## Mountaineers at Work Twice Daily This Week

Football practice began for the 1969 season on Monday morning with 32 high school boys reporting for the workout. Practice sessions are being held at 7:30 a. m. and 6:15 p. m. each day this week preceding the beginning of school. After classes begin the workouts will be held during the last period of school and after classes have been dismissed.

Coaches Terry McIver and Larry Coffman are well pleased with the turnout of players and expect a few more to report Monday. Coach McIver is optimistic about the coming season and pleased

with the size of the boys participating. McIver is coach of the linemen and Coffman is working with the backfield. Also to assist with coaching chores will be Dwight Hudson, Junior High athletic coach.

Two scrimmage sessions are planned for the Mounties, the first being on Friday, August 29 at 7:30. The DeLeon team will come to Santa Anna for the practice session. The second scrimmage will be at Wylie on Friday, September 5.

## Construction On Housing Units Near Completion

Construction is almost completed on the four two-family apartment units located on the south side of the railroad just west of the old West Texas Utilities Co. According to reports, the construction company is trying to have the four new units finished by September 4.

Exterior work has been completed and curbs and sidewalks are being built around the half-block on which the apartments are located.

Nearly all of the eight apartments have already been rented, according to Mrs. Henry Newman, Housing Authority secretary.

The large two-story apartment area is well underway, but completion is not expected until about November 1. Kenneth Caspers, assistant superintendent of the construction job, said the project is about 65 to 70 per cent completed.

The construction of the two projects has progressed much faster than expected, as December 1 is the deadline on the completion, and the job is apparently at least a month ahead of schedule.

## School Year Starts Monday at Santa Anna

The 1969-70 school term of the Santa Anna Independent School District will open at 8:30 a. m. on August 25, 1969, with a full faculty including seven new faculty members. The buses will operate over their regular routes on the first day and adjustments will be made as needed to best serve the district. The lunchroom will operate on the first day and a full scheduled day of classes will be run with dismissal time at 4:00 p. m. for all students except for students in the first three grades.

The complete staff for 1969-70 is as follows: Cullen N. Perry, Superintendent; Sandra J. Cammack, Business Manager; R. C. Smith, High School Principal; James A. Harris, Elementary School Principal, and junior high math; Mrs. Dorothy Harris,

Grade 1; Mrs. Lucille Dean, Grade 2; Mrs. Margaret Crews, Grade 3; Mrs. Mattie B. Davenport, Grade 4; Mrs. Nadean Harris, Grade 5; Dwight S. Hudson, junior high science and coach; Mrs. Ruth Dodson, junior high social studies and librarian; and Mrs. Joan Allen Jones, junior high language arts, Grades 6, 7 and 8. Mrs. Loweta Pope will serve as librarian for the high school. Mrs. Gertrude Martin will teach in the second grade for a short time until Mrs. Lucille Dean completely recovers from an injury.

Assigned primarily to high school will be Ora Beth McIver, English; Tommie Ruth Tate, business and girls athletics; Winnie McQueen, home making; Larry Coffmann, social studies; and assistant coach; Terry McIver, science and head coach; Billy M. Riley, vocational agriculture; and Aubrey Edwards, band director and music.

Assigned to ESEA, Title I Special Programs are Martha Perry and Sue Newman.

Bus drivers will be Allene Rutherford, Whon-Trickham area; Delma Blair, Rockwood area; Claude Langford, Mayo-Buffalo area; Darrell Ashley, Liberty-Cleveland area; and Sybil Dean, Plainview-Shield area.

Santa Anna Independent School District contains 308 square miles with newly established assessed values of \$7,925,000, and a tax rate of \$1.75 per \$100 assessed value. An increase in enrollment is expected for the 69-70 year.

Building renovation and maintenance has been carried forward during the summer with the custodians Cap Peacock and E. E. McClintock being assisted by National Youth Corps students, Jim Edwards, Joyce Young, W. T. Young, Tommy Culpepper, Roberta Barton and Tommy Lewis. Kittle Phillips was assigned to the city library and Rosa Frausto to the summer headstart program to complete the N. Y. C. program.

