BASE BALL NEWS NOW BUILDING PARK

THE LAND IN SOUTH COLORADO PURCHASED AND WORK BEING RUSHED

Colorado to Have an Up-To-Date Park and Grandstand for Benefit of Base Ball Fans.

Mr. Preston Scott informs us that they have bought the block of land lying in front of the public school property and extending alongside Candelero street, in South Colorado. It was at first intended to lease this plot of ground for a term of years for a ball and amusement park but some trouble came up in regard to the lease so the land was bought. A large force of men went to work yesterday hauling the lumber and putting up posts, and this work will be rushed to completion. The park will be 300 feet square, and every foot of the ground inside the fence will be cleaned, leveled and put in first class condition. The grandstand will, of course be behind the home plate, and provision will be made along the right foul line for vehicles, and on the other side for the bleachers.

Regular league rules will apply as to measurements, and distances, and the whole thing, when completed, will be one of the best and fastest ball grounds in West Texas.

Manager Winn is making every effort to strengthen the team of players and he has some good ones, as has been shown in their practice games. He says he is going to keep up his scouting until he gets a team that will lead this country for the next season.

Now these men have come to a big expense to build this park and it will cost good money to keep up a team and bring good teams here to play. The only chance they have to get their money back is by the patronage of the public and their liberal attendance on these games.

We understand the admission fee will be put as low as possible, as will also seats in the grandstand, and the Colorado people should show their appreciation by a liberal attendance.

The Clerks, or Second team, has been organized under the management of the old time leaguer, C. A. Pierce, and will not only give the "Short Horns" some good practice, but will make them earn their games. See Mr. Pierce's announcement in this issue.

2974 WINS THE PLANTER.

Mr. Y. D. McMurry advertised to give away on March 31 a "Mr. Bill" Planter to the party guessing to the nearest number of beans in a jar.

The jar held exactly 2974 beans and Mr. W. H. Nichols who lives up on the Snyder road guessed 2975, within one of the number. Quite a number of guesses came in 2872, 2976, 2971 etc.

Mr. Nichols came in Thursday morning and got his planter the best pleased man in Mitchell County.

TO THE LAND OWNERS.

After my return from the north, and last I made a statement thru the Colorado Record that I had interested capital to sink a test well or wells for the express purpose of trying to develop a paying oil well, provided I could secure the proper amount of acreage.

Before I can start on patrons or the buying of tools or machinery it will be necessary for me to procure at least 100,000 thousand acres the same to be in one block if possible.

The oil and gas leases do not in any way conflict with raising or the grazing of stock. All the ground that will be used at the time of drilling will be just enough ground for the oil, storage tanks and road to and from the wells.

I am willing to pay 7 cents per acre or \$22.00 per section for a period of five years plus one eighth of the oil produced and saved from the land, delivered free of charge in the pipe lines, and one hundred and fifty dollars per annum for each and every producing gas well.

I have seen a number of the larger land owners of Mitchell County and with the exception of a few they seem to be holding out and not willing to sign leases.

I am very much of the opinion that very little money could be raised locally for the purpose of sinking a test well and I am at a loss to understand why the land owners of Mitchell County should not be willing to lease their lands when they have every thing to win and nothing to lose nor are at any expense whatever, as oil is never found there is a chance for artesian water, and the rentals on the lands will be considerable within itself.

It may be necessary to sink more than one well to thoroughly test the ground, the expenditure of which may amount to \$75,000 or \$100,000 thousand dollars, and if oil is found the additional expense of building storage tanks, and pipe lines to railroad centers will be a like amount. This being one of the principal reasons such a large amount of acreage is required by the company.

If I can secure the acreage required within 30 days I can guarantee that drilling will start not later than August 1st 1914.

It is quite an undertaking to get capital to come into a new country where nothing has been done in that line, especially one that is as strong and reliable as the one I represent and the people should be glad to have their country proven without the least expense to them. I will be glad to take the matter up with any of the land owners, go more into detail regarding the same between now and April 15th. If this proposition is not accepted at this time I am of the opinion that it will be a long time before Colorado Texas is in the midst of a producing oil field.

LATHAM CASES TRANSFERRED TO ANSON COURT

Latham's Bond Was Raised to \$10,000.

Mrs. Latham is Prostrated and Confinned to Her Bed—Ready Response Shows Esteem.

