### MRS. IVEY FATALLY BURNED RECENTLY AT ROARING SPRING

Perhaps the greatest shock ever experienced by the people of Roaring Springs, which soon spread to the entire county and surrounding country, was the startling intelligence conveyed about eleven o'clock last Thursday morning, that Mrs. M. D. Ivey, wife of the cashier of the First State Bank of Roaring Springs, had probably been fatally burned, and the gravest fears were to be realized as the good lady passed away about six o'clock Saturday morning.

The appalling accident was one of those unaccountable things that are of not infrequent occurrence and yet seem so inexplicable in their origin, and horrifying in their results.

It seems that a coal oil stove that was used for cooking, had developed a defective or leaking burner, and this became ignited. Mrs. Ivey, with remarkable presence of mind, had thrown water on the blaze and then removed the reservoir, taking it out into the yard and to a place of safety. She then returned and carried out the stove proper, but in doing so she evidently tilted the end that contained the receptacle for the reservoir, which always contains more or less oil, and this must have spilled on her clothing, as it caught fire, and before she could get relief the upper portion of her body and hands were severely burned covering almost half of the cuticle area. The fact that the clothing was thoroughly saturated and some of it firmly bound to her, caused the burns to be deep and necessarily severe.

With her clothing still ablaze the unfortunate woman ran out into the street, where she was met by those alarmed by her screams, and everything possible was done to relieve her suffering and, if possible, to save her life, but to no avail. While she seemed to recover from the shock to some extent, the fatality of the injuries could not be overcome, and death was the only relief that could come to her.

Funeral services, attended by all the near relatives and a large concourse of friends, were held at the Roaring Springs Baptist church at 3:00 p. m. Sunday, after which the remains were interred in the local cemetery.—Motley County News.

### A KENT COUNTY BOY KILLED ACCIDENTALLY LAST WEEK

Cadet Spearman Evetts of the Aviation Service, who was killed in California last week, in an accident in which a truck in which he and others were riding, while stalled on a crossing was hit by a fast train, was brought here for burial, the remains accompanied by Cadet Charles arriving at Jayton on the noon train Wednesday. The family of the deceased consisting of his father, Mr. Evetts, of Post City and five sisters and two brothers, had come from their different places of residence to meet the train bearing his remains.

The funeral service was held at the Baptist church by the pastor, the church having been decorated for the occasion by a schoolmate of the deceased, Mrs. Sam McCombs. After the service the body was taken to Claiborne for interment.

Spearman Evetts was a splendid young man, a native son of Kent county, a Christian and a member of the Baptist church. He was 20 years of age Feb. 12th last. He lacked only two weeks of completing his term of enlistment in the Aviation Service. A Soldier of his country, a Soldier of the cross, a man against whom nothing evil can be said, cut down in the dawn of manhood, God only knows why; but God does know and he makes no mistakes, but "doeth all things well."

Thursday there arrived a beautiful floral offering sent by Cadet Spearman's comrades.

The bereaved family have many old friends in Kent county who enter into fullest sympathy with them in their sorrow.—Jayton Chronicle.

**AN ORDINANCE.**

Prohibiting Shows Within the Fire Limits of the City of Spur, Texas. Be it Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Spur, Texas:

Art. 1. That from and after the passage and publication of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any tent, show, open air show, theatrical performance of any sort showing under tent, on platform, or in the open, to exhibit within the prescribed fire limits of the City of Spur, Texas, as defined by an ordinance passed by the City Council of said city on the ninth day of November A. D. 1921.

Art. 2. Any person or persons violating the terms of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not more than one hundred dollars, and every such performance given in violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed a separate offense.

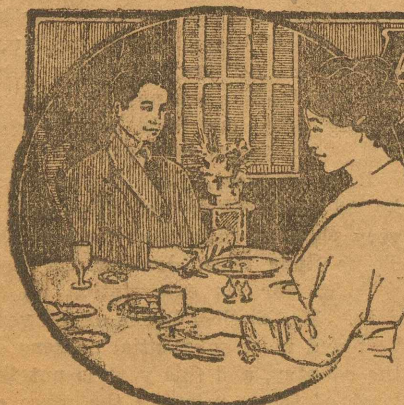

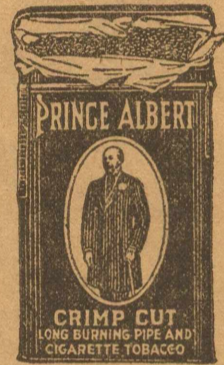

**AN ORDINANCE.**

Prohibiting Peddling of Merchandise Within Certain Streets of the City of Spur, Texas

Be it Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Spur, Texas:

Art. 1. That from and after the passage and publication of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to hawk or peddle merchandise on the following streets and alleys in the City of Spur, Texas:

Willard Avenue, between Second and Seventh Streets.  
Burlington Avenue, between Second and Seventh Streets.

Trumbull Avenue, between Second and Seventh Streets.

And the following streets between Willard Avenue and Trumbull Avenue:

Second Street, Fifth Street, Third Street, Sixth Street, Harris Street, Seventh Street

And all alleys within an area bounded by Second Street on the north, Trumbull Avenue on the east, Seventh Street on the south, and Willard Avenue on the west.

Art. 2. Nothing herein shall be construed to prevent the selling of farm produce by the producer thereof on the said named streets and alleys.

Art. 3. Any person or persons violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars.

**FIRE ORDINANCE.**

Prescribing Fire Limits, and Defining the Class of Buildings which May be Constructed Therein, and Fixing a Penalty for Construction of Prohibited Buildings.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Spur, Texas:

Art. 1. That the following described area within the City of Spur, Texas, is hereby designated as fire limits:

"The east one-half of Blocks Nos. 5, 12, 21, 28, 37; the west one-half of Block Nos. 6, 11, 22, 27, 33; the northwest one-fourth of Block No. 21, and the southwest one-fourth of Block No. 28; the southeast one-fourth of Block No. 27, and the northeast one-fourth of Block No. 22.

Art. 2. That within the area described in the foregoing Article 1, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or association of persons, to erect, build, place or move any wooden building, or to remove any wooden building from one place to another within said area, or to remove any wooden building into said limits from without, or to repair any wooden building within said fire limits when the same shall be damaged to the extent of fifty per cent of the value thereof.

Art. 3. All buildings hereafter constructed within said area or fire limits, named in Article 1, shall be constructed of brick, stone, or concrete, except that it is hereby provided that on the rear fifty feet of each lot, as officially numbered by the town plat of the City of Spur, there may be constructed buildings the outer walls of which shall be entirely covered with sheet metal, such buildings being commonly known as iron-clad buildings, to be used only for warehouse purposes.

Art. 4. Any person, or persons, violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars, and each day that any such building as herein prohibited may be permitted to stand by any person or persons, having the same placed within the prohibited area shall be deemed a separate offense by such person or persons.
