The sales would be larger if more farm from average farm flocks is perbaps more convincing than if the sale were from standard bred chickens, be cause many would think their scrub flocks would not return anywhere near such large returns as would good chickens. Two-thirds of these sales were from mixed or scrub flocks for 63 per cents of all the farms in north west Texas have mixed or scrub flocks of chickens. No wonder people do not give their chickens more attention. 



Horses working in the fields not only require good care and feed but they will eat better.




Losses Have Been Greatly Reduced and May Be Wiped Out Entirely By Right Treatment.

August and September take the heaviest toll through hog cholera, the bane of swine keepers, which in years past has wiped out entire herds after an expensive season's feeding. In certain years the hog-cholera toll has run as high as 144 per 1,000 through the United States. Preventive measures developed by the United States Department of Agriculture have reduced the toll to 38. The experts, whose work has effected this annual multimillion-dollar saving, assert confidently that the means of absolute insurance from hog cholera losses is within the reach of any farmer who cares to take the precautionary trouble and expense.

The serum treatment, developed about 15 years ago and first put into general use within the last six or seven years, gives immunity if injected in time. This serum treatment is described fully in Farmesse' Bulletin 834, which should be kept at hand for ready reference by every hog raiser.

Hog cholera is an epidemic disease; that means that it spreads from oneor a few initial cases. It is carried in bedding, sty refuse, feeding troughs, loading shutes, railroad cars, farm im-

plements, clothing of laborers, and even in running water. Sanitation will cut down the danger, but it is not an absolute preventive. Unless the farmer has taken the precaution to have all of his herd immunized with serum and virus, an operation which should be done by a veterinarian or a specially trained layman, there is always possibility of the disease breaking out unexpectedly.

The farmer's protection lies in the fact that usually only one or two members of the herd are affected at first, and he should be on the watch. One or two hogs will refuse to come up to feed with the herd. They will remain Horses that have had their teeth hidden in the nest, and when driven looked after are usually more efficient from the bed their backs may be arched and they may appear cold, and shiver. The rest of the herd may remain apparently well for several days. when others are likely to be found affected in about the same way as those first attacked. As the disease progresses the sick hogs become gaunt or tucked up in the flanks, and have a weak, staggering gait, the weakness being most marked in the hind legs. If the lungs are affected there may be a cough, which is particularly noticeable when the hogs are disturbed. The eyes usually are inflamed and show a whitish discharge, which may cause the lids to stick together. Constipation, which is commonly present in the early days of the disease, is generally followed by a diarrhoea. As the disease reaches its height red or purplish blotches are likely to appear upon the skin of the ears, of the belly, and the inner surfaces of the legs. Some of the symptoms mentioned may be present in other diseases, but owner should remember that the cholera spreads rapidly through a herd and no time should be lost in calling a veterinarian to diagnose the disease and administer the proper treatment. If the disease is cholera heavy losses can be averted only by prompt administration of hog-cholera serum.

T HAS been said that the real test of good table manners depends on one's ability to manage a knife and fork in the right way. Quite as good a test might be shown in one's mode and manner of drinking any of the ordinary everyday beverages. The really fine points in manners are revealed in these everyday things. Don't worry your head over the proper way of dispensing tea from a Russian samovar. It is much more important to drink' the everyday brew from an everyday tea pot.

It seems unnecessary to say that we should drink noiselessly. However, most people don't. Keep tab on yourself sometime and see whether you yourself do not have to exert quite an effort in order to make your drinking absolutely noiseless. In drinking tea, coffee, or other beverages served in cup and saucer, you should use the spoon only in order to mix the sugar and then to take a few spoonfuls by way of testing the temperature. To sip the entire cupful in spoonfuls is decidedly bad form, If you have been advised to "sip" tea or water in this way for your health, then out of kindness to your associates take this in your own room as you would any other sort of remedy.

Needless to say we never leave the spoon in our cups. After the sugar is added it should be mixed by one or two motions of the spoon in the cup and then it should be laid on the saucer beside the cup. If your venerable grandmother or grandfather drinks with the spoon in the cup, just recall that in the days that are long gone by this was regarded as a perfectly correct mode of drinking; but that is no excuse for anyone else.

The same rule applies to spoons in any glass or cup. And remember when you are partaking of a soda fountain concoction that you should not drink with the straws in the glass. As a matter of fact very good manners make no allowances whatever for straws. At all events they and the long spoon that is served with the fountain drink should be removed and laid aside before attempting to drink from the glass.

An exception to this rule against straws must be made in favor of certain warm-weather drinks that really contain so much hopped ice that to drink them in any way save through a straw would be quite impossible (Copyright.)

