My reports not quite all in but indicate 8,133,000 ginned to Nov. 1st, or 1,171,000 for the period compared with 6,646,000 last year and 1,149,000 for the same period last year. This is about 6 per cent more than was ginned last year and if we continue at the same ratio M would mean a crop of 9,600,000 but my reports indicate a smaller crop than that and I am sure the ginning will not continue 6 per cent over as it dropped from nearly 20 per cent over on the last period, notwithstanding we have had splendid weather and much higher prices than last year. I feel positive the Census will come under my figures as there are more small gins closed down than I ever saw at this time of the year. closed down than I ever saw at this time of the year.

My reports indicate the crop will be under 9,440,000 but I want to be conservative. There is very little cotton left to pick as the weather hts been favorable, labor plenkiful and high prices as in incentive to get it out. As the Boll Weevil took all the top crop and part of the middle crop there were all the top crop and part of the middle crop there was only one good picking and in some fields a light second picking.

In answer to an inquiry sent out to Cotton Mills, Merchant, Bankers, Oil Mills, Ginners & Brokers I find the general opinion is that the crop is around 10,000,000 and that such a crop will cause an advance to about 29.64 on an average and if the crop is 9,500,000 it would sell at from 35cents to 40 cents or at such a priceas would curtail consumption. While I don't think it will go above 35 cents yet I was wrong about it going to 40 cents in 1919, and 1920, but I had about it going to 40 cents in 1919 and 1920, but I had rather be conservative.

On careful investigation I find that it does not pay to hee Poison except on Ertra Staple cotton that sells around 30 to 35 cents and the supply of poison is limited so that only enough for about 5 per cent, possibly 10 per cent, of the acreage could be supplied.



Calves were raised on the ranch of R. C. Forbis, who is one of the most progressive stock farmers in Texas.

These calves were purchased of R. C. Forbis, by Bird and Siegler, of Mount Sterling, Ohio. The calves brought 10 cents on the market, at a time when such a price looked next to impossible. This would be an aver age of \$93.30 a round for them.

The above is just a little example of how Texas cattlemen are making the North rich. If we would sell our grain in calf skins instead of box cars we would fare better. It always pays to place good stuff on the markets, and by a few weeks of scientific feeding applied with good judgement the people of Texas can excell the world in fine cattle.—Roaring Springs