The case of the State of Texas vs. Mrs. Minnie Latham, who is charged with the killing on January 27th of John Y. Snyder on the streets of Snyder, was transferred Saturday from the latter place to Anson, Jones County, in which city it will be called for trial on July 14. Mrs. Latham is at present confined to her bed with illness at a hotel in Snyder.

"Mrs. Latham was granted a new bail in the sum of \$10,000, which was immediately signed by two of the most influential men in Scurry county—men who are easily worth a half million dollars."

Her husband was indicted as an accomplice in the killing and his bond was placed at \$10,000. It is said that the five sureties in this bail are prominent people—worth in the neighborhood of \$100,000. The husband's case was set for June 1st and will be heard in Haskell, Texas.

The change of venue from Snyder to Anson was made upon the court's own motion.

Much interest has been manifested in this section in the proceedings which have taken place since the fatal shooting as both Mr. and Mrs. Latham resided in Sterling.

Being acquainted with the conditions in Mexico and understanding the cause that brought about the present war, I am very much interested in its outcome and hope that Villa will win, take possession of every office, call the best blood to the Nations chair, show no favors but deal out absolute exact Justice reserve her lands and the riches of her forests and mines for all her people, and I am satisfied they will show their appreciation in a patriotic and sensible way.

I consider Huerta and his followers an enemy to every peon in Mexico. Under ordinary circumstances I am opposed to war, but in this case it is the battle of peons against the powers that oppress. We hold up our hands in horror at some of Villa's tactics in making some of those Dons and Senors disgorge some of their ill-gotten gains. All things are considered fair in love and war and precedents have been set by great men in the past. Marc Anthony in his oration over the dead body of his friend Julius Caesar, in recounting his army's virtues, said, "he brought in many captives home to Rome whose ransom did the general coffers fill."

Sherman said war was hell, and so it is. Many things have been done that make us shudder, but we forget that the men are not natural during such times. Our own people have been guilty of much worse deeds than themselves. When the civil war was in its first or second year about a half dozen men living in east Texas expressed themselves as being opposed to secession and sympathizing with the North. The country was aroused. These men were hunted down during a big snow-

tracked like wild beasts, tried, convicted and hanged before their wives and children. At the time the country was at fever heat and men "their uncontrolled anger and passion were unfit to administer reproof."

I was a small boy at the time and not an eye witness to the deed, but I remember very distinctly the time, and have thought so often of what a horrible thing it was. One of the wives picked up a board on the scaffold from which the hanged men were forced to step, and turning toward the men who so recently made her a widow said "I will see that you step off this very board to pay for this crime."

After the war these men found it very uncomfortable in that part of the country, but after conditions became more settled they came back and not one was ever punished. I have shed tears enough to blot it from my memory forever, but like Banquos ghost it will not fade. This was only one of many deeds that were perpetrated by hot headed people during those dark days.

There are men now living who witnessed this outrage and some who participated in it and who no doubt are humiliated that they ever gave way to such feelings as to commit wanton murder.

So we can look back and understand how easy it is to give way to these wicked feelings during times of excitement. I approve of Wilson's policy and admire his bold stand against the cry for intervention coming from all sides. War has always been brutal. I have never heard of a kind war. For that reason I am not willing to sacrifice our best and noblest men to that cruel juggernaut.

WASHINGTON NEWS NOTES

Rivers and Harbor Bill—Society Weddings and Easter Gayeties at the Nations Capitol.

Not in a quarter of a century have the citizens of Washington been so wrought up as they are now, due to the efforts being made by certain Representatives in Congress to repeal the "organic act" as the Supreme Court of the United States has termed the act of June 11, 1878, which has also been defined by the highest judicial tribunal in the Nation as, "the Constitution of the District," and which Congress said was to provide "a permanent form of government."

Patriotic societies, with headquarters in Washington, commercial bodies, both local and national, together with the united citizenship, have inaugurated a nation-wide campaign to the end that the seat of government of the United States may continue to be the Nation's federal city, symbol of the Republic.

Washington is unique among American cities and unique among national capitals for it is the only purely national and governmental city in the world. The officers and judges are appointed by the national government and the courts are federal. The civil and criminal process runs in the name of the President of the United States and Congress exercises complete dominion over the territory included within the limits of the "District of Columbia."

