#### MATERIAL ON GROUND FOR DRIVE-IN FILLING STATION

Gravel is on the ground and the dirt will be broken immediately for the foundation of another drive-in filling station to be constructed by Ramsey & Moore of the Citizens Garage. #### JUSTICEBURG OIL TEST WELL

WAS SHOT WITHOUT EFFECT The oil test well at Justiceburg was recently given a shot of nitro glycerine in the hope of "bringing it in". However the shot did not bring about the desired end.

The well had reached a considerable depth and had the most flattering showings of oil and gas. In fact, when shot three barrels of oil per day was being drawn from the well in the slush. This fact is conclusive evidence that oil exists in that territory, and a more extensive drilling campaign will be instituted by the big oil companies, thus insuring a more thorough test if big developments do not result.



#### GOVERNORS IN CONFERENCE SAY KU KLUX ARE DOOMED

At the conference of governors held last week in Virginia Governor Allen of Kansas made the following address with reference to the Ku Klux Klan:

"The organization is as dangerous to the Protestant as it is to the Catholic and the negro because it exists only when the authority of government has been broken down and destroyed," he declared. "It brings hatred, chaos and menace to every law-abiding citizen who may fall victim of the private quarrels and animosities of the men who hide their identity behind a mask.

"The organization would be absurd, of course, if it were not for the undoubted hold which it has secured in many communities and where it operates, according to the character of its membership in that local community. In many places the appeal to creed has brought into the organization some excellent men who believe that they are addressing themselves to the real problem when they draw lines of religious preju-

"It grows very rapidly when it strikes a community and it requires about a year of experience to convince its best members that the organization has no real place of usefulness in America. It arouses the most intense bitterness; in some of the communities where I am acquainted with its activitites, friends of a life time have been estranged; families have been divided; men become suspicious of their neighbors; bigotry and intolerance have thrived; poisoned pens and serpent tongues at this conference were outspoken in




