HOW TO CURE UNEMPLOYMENT

Is it possible to have full employment — where everyone who wants to work can get a job?

Yes! This is what our traditional American free enterprise system offers us. In a free economy, there is always a need for someone who wants to work. For evidence of that, just look in the help wanted section of this newspaper.

You may not find the job you want most or the salary you dream of. Who does? But people don't starve to death in America because the capitalist system will always supply some kind of job at a livable wage.

Supply and Demand

At the same time, the miraculous private enterprise system automatically takes into consideration the real needs and wants of the consumer. A premium is thereby placed on work that is really needed, while others see lowering wages as an inducement to give up work that is no longer in demand.

This natural supply-and-demand system keeps everyone at work — and keeps production geared to our needs and wants.

Why, then, is there so much unemployment today? What has thrown this great system out of balance?

Wage Fixing

Basically, there are three main causes of our present unemployment. First, minimum wage laws keep some people — who are not worth the fixed minimum — out of work permanently. The man whose value is only \$1 per hour is not going to be hired by a firm that is forced to pay \$1.25 per hour.

Second, government unemployment-insurance systems force employers to contribute to a fund that tempts workers to remain unemployed. Why take a less-than-perfect job at \$80 per week you can draw \$60 per week for not working?

If the system were voluntary — supported by the worker's own savings — there would be more incentive to work.

Third, the government has granted special privileges to labor union leaders to permit them to force wages rates up to unrealistic levels. As with minimum wage laws, this forces the employer to make up the difference by hiring fewer people.

Capitalist System

Full employment will come when we reclaim the capitalist system that is our heritage. We should eliminate minimum wage laws, transfer unemployment insurance to a private, voluntary system, and require unions to compete on the basis of service, rather than political advantage.

Then there will be jobs available for all who want them. Production will be geared to the real desires of the people — and can help move our standard of living ever upward.

Freedom is the most beneficial commodity known to man. Why do we trade its blessings for inept political meddling?

Mountaineers Journey To Copperas Cove For District Game Friday Night

The Mountaineers will journey to Copperas Cove Friday night for their third conference game of the season. For those who have not yet been to Copperas Cove, it is right at 110 miles from Santa Anna. Best way we can figure out to get there on the map is by way of Lampasas. You go into Lampasas on Highways 183-190 and follow Highway 190 to your left and Copperas Cove is just about 20 miles away. Game time is 8:00 p. m., so fans will have to leave rather early in order to drive reasonable and get there on time.

The Bulldogs of Copperas Cove were picked to be one of the weaker teams of the district at the start of the season, but it has not turned out that way. They have a 5-2 season record and a 2-1 conference record.

Because the Bulldogs play a lot of teams that we are not familiar with in this area, we do not know a lot about their non-conference power. However, in their three conference games, they lost to Goldthwaite by a score of 6-24, which indicates they have a rather good defense and are capable of scoring.

Last week they won over Marble Falls 6-0, but according to those who saw the game, Marble Falls was keyed up rather high for the game and Copperas Cove was low for this encounter, which causes a lot of good teams to get beat. But they were able to come up with the win. They run all over Early in their first conference game, to the tune of 35-0.

In their non-conference games, they lost to Waco Reicher 28-0, but won over all their other non-conference foes: Rogers, 28-10; Academy 26-0; Thrall, 44-6. None of the other teams the Mounties play have been in a contest with any of these teams, so there is no way to compare them.

However, Goldthwaite beat the Mounties 51-0 and could have beat them many more points, then Marble Falls beat

the Mounties 22-0. This seems to give Copperas Cove the advantage by at least four TDs and possibly more.

But, the Mounties did not play the football game against Goldthwaite or Marble Falls they are capable of playing. They were not due to win against the Eagles, but it should have been a different story against Marble Falls.

All the first half statistics were in favor of the Mounties, and if they had continued their power plays during the second half, likely they would have won the game. But Marble Falls intercepted three passes and turned each interception into a score, which was the difference in the game.

