LARRY COFFMAN WILL BE TEACHER, ASSIST'T COACH

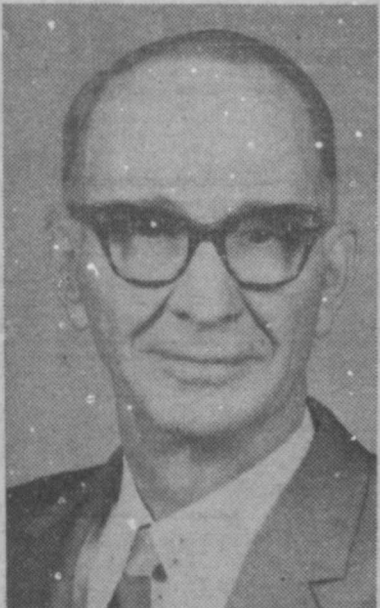
Mr. Larry Coffman, a summer graduate of McMurry College, was hired as assistant coach and social science teacher for Santa Anna High School at the regular monthly school board meeting on Tuesday night of last week. Mr. Coffman is now single but plans to be married in the near future.

A graduate of Littlefield High School, Mr. Coffman attended McMurry for four years on a football scholarship. He also has experience in basketball and track. His father is presently pastor of the Belle Plain Baptist Church at Brownwood.

Other business at the meeting included a study of the budget and the payment of the bills and accounts.

The Santa Anna National Bank was selected as the official depository for the School district for the next two years.

HPC On Early Fall Schedule

Brownwood (Spl) High school and junior college graduates who plan to attend Howard Payne College this fall should make their applications as soon as possible, according to president Dr. Guy Newman.

"With a forecast of an increase of some 250 students, we are encouraging all students to get their applications in as soon as possible," said Dr. Newman.

He added, "Students who are seeking scholarships and financial aid should contact the college, if possible by June 15."

HPC will begin this year's fall semester early enough to let the semester end before Christmas holidays. Fall activities will begin with faculty orientation, Aug. 27. Registration is planned August 28 and 29, with classes getting underway the following day.

Dr. Newman also announced that Jennings Hall which has been used to house men, is now being renovated so that it can serve as a dormitory for women this fall.

This is being done due to the opening this fall of the 12-story Sid Richardson Hall. Some 284 men are slated to live in the facility, which once served as the Brewmaster Motor Inn.

"We expect this fine facility to be among the best in the Southwest," said Dr. Newman.

CITY COUNCIL MONTHLY MEET

The Santa Anna City Council met for the regular monthly session at the City Hall last Thursday night. Mayor Thomas Wristen, Jr. presided.

The status of the budget was studied and monthly bills were approved for payment.

The Council discussed the meeting of the City Tax Board of Equalization and made plans for the group to meet at the City Hall on June 16.

The paving on Bowie Avenue, from High School to the Roe'wood Highway is slated to take place this summer.

The City fathers voted to sell the lots on Bowie Avenue just west of the Vernon Herring home. Also to be for sale is the former Blue Hardware building and some other property. Notice of the sale and advertising for bids on the property will be made soon.

Letters have been written to several property owners asking cooperation in the city-wide clean-up campaign. Many vacant lots and other property in the city have been cleaned during the last few weeks.

It was voted to close the Brownwood water pump station for repairs. The closing of the facility will not disrupt the city water service.

After an overwhelming majority of city business people approved the changing of the present system used by the nightwatchman, the Council voted to discontinue the use of a time clock by the watchman. He will hereafter be on a flexible schedule rather than a definite schedule of rounds. Although the fire insurance rate will be increased slightly for local businesses by this change, it is believed that the new procedure will be beneficial.

The next meeting of the City Council will be held on Thursday, July 3.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon for well-known postal clerk, Jack Mobley, 62, who died suddenly in the Santa Anna Hospital Friday about noon. Mr. Mobley had been hospitalized the evening before and suffered a fatal heart attack the next morning.

Born September 2, 1906 in Santa Anna, he was married to Miss Elizabeth Faye Routh on September 23, 1925, in Brownwood. He was a member of the Methodist Church, the Masonic Lodge and Eastern Star.

Survivors are the wife; one son, Jackie E. Mobley, now stationed with the Air Corps at Tuxford, South Viet Nam; one daughter, Miss Margaret Mobley of San Angelo; one sister, Mrs. Clara D. Moore of Brownwood; and one grandson.

Rev. Bobby Weathers and Rev. R. A. Brooks, Jr. were officiating ministers and burial was in the Santa Anna Cemetery.

Mr. Mobley was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Mobley, early day residents, and had been employed at the Santa Anna Post Office about 23 years.

The girls have also performed in Summer youth camps where they have thrilled hundreds of young listeners. The Ron Gardner Singers have just recently recorded a new religious album on the SUMMAR label which is owned by J. D. Sumner of the Stamps quartet.

