City Beautification Is Garden Club Goal

Visitors to the downtown area have probably noticed the little park located on Wallis Avenue between North 3rd and 4th Streets. The well-landscaped area is the new project of the Mountain City Garden Club and is named as a memorial to Mrs. Kate Mathews, organizer and first president of the club.

Started just last year, the large lot for the park was donated by the city. The head-high weeds and rubble were cleaned off the area with the help of Pct. Commissioner Jake McCreary and his crew. The city employees helped by cleaning the alley along the back of the property.

Shrubbery, trees and grass were planted by the Garden Club members during the early spring, and L. E. Storey made and donated an attractive planter.

A picnic table and benches have been bought by the club and placed at the park, and a friend of the club who has a nearby business has watered the grass and plantings each week.

Although the Garden Club does not meet during the summer months, members of the group have met there often to hoe, weed, and trim and water the non-bearing mulberry trees that were planted on Arbor Day last January. The thriving bermuda grass has been mowed each week and flowers planted in the wrought-iron planter.

Although the small park is already an attractive place, Garden Club members plan other improvements to the area. A bird bath is being built and a marker designating the memorial park will be erected. Landscaping is

planned for the area between the curb and the sidewalk at the south side of the park.

Local people salute the Mountain City Garden Club with their beautification project in the downtown area of our little town.

Carl Benton Is Named Trustee

At the Thursday night meeting of the Santa Anna District Board of Trustees, Carl Benton was chosen to fill the place of John McDaniel who has resigned. The appointed term is until next regular election, which will be the first Saturday in April.

In Our Opinion

PRESIDENT NIXON'S plans for the reorganization of the welfare system in this country are an unknown factor at the present time. There has been no definite plans made apparently, only general ideas have been forthcoming.

It has all the earmarks of the "guaranteed annual wage" which has been under discussion for some time. There is no doubt that the present welfare system is not successful. It gives recipients no incentive to find gainful employment, and in fact, penalizes them if they do. The rolls are growing by leaps and bounds, and it would appear that if the President's plan is adopted, the rolls would double in short order.

When people are on welfare, somebody has to pay the bill. The more we have on the rolls, the less we have to pay the bills because it has to be those who are gainfully employed or in business themselves who do the paying.

What are we going to do when those who pay grow less in number and those who don't grow more? The per capita cost is going to get pretty high. Then the borderline cases can't afford the cost, so they become recipients instead of payers.

So goes the spiral, and one of these days we will run out of those who can pay—then what do we do? There has been a trend toward socialism in this country for 30 years or more. In the beginning it was necessary to do something because this country was suffering the greatest depression of its history. There were no jobs available and people had to eat.

In these times, it is hard to get anyone who will work. Everybody wants an executive position, one that is short hours and big pay and which does not involve working with one's hands. Nobody wants to start at the bottom and work up, because that kind of work carries no prestige, and besides the pay is only nominal. And in addition if they go to work their welfare will be cut off, and many draw almost as much in welfare payments as they can earn on a job.

Granted, anyone who is not physically able to work, or for some legitimate reason cannot work, should certainly be taken care of. This is a rich country and we have plenty of food and clothing for everybody. But when able-bodied men and women refuse to accept jobs that are available and sit back and live on hand-outs, then we, for one, don't feel like digging down in our pockets to feed and clothe them.

Like the applicant who asked for a bed for their baby because he had outgrown the box the new television set came in.

ACTION IN THE TEXAS LEGISLATURE on the passing of a tax bill is evidently an example of the pressure of public concern. The House leadership seemed determined that they would not approve the sales tax on alcohol beverages, but no doubt the people back home changed the minds of some legislators.

After dragging their feet until the Governor had to call a second special session, they finally got down to business and passed the tax bill, very similar to the one the Senate had sent to them in the first special session.

Texans can't be very proud of the demonstration of law-making carried on in Austin this year. In fact, it is the opinion of many to whom this writer has talked, that the action of the whole was a disgrace to the state.

Now we have some good men in the Legislature, but too many times the job is obtained by those who use it strictly as a stepping stone to further their career elsewhere and don't really worry about, nor care, what the people back home want. Many a young lawyer, fresh out of school, has used his term in the legislature to make contacts for further retainers. And some people in the state don't hesitate to reward their loyalty while in the law-making body.

It may be hard to prove, but it is a well-known fact.

CAPT. STEARNS GETS AIR MEDAL

Capt. Sherman Stearns was awarded the Air Medal on July 24, 1969 for his meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight in Vietnam from Feb. 4, 1969 to June 26, 1969.