One room of new furniture has been purchased to complete the replacement of all regular furniture in the high school classrooms. Some building repair on the gymnasium, band hall and vocational agriculture building is yet to be done but this work can be carried forward without interference to the school program.

There will be no general assembly on August 25 except for the high school. The faculty will meet at on Friday, August 22 in the high school, and will spend some other time Friday and Saturday in meetings with principals, arranging rooms and planning.

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*In Our Opinion*

THE TEXAS LEGISLATURE is still trying to get a tax bill written that will satisfy both the House and the Senate, and the joint committee was in session Tuesday to come up with one.

Much publicity has been given to the efforts in the Senate to relieve the consumer of the whole burden of the tax and place some of it on business.

That is a myth.

Any time a tax increase is passed it eventually gets to the consumer, one way or another. He either pays it directly or he pays it in higher prices. We know of no business who can assume the tax and not pass it on in the cost of their merchandise.

However, it sounds good and that is what the politicians want. Tuesday morning the news media quoted Gus Mutscher, speaker of the House, as saying that a compromise looked good, while Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes said that it looked like it would be hard for them to get together. Barnes wanted a business tax increase included with the bill instead of putting the whole burden on the sales tax increase.

Both, however, have ignored the possibility of taxing non-essential items like cigarettes and liquor, which the governor recommended. Governor Smith had recommended placing these items under the sales tax, which would have brought in a large amount of revenue, but the Legislature completely ignored it.

As much of the press of Texas has been saying, the liquor lobby in Austin is strong, and they can put plenty of pressure on Legislators from wet districts. It is too bad that some of our representatives and senators are vulnerable to what money can buy. They feel an obligation to those who wine and dine them, so when a bill comes up which affects their entertainers, they don't seem to be able to vote against them.

If they will stop and think, maybe it will dawn on them why the people of Texas voted down their pay raise. A lot of us are tired of discriminatory legislation, and since we only vote for our own representative and senator, that is the only way we have of letting them know how we feel.

Our other alternative is but letters, telephone calls and telegrams. They are sensitive to letters from home, and enough of them will create some pressure. Lawmakers both in Austin and Washington are susceptible to pressure, and the result is often according to who exerts the most of it. —WTH

Austin — Legislature is roaring through the final full week of a called special session with accomplishment of its major goals — adoption of a budget and a tax bill — in sight.

Senate scored a major breakthrough on its tax bill after a four hour floor debate and days of gloomy predictions of a deadlock.

Here are how tax bills passed by the House and Senate stackup, pending conference committee adjustment:

**SENATE** — An increase in the sales tax rate from three to 3.25 per cent with the levy extended to beer - liquor and telephone - telegraph services; four cents a pack increase in the cigarette tax, from 11 cents to 15 cents; 50 - cent raise in corporation franchise tax rate (to \$3.25 per \$1,000) with base for computing the tax expanded to include 25 per cent of out - of - state sales; boost in the natural gas production tax from seven to eight per cent and addition of a new documentary stamp tax of 50 cents per \$500 value transfer documents.

**HOUSE** — An increase in the sales tax rate to 3.5 per cent; a new services tax of the same amount on telephone and telegraph, professional entertainment, auto appliance and jewelry repairs, parking, laundry and dry cleaning; a five cents a pack raise in the cigarette tax and a 10-cent transaction levy on sale or purchase of stocks and other securities.

Total yield of the House bill was calculated at about \$325 million. Senate bill originally was figured at \$360 million, but a delay in its effective date may reduce the take sharply.

Senate bill would share with those cities levying a local option sales tax the new income from tax on telephone and alcoholic beverages. House bill did not propose such sharing from services levy.

Differences in the \$1.2 billion Senate and \$1.1 billion House general revenue budgets also are being hastily adjusted.

**WELFARE BENEFITS TO RISE** — Proving that what comes down eventually will go up, state welfare benefits will increase September 1.

Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), sharply reduced May 1 due to fund shortages, will rise at least 50 per cent.

Maximum grants to the aged also will increase from \$130 to \$125 a month. Aid to the disabled maximums will go up from \$64 to \$100 and aid to the blind from \$96 to \$110.

