A Sermonette

Wm. A. Cokerell-Pastor Carbon Flatwood Methodist Churches

Subject: The Holy Spirit's Relationship To Preaching.

Preaching is an important factor of the church's work and worship. The Holy Spirit was related to Christ's preaching. Jesus said at Nazareth, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because He hath anointed me to preach the gospel. Luke 4:18 Christ did not preach until He had been baptized with the Holy Spirit of God. He forbade His disciples to preach until they had been baptized with the same spirit. Neither can we preach the Gospel from the pulpit or live it in our daily living until we have been baptized with the Holy Spirit. Christian preaching began at Pentecost. Peter might have begun by saying, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because He hath anointed me to preach the Gospel." Luke says that Peter and the rest "Spoke as the Spirit gave them utterance". Importance Of Zip Code Stressed

Residents in the Carbon area will be offered an opportunity to Zip Code their mailing lists during October Postmaster Arthur B. Been, has announced. "No postage needed" cards will be delivered to patrons beginning Oct. 10, the postmaster said. Cards will have blanks for addresses used most often, but for which individuals do not know the Zip Codes.

"This is a good time to get the Zip Codes missing from your lists as this Christmas, Zip Code will be as important as shopping and mailing early for the efficient and on time delivery of the record-breaking avalanche of mail expected in the pre-holiday weeks," Postmaster Been said. After filling in the street number, city and state, the cards are to be mailed back to the postmaster. Post Office personnel will add the proper Zip Codes and return the cards to the sender.

President Johnson has proclaimed Oct. 10-15 as "Zip Code Week" to promote greater usage.

Only addresses, not names of correspondents, should be listed on the cards, the postmaster said. Zip Codes represent delivery areas for postal service, not individuals

CARBON LOSES TO TOLAR 44 TO 14 THURSDAY NIGHT

The Carbon Wolverines lost their first game of the season to Tolar 44 to 14 at Tolar last Thursday night.

Tolar scored early in the first quarter and Carbon failed to score the quarter ending 14 to 0 with Tolar leading.

Ray Kanady scored on a 40 yard scamper in the second quarter and Ronnie Hughes scored on a 20 yard run with Tolar also scoring twice. The half ended 32 to 14 and Tolar went on to score two more touchdowns in the last half, the game ending 44 to 14.

Carbon plays Lingleville at Dublin this Thursday night for our first conference game of the season. This is Lingleville's first year in football and Carbon will go to Dublin determined to bring back a victory.

The junior high football team played Moran here last Tuesday night, Carbon winning 45 to 13. Bobby Carlton scored 3 touchdowns, Dale Jackson 2, Durwood Webb and Doug Bryant scored 1 each. Durwood Webb kicked several extra points after TD.

TRAINING UNION SCHOOLS ARE PLANNED BY BAPTISTS OF AREA

Cisco Baptist Association will initiate a series of Training Union Leadership schools October 3-6 and October 24-27. First Baptist Church of Eastland and First Baptist Church of Breckenridge will be hosts for the two schools, respectively. A person can choose to attend either October 3-6 at Eastland or October 24-27 at Breckenridge, the schools being the same with the exception of the facilities.

The schools represent the third phase of a comprehensive plan designed to upgrade Training Union, Southern Baptists' training program for every church.

Featured at the schools will be five new leadership manuals prepared by Baptist writers for the eight age groups comprising the organization. Representative age group leadership from a majority of the churches in the Cisco Association are expected to attend the area schools.

Local leaders who will serve as conference leaders and the age group involved are the following in the Eastland school: Rev. L. R. Penley, pastor of First, Rising Star, leader of General Officers and Pastors; Rev. Avery Sullivan, pastor of First, Ranger, leader of Adults; Rev. Charlie Cluck, pastor of Okra, leader of Young People and their leaders; Mrs. J. E. Crumbley, leader of Intermediate workers; Mrs. Fred

Watkins, leader of Junior leaders; Mrs. Bob Farrell, leader of Primary leaders; Mrs. Moody Smith, leader of Beginner leaders; and Billy King, associate of the Baptist General Convention of Texas Training Union Department, leader of Nursery workers.

The age group leadership trained in this and similar associational schools across the state of Texas will return to their churches to launch the enlarged concept of training, advancing Christian concepts of growth set forth in the new manuals.

First phase of the modern "Relay Training Stations" program of which these schools are a part came in a week-long series of conferences at Glorieta Baptist Assembly located at Glorieta, New Mexico this summer when authors of the new leadership books taught facilities of Texas Baptists.

These faculties, in turn, returned to the state to "relay" the instruction to area faculties made up of many associations in all parts of the state. This third phase is planned to give to local church leadership the same quality instruction given at the Glorieta sessions.

The current program is under sponsorship of the Training Union Department of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. The convention is made of some 4,000 churches with a membership of 1.8 million persons.

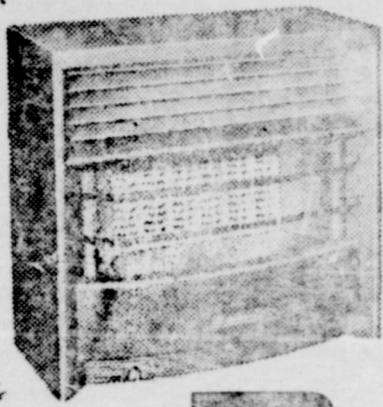