After seeing the Mountaineers play the type ball they did against Baird and Dublin, it is almost impossible to believe that now they are at the bottom of the standings in district and season play. In the six games played thus far, they have scored only 23 points and half of these points were scored against Cross Plains, which has not won a game this season. Eight points were scored against Baird and 6 points against Clyde.

The Mounties need to get back their spirit of determination and cooperation they had at the start of the season. No one person is going to play the game without the help of the ten other boys on the team. Without every boy on the team doing his best on every down, there is little hope of winning. Friday night we hope to see a much improved Mountaineer squad take the field at Copperas Cove.

State Capitol NEWS

Austin, Tex. — School people have inquired whether passage of the constitutional amendment on November 9, removing the poll tax as a requirement for voting, will cut down on State aid to schools. The answer is "no".

Dr. D. Richard Bowles of Austin, former president of the Texas State Teachers Association, says repeal of the poll tax will not harm public schools financing since the levy provides only three-tenths of one percent of State aid to local schools.

Amendment does not coil for cancellation of the poll tax. It merely removes it as a requirement for voting. He added that the law is written so that if a school district lacks anything toward its minimum program, "it will be automatically made up from the Minimum Foundation Fund."

"School people who feel that the poll tax should be removed as a qualification for voting should have no hesitation about voting for Amendment No. 1 on November 9," Dr. Bowles said.

ALCOHOLISM RATE HIGH
Educating the public on alcoholism and trying to give aid to alcoholics is a very difficult job. But it is one to which the six-member Texas Commission on Alcoholism and its director, Macon W. Freeman, are devoted. It is estimated that there are close to 6,000,000 alcoholics in the U. S. with some 300,000 of these in Texas.

Freeman says the alcoholic he noted further that the

tries to hide himself. His family and friends try to shield him. Together they succeed so well that most people think he's buried on skid row.

"About three percent are on skid row. But more than 90 percent are your neighbors," said Freeman. "They have good jobs. But they are disturbed and their families are disturbed."

He said that for every 100,000 alcoholics who are rehabilitated, another 250,000 get sick. Ministers, doctors, nurses, social workers, Alcoholics Anonymous and just plain interested citizens are working just that much harder to combat the disease. He said an estimated 50 to 75 percent of "identified" alcoholics can be cured.

Texas Commission on Alcoholism works for education and rehabilitation through cooperation with other state agencies, and with some 30 community councils on alcoholism.

TEXAS IS AVIATION MINDED
Texas provides more airports for civilian aircraft than any other state. A recent survey shows that Texas has 621 civilian and joint-use airports. California, which follows second, has 505.

However, California leads in the number of aircraft — 12,073 — while Texas' civilian aircraft total is 7,325.

Aviation is the subject of a lot of talk among state agencies.

Texas Industrial Commission added a licensed pilot to its community coordinator staff.

Two flight safety supervisors with the Texas Aeronautics Commission — John G. Uranga and Laddie J. Roark — are conducting flight safety courses this month in Graham and Breckenridge.

State Legislative Council is making a study of the possibility of a state agency aircraft pool.

PARKS PULL VISITORS
Texas' 46 parks drew 7,200,000 visitors during the 1962-63 fiscal year. That's an all-time high, according to J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Of 2,200,000 autos checked, 112,932 were from out-of-state. McKenzie Park near Lubbock attracted the most visitors, with 1,800,000, closely followed by Garner at Uvalde with more than 1,000,000, and Huntsville with 614,335.

Garner Park was first in campers with 172,683. Huntsville had 93,310 and Inks Lake 38,811. Parks with more than 25,000 campers included Lake Brownwood, Palo Duro Canyon, Possum Kingdom and Tyler.

STUDY COLLEGES
Commission on Higher Education points to the need for top physical facilities, sound undergraduate programs and weeding out of course duplications at new Angelo (San Angelo) and Pan American (Edinburg) State colleges.

Commission approved gradu-

ate programs at The University of Texas Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences at Houston. But it declined to take any action on a second request for two new doctorate programs at Texas A&M.

Dr. Joaquin Gonzales Cigarroa Jr., Laredo physician, was sworn in as a Commission member. He succeeds Jack Woodward of San Angelo.

