

formulating our ideas of true greatness; and the essential points are frequently obscured by those of less importance.

We are living in a commercial age -when every other element is dominated by constructive force-an age in which the Valley of Hope is fertilized by the stream of Gold; and while the old fashioned ways of measuring a worthy man may not be completely under cover, they are so far below the common horizon that only an occasional glimpse may be obtained.

There are times, of course, when we pause, and think. There are times when 'we wander aimlessly through the pages of history like a nature loving lad in the fields on a morning in May; and stumbling upon an interesting chapter, or series of chapters, we often find that which awakens our curiosity, arouses our sense of the present unfitness of some things, and casts the greenish glamour of absurdity over our pet theories.

And thus came to be written this cursory notice of the chief elements that made the Roman Empire undisputed mistress of the world.

We are a very vain people. Our scientific discoveries and commercial achievements are inflated beyond comparison; while our Ego has reached the acute stage of exaggera-




