Veterans New Educational Benefits Listed

Approximately 28,000 veterans in the Waco Veterans Administration Regional Office Area are expected to apply for educational benefits under PL 89-358 during the first year, according to Jack Coker, Manager of the Waco Regional Office.

The first payments have now been issued to veterans enrolled in summer schools and these payments were for attendance during the month of June. Payments may be made only after the VA receives a certificate of attendance submitted by the veteran at the end of each month he is in attendance.

Coker cautioned that students reporting for school this fall should have sufficient fund in addition to enrollment costs to support themselves for at least two months, since it takes approximately that long before the first VA check may be issued. Students should be prepared also to supplement educational allowance payments, as normally these payments will not be sufficient to cover all of their educational expenses.

Veterans applying for benefits will receive a certificate of eligibility showing the school and the training objective they have selected.

These are presented to the schools which in turn will certify veterans' enrollments. Coker urged that veterans be

Good General Rain Leaves Area With Bright Peanut Prospects

Rainfall that measured from 1.5 to more than 3.0 inches fell over this region last Wednesday to brighten the outlook for an outstanding peanut crop in Eastland County.

Rainfall reports included 2.9 inches in Cisco, 2.0 at Cross Plains, 3.2 in Eastland, 1.5 at Gorman, 1.8 at Moran, 2.6 at Putnam, 3.2 at Rising Star, and 2.0 in Ranger.

The late summer rain dropped temperatures to the low 60s at night and to the 70s during the day, bringing welcome relief from heat that had been in the middle 90s for several days. Forecasts called for showers and cooler weather to prevail for the weekend.

The rain was general over the area and is expected to ensure that they meet entrance requirements and that they will be accepted by their chosen school before filing an application for educational benefits.

much of the state, causing flood conditions in far West Texas and New Mexico.

County Agent J. M. Cooper said that he could not remember when the county's peanut fields, both irrigated and dry land, looked better. It is too early, he noted, to determine what will be on the vines, but they are particularly attractive. He had just completed a tour of the county's crop areas Tuesday.

The peanut acreage in the county is approximately 33,000 this year, Mr. Cooper said. This was a little over last year's acreage.

Mr. Cooper attributed the good crop outlook in part on use of a new dusting idea for leaf spot. This position has after a high crop yield, poor tronic duster that gives the sulphur base material an electric charge as it leaves the machine. This causes it to stick to the leaves for maximum results, he said.

The pecan crop will be about 15 per cent of normal this fall, Mr. Cooper believed. This was attributed by the veteran orchard specialist to a tendency of trees to "rest" after a high crop yield, poor pollination, and the fact that case bearers (insects) hatched later than usual this year — after most orchards had been sprayed for them.

The orchard of Earl Walker, who lives south of Cisco, has the best crop prospects of any pecan trees in the county, Mr. Cooper believed.

The Eastland County Pecan Growers Association is making plans for its annual fall pecan orchard tour on Sept. 16, Mr. Cooper reported. An announcement on this event will be released soon, he added.

Stock tanks were in excellent condition throughout the county. Fields were in good shape for fall grain and cover crop planting, Mr. Cooper reported.



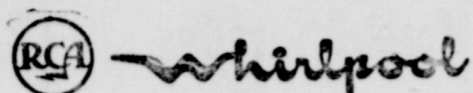

Area 4-H's Get Calf Advice At Gorman Field Day Saturday

Getting tips on how to select show calves and how to care for them at the Saturday 4-H Calf Field Day in Gorman were 4-H'ers from Cisco Rising Star, Morton Valley and host club, Gorman.

Among the 75 people present were 4-H'ers Lynne Phippen, Mike, Bill and Larry Farnsworth and Tommie Bobby, Caddy and Caryn Lee of Cisco; Carter and Cynthia Hounsel of Rising Star; Bobby and Barbara Williams, Teddy Jordan and Ed Harrison of Gorman; Gary Wheat of Morton Valley. Twenty-six calves were exhibited.

Buck Wheat, adult 4-H leader from Morton Valley, told the youngsters what to look for when selecting show calves. He said how calves place in shows depends a great deal on the judge's discretion.

He suggested that anyone choosing a show calf should look at the animal as a whole instead of picking out the good points or bad points.

Ranger veterinarian, Dr. John Foster, told the 4-H'ers about cattle diseases and how to cope with them.

Giving the welcome address to the 4-H'ers and leaders was Bobby Williams, beef leader in the Gorman club. The host club demonstrated calf washing. Those participating

were Barbara Williams, Teddy Jordan and Ed Harrison.

Owners of the 26 calves exhibited reported the average daily weight gains of the animals and introduced the breeders. 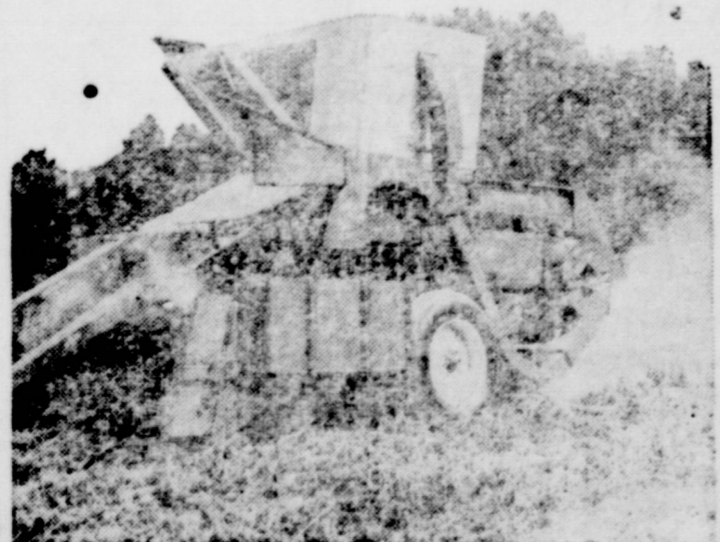