Meanwhile, the Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School, which is studying college needs, received a set-back. Its executive director, Dr. A. B. Martin, resigned due to ill health.

Dr. Martin has been on leave of absence from his job as president of Amarillo Junior College. Chairman H. B. Zachry of San Antonio said plans for replacing Martin are incomplete. Meanwhile he will remain as a member of the Committee.

PLAN INDUSTRIAL PROGRAM
Texas Industrial Commission set the stage for an expanded program after taking on three new members.

Claude Brown of McCamey, Leslie Burnett of Austin, and J. B. McDuff of Crockett attended their first session.

Ray Horton of Houston accepted appointment by Governor Connally to a new term.

Chairman E. B. Germany of Dallas named Brown chairman of a finance sub-committee. He also appointed McDuff and Burnett to the Commission's sub-committee on public relations, along with John Ben Shepperd of Odessa.

Commission ramrods the State's program of advertising for new industry to boost the Texas economy.

OIL OUTPUT CUT
Texas Railroad Commission ordered oil production for November set at the lowest point since January. Figure established was 27.5 percent of potential.

In brief that's 2,808,183 barrels daily as compared with 2,878,206 for October.

Oilmen got into a fuss at the statewide hearing.

Alvin C. Hope of San Antonio questioned "self-appointed emissaries to Washington who want to bundle up our problems and drop them in the lap of the federal bureaucracy."

Stanley Wood of the Texas Landowners and Oil and Gas Producers Association said Hope was talking about him. Retorted Wood: "Washington isn't interested in taking over. They are concerned with deterioration of our domestic reserves. They want us to get our own house in order."

INSURANCE RULINGS
Insurance companies were given until October 28 to submit recommended credit insurance rules after Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr released an opinion bearing on the \$15,000,000-a-year industry.

State Board of Insurance also announced businessmen will pay lower rates for workmen's compensation insurance coverage. Rate for manufacturing workers will be 3.7 less; for the contracting industry 0.5 percent less; for the oil industry 2.4 percent less.

ESTES TRIAL SET
Court of Criminal Appeals has set for October 30 a hearing on the appeal of Billie Sol Estes from an eight year prison sentence.

Last November 7, a Tyler jury convicted Estes, formerly of Pecos, on a swindling charge in connection with liquid fertilizer tank deals. Estes later received a 15-year federal sentence for mail fraud in the tank mortgages.

STUDYING DEPARTMENTS
State Textbook Committee recommended 116 books for public school use after studying written and oral protests against five on economics and three on world geography.

"What we want are books that will tell the students we want small government, not big government, for sound economics," said one witness, Roger K. Harlan of Dallas.

Chairman John W. McFarland, Houston, said some of the objections indicated a lack of understanding of the maturity and thinking level of present-day high school seniors.

In its final vote, the committee recommended only two books which had drawn protests.

STUDYING DEPARTMENTS
Governor Connally is paying a series of visits to State departments and agencies, studying their problems first hand.

Purpose is to establish better lines of communications bet-

ween the divisions and his office.

Says the Governor: "We need to articulate what our problems are."

DROUGHT WORRIES
Major Texas reservoirs were less than two-thirds full last month, compared with 79 percent in September of 1962, the Texas Water Commission reports.