5. A well stocked freezer. You won't have time for extra cooking either.
6. A supply of tranquilizers. You can take them if needed, or give one to your husband if the wind and rain start blowing before you are finished with the combining.

Outdoors In Texas

A fantastic lake in Texas is the impoundment generally known as "Alcoa," near Rockdale. It is one of the most "constantly good" fishing lakes of its kind.

Alcoa furnishes good fishing for bass, crappie, bream and catfish practically the year around.

This lake was built by the Aluminum Company of America, when it opened its plant near Rockdale back in the early fifties.

Alcoa Lake was stocked by the Old Game and Fish Commission, kept closed for a reasonable time, then opened to public fishing. Since then thousands of pounds of wonderful fish have been taken from the lake.

Alcoa has permitted a concession on the lake, where boats can be rented or supplies bought. There are certain necessary restrictions, but none any good sportsman wouldn't approve.

It is a picturesque spot.

San Saba wants to sell its rocky hills for fertilizing sections not so rocky. San Saba usually succeeds in what it undertakes, and while the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station found that the limestone rocks contain nitrates and potash salts, they are not in sufficient quantities for commercial purposes. Give San Saba plenty of time and some use will be found for those limestone hills.

Heavy smokestacks of the aluminum plant form a background that is most interesting. Part of the shoreline is rocky. There are also many cattails, reeds and willows along the banks. These furnish fine cover for the fish.

Alcoa Lake is kept at a fairly constant level because the company pumps in water from the San Gabriel and Little rivers some 12 miles away.

This lake is unusual from another standpoint. It has a "built in" hatchery, which produces a good crop of brood fish earlier than most other lakes in Texas.

Actually there are two lakes, connected by a deep channel. In one of these lakes the water used in the cooling process is released. This water is 10 to 20 degrees warmer than the water in the main body of the lake.

Fishing is not permitted in this water. As a result big brood bass are developed and they spawn early. Their young eventually work on out through the channel into the cooler water where they grow big and sassy.

State biologists go to this warm section every year and take a number of large brood bass for their own hatcheries. This gives them production much earlier than could be normally expected.

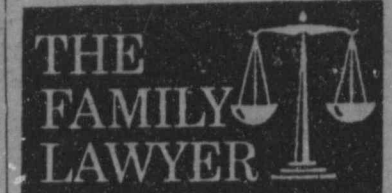
Alcoa also is one of the best crappie lakes and many fine strings are caught in the deeper water. Bream are very plentiful along the shoreline, offering good sport for fly and light tackle fishermen.

Alcoa is a popular lake not only with residents of the nearby towns, but with people from more than 100 miles away. It is one Texas lake where anglers are more likely to get a good mess of fish than perhaps from any other lake.

Near the concession building is a huge oak mott which provides ample shade for a park. Tables in the park make it a wonderful recreation area. Users help keep it clean by doing away with their own litter.

This is a lake of many regulars. The same people go there time after time. They are well acquainted with all the hotspots on the lake. Perhaps that is the reason there are so many good catch-

es reported. This fabulous lake also has meant much in the way of goodwill for Alcoa. The lake is a necessity for the plant and it could have been fenced off, like so many other similar impoundments. However, its gates have been opened by the company and everyone who fishes it is appreciative of its qualities.



Teaching Someone to Drive

On the day Margaret got a learner's permit her boy friend Fred took her out for a driving lesson. As they approached another car, waiting at a stop light, Margaret suddenly "froze". Worse, so did Fred.

Result: a collision, with considerable damage to the other car. In due course, the driver filed a damage suit against Fred.

"I'm not liable," Fred protested in court. "A driving teacher does not guarantee that his pupil will drive carefully."

Nevertheless, the court held him liable — not for Margaret's bad driving but for his own bad teaching. The judge said Fred should have made some effort, either by word or gesture, to avert the crash.

According to law, if you take on the responsibility to drive, you also take on the responsibility of doing so with reasonable care.

However, the law does recognize that a teacher's control has practical limits. In another case, after the driving lesson was supposed to be over, the pupil — acting on impulse — started the car again and jerked forward. The teacher shouted a warning and pulled the emergency brake, but not quickly enough to avoid hitting a pedestrian.

This time a court ruled

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that, while the teacher did not take over the role — and the responsibility — of a teacher, just trying to be helpful.

Nor are you held to a teacher's responsibility if you do not, in fact, occupy that role. Thus:

When an accident resulted from the improper parking of a car by the roadside, a claim was filed not only against the driver of the car but also against his passenger. It seems that, while the driver was parking the car, the passenger had remarked:

"There. I think you are far enough off the road."