Measures looking to the repeal of the "half and half" arrangement of the organic act had been sent by the house to the Senate and other measures pending in the House threatening a similar danger aroused the residents of the capitol, and exercising their constitutional right of peaceful assembly for free discussion, a working committee of one hundred appointed to bring pressure upon Congress to defeat the efforts of legislators who are seeking to put the whole burden of the development and maintenance of the national capital upon the three hundred and forty five thousand people living here and to relieve the rest of the ninety two millions of American from the contribution they have been making.

If you have an interest in making the national capitol the world's most beautiful city write your Congressman or your Senator to that effect.

And still the River and Harbor Appropriation bill is under discussion in the House although Chairman Sparkman in charge of the measure is hopeful that the bill will be passed by Thursday of this week.

It has been a number of years since so much time has been consumed in the consideration of a waterways appropriation bill as on the one now before the House and there are those who are asking the question "what is the reason for this close analysis of every feature of the bill and the small like progress being made toward its final passage?" The answer in some quarters is, that the delay is sought

in order to postpone consideration of the so-called "Sims Repeal Bill" which repeals that section of the Panama Canal act giving American vessels engaged in the coastwise trade free passage through the "big ditch". In other words that a filibuster is on in order that the country may have a longer time to study the pros and cons of the question which is already attracting nation-wide attention. President Wilson is determined to bring about the repeal of that clause in the bill which is so obnoxious to him. A number of his most ardent admirers, of his own political faith, are equally as determined that the section as originally passed, and which received the unanimous endorsement of the Baltimore Convention, shall stand as it is.

Have you any idea how many telephones there are in the United States and how many miles of wire? Preliminary figures of the quinquennial report on telephones in this country have been given out by Director W. J. Harris of the Bureau of the Census and they show that there are in use 8,729,592 telephones. The Bell Telephone System operates 3,087,027, all other Companies and Systems, 3,642,565. The number of miles of wire in use in 1912 were 20,243,326, the Bell system controlling 74.7 per cent of the wires. It is estimated that there were 13,735,558 245 messages or talks sent over the telephone lines of Companies which had an income of at least \$5,000 during 1912.

The approaching marriage of Miss Eleanor Wilson to Secretary McAdoo is no surprise to any one who has seen them together during the past season. Notwithstanding the disparity in ages, a little matter of twenty eight years, it is a genuine love-match. And the prospective bridegroom's children, married and otherwise, are almost as much in love with her as their father.

Miss Wilson came to Washington engaged to a Princeton man, but his health necessitated his going west and early this winter that engagement was broken. This left the field clear for the Secretary of the Treasury, an opportunity he made good use of. This is one of the few times that a daughter of a President has married during his term of office, an old fashioned custom with her father's administration. The death here a week ago, of Mrs. Samuel L. Gouverneur who was formerly Miss Marian Campbell of New York, brought to mind the marriage of her husband's parents which took place in the East Room of the White House in the Monroe administration. The bride on that occasion was Maria Monroe and the bridegroom Samuel L. Gouverneur, private secretary to the President. Their eldest son was also Samuel L. His widow had lived in Washington for more than fifty years and was well into the eighties. Only recently she published a book of her memories of Washington society which shows the wonderful changes in customs and manners in half a century.

The Vice President and Mrs. Marshall will take a little fling at Florida gayeties in Easter week. They will spend just one week at Palm Beach, St. Augustine and Jacksonville. Mrs. Marshall is making considerable preparation in the matter of clothes and the Vice President was much surprised that she should even think of taking a trunk. He boasted that she made whole campaign trips in Indiana with a small hand satchell.

"Yes" she said "but Tom Marshall, you must remember that now you are the Vice President of the United States. That's different."

ANTIS WANT JUDGE PHILLIPS FOR CANDIDATE

Austin, Texas, Mar. 30.—The withdrawal of Sam Sparks from the gubernatorial contest proved quite a surprise in general political circles here. The antis that are opposed to the candidacy of James E. Ferguson are already looking around for a candidate to submit to the Fort Worth convention on April 14. It is understood another attempt will be made to get Judge Nelson Phillips to enter the contest. They believe that he would be strong enough candidate to get in the race at the present time. Judge Phillips had not officially declined but it was some time ago understood that he would not be a candidate.

There is also talk here of a third term for Governor Colquitt, some of his friends are said to be anxious for him to enter the race. The governor however, is not talking.

The pros believe that the withdrawal of Sparks has greatly strengthened the chances of Col. Ball of Houston.

