Historical Marker Ready For First National Bank In March 20 Event

(State-wide release by Texas State Historical Survey Committee.)

The historical First National Bank in Cisco has been designated a "Recorded Texas Historic Landmark," and is being marked appropriately with an interpretive plate, Charles Woodburn of Amarillo, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, announced today.

The interpretive plate, made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect, will be placed by the Official Texas Historical Medallion which was awarded this structure 5 years ago. It is sponsored by the First National Bank. The marker text states: (See attached copy of inscription)

Awarding of this plate is a part of the statewide program, "RAMPS," which includes recordation, appreciation, marking, preservation and survey of historical structures. These medallions with plates may be sponsored

by private donors or organizations and by cities and counties in cooperation with the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee according to Chairman Mike Collins of Eastland. All such markers and inscription are approved by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

This type of marker is designed to recognize and interpret historical, cultural, architectural and religious significance of buildings and other structures as worthy of preservation.

The history of this structure will be placed in the State Archives and its location will be listed in the next edition of the Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers and on maps to help stimulate tourist trade in the area, provide a high point on historical tours and acquaint local citizens of Eastland County with their own unique historical heritage, Collins stated.

642 Violations Are Recorded In Hunting Season

AUSTIN—The official wrap up of the state's most elaborate hunting season disclosed some unhappy proceedings to sandwich in with the record game harvest.

The final full month found 642 hunting violations, 101 of which were dated to night hunting.

The major numerical categories involved:

84, lacking hunting licenses;

54, discharging firearm on a public road;

44, killing doe deer;

26, having untagged deer;

26, killing quail in closed season;

23, killing deer in closed season;

17, having unplugged gun;

12, deer with evidence of sex removed;

11, exceeding quail bag limit;

11, exceeding bag limit on geese;

In addition to the closed season violations on quail and deer, there were 32 cases for hunting out of season for most species, including one each for antelope and pheasant. Game wardens where pheasants have been stocked to bulwark upland game species.

Two were caught using another's hunting license, two were charged with shooting geese with a rifle, three were filed on for killing a protected bird, one person was caught trapping quail and one hunter tried to make legal game of an extra buck deer by using his bonus or antlerless deer permit.

All 32 juveniles got probation or outright dismissal for assorted charges, including discharging a gun on a public road and hunting after legal hours. But such was not the case for 101 adults who should have known better. They lacked fishing licenses.

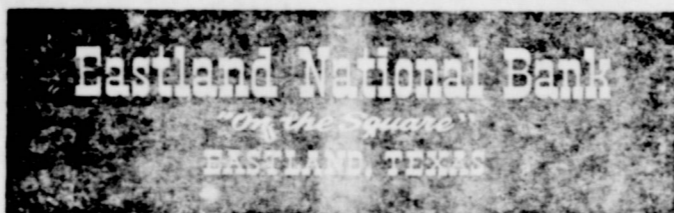

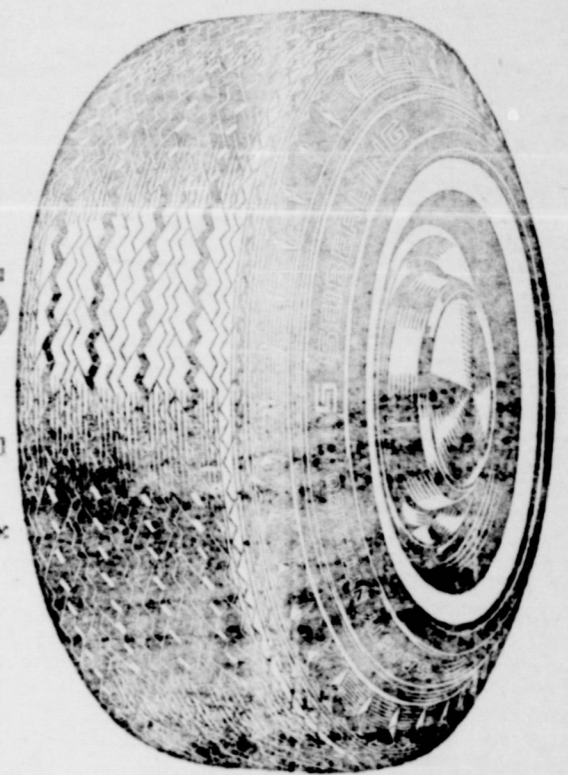

Important ASCS Dates Announced

Jesse G. Meredith, office manager of Eastland County ASCS, has announced the following important dates to remember: March 3, final date to release or request additional cotton acreage; and April 4, final date to release or request additional peanut acreage.