The official citation reads: "The Air Medal is presented to Capt. Sherman Stearns, United States Army, for distinguishing himself by meritorious achievement during sustained aerial operational activities against hostile forces in the Republic of Vietnam during the period of Feb. 4, 1969 to June 26, 1969.

Social Security Suggestions

"Don't delay, do it today" might sound like an overworn cliché, but it is a very important suggestion to a person nearing his 65th birthday, R. R. Tulley, Jr., Abilene social security district manager announced today.

Failure to make an application on time has resulted in a loss of cash benefits and Medicare protection to some Big Country residents, he reported.

A worker should file his social security claim during the three month period before his retirement date, he stated, and certainly during the three months before his 65th birthday, whether he is contemplating retirement or not.

He emphasized that early filing of the claim allows the social security office adequate time to assist the claimant in securing the required proofs for approval of his claim, and also assures the payment of benefits promptly.

Tulley said that cash benefit applications can be retroactive for a period of one year if all conditions of entitlement are met. But there is no retroactivity to a claimant's election of supplementary medical insurance under Medicare. This is why it is imperative that people make their applications in the three month period before age 65 is reached.

Tulley urges everyone nearing 65 to contact a social security representative and file for these benefits. The Abilene office is open 9-5 Mondays through Friday; it also remains open each Tuesday 5-7 p. m.



Mimics, Unlimited

Mimicking the famous is, and always has been, a favor mode of humor. Prince or president, magnate or movie star, anyone in the public eye can expect to see his idiosyncrasies turned into fodder for laughs.

Some are pleased, perhaps on the theory that imitation is the sincerest form of flattery. But suppose the person mimicked is not pleased. Does he have a legal kick coming?

As a rule, the answer is no. Whatever anguish he feels is considered one of the penalties of fame. The law gives a kind of poetic license to the mimic to practice what it calls "a distinct variety of the histrionic art."

However, there are limits. Even the famous are entitled to be shielded against the imitator who goes too far.

For one thing, mimicry must not be used as a device for defamation of character.

"A person shall not be allowed," said a judge, "to murder another's reputation in jest."

For another thing, the mimic even though telling no lies — must not violate the right of privacy. He must not expose those areas of the person's life that are not "fair game" for public dissection. Thus, revelation of a tycoon's personal peccadilloes, if totally unrelated to his business career, might well be an invasion of his privacy.

What if the mimic uses imitation not for humor at all, but rather to pass himself off as the real thing? In one case, an actor assumed a name and mannerisms similar to those of a famous entertainer, so as to trick audiences into coming to see him.

But a court finally halted him with an injunction, partly to protect the original entertainer, partly to protect the public. As one judge put it:

"First, a man who has a reputation for excellence is entitled to be protected in the reputation thus established; and second, the public should be protected against whomsoever places a counterfeit article on the market in the likeness of the genuine."



What is inside the earth?

If the earth were cut open, it would look as it does here in this illustration. As you can see, the earth is made up of three main layers—the



CUTAWAY VIEW OF THE EARTH
The crust, the mantle, and the core. The topmost layer is the crust. It is made of solid rock. The lower boundary of the crust is the Mohorovicic discontinuity, or Moho for short. It was named for Andrija Mohorovicic, the Yugoslav geologist who discovered it in 1909. The Moho separates the crust from the layer beneath it, the mantle. The mantle goes down to a depth of about 1,800 miles. It is also made of solid rock. The innermost part of the earth is the core, which

is about 2,100 miles in radius. Because of the great heat, the material of the core is liquid. Some scientists have suggested that there is an inner core of solid metal about 1,600 miles in diameter.

What are the equinoxes?

On March 21 and September 23 the night is 12 hours long everywhere on earth. Daytime, too, is 12 hours long, so the night and day are equal in length. Therefore these two dates are given the Latin name equinox, which means equal night.

Suppose a tree crashes to the ground in a forest where there is no one to hear. Does the sound exist?

There would be no sensation of sound, because a sensation can exist only if there is a brain to receive the sensation "signal." But there would be a sound, because a sound is a disturbance in the air. The crashing tree sends out sound waves even if they are not received by an ear and changed into the sensation of sound.

STATE Capital NEWS

By VERN SANFORD

Austin — Legislators battled wearily toward a conclusion of the second special session, with some indications of a conclusion developing.

