### TRADE NEGOTIATIONS BROKEN OFF

The State Department announces that because of "differences" the negotiations between the department and Sir Richard Crawford, commercial adviser of the British embassy, on the subject of facilitating the movement of American cargoes have been broken off. Following as it does the action of Secretary Bryan in denying that the informal acts of the trade advisers of the State Department regarding cotton cargoes were to be considered as binding on this government, as the British government maintained the announcement was considered of great significance. It means that the United States reaffirms an implied refusal to be put in a position which might be interpreted as approval of Great Britain's order in council, under which Great Britain claimed the right to maintain a long distance blockade and supervise all trade between this country and Germany.

#### THE ELECTRIC MAIL.

The Electric Mail Service which the Telepost Committee of the United States Senate in its report of March 4, 1915, recommends to the consideration of the Postmaster General, means a telegraph service throughout the United States in conjunction with the United States postoffice. The rates at which the Telepost will give this service are one cent a word for 10 words and one-half a cent a word for 50 words or more. The electric mail service will differ from the present telegraph service in rates and in that the postal facilities would be used to collect and deliver messages sent at the reduced rates. In case special delivery or messenger service is desired an additional payment of ten cents would be required.

This service is made possible by the Telepost Automatic system of telegraphing by which as high as 1,000 words a minute can be transmitted over a single wire.

From the point of view of the postoffice, the electric mail means a letter or card handled by the postoffice just as any other letter or card is today handled, with the single exception that instead of being carried by train the contents of the letters or cards are transmitted by wire between the two postoffices.

From the point of view of the telepost, the electric mail means a message sent by telepost, just as any other telegraph message is sent, with the difference that the collecting of the message at one end and the delivering of it at the other is done by the regular collectors and carriers of the postoffice.

Where a message is delivered on a postal card it will be called a telecard which means 10 words for 10 cents. When it is delivered in a sealed envelope, the message is called a telepost, which means 50 words or less for 25 cents, and 5 cents for each additional 10 words or less. These rates will be uniform, regardless of distance between any two points connected by telepost lines.

The electric mail will be far quicker than a letter,—much cheaper than a telegram.

By this service several communications may be exchanged during business hours between the business sections of all cities having frequent postoffice collections and deliveries.

The telepost is now ready to introduce the electric mail between St. Louis and Chicago and to extend it as rapidly as its lines are built, or leased.

#### NEW RAILROAD CHARTER.

The charter of the Roby & Northern Railroad Company, capital stock \$10,000, was approved by the Attorney General's Department, and filed in the office of the Secretary of State, last week. The company proposes to construct a line of railroad from Roby in Fisher county, in a northern direction to a connection with the Texas Central railroad at North Roby, a distance of five miles.

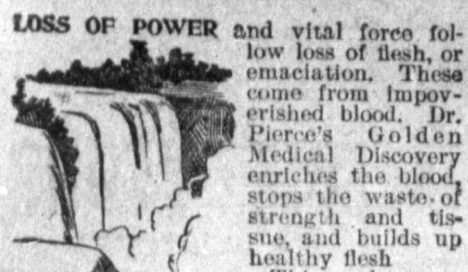

**BRAZEN TONGUES WARNED**  
**SAN ANTONIO.**

The Bell Ringer of San Fernando Church—The Paul Revere of Texas, and Heroes of Alamo.

The populace of San Antonio is resting late after the fandango of the night before. Only the very devout have arisen from their feathers to attend the morning mass, and the sun, now creeping over the horizon, sheds beneficent rays upon the few homeward bound worshippers. The lowing of a cow, punctuated by the challenge of the strutting rooster, is all that breaks the morning silence. The curling smoke from many breakfast fires festoons the wisp of breeze and peace is everywhere.

