

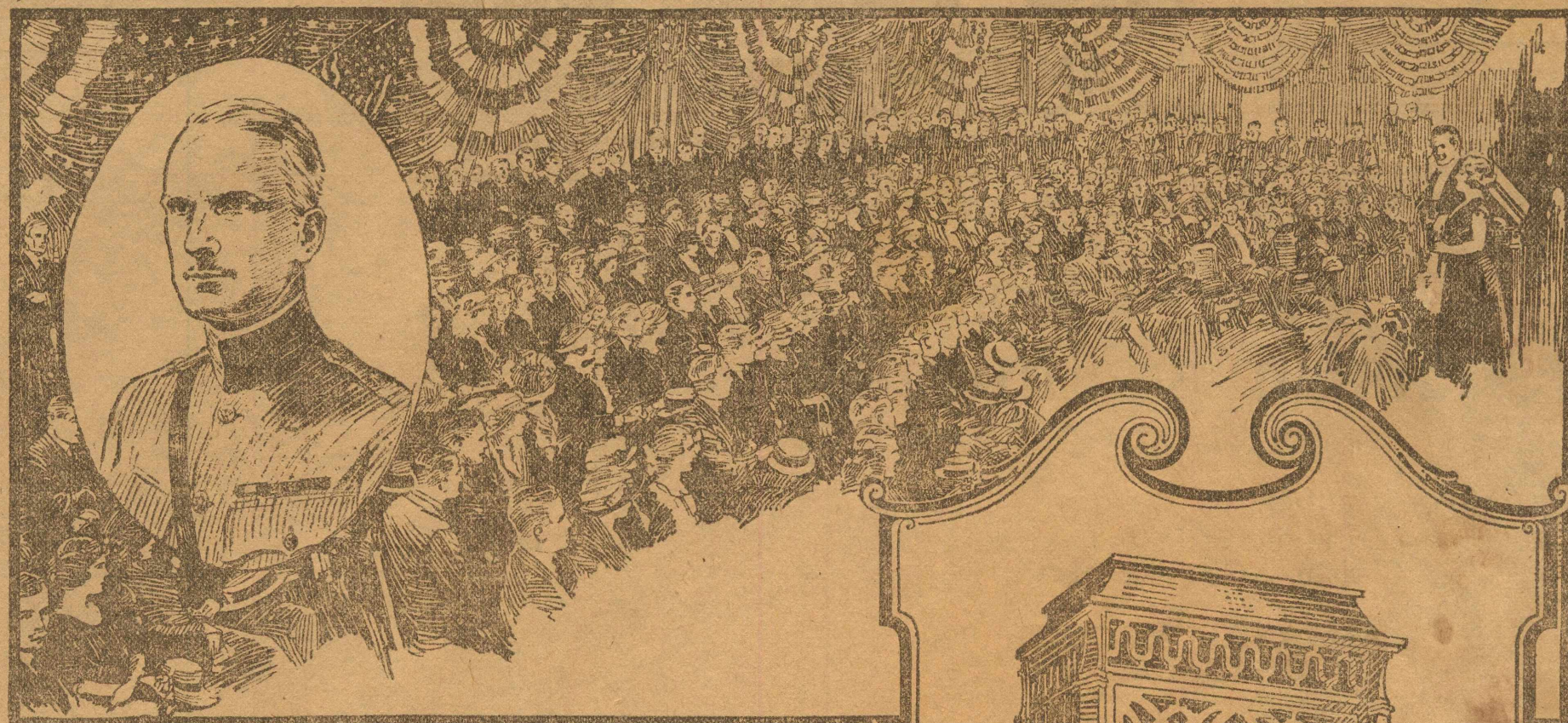

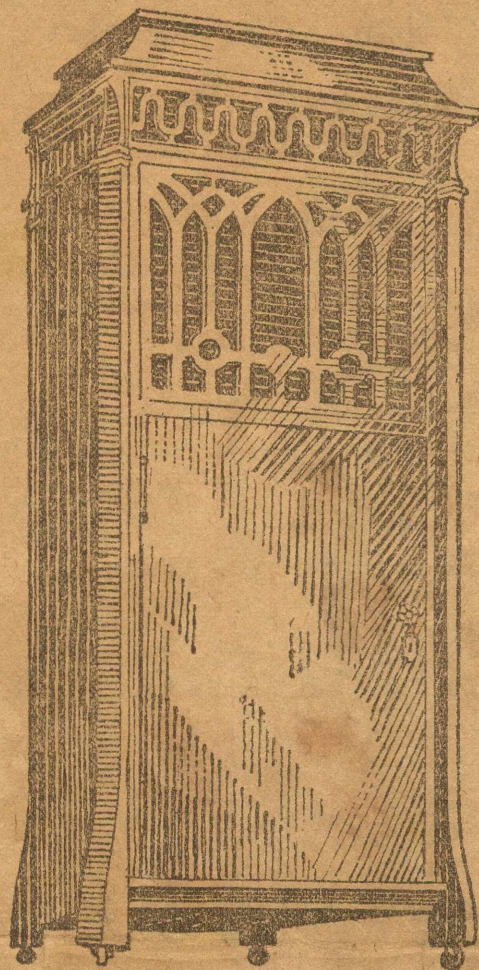
The Test General Wingate Heard

URGES UNIFORM WHEAT.
STAMFORD, Sept. 13.—A successful Coleman county farmer who annually grows a large acreage of wheat and markets his products in car lots at 5 to 10 cents per bushel above the general market price, makes the suggestion to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce that if all farmers of a given section would grow the same variety of wheat, that the wheat would command a better price in the markets. Also it would find a more ready sale. With a dozen different varieties before him and not sufficient quantity of any certain variety for his local mill, the local buyer is often forced to discriminate in prices.

Also this farmer suggests that cotton should take concerted action in growing for uniformity in securing uniform staples of cotton of the same variety, raise grade and stimulate bonus prices for cotton.

7,270,575 BALES ARE GINNED UP TO NOVEMBER 14TH

the 1921 cotton crop up to Nov. 14 amounted to 7,270,575 bales, a addition of 625,000 bales in the two week prior to Nov. 14, the Census Bureau announced today.

Ginnings as recorded by the Census Bureau now exceed by 733,575 bales the quantity forecast in the preliminary estimate of the crop made by the Department of Agriculture early in October. A final estimate of this years crop will be announced by the Department of Agriculture, Dec. 12.

Prior to Nov. 14 last year 8,914,642 running bales were ginned, including 175,284 round bales, 31,114 bales of American-Egyptian and 848 bales of Sea Island.
