New York, Sept. 27.-Otto I Kahn, International banker and leader in world finances, is back in hi Now York offices at Kuhn, Loeb
Co., after an extended stay in Europe for a close study of conditions there. His summary is positive when he says:
"The permanent prosperity of our American farmers depends upon establishing an even keel in world affairs and keeping world farm mark ets open for our surplus, because we have no other."
of the Central European naton Mr. Kahn say
"It is appaling to contemplate etpecially, the dreadful conditions among the middle classes, their semi starvation, and, in some cases, actual starvation.
"In a snarl of animosities, jealousies and apprehensions they need and ask our co-operation, less even in a material sense than as helpful counsellors and guides. It seems to me both our duty and our advantage to heed that call. In all mode I would venture to say, in a con-
structive sense, that we could do this. "We should deal in a large vis ioned and liberal manner with the debts due us from the allied nations discriminating between war-making
loans and those made after the Arm istice. I would not relinquish any jof our claims as a free gift, but only in consideration of measures leading mitigation of conditions keening urope in turmoil."
Such a "bargain", the banker as serted, would be a good and profitable investment, resulting in secur ing not only a moral asset for Amer ca, but would be a distinct benent to us
The purchasing power of the Eu-
ropean market, he holds, may not for a time be indispensable to our manufacturers, but it is, to the prosperity of our farmers, because they have no other market for their surplus.
Rega Regarding the United States, Mr. Kahn concluded:
"An era of great prospeity and beneficent progress is within our grasp. The one cloud on the horizon of our contentment and well being has been the disturbed relationship between capital and labor.
"There is no short cut to the to tal elimination of such distressing strife, but we must build our hope on the slow but sure remedy of growing reciprocal observance of the golden rule, spirit and practice of give and take, consideration for
the rights of the public and a sincere and permanent effort at mutual forbearance and conciliation."
