The outlook for the McAdoo School is exceptionally bright. With an unexcelled record for the second month, she hopes to do even better in the future. Of the 158 enrolled, 62 made the honor roll. Pupils are required to make an average of 85, and not lower than 90 on deportment in order to make the honor roll.

With a snappy boy scout organiza. tion of 32 members, a community welfare club, a public speaking society, and various other similar organizations, great things are expected in the future. And why should we not expect great things in the future when we are training our boys and girls to fill capably their positions in life? What is our future ray of hope if it is in not the boys and girls of to day? What is of more value to the people of Dickens county in the fature than the education of our boys and girls of today?

Why is it that Texas ranks first in the production of agricultural prowe people of Texas, of Dickens coun 1923. ty are more interested in our farms thon we are interested in the education of our boys and girls? Your answer to this question is "NO" emphatically. Our trouble is that we lack initiative. Of course we have ber, Tax Collector. the interests of our schools at heart, but have we voted on the special dolup to a very high standard with the state per capita allotment? To be our legislature gave us the privilege bock, Texas. of voting on the special tax. With the extra tax we can employ more efficient teachers, supply our schools with sufficient libraries and labora tories, and build brick school buildings that are outstanding features of adjoining counties. With these facil ities at our disposal, our education will advance by leaps and bounds.

For two years the McAdoo School has enjoyed the benefits of a special tax that was voted on by the progressive group of patrons that supports it. In that time two teachers have been added to the school, making a total of five, and the school runs two trucks for transporting children to school. Without the special tax this would have been impossible.

Theodore Roosevelt, one of our greatest presidents, said that the safest investments that America can make is for education. Hence, one of the best investments that the citizens of Dickens county can moke is an investment for our own cause of education.

We are living in an age where edu cation is not only a thing to be appreciated, but a vital necessity. It will be much more so in the near future. The boys and girls of today will be the men and women of tomor row. The responsibility for providing them for the necessities of life is our own. Will we shirk that great responsibility? Will we, through our negligence, deprive them of that necessity that will mean so much to them when they take our places in the world of strife and industry? To day is a great day because it is a day of preparation. Tomorrow will also be a great day if we prepare sufficiently today.

Let every citizen of Dickens county that is interested in the cause of education do everything in his or her power to meet the issue that is so rapidly approaching. Encourage every boy and girl of your acquaintance to be prepared for the great issue. Let every step that you take be a step of advancement and thus you will be sharing with credit to yourself and your community the responsibility that is yours and yours




