Bread Flour and Pastry Flour UR mills make two kinds of flours; one from hard Spring wheat called bread flour, the other from soft Winter wheat called pastry flour. The read flour has a larger percentage of cluten which dissolves slowly and makes the flour harder to mix, so that it is less with the old fashioned single acting with the old fashioned single acting esirable than the soft wheat or pastry our for quick baking. Pastry flour when pressed tightly in the closed hand. should feel soft and pack closely, retaining its form after the hand is opened, and showing the imprints of the fingers. If, on the other hand, the flour seems dry and harsh to the touch, and cannot be pressed dry into a form, it is bread flour, and will give good results only when a slow working leaven like yeast is used. the remainder of the dough away in the Pastry flour costs no more than bread ice box until morning, when you can have freshly baked biscuits for breakfast without the loss of a moment's time in mixing. That you can do this with K C Baking Powder is due to the fact that it is virtually a blend of two baking powders, one of which commences to act as soon as the dough is mixed the other commencing as soon as flour and it is so much better for cakes, hiscuits, muffins and all kinds of pastry that it should be kept on hand and regularly used. Please do not confuse pastry flour with the expensive packages of cake flour or the self-raising flour, which are sometimes called "Pastry Flour" and "Biscuit Flour." If you will remember that bread flour is a Spring wheat flour and pastry flour is a Winter wheat flour, and make it clear to your grocer which you want, you will be sure of getting it.

fact that it is virtually a blend of two baking powders, one of which commences to act as soon as the dough is mixed, the other commencing as soon as it is reached by heat. The dough after being mixed, will stay in a partly leavened condition for hours. Then when the heat is applied it will finish raising.

How to Make Delicious Biscuits

For biscuits let us select pastry flour, a good sweet shortening, a double-raise baking powder and sweet milk or water. Milk is to be preferred, as it browns the biscuits better. First, measure correctly and sift together at least three times, the flour, salt and baking powder. It is important to blend the baking powder thoroughly with the flour. Then with a fork or the finger tips work the shortening thoroughly into the flour and mix to a soft dough with the milk or water-just as soft as can be handled. Roll out very lightly, or better, spread and pat the dough out thin with the hands. Handle as little as possible after wetting. Then cut in small shapes for the oven, for small biscuits are very nickly, as biscuits should be, a large pes not get the proper heat to ause and bake the center of the biscuit. small biscuit raises perfectly, bakes better, is more palatable, and is easier to digest.

Biscuits should always be baked on a sheet or in a very shallow pan, as the biscuits should be above the sides of the pan in order to have the heat get to them quickly. If baked in a deep pan the sides shut off the heat, and the biscuits are likely to flatten out and run together and have heavy centers. Never floor of the oven. em quickly. 

have haid, "I am training my son to fill the duties of my position, but I well know that he will be the last of the German emperors. Every student of current events must see the drift toward republican forms of government. I am satisfied that in another generation not a monarchy will remain." Few are in as favorable a position to judge of the significance of current events, few realize so clearly the great and growing difficulties which beset royalty, and few would have had the courage to give public expression to fears, no matter how well-founded, that bode such disaster to their own posterity. The Kaiser Wilhelm is truly a great man.

The original design of the creator was that the earth should have a republican form of government. 