Increases were made possible by voters August 5 adoption of the constitutional amendment to raise the welfare spending ceiling from \$60 million to \$60 million a year.

Public Welfare Board authorized an increase in AFDC to 75 per cent of budgeted family needs. AFDC checks were reduced May 1 to 50 per cent of budgeted needs.

New level of assistance will represent a 30 per cent increase over the average AFDC grant as of Jan. 2, 1968, effective date of a federal requirement that by last July 1 amounts used to determine needs in the AFDC program must reflect regular cost - of - living increases.

**PRIVATE CLUB RULES STAND** — An Austin district court has refused to block Texas Liquor Control Board from enforcing new rules for private clubs effective September 1.

Club operators asked the Board for a delay pending their appeal, but the Board said its rules appear clear enough and will be enforced pending an adverse court order.

Primarily at issue are sections of the rules which would require that club guests be

personally introduced by a regular club member or accompanied by a member and that bills incurred be sent to and paid by a member. Ladies would ban cash sales by clubs.

LCE member Joe Burkett Jr. of Kerrville told complaining club operators they may be needlessly "gun - shy." Agency, said Burkett, is not interested in making unwarranted arrests and prefers a "warning system" to a "complaint system."

"The Board has no desire to be punitive," said Chairman Tom Gordon of Abilene. "But it is our duty to enforce the Texas liquor control law and that is precisely what we intend to do."

**APPOINTMENTS** — Governor Preston Smith named Joe Frazier of San Antonio as executive director of Criminal Justice Council in his office. Council met last week to consider \$1.1 million in action grants to implement the state's war on crime.

Smith appointed to the new Polygraph (lie detector) Examiners Board San Antonio Police Sgt. Gene Ralph Danish; Hyden Allen Albert of Austin, supervisor of Texas Department of Public Safety polygraph section; Bobby Harvel Musser of Houston; James Davidson Williams of Dallas; William Dodge of Lubbock and Dee Estes Wheeler of Fort Worth.

Dr. Billy R. Walker, Ph. D., of Abilene was named Saturday as superintendent of San Angelo Center of Mentally Ill and Mentally Retarded. He has been assistant superintendent of Abilene State School since 1967.

DPS promoted to Texas Ranger captains Sgt. Bill Wilson of Austin and Sgt. J. F. (Pete) Rogers of Houston. Wilson will command Company B in Dallas, and Rogers Company C in Lubbock.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES** — State Board of Insurance can consider insurance company investment income in setting auto coverage premium rates, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held in a new opinion. But Martin said he could offer no advice as to whether the Board should take invest-

ments into consideration in rate making.

In other recent opinions, Martin held that:

New theft - of - fish law may be enforced by Parks and Wildlife Department officers if the offense is committed in their presence or view and fish taken from the fish farm have value in excess of \$200. Otherwise, enforcement lies with regular peace officers.

Dimmitt Feed Yards Inc., a custom cattle feeding lot, is not obligated to furnish to county tax assessor a list of the names of those owning cattle located within its confines on January 1.

**WATER STUDY** — Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake introduced a resolution creating a legislative - citizens study committee to take a full look at the Texas Water Plan, now that the voters refused to ap-

prove the \$3.6 billion state bond issue to help finance the 50 - year water program.

Committee would be composed of three private citizens, three senators and three representatives. They would investigate other possible ways of financing the state water plan. Opponents of the bond issue raised the question that the effect of 67 reservoirs and two large canals on the ecology of the state had not been given enough consideration by the Texas Water Development Board. Committee would hold hearings over the state on that.

Recommendations would be made to the Legislature in 1971, thus making it possible for a new election to be held that year or in 1972 on a finance plan.

### Old Glasses Aid Needy People See

"These glasses were my grammy's, maybe someone else's grammy can use them." The note was written in a childish hand, strapped around a pair of eyeglasses and mailed to "New Eyes For The Needy," a Short Hills, N. J. volunteer organization that is staffed mostly by housewives.

Some 883,835 pairs of glasses were sent to "New Eyes" last year. They didn't all come with touching notes, but they came from every state and from people of all ages. And they came for the same reason—a desire on the part of the sender to assist "New Eyes" in bringing the gift of better sight to people who have no one else to help them.