In the tower of San Fernando church the bell ringer, thinking of his morning dram, yawns lazily in the face of the rising sun, deftly rolls a cigarette and begins his descent on the rickety ladder. He stops—What is that beyond Disiderio Hill not there the day before? Splashes of color against the dun background, the many points of reflected light, the surging mass. What means that? Now a standard flutters in the breeze. He understands and hurriedly reascending the ladder, sounds the alarm on his big bronze bells. The brazen summons, the wild, imperative clang wakes the town to action. Like wild fire spreads the report: "The Mexicans!" "Santa Anna!" "To the Alamo!" Stopping not for goods nor provisions, the Americans flee for their lives to the sheltering walls of the mission.

John Sutherland and J. W. Smith spur their lagging mounts to Disiderio hill to reconiter. The alarm of

the Paul Revere of the Texas Revolution is substantiated and hurried preparations for an assault are made. The Mexicans appear over the hill. Haste is essential. Barricades are thrown up, arms distributed and with a prayer the garrison awaits the approach of the enemy. The advance force of Santa Anna's army, two battalions of infantry and a dragoon regiment of Dolores do not immediately attack but pitch camp at the river. During this respite Colonel Travis takes stock of provisions and finds only three bushels of corn. His heart sinks within him, at the thought of a probable siege, yet he resolves, though even the garrison should starve, they will never surrender. A further search is seemingly useless, however, he dispatches scouts to scour the outbuildings for more food. Providence is kind; ninety more bushels of corn and twenty head of beaves are found in the Indian quarters, which makes a welcome addition to the scanty rations of the garrison.

The surrender of the Alamo is now demanded by the Mexican commander. This demand is answered by a cannon shot, which retires the Mexicans. Davy Crockett addresses the beleaguered garrison, and his voice swelling to oratorical fullness, appeals to the pride and patriotism of the besieged. Enthusiasm holds his audience and they resolve to die before ever the Alamo shall be surrendered.

These stirring occurrences, correct in historical detail, are depicted in the greatest production of the age—The "Siege and Fall of the Alamo," and imbue the spectator with patriotic pride for the heroes who fell in the cause of liberty.

This great picture in four parts will be exhibited at the Colorado Opera House, next Monday afternoon and night (May 31) as a benefit for the Colorado Fire Company. The performance will commence at 2 o'clock p. m., and run continuously until 11 p. m. Everybody should see this wonderful picture, and more especially the children. A coroner's jury at Ramsgate, England, has returned a verdict charging Emperor William of Germany with murder for the death of John Smith, who was killed by a bomb dropped on that town by a Zeppelin air ship. It now remains to find an officer to serve the writ on His Majesty.

Villa comes to the surface often enough to keep his name in the papers, while he and Carranza keep steadily on winning the same fights.

Teddy says the republican party can not afford to be without him, as he is the only man in America who can defeat Mr. Wilson. Mr. Roosevelt has long been the greatest asset of the democratic party, and it is earnestly hoped he will continue to be "agin hit."

A woman writer and suffragette of England advocates the passage of a law allowing polygamy in order to recruit the decimated ranks of mankind, after the war. She favors a man having as many wives as he can comfortably support, which would be determined by government investigation. It were useless to state that the advocate of this step is herself without a man at present.

President Wilson has a new grandchild in the McAdoo home. It arrived last week. Betraying the same weakness of human nature that is found in all classes and localities, when announcement of this arrival was made, the newspapers and their readers, of course, figured back just how long they had been married. We heard one good lady comment: "Oh, they have been married a year—haven't they?"

"Laying on of hands" is most effectively employed now in the curing of many disorders—especially in the young. One mother recently cured her young son of the cigarette habit by only one treatment. Unlike the biblical method, the healing power is not assimilated through the head, but through that part of the anatomy whereon one sits. This method of therapy is highly recommended for various contagious habits among young boys, who think they are men. For impudence, profanity, street-prowling, fishing on Sunday and the like, it is a reputed specific.