TO INVESTIGATE IRRIGATION.

Representative Smith Introduces Bill For Appropriation of \$250,000 for Such Work in Texas

Washington, March, 28.—Representative Smith of Texas introduced a bill appropriating \$250,000 for investigation as to the feasibility of irrigation in Texas by the lake and reservoir system, similar to the Senate bill offered by Senator Sheppard two weeks ago.

In the Senate today Senator Bristow of Kansas offered a memorial from

the Chamber of Commerce of Abilene, Tex., indorsing a bill he has on the same subject, but dealing with Western Kansas, Eastern New Mexico, Colorado, Nebraska and Western Oklahoma. The memorial asked that Texas be included, Senator Bristow said he thought it ought to be done and called attention to Senator Sheppard's bill pending in the Senate.

THE WEATHER FORECAST

We give below the weather forecast for April two of the best weather prognosticators in the United States. Foster Says:

Second disturbance of April will reach Pacific coast about April 3, cross Pacific slope by close of 4, great central valleys 5 to 7, eastern sections 8. Warm wave will cross Pacific slope about April 3, great central valleys 5, eastern sections 7. Cool wave will cross Pacific slope about April 6, great central valleys 5, eastern sections 10.

Temperatures of this disturbance will be about normal as an average, but will run to extremes because of the great energy of the storm forces. As a general average the crop weather will be good, but some places will begin to suffer for want of rain. Four-fifths of the continent will be threatened by drouth during April, and some parts will be seriously damaged.

The moon causes the tides by expanding the sea water and by evaporating sea water prepares the atmosphere for the rains. If we had no moon we would have no rain and vegetation would get its moisture from the mists. The combination of moon and planets with the forces of the sun and earth locate the evaporations of sea water and thereby locate the rains.

For April the evaporations will principally be about Panama, reaching out several hundred miles both east and west into the Caribbean sea and the Pacific ocean. As a consequence most rain will fall south and a northern drouth will tarotain. For April crops will do best that have been planted in the bottom of the furrow or drilled deeply. Low or flat lands will promise best results particularly in northern sections. Truck gardeners should make a note of this.

The evaporation being far south for April, and will draw the storms southward and the severe storms of that month are expected to bend their paths far down into the southern states as they cross the continent. These storms and the high temperatures will probably pass farthest north during the first days of April and near April 18 and then drop a little farther south as each successive storm wave comes along. Most dangerous storms are expected during the last week of April. Some danger of northern frosts near April 14 and 24.

Our farmers and planters should remember that Mexico must be fed by the states and Canada. Speculators are trying to scare our producers by using South America as a scarecrow. Nonsense! The demands for farm products will continue to increase and farmers should never sell till they can get a good price.

We will have no more starvation periods in this country while the bins are full, the potatoes left to rot in the patch and cotton not worth enough to move it. Those times belong to a decadent age of high finance. DeVoie says.

The weather this month will grow rapidly warmer. 1st to 2nd, warm and pleasant. On the 3rd a storm will advance from the Pacific Coast, moving southeastward. 4th to 6th thunder showers. 6th to 7th, pleasant. On the 8th a storm will form over the lower Mississippi Valley and move eastward. 9th to 10th, cloudy with rain. 11th to 12th, cloudy. 13th to 14th pleasant. 15th, warmer 16th to 17th, warm wave. 18th, cloudy. 19th to 20th shower. 21st to 2nd, pleasant. On the 23rd a warm wave will form over the Missouri Valley and move southeastward. 24th to 25th, warm wave. On the 26th a storm will form over the lower Mississippi Valley and move eastward. 27th to 28th, cloudy with rain. 29th to 30th, the month will close with cold wave, danger of frost.

The educational problem of Texas is not in the school room, but in the home and field.

IF PROHIBITION WINS.

D. Clarence Gibbonney is president of the Law and Order Society of Philadelphia. Twenty-five years of association with the forces striving for improvement in morals and in living conditions in the big Pennsylvania city have given him some interesting ideas on the liquor question.

Mr. Gibbonney feels that while much has been accomplished by legislative efforts at regulating the liquor business, there is a growing sentiment among the people in favor of putting an end to that business altogether. But he argues that if we are to have nation-wide prohibition, the people in ordinary fairness ought to take steps looking to the purchase of property

made useless by such legislation.

