## CARBON SCHOOLS READY TO OPEN NEW YEAR'S WORK AUGUST 29

The Carbon schools will begin at 8 a. m. August 29 with high school registration set for Friday, August 26. All teachers and bus drivers have been hired for the coming year. In recent action the school board employed Mrs.

Euel Allison, Mrs. Ruby Wright and Larry Allen as teachers.

New to the system is Larry Allen, an August graduate of ACC and a former member of the Wildcat team. Larry will serve as a teacher and coach all sports for boys. He is a native of Hisboro where he competed in football, basketball and track. His wife, Diane, will serve as a teacher's aide under the Federal Program for Education. Larry will teach business.

Mrs. Wright has been a

teacher in the Crane School System for 22 years and she and her husband have moved to a farm between Carbon and Kokomo. She holds a bachelors degree and a professional certificate in both elementary and high school. She will teach seventh and eighth science and math.

Mrs. Alison, who previously taught here, will teach social science in high school and other subjects.

## Big Investment Is Needed To Keep State Highways Modern

ASTIN — Texas will need to invest more than one-half billion dollars a year in new highway construction by 1985 to keep pace with the growth of the state, a new study released today by the Texas Highway Department predicted.

The forecast was contained in a 24-page brochure entitled "The Great Challenge . . . Texas Highway Needs." The report is based on projections made by planners in the department.

By comparison construction expenditures in Texas in 1965 were \$348 million.

A highway system to meet the challenge of the future requires active, alert public support, the brochure said. It also requires sound, adequate financing.

"The public should be alert to any attempts to divert or disperse any current highway revenues," the report warned. It added:

"The failure — even by one day — to fulfill the obligation to build better, safer highways will be costly in human life and suffering. The economic loss is irrecoverable."

The report pointed out: "A vibrant economy produces its own problems. Population growth, the rapid urbanization of Texas, the increasing number of motor vehicles and the complexities of modern society compel a constant vigilance."

By 1985, the brochure noted, Texans will drive a total of more than 77 billion vehicle miles each year, compared with 52 billion vehicle miles rolled up in the state in 1965.

Vehicle registration will more than double — from 6.2 million to about 14 million in the next two decades.

To keep pace, the State-maintained highway system is expected to grow to a total of 79 thousand miles. Presently, 68.5 thousand miles of highways are under State maintenance.

More significant, Highway Department planners said more miles of high-type highways will be needed to carry ever-increasing burdens of traffic. In the next two decades, 17 thousand construction miles of new freeways should be built, including traffic arteries on new locations and conversion of older, conventional roads to freeways.

In general, all existing highways will require one reconstruction and two resurfacings before 1985. All bridges built prior to World War II will require replacement.

The report notes the role of the highway system in the unprecedented growth and development of the state during recent years.

The Texas Highway Commission presented the report to Governor John B. Connally as an aid to consideration of future highway needs of Texas.

**3,000 Home Loan Applications Filed**

Nearly 3,000 applications for home loans under the new GI Bill program have been received from Texas veterans, the Veterans Administration reported today.

A VA study to determine what impact the Veterans Readjustment Act of 1966 (new GI Bill) has had on the nation's economy also showed 7,137 Texas veterans have applied for certificates of eligibility for loans. Jack Coker, manager of the VA Regional Office in Waco said. The number of applications

for GI home loans is considered important because the lender usually makes the application, indicating the loan has gone through the initial, or interviewing stage, Coker said.

Nearly 42,000 applications for home loans under the new GI Bill have been received nationally, the VA manager said. Throughout the country 135,000 veterans have applied for certificates of eligibility.