But the court ruled that the passenger could not be held liable for merely giving bad advice. The judge said the occupant of a car does

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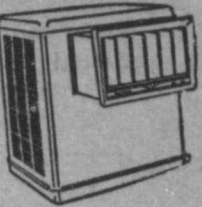

Accent On Health

If the warm spring weather has drawn you out to work in the yard — when it's not raining, that is — and you haven't had a tetanus immunization, you are, in fact, giving tetanus an open invitation to pay you a visit.

Last year it visited 17 persons in Texas — and all but seven died. Of the 10 deaths, at least eight had not been immunized against tetanus, according to State Health Department morbidity reports.

Often referred to as "lockjaw," tetanus is no respecter of persons — either by age or residence. It hits anywhere

In 1968, the disease struck down two infants under one year of age. It also claimed victims in the 1-to-4 age group, and age groups of 5-

to-9, 10-to-19, 30-to-39, 50-to-59 and 60 and older.

Tetanus is definitely a killer. Even when treatment is started almost immediately, about one-third of the victims die anyway.

Fortunately, there is an effective and safe immunization procedure against this disease.

However, an initial series of tetanus inoculations will not help if given after an injury. A booster will do, if you have had initial protection.

Spores of the bacteria which cause tetanus are almost everywhere. They are found in soil, street dust and animal droppings, particularly in manured soil. A scratch, cut or open sore may allow some of the unseen spores to enter the body.

Once inside the body, these tough spores turn into a form of tetanus germ which may secrete a powerful toxin—or poison. One-fourth teaspoonful of this toxin is enough to kill 100,000 people.

In humans, the toxin causes muscle spasms, convulsions and frequently, death. The label "lockjaw" refers to a spasm of the jaw muscle which clamps the jaw shut.

Unless you have had a basic tetanus immunization in the armed forces or from your family doctor, you must do so before an injury to be protected.

In many Texas school systems, local rules require that all students entering school for the first time must show proof that they have been immunized for certain diseases; tetanus is sometimes one of the required immunizations.

But in the preschool group and for adults who have not been immunized for tetanus or whose immunization effectiveness has expired, the need certainly exists.

Why take a chance?

Like to travel aboard a faithful mount? How about your personal mechanized mustang — an inexpensive, highly perfected, utterly dependable modern trail cycle. If you rig your machine with a carrier, saddle, bags, perhaps a scabbard useful for a rifle, shotgun, fishing rod or camera tri-pod, and if you own lightweight backpack camping gear, you have a winning setup for all sorts of adventuring afield. Trail cycling cross-country costs so little as to be inconsequential.

You need a machine light in weight so that you handle it — it should not handle you. You want to sort of crawl along, dignified — like, not blast off. As for mufflers, just make certain your own does two things: Almost silences the exhaust and it absolutely must arrest sparks. Make sure your muffler is hung high, so it doesn't hit trail obstructions.

A good trail bike is a complicated device — basically just two wheels on a welded frame engineered for abuse it likely will never encounter. This frame will hold the power unit, and it will have a drive system, suspension system, electrical and brake systems.

My companions and I have used several different types of trail machines and we've found them all dependable and reliable. At the moment we're talking about the wire-

wheeled bike rather than the disc-wheeled scooter. Some have a mechanical clutch requiring a control (mine is by hand) and other have the easily operated automatic which cuts in as the throttle is opened. Both four-cycle and two-cycle engines are available. In trail bike scooters these always are air-cooled. Four-cycles are vastly reliable, but are a bit heavy for the power output.

Unless for some reason you want it, it is no longer necessary to premix oil and gasoline for the two-cycle engine fuel.

I thing lug tires and safety glasses are a necessity. I like a powerful headlight, a speedometer and, most important, an odometer. I prefer a comfortable, adjustable seat, wide handlebars, waterproof ignition system and good brake that come an easy, gradually.

According to John Jobson, Camping Editor of SPORTS AFIELD Magazine, trail cycles are not as dangerous to your person as riding a horse or driving your car in traffic. They go slow and unless the rider is very careless indeed,

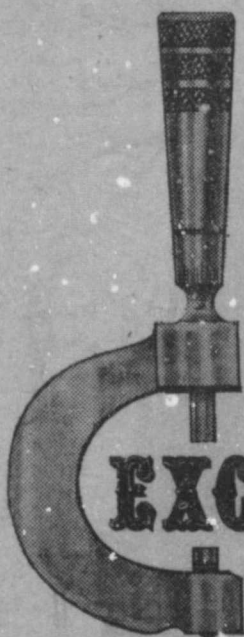

The Texas Highway Department is proceeding with plans for the reconstruction and widening of US 84, etc. from Coleman, Southeast to US 67 in Santa Anna along its existing location. It includes minor relocation for new overpass structure to replace present AT & SF Rwy Underpass for railroad grade separation. Additional right-of-way is being secured throughout the 7.2 miles limit of the project (the added strip being mainly on the west side of present roadway and a new strip for overpass and approaches).