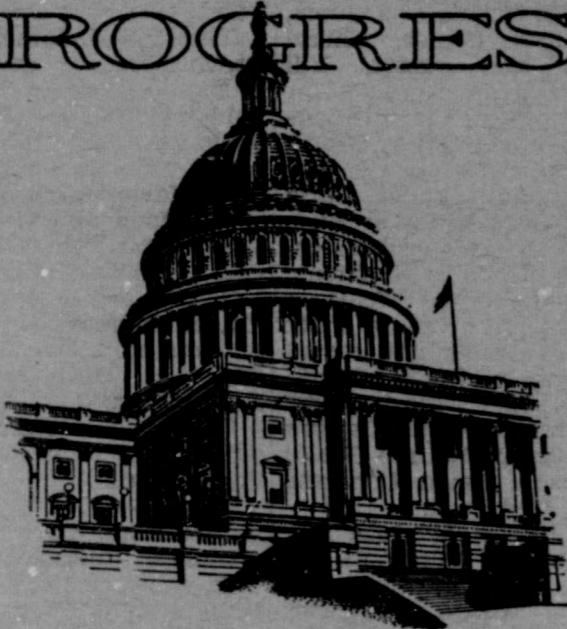

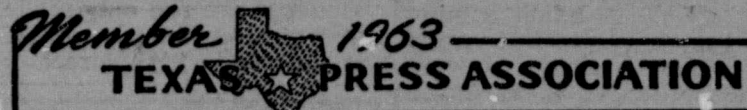

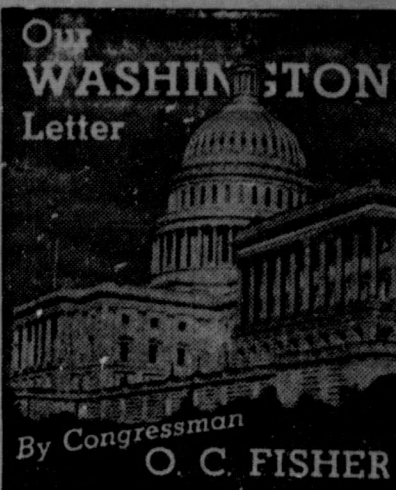

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IN A NATION-WIDE power struggle, James Hoffa, head of the 1.4 million member teamsters union, is maneuvering a uniform contract with practically all interstate trucking concerns, which conceivably could give him life-and-death control over this vital facet of the nation's transportation system.

Hoffa's excuse for this power grab is to provide a "stabilizer" with uniformity of working conditions throughout the country, a goal which would supersede the existing series of regional agreements. However, experts in this field warn that the effect could be to force more and more of the smaller, marginal concerns out of business or force them into mergers.

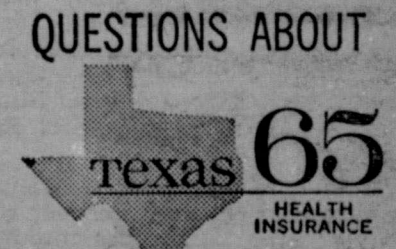
Even transcending this effect is the pyramided power over the nation's transportation system which would result. This could conceivably eventually give the fiery Hoffa the power to effectuate a nation-wide strike.

This development serves to point up the need for additional labor legislation, to protect the public against the dire consequence of one man, or a small group of men, shutting down a substantial portion of the nation's commerce at one fell swoop.

There are two ways of preventing this from happening. One would be to place all unions under the anti-trust laws, and the other would be to prohibit industry-wide bargaining. When the Taft-Hartley Act was originally approved in the House some 15 years ago the bill did both — it put the unions under anti-trust and it restricted industry-wide bargaining. The latter would have applied to both industry and unions. But the Senate deleted both provisions and the compromise version left both of them out.

I have a bill pending which would put unions under the anti-trust laws. With Hoffa advancing his empire dreams the need for legislation of this nature becomes more apparent than ever. The trouble is that the labor committees of both the House and Senate are today dominated by members who rarely ever vote contrary to the wishes of labor union leaders. But it appears that even the union leaders are becoming uneasy over Hoffa's build-up, lest it result in an aroused public opinion forcing the issue in Congress.

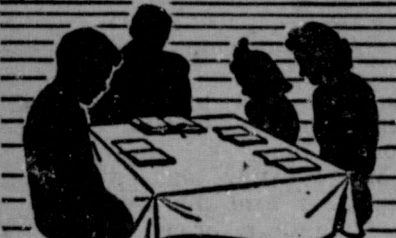

vance and to "demonstrate to all citizens the many health services and facilities available that enrich and protect their lives."

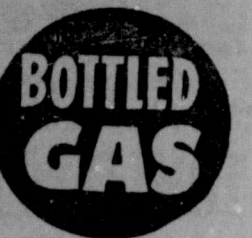

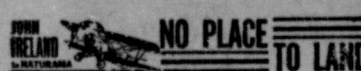

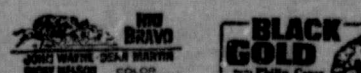