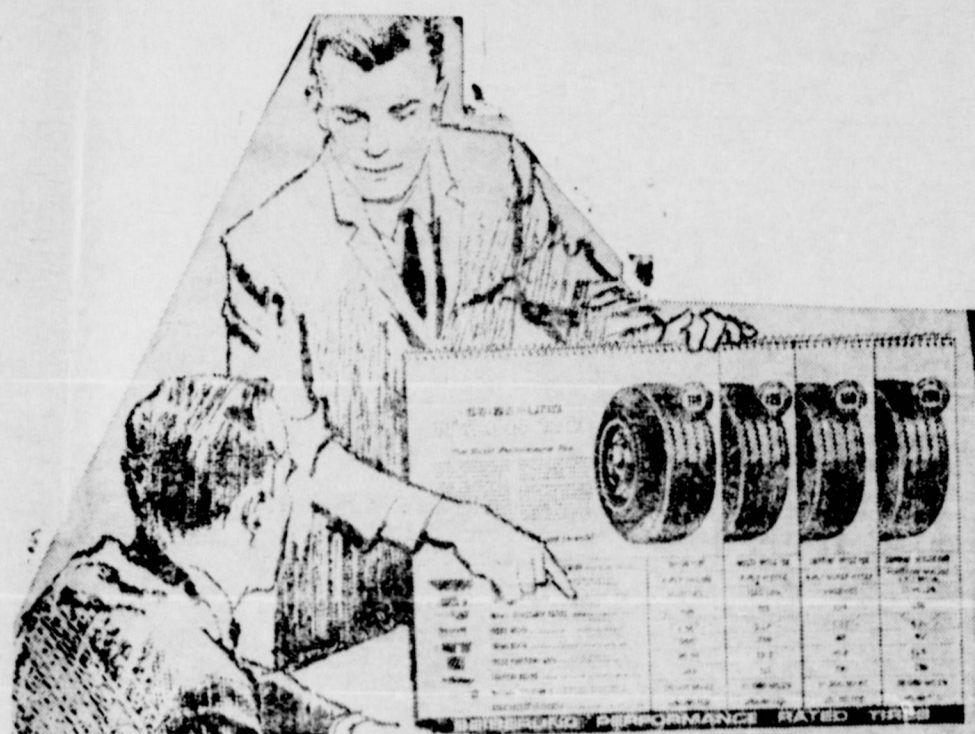

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 79 proposing an amendment to Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding Section 1-d to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-d to read as follows:

"Section 1-d. (a) All land owned by natural persons which is designated for agricultural use in accordance with the provisions of this Section shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use. 'Agricultural use' means the raising of livestock or growing of crops, fruit, flowers, and other products of the soil under natural conditions as a business venture for profit, which business is the primary occupation and source of income of the owner.

(b) For each assessment year the owner wishes to qualify his land under provisions of this Section as designated for agricultural

use he shall file with the local tax assessor a sworn statement in writing describing the use to which the land is devoted.

(c) Upon receipt of the sworn statement in writing the local tax assessor shall determine whether or not such land qualifies for the designation as to agricultural use as defined herein and in the event it so qualifies he shall designate such land as being for agricultural use and assess the land accordingly.

(d) Such local tax assessor may inspect the land and require such evidence of use and source of income as may be necessary or useful in determining whether or not the agricultural use provision of this article applies.

(e) No land may qualify for the designation provided for in this Act unless for at least three (3) successive years immediately preceding the assessment date the land has been devoted exclusively for agricultural use, or unless the land has been continuously developed for agriculture during such time.

(f) Each year during which the land is designated for agricultural use, the local tax assessor shall note on his records the valuation which would have been made had the land not qualified for such designation under this Section.

If designated land is subsequently diverted to a purpose other than that of agricultural use, or is sold, the land shall be subject to an additional!

tax. The additional tax shall equal the difference between taxes paid or payable, hereunder, and the amount of tax payable for the preceding three years had the land been otherwise assessed. Until paid, there shall be a lien for additional taxes and interest on land assessed under the provisions of this Section.

(g) The valuation and assessment of any minerals or subsurface rights to minerals shall not come within the provisions of this Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

"fastenings and belt will clean in the same manner as the garment." For example, sweaters, knit dresses and suits, non-electric blankets, draperies and slip covers can be successfully machine dry cleaned.

Items which should not be dry cleaned by the self-service process, are raincoats which have water repellancy and which the self-service process cannot replace; and electric blankets, which may have the insulation damaged; and pillows and comforters which may lose their shape and resiliency. Items containing leather and rubber should not be cleaned in this manner, for leather is likely to become brittle and rubber to lose its elasticity.

Felt items may shrink, metallic yarn may tarnish, and plastic may dissolve or become stiff or soft.

Machine cleaning also should be avoided if garments are made from flock or lacquer prints, for the pattern may disappear, or the stiffened fabric may become soft and embossed fabrics may lose their texture.

Wrinkles are not always removed during machine cleaning, but the process itself does not add new wrinkles. Coin-operated dry cleaning establishments vary considerably in the services they offer. Some provide spot cleaning or pressing, features which add to the advantages of self-service dry cleaning.

### Advice Given On Signing Up For Medicare

"Medicare enrollment will be a continuing process from now on," said R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager for the Abilene area. The general enrollment period that ended May 31 was an all-out effort to enroll those persons who were already age 65 or older.

Persons not yet 65 will have 7 months in which to enroll for doctor bill insurance, Tuley continued. The individual's enrollment period for that part of Medicare will run from the third month before

his 65th birthday month to the third month after it. Thus a person who will be 65 in October, 1966, may enroll from July 1, 1966, through January 31, 1967.

"There is no special enrollment period for the hospital insurance part," he went on, adding that a person past 65 could sign up for that even after he becomes an in-patient at a participating hospital. There are no premium payments involved for the hospital insurance half of Medicare.

Whether or not a person has retired or has ever worked under social security has no effect on Medicare coverage, but failure to enroll in the 3 month period before age 65 will result in a delay of from one to three months in acquiring the medical or doctor bill part of Medicare cover-

age. A higher premium cost will apply for those who do not enroll at their first opportunity but decide to come in during a later October-December period in 1967, 1969, or other odd-numbered years.

Persons nearing age 65 are urged to ask their social security office for the free booklet on Medicare, Tuley added.
