



IN A NATION-WIDE power truggle, James Hoffa, head of the 1.4 million member teamsters union, is maneuvering a uniform contract with practically all interstate trucking concerns, which conceivably could give him life-and-death control over this vital facet of the nation's transportation system.

Hoffa's excuse for this power grab is to provide a "stabilizer", with uniformity of working conditions throughout the country, a goal which would supersede the existing series of regional agreements. However, experts in this field warn that the effect could be to force more and more of the smaller, marginal concerns out of business or force them into mergers.