Mr. Gibbonney makes an interesting argument in support of the moral and legal right of people engaged in the liquor business to expect something better than practical confiscation in the event of sweeping prohibition amendments to the constitution of the nation or to the constitutions of most of the States. He points out that the liquor business has been recognized as a legal business through a long course of years, and that the people by accepting large sums of money as license fees have in effect made themselves partners in the business. If the people now decide that they want prohibition, he holds that it is up to the people who have shared in the profits of the enterprise to bear at least a part of the loss incident to its sudden discontinuance.

This is a question to which the American people ought to give serious consideration.

Unless all signs fail prohibition is to play a larger part in our national politics during the next decade than it has ever played in the past. The "wets" and the "drys" have made things lively enough in many of the States, heaven knows. But it seems very probable that from now on the fighting will be transferred from the State capitals to Washington.

If the American people finally decide to try nation wide prohibition if they make up their minds, as Mr. Gibbonney suggests they are about to make up their minds, that the liquor business means waste and danger and is inconsistent with business efficiency and the conservation of human happiness, no one will question their right to put these ideas into effect. But Americans ought to know by this time that wholesale confiscation of property is a bad thing not only for the people whose property is confiscated, but for the larger number of people who do the confiscating.

The above taken from the Cincinnati Star in our opinion is a wall from the lost Tex "wets" as Mr. Gibbonney calls them, sees the hand writing on the wall and their approaching doom and are now beginning to hedge or beg for at least pay for their investment. The Record believes that Nation wide prohibition is coming and these people have ample time to get out now while time are good, if not let them abide the time and accept their fate.

THE POSTMASTER. Received the Following Letter With Request to Publish. It has come to the attention of the Department that many possible patrons of the parcel post service are not familiar with its advantages, especially as extended by the reduced postage rates and increased limit of weight, effective January 1, 1914, and other modifications recently made for the purpose of promoting the service to the public. You are requested, therefore, to make every possible effort to acquaint your patrons with such changes, as well as the insurance and C. O. D. features and other advantages of the parcel post service, giving particular prominence to the fact that under paragraph 5, amended section 456, and paragraph 7, amended section 663, Postal Laws and Regulations, the regular parcel post rates now apply to parcels weighing more than eight ounces containing books and to parcels of miscellaneous printed matter weighing more than four pounds. It is desired that these features, particularly the latter, be brought to the attention of the patrons of your office likely to have matter of this character for transmission, the advantages of using the parcel post service for such shipments being pointed out by interview or any other possible means, without expense to the postal service. At the same time publicity should be given to the recent Departmental orders providing for the attaching of communications prepaid at the first-class rate to parcels of fourth-class matter prepaid at the rate for the latter class, and putting into effect the provision of the Act of March 9, 1914, rates to seeds, plants, etc. It is also highly important that the necessity for properly preparing, additions are absolutely essential in order that the service may prove satisfactory. In this connection you are informed that proprietary articles of merchandise, such as harmless medicinal preparations, soaps, food products, etc., put up by the manufacturer in fixed quantities in original sealed packages so as to allow examination of the packages in their simplest mercantile form and labeled so as to show the nature of contents, quantity, and name of the manufacturer, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 5, section 469, Postal Laws and Regulations, are mailable at the fourth-class rates of postage. If such sealed packages are enclosed in an outer wrapper, the latter must not be sealed. Your earnest cooperation is requested in giving publicity to the various features herein referred to, as well as to such other changes and improvements as are made from time to time, with a view to increasing the use of the parcel post service as a means of bringing the producer and consumer into closer contact. Fire Started in Second Story Seed Bins Were Not Damaged. Is The Report.

The Colorado Oil mill was destroyed by fire Monday night. The loss is estimated at between \$60,000 and \$75,000. Origin of the fire is unknown.

When discovered it was burning in the second story of the brick oil mill proper. This was about 9:30 Monday night. Warehouses and seed bins were out of the path of the fire and no loss is reported from that source. All of the machinery was lost.

John Guita, owner of the plant, and who lives in Abilene came over Tuesday morning and in conversation with The Record said, all our insurance policies are in Abilene and can not tell the amount but believe we were pretty well insured. Mr. Guita said the mill would be rebuilt, bigger and better than the old one.

Mr. H. Hagan said they had \$2500 of the loss and E. B. Harwood had \$10,000 and E. Bradley had \$5,000.

This is indeed a heavy loss to Colorado.