Mitchell county is as likely a place for oil as any other—provided the oil is here, and if arrangements now afoot can be successfully put through, efforts to find out whether or not the oil is beneath us, will begin at no distant day. With the increasing consumption of oil as fuel and the increasing manufacture of machinery adapted to oil consumption, an oil well is about as good "strike" as a gold mine. The Record will never rest satisfied about the question until the country lying along the Colorado river has been thoroughly exploited for oil. Salt deposits and oil bearing sands are nearly first cousins geologically, and we hope to live to see verified that bit of ancient wisdom—"where de hen scratch, dar de bug boun' ter be."

The human heart doesn't beat which does not respond to words of commendation and encouragement. The Record is no exception to this universal rule. The words of encouragement given by subscribers in renewing their subscription, are worth far more to the paper than the money

Next to the relation between pastor and congregation or doctor and patient, there should be none more intimate or cordial than that subsisting between the country paper and its readers. Accession by China to all the demands made by Japan, is equivalent to becoming a dependency of the latter country. It places not only the material development of China in the hands of Japan and imposes Japanese advisers in all political, judicial and military questions, assumes the right to police Chinese cities, but demands the right to propagate Buddhism among the Chinese. In short, the demands emasculate the power of the Chinese government over its own affairs. Japan knew when to strike for these things. She is an ally of England, and England just now is engaged in a gigantic war, as are Russia and France. China could not appeal to the nations of Europe, while the United States had no concern in the matter. In thus taking over China as she did Korea, Japan virtually declares the Monroe doctrine for the Orient and gives notice to other nations to keep their hands off. Japan aspires to become mistress of the Pacific, and if she can completely dominate and dictate to China and weld the entire malay population of the East into one cohesive power, she will not only soon become an imminent menace to the United States, but to England as well, in her influence on the peoples of India. Japan will loom larger and larger in the affairs of the East and have to be reckoned with by all Caucasian nations.

The department of Journalism in the state university barely escaped the pruning knife of the legislature last week. The special committee went so far as to threaten the existence of the "Daily Texan," the organ of the student body of the university, and one of the most creditable features connected with that institution.

HIS TWO MONUMENTS.

Plans have been drawn for a mausoleum for the late Adolphus Busch of Budweiser notoriety and dollars, to cost \$500,000. The fittest emblem for his tomb would be a bottle of beer and a widow and a group of children in rags. In England, Germany and other European countries boasting a nobility, men who have waxed rich in the manufacture of gin, rum, whiskey, ale or beer, are raised to the peerage, given titles and decorations, while their children are ennobled and accorded a coat of arms, etc. Many of the most prominent lords, barons, knights and whatnot of European nobility, made their fortunes in the manufacture of beer, ale or whiskey. If old Adolphus Busch had remained in Bavaria and achieved his fortune in making beer, he would have been ennobled and his blood made blue. Lacking such class distinctions in republican America, we express our gratitude for his humanitarian work, by guzzling all his brew we can get and erecting to his memory a monument costing enough to build and endow a college. No president of this nation, no statesman, no man of letters, ever had such a monument as this will be to the man whose business has doubtless diverted more money from its legitimate channels—from the mouths of hungry children and from the backs of shivering women—than any other one business in the country.

Yes, build Adolphus Busch a mausoleum high, strong and lasting as the pyramids of Egypt. It will require such a gigantic structure to distract attention from the monument he already has, not built in marble and gold; but of the tears, heart-aches, long vigils of wives and the sobs of hungry children.

If any student of psychology doubts that attending moving picture shows creates a habit, he has only to look about himself, even in so small a town as Colorado, where the frequenters can be more easily identified than in larger places. He will see the same people, night after night, week in and week out, month on month, going to see the movies. The excuse that there's nowhere else to go or nothing else in the way of entertainment in the town, is a most superficial one for such habitual attendance. After witnessing a few plays on the stage, one tires of the diversion, no matter how eminent the actors; the edge of enjoyment is dulled by constant indulgence, and it ceases to be recreation and becomes a bore. Not so with the movie habits. The more regularly they go, the more they want to go. The character of the exhibition is of secondary moment. Like "Helen's Babies," they seem to simply want to "see the wheels go round." Quite likely, if the same story as depicted on the screen, should be written, they would not read the book. Without words, a hundred different people seeing the same pictures would construct in their imaginations a hundred totally different stories as suggested by the picture. So it is, the same lesson does not reach the minds of all who see the same pictures, as there are no accompanying words to direct the thoughts. Going to the movies is just a habit of being passively entertained, and the habit grows upon what it feeds. The going, the crowd, the rubbing of elbows and gregarious instinct, account more for the habit than any real progressive entertainment. The same thing reduced to print and read in the seclusion of the home would not be tolerated more than twice.

