This is exactly what will happen to us if we are incautious enough to introduce the worm through planting seed not properly treated.. The threatmen found absolutely reliable consists in having all seed put under 140 degrees Fahrenheit which des-

not injure the germination of seed. from almost every section of state. In this connection it may be well to mention a fact that many of the so-called wonderful new varieties of cotton for which fancy prices are being asked are absolutely worth less, while others which are moderately well adapted to the sections which are growing them would be failures in localities where soil and climatic conditions are different. Some of the best cotton in the South and Fast are not at all profitable in the West.

Within the next few weeks meetings will be held in various communities to get together on subject of planting cotton adapted to our soil and climate, and at the same time producing a reasonable staple, and in the meantime I shall be glad to advise with any farmer who has already placed an order for seed. If you have ordered seed which have not already been shipped, have the firm with whom you are dealing treat them as recommended or cancel the order. If you have already purchas ed seed, ascertain whether or not they have been so treated .- R. B. Johnston, County Agricultural Agent




PROPER COOPERATION BE-TWEEN TOWN AND COUNTRY

Having read in a recent issue of the Texas Spur an article from California Van Guard. In which he said did you ever give the subject of the local merchant and you any thought? Why how can we he'p from giving him a thought. He is ever ready o remind us of his business passed and future.

But does He ever give his patrons any thought, only so far as his financial interest goes. I am a farm r I raise hogs, cattle, horses, mules, poultry, fruit, potatoes, cotton maize corn, oats and vegetables. I raise and grow a surplus above my own use: I grow this surplus for the merchant, lawyer, doctor, mechanic, blacksmith and those who do not grow and raise such: Do they buy it from me or from the merchant? Who does the merchant buy it from? Does he buy it from me direct? Now let every man living in town stop and think. This surplus I speak of is my only means of patronizing him, yet he will not buy it direct from me. Why, he says my potatoes will rot before he can get rid of them, as they are not kiln dried. He objects to my home rendered lard, as it is in bulk, and his patrons do not buy it that way. He objects to my syrup as it is put in barrels or kegs, and his patrons do not want it that way, and so on down the line. 

WANTED A MARKET

A paper of pins is the same price the whole year round. In fact, the price varies very little in a whole generation. The same is true of a spool of thread, a package of gum, a box of soda, a pound of beans and practically everything else we buy to use in the home. The price is fixed. We do not know who fixes it, but somebody does. Excluding wartimes, when everything was abnormal and unnatural, the price of the things most of us have to buy does not vary much. But how about the things that are offered/for sale by those who produce them?

For example how about the price of eggs at this time? There are records where the price of eggs has varied within a year 1,000 per cent. Last Spring when the egg harvest was on throughout the whole country as it is every Spring, eggs were forced down in many places to 10 cents per dozen. No doubt there are many city women who will pay \$i per dozen for eggs to bake their cakes. What does this mean? It simply means that there is no order, no system, no sense to the egg market. The people and most of the people who send eggs to market, are women and children, who do all the work to make the Christmas cakes possible for the nation, received 10 cents per dozen for the products of their labor, and the women and children who make the Christmas cakes must pay \$1 per dozen for the same eggs a few months later Have the eggs improved by age 1,000 per cent? As a rule, eggs do not improve with age. The question we would like to have answered and we believe there are millions of other women who would like to know the answer, is this: Who gets the 90 cents per dozen difference from the first selling price to the last buying price? 