A Senate - written version of the tax bill came within six votes of adoption in the House. But Representatives balked at the Senate's compromise \$357.6 million tax bill which included a new "destination allocation formula" designed to collect a corporation franchise tax on out-of-state industries selling products in Texas.

Senate first turned a deaf ear to the House request for a new conference committee.

Governor Preston Smith and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes pressed hard for House adoption of the Senate amendments to HB 4, but Speaker Gus Mutscher said the measure remained a "bad bill."

Only really - new idea in the compromise was the destination allocation formula.

Otherwise it called for a quarter per cent increase (to 3.5) in the state sales tax and inclusion of beer and liquor under its base; five cents a pack raise on cigarettes; 50-cent (to \$3.25 per \$1,000) raise in corporation franchise tax rate; one half per cent (to 7.5 per cent of value) hike in natural gas tax; and 10 cents a drink tax on alcoholic beverages sold in private clubs and on airlines.

Rep. John Allen of Longview denounced the big-city members for failure to support the tax bill. He pointed out that of 19 members from Harris County, only one voted for the tax bill. And this is the county that gets 20 per cent of the state spending, Allen said.

Allen noted that other big-city delegations voted against the bill, except for the Dallas delegation, and that 54 of the 68 votes cast for the bill, were from members from rural or small-city areas.

He pointed to the coming reapportionment after the 1970 census and asked: "How will we ever pass a tax bill when Houston gets 24 members and only one of them will vote for a tax bill?"

This rural-urban split in the House was just one of many developments as the weary legislators fought to put a majority of each house together on a tax package to sustain state government during the next two years.

Senate first enacted, then

backed down on its unusual proposal to levy a -1 per ticket tax on admissions to "dirty movies." Original bill would have designated the Commissioner of Bureau of Labor Statistics (who supervises boxing and wrestling) to review all movies coming into the state and determine those which should be rated "X" for adult only. The latter were targeted for the tax. After thinking it over a couple of days, Senate bowed to the advice of members who argued that the regulation of sexy movies should be left to a separate bill, not a tax measure.

Increase in teachers' and state workers' pay, expansion of the college and university system, and improvements in the care of the mentally ill account for most of the increase in state spending.

But how to put together a tax package to provide the money was the question which troubled the legislators in the second week of the second special session.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Smith named Charles D. Mathews of Dallas to Texas Board of Insurance and designated Ned Price, formerly of Tyler, chairman of the major state agency.

Smith picked Reynaldo Ferrer Luna of San Diego and Frank Randall Nye Jr. of Rio Grande City as judge and district attorney respectively of the new 299th judicial district, for Starr, Duval and Jim Hogg counties.

At the same time, he selected Ted Zanderson Robertson of Dallas judge of Juvenile Court No. 2 in Dallas. Senate quickly confirmed all three. Jackson B. Smith Jr. and Wallace Harland Miller of Houston were named to domestic relations and juvenile court benches there.

Smith placed on the new Commission for Rehabilitation Mrs. Marjorie Cone Kastman of Lubbock, John David Simpson Jr. of Austin (Chairman), Dr. John James Hinchey of San Antonio, Dr. Clifford Stanley Knappe of Waco, John Thomas Bean of El Paso and Jack Burris Dale of Houston.

Capt. Richard Gerald Johnson of Beaumont, Capt. Theodore Ralph Morgan of Groves and Capt. Samuel William Livingston, Daniel Jackson Simonton and Harold Edwin Weaver, all of Port Arthur, were designated by the Governor as branch pilots for Sabine Bar, Pass and Tributaries.

James R. Ray of Plainview will serve on Smith's staff and assist the new Committee of Human Relations. **GUEST RULE DELAYED** — Tough new rules of the Liquor Control Board to curb temporary

guest card abuses at private bottle clubs cannot be enforced pending appeal of a court test case here.

District Judge James Meyers concluded that LCB rules are valid, but they should not be put into full effect until final disposition of the case on appeal.

In the lawsuit, Dallas clubs claimed the rule would close 75 per cent of Texas private clubs, many of which aren't so private. Rule would require guests to be personally introduced or physically accompanied by a club member. Bills would have to be paid by members on monthly statements, not in cash by guests.

LCB said applications for late hours (2a.m.) drinking permits for clubs and taverns are being screened carefully. Only 18 were approved in the week before the new curfew-stretching law went into effect September 1.

SADLER INVESTIGATION REQUESTED — An investigation of allegations made against Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler under careful procedural safeguards has been proposed to the House by Rep. Temple Dickson of Sweetwater, one of the men who fought an attempt by Rep. Frances Farenhold of Corpus Christi to censure Sadler.

