The average cost of producing this cotton crop is estimated to be 22 cents per pound. The spot market is below this price now, and cotton has lost more than five dollars per bale in the last few days, caused by the rapid gathering and selling of the Texas crop.

The legitimate business in dry goods is haulted by, 'crying big crop of cotton, lower prices.'

All cotton growing countries in dicate poor crops,-cotton famine is inevitable. The whole world wants cotton. The world is hungry for cotton goods. Middling cotton will sell at 30 cents before the beautiful snow flies."

In view of these undisputed facts, it seems to me that the business interest of Texas and the South, which must depend upon cotton for existence could not afford to force this crop upon the market at prices less than cost, causing a loss of millions of dollars to the farmers, and all interests dependent upon the cotton crop. As soon as pressing debts are paid, all interests should unite to stop the rapid sale of cotton, and the price would reach 30 cents in 30 days if the sale of cotton could be stopped




