatever from our lands anywhere, and that prosecution will certainly follow trespassers hereafter without favor.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 17.

Proposing an amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by exempting independent and common school districts from the limitation of a total tax of one dollar on the one hundred

dollars valuation for any one year, and making an appropriation therefor.

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution be so amended as hereafter to read as follows: (Creating a new Section 3.)

Section 3. 

OBITUARY

Paul Hagins was born in Dickens county, on Duck Creek, October 24th 1891, died July 5th, 1920, age twenty eight years, nine months and eleven days. At the time of the accident which caused his death, he was working for an oil company in Grandfield, Oklahoma, and was fatally burned by the explosion of a gasoline tank. When his clothing caught fire he ran for thirty or forty steps, jumped over the guard line into a pile of sand, rolled till the flames were extinguished. When help arrived a few minutes later they found his body was seriously burned, all but his forehead and hair, which was protected by his hat. He was immediately hurried to a hospital where he received every attention possible to alleviate his suffering.

Ween his father arrived the new morning he was conscious and recognized him at once and though he we. suffering untold agony, he gladly greeted him and inquired affection ately after the rest of the family. 'Yes papa, I am pretty badly burned.' he said heroically, trying to conceal his pain. A hero to the last he bore his suffering without a murmer till death relieved him of the agony. His mother and sister, Mrs. Lucy Heatherington, who wre unavoidably delayed, arrived too late.

His body was shipped to Jayton for burial and was laid to rest in the Jayton cemetary on the evening of July the seventh, Brother Jesse Willis officiating. He leaves a father and stepmother, nine brothers, four sisters, three step-sisters and fiance to mourn his loss. They are: His father and mother, the Hon. A. J.