Meredith also said that incentive payment on mohair, wool, and unshorn lambs probably will be made in April.

Aerial control of mesquite has been added to the list of approved ACP practices. Cost-share is approved at \$1.50 per acre. The average cost for spraying mesquite by the aerial method is \$3.00 per acre and spraying should be done about 45 days after the first leaves appear in the spring. Sign-up dates will be announced by the ASCS office.

Requests for a measurement service prior to planting are now being filed. The rate of charge is \$10.00 per farm plus \$2.00 per acre based on allotment or base, whichever is applicable.

Requests for cost-share may now be filed for springing Coastal Bermuda. Recommended is 180 pounds of sprigs per acre with 150 pounds of 16-20-0 per acre. Maximum acreage for cost-share is 30 acres. Applications must be filed before work is begun.

Title I Okayed For \$100,979.00

A total of \$100,979.15 has been authorized for 624 Eastland County children in low income families, aged 5 to 17, by the Office of Education, under the Elementary - Secondary Education Act, according to word received here.

The figure was announced by Cong. Omar Burleson this week.

County School Supt. O. L. Stamey, said he figure is part of the Title One program, and actually represents a confirmation of an additional ten per cent in available money. The program had originally been authorized for 85 per cent of the total received here last year, and word was received that an additional ten per cent might be forthcoming.

This announcement confirms the additional money.

The Eastland Auction Co. reported an especially active and strong market last Tuesday. Some classes of cattle were as much as 2.50 higher. Sold were 761 head of cattle, 248 hogs, 40 sheep and goats. There were 219 consignors and 76 buyers.

Prices were reported as follows: butcher bulls, 19 to 24; stocker bulls, 22 to 26.50; butcher cows, 16 to 19; canners and cutters, 13 to 17.50; butcher calves, 21 to 24; stocker steer calves, light choice, 25 to 46, and heavy choice, 23 to 30.

Stocker heifer calves, 23 to 26; yearling heifers, 21 to 24.50; stocker cows, 100 to 130; pairs, 150 to 230; butcher hogs, 16.50 to 20; sows, 13.50 to 17; packer goats, 3.

The program for which this money is labeled is already in operation, Mr. Stamey said. J. B. Arther is coordinator of the program for the county.

HOMEMAKERS HINTS

Eastland County Home Demonstration Agent

Roses are now available in many stores throughout the county. You know, roses are probably one of the most popular of all garden plants, and anyone can grow them. However the most common error made by many gardeners is to attempt to grow too many varieties or too many plants.

There are many different types of garden roses. The shrub roses can be used as shrubs in landscape plantings in the same manner as any other flowering shrub. The most popular types, however, are the tea roses, hybrid teas, hybrid perpetuals, floribundas and climbers. The hybrid teas and the floribun-

das are the most important garden roses today and are the ones with which the home gardener is primarily concerned.

When planting, select a location in the garden where the plants will receive a minimum of 6 hours of sunlight a day. In Texas, a location that is lightly shaded in the afternoon is ideal.

Roses should not be planted too close to trees which form matted roots near the surface, such as your elms or

populars. Any well-drained garden soil, mixed with peat or other organic matter, that is well fertilized can produce good roses. The soil should be slightly acid to neutral. Highly acid or highly alkaline soils are unsuitable for growing roses successfully. Also, good drainage is the most important consideration.

In Texas, roses may be planted in the fall or spring. When plants are set out in the spring, cut the canes to 6 inches above the ground at the time of planting.

Mulching the rose bed with granulated peat moss or some other loose material, such as cottonseed hulls, ground corn-cobs, saw-dust, sugar cane pulp, etc. is a satisfactory practice to retain moisture and keep down weeds. Mulches should be about 2 inches thick. Mulching is better than cultivation.

Water plants thoroughly. Don't apply fertilizer to newly planted bushes until the root system is well established, then feed at least twice a season, and do not fertilize late in the fall.

The Extension Service has two excellent publications on the growing of roses for the home, and are available from the County Home Demonstration Agent's office in the courthouse.