Dickson's resolution would require any investigating a bill of particulars on what is to be allegations made by members of the Legislature. It would require the committee to allow the subject of an investigation to be present at its meetings either in person or by counsel and be entitled to cross-examine all witnesses. Bill also would require that all testimony be under oath and that it be transcribed by a court reporter. And it would give the committee subpoena power, both inside and outside Texas.

Resolution directs Speaker Mutscher to refer the matter to an appropriate committee. Mutscher already has said that he will refer it to the House General Investigating Committee, and that Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria will be chairman of that committee.



Coleman County -- From Its Beginning

Ed. Note: The following is the first of a series of articles written for publication in the NEWS by Mrs. C. D. (Leona Banister) Bruce on the formation and early history of Coleman County. Mrs. Bruce is author of two books, *Trickham, Texas*, published in 1966, and *Banister Was There*, a biography of her late father, published in 1968. We know our readers will enjoy the articles about Coleman County history and early-day families in the area.

Coleman County was named for Robert Morris Coleman, a native of Kentucky, who was born in 1797 and came to Texas in 1832. A veteran of a Kentucky military company, he was appointed the captain of the first ranger company in Texas. He spent much time defending the frontier, and a log blockhouse on the Colorado below Austin was called Coleman's Fort, about 1835.

Coleman was a signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence, an aide on the staff of Gen. Sam Houston at San Jacinto, and was prominent in the formation of the

new republic. He, his wife and their four children lived on their estate near Velasco, and he seemed destined for a career of wealth and fame.

But seldom in history has a family suffered such complete disaster. In 1838 Coleman was drowned in a boating accident off the coast; the widow and her young children stayed on the plantation, proud to be Texans, but the next year a raiding band of Indians attacked the settlement and fell fiercely on the Coleman household. Mrs. Coleman and the oldest son were killed and scalped, and the three younger children were carried away by the raiders, never to be heard from again.

In 1856 a county was created out of Travis and Brown Counties and named Coleman for the San Jacinto hero. Near the center of the state, it is drained by several noteworthy creeks, including two named for Comanche Indian chiefs, the Jim Ned and the Mukewater. During the ten years of the Texas Republic, many explorers came up the Colorado and its branches, and at that time the Indians were generally friendly to them.

The first maps of Central Texas made for the white men showed a round mountain between the Colorado and the Pecan River, called High Peak; by 1829, a map made for Stephen F. Austin and now in the Alamo Museum, says "Santa Anna's Peak." Incidentally, I have chosen "Santa Anna's Peak" for the name of my third book of Texas history, which will be published early next year. Dr. Rupert N. Richardson in the yearbook of the West Texas Historical Association for 1935 tells that Moses Austin and his son, Stephen F. Austin, came up the Colorado in 1820 and into this area on a tour of inspection with a view to settle-

ment of colonists.

What may have been the Comanche name for Jim Ned is not known. Most of the well-known Indians of the time had one or more names, the explorers spelling them in various ways; thus the Mukewater Creek was an attempt at the name of the Comanche, Mukewarrab, or Mukewaka or Mugua-ra, who camped on its banks. The eminent settler and trader, Noah Smithwick, who was also a Texas Ranger, wrote his memoirs, "The Evolution of a State," which has become a classic of its type and time.

Smithwick was asked by two Comanche chiefs to meet with them in council on Brushy Creek, above Austin, in 1837, and agreed to go. On his packhorse he took articles he would need for several weeks stay with the Indians, and also some for trading and for gifts to them. Reaching the place of council, he found about 50 lodges, about 100 warriors and many women and children. The head chief was Mugua-ra, who received Smithwick civilly, and as the days passed they achieved friendly relations. The white man stayed with this band for some three months, making at least two moves with them. They had a common language, Spanish, and the observant Smithwick noted carefully their customs, possessions, people, and learned some Comanche words.

This band had six prisoners, a white woman and two white children and a Mexican woman and two Mexican children. Smithwick asked the white woman if she did not wish to return to her people, but she had been captured as a child and was one of the wives of a warrior, and had no desire to leave the Comanches.

It has occurred to this writer to wonder if this woman could have been the daughter of Robert Coleman. What bitter irony if the poor girl had grown up to a life of slavery and poverty along the Mukewater Creek, in the very county later named for her illustrious father.

In future articles, the stories of the formation of the county and of the early families who settled here will be told.