The "New Eyes" volunteers have been on the job for 36 years, and donated reusable glasses have always been the mainstay of the operation. When the organization was incorporated in 1947, the treasury consisted of 47 cents.

Despite this "New Eyes" has never solicited money. Besides glasses, virtually the only other assistance the 300 volunteers who make up the organization accept is pre-usable jewelry and silverware antique and costume jewelry.

These are melted down and the money from the reclamation, and from the sale of usable jewelry and silverware donors sometimes send, is used to supply funds established in 106 hospitals all over

the country, Canada and Puerto Rico. They pay for new prescription glasses, or if needed, artificial eyes.

While the emphasis is on helping as many people as possible, as quickly as possible, "New Eyes" volunteers don't close their eyes to individual request for aid.

In 1968 for instance, "New Eyes" answered the request of a Peace Corps volunteer and sent glasses to the natives of a tiny Pacific island.

Provided glasses for a Viet Nam civilian whose poor sight was the subject of a letter from that country written by a U. S. Army private.

Started a fund to aid a mid-western clinic created by medical students and their instructors to assist poor people not eligible for public assistance because of the limited period of their residence.

One of the happiest aspects of providing assistance is the thank you letter which come in from grateful recipients.

As it fell it pinned Daniels and seized his foot. Mr. Green cut the animal's throat with a pocket knife before it would release its victim. Daniels was reported resting well at his home.

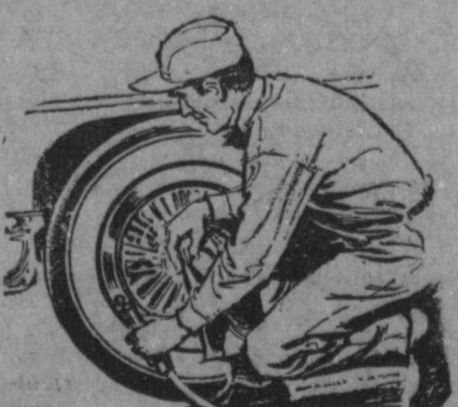

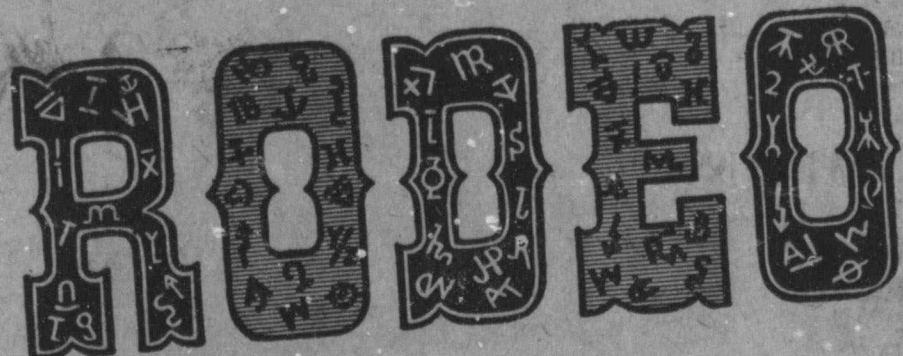

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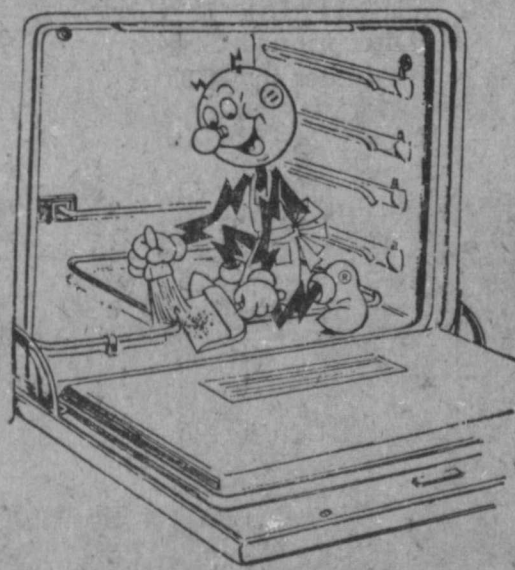
