Social Security **Payments** Total \$3,400,404 Here Some 4,499 people in East.

land county received a total of \$3,400,404 in social security benefits in 1965, R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene, revealed today, an increase of \$464,988 and 249 people over 1964.

A large part of the increase in payments resulted from changes made by the Social Security Amendments of 1965, Tuley said. Those changes which were in addition to the new program of health insur-ance for the aged, included a 7 per cent increase in monthly benefits retroactive to January 1965; benefits for widows as early as 60; benefits for full-time students between 18 and 22; benefits for some people over 72 who hadn't worked long enough to get social security before; and the pay-ment of disability insurance benefits to workers who are unable to work because of a disability that lasts 12 months or more.

"In addition," Tuley continued, "a good many older people, upon applying for medi-care, fouund they were eligible for regular social security benefits, too, All in all, the 1965 figures for Eastland County include 2,448 retired workers, 311 disabled workers and their families, and 1,173 wives and children of retired or deceased workers. In addition, 567 widows, widowers, or dependent, aged parents received benefits. The Eastland County beneficiaries ity retirement benefit for ery man, woman, and child amounted to \$72.30 in 1965."

"These figures," Tuley said, "show how wide the protec-tion offered by social security has become. Just about evtution - and now with mediin Eastland County has in social security the assurance that loss of income because of retirement disability or death will not result in destitution - and now wih medicare the aged have the assurance of help with the costs of



When tap water is used in steam irons, deposits of calcium and other minerals are almost certain to form. These deposits usually lead to sputtering irons, drops of water splattering on clothes and disgruntled housewives.

To correct the problem, follow these simple directions: Dissolve one tablespoon of a non - precipitating packaged water softener in one cup of distilled or demineralized water. Fill the iron with this solution and let it steam for five to ten minutes, shaking it constantly during this time. Empty this water and fill the iron with a mixture of two tablespoons distilled white vinegar to one cup distilled water. Let the iron steam five to ten minutes, again shaking constantly. Pour off this water and rinse the iron with distilled or demineralized water.


Don't neglect to shake the iron while you're steaming it clean. This is the secret to success. If this does not completely clean the iron, repeat the procedure.

You should clean your iron every two months to keep it in proper working order. Use only distilled or demineralized