Red Cross Gives • \$310,000 to Aid 'Clean-Up' Drive

An appropriation of \$310,000 for Red Cross work in connection with the "clean-up" campaign instituted by the Denver recently rejected an ordinance disabled service men who are entitled to Federal aid before the proper gov ernment bureau for action, has beeu made by the American Red Cross. The Executive Committee of the American Red Cross in making the appropriation authorized the appropriation of \$35,000 of this sum to the American Legion to defray the expense of the Legion representatives assigned to the various districts of the Veterans Bureau. The remainder of the appropriation was authorized for apportionment among the several Divisions of the Red Cross for carrying on that part of the "clean-up" work that falls directly upon the Red Cross organization,



MINERAL MIXTURE FOR HOGS

Animals Crave Something in Addition to Feeds Given Them to Meet Growth Requirements.

Hogs need certain minerals to meet their growth requirements. One such mixture that has proved satisfactory is composed of: Charcoal, 50 pounds; wood ashes, 50; epsom salts, 3 pounds. Partly burned corncobs and soft coal are good. It is well to keep a mineral mixture before the hogs all the time.

HOGS ARE HARVEST HELPERS

In Most Cases It Will Pay to Let Them Take Care of Part of Small Grain Crops.

Hogs can be of great assistance in harvesting small grain crops. In most eases when hogs are a paying proposition at all it will be found profitable to let them take care of part of the crops in this way, whether labor is scarce or not.

GIVE PURE DRINKING WATER

Necessary for Best Health of Fowls as All Poultrymen Know-Epsom Salts Help.

Pure drinking water is necessary, as all our good poultrymen and poultrywomen know. An occasional dose of Epsom salts, twenty grains to the quart, followed by thirty grains of bkarbonate of soda to each quart of drinking water is a cleanser reported by some of our breeders as being beneficial.

Antopsy should be performed upon hogs which die of any disease. Indications of cholera are described in the bulletin referred to. The most important thing is to be prepared and to act promptly.

Locate hog lots and pastures away from streams and public highways, and do not allow hogs to run on free range or highways, nor to have access to canals or irrigated ditches.

Do not drive into hog lots after driving on public highways.

Do not use hog lots for yarding wagons and farm implements.

FREE AIR

Young America Sends Vast Relief To Needy Abroad

Various relief projects of the Junior American Red Cross in European countries resulted in helping 237,000 destitute children during the last fiscal year, according to the annual report of the American Red Cross for that period. The growth of the activities of the Juniors abroad is manifested by a comparison which shows this figure is 200,000 /arger than that of the previous fiscal year.

The National Children's Fund raised by school children, members of the Junior American Red Cross, was drawn upon for \$420,557 for these proj ects. Receipts for the National Children's Fund during the last fiscal year totalled \$155,317.

America Succors Russians

Food, clothing and medical relief costing \$700,000 has been provided by the American Red Cross for the thousands of Russian refugees stranded last year in Constantinople and vicinity.

FURNISH FOALS WITH GRAIN

When Pastures Eegin to Dry Up Young Animais Must Have Feed for Best Development.

As the pastures commence to dry up the proper development of the calls for the feeding of a little grain In order to maintain the milk fat and keep the foal developing to the best advantage. Colts that belong to working mares should have a separate feed box and receive a little grain each time the mother is fed. Those on pasture should be provided with a creep where grain can be kept available for the feal at all times. If these methods are followed the colt will continue to gain and will not shrink when weaning time comes.

DISPOSING OF DEAD ANIMALS

All Carcasses Should Be Burned or Covered With Quicklime and Buried Quite Deeply.

Burn to ashes or cover with quicklime and bury under four feet of earth all dead animals at butchering time, because they attract buzzards, dogs, etc., which may carry hog-cholera infection.

AIDED STATES IN BUILD ING 16,875 MILES OF HIGHWAY Two hundred years ago France be gan the task of building an interlocking system of paved highways that are the pride of France and are often referred to by Americans as being the finest system of roads in the world. In 200 years 15,000 miles of roads have been built, which is not considered a mean record for France. Six years ago, in 1916, the United States decided to aid States in building highways and in those six years has spent \$124,126,828 on highway construction, has assisted in building 16,875 miles of road and at this time is assisting in building 18,950 additional miles.

The figures were obtained from the records of the United States Bureau of Roads, Fort Worth District. However, the mileage given is just work. To get some idea of the scope of the industry, bridges are considered Those projected have a total length of 25 miles. If placed together they would make a bridge almost from Fort Worth to Dallas.

Ten per cent of the total number of miles of road under construction is in Texas, or a total of 1,522 miles which is taken to mean that the industry is affording employment to 100,000 men in this State.

Approximately 1,442 miles of good roads in the State have been complet ed. To Texas the Federal Government has appropriated \$20,525,577, for road construction. Of that a mount in the past six years \$9,015,-832 has already been spent.

The total of all states is \$350 .-000,000, of which \$159, 000,000 has been spent.

The total miles now under construction in the United States is of the following materials: Earth graded and drained 5,160; sand clay, 5, 395; gravel, 6,677; macadam, 909; bituminous, 1,351, concrete, 2,540; brick, 169; bridges, 25.