Editor McCollum of the Waco Tribune is also senator from that senatorial district. His mind had not been conclusively made up as to how he shall vote on the pending Gibson bill before that body. He received a letter this week from a prominent Waco insurance man warning him to "vote right," that is, against the bill, assuring him that if he did not, his business would be ruined; not only would valuable advertising contracts be cancelled, but that the various banks would be boycotted by the insurance interests if they give that paper any financial aid. This letter to senator McCollum was read on the floor of the senate. A resolution was introduced by senator Harley that on roll call each senator would state his connection, if any, with any insurance company. This resolution precipitated a row between senators Lattimore and Gibson. The money trust of Texas is leaving no effort untried to keep out of the state foreign competitors.

There is an unpaid bill of \$19,000 for tobacco used in the penitentiary. And that advertisement running in the papers that "men who chew are men who do." Some of them have run the state into debt to the tune of near a million dollars.—Fr. Worth Record.

PRESIDENT WILSON, THE NATION'S STAY.

Along in 1860 Blondin, the world's famous wire walker, crossed Niagara Falls with a man on his back for the entertainment of the Prince of Wales, who had just attained his majority, and was the guest of the United States. Gamblers present at the exhibition made a "book" and took bets that Blondin would or would not make the crossing safely. When those who had bet he would not, saw that he would make the trip safely, they cut the guy ropes that held the wire and Blondin came very nearly losing his own life as well as the life of the man whom he carried on his back. The crowd on the shore shouted to him all kinds of advice, but, cautioning the man on his back to sit perfectly still, he waited till the swaying wire had come to rest, and then calmly walked to the other side.

Several years after this incident, when this country was torn by civil war, a delegation of senators called upon President Lincoln at the White House to advise him how to act as president. His saving sense of humor came to his aid, and he reminded them what Blondin did when he crossed Niagara on a wire. He asked them whether Blondin took advice of those on shore or did what he knew best. The delegation saw the point and afterward let President Lincoln follow his own judgement. President Wilson is now besieged with advice as to what should be done in the Lusitania incident, and it is fortunate that the matter of dealing with Germany in the adjustment of this matter rests with President Wilson rather than with congress. Says the Scientific American, one of the most level headed and conservative papers in the country:

"A grave responsibility rests upon the President of the United States at this crisis. It is a fortunate thing for the people of this United States that they have at the head of the Government one in whom they have every confidence, who all through this long and painful struggle has shown a wisdom, a patience, a conscientiousness and a high-mindedness which have evoked the admiration of the people.

"The rights of our citizens are being abused, the rights of humanity are being violated, and what worse is it possible for us to assume? This we leave in your hands, Mr. President. It is against the tradition and the unwritten law of this land for us to engage in any European conflict; the policy of our Government for the last one hundred and twenty-five years has been so shaped that we are not prepared to engage in any such conflict; it is not our purpose or our wish. The establishment of a large standing army is contrary to the spirit of our people. We have neither the army nor equipment necessary for war, even did our wishes incline us in such a direction, so that such a policy is hardly to be entertained. Our fleet would be of little, if any, service in this invisible marine warfare. We are content to leave in your hands, Mr. President the shaping of the course which this great nation should pursue, feeling that the rights of its citizens will be fully protected, and that its reputation for honor, for fair dealing and dignity will not be allowed to suffer."

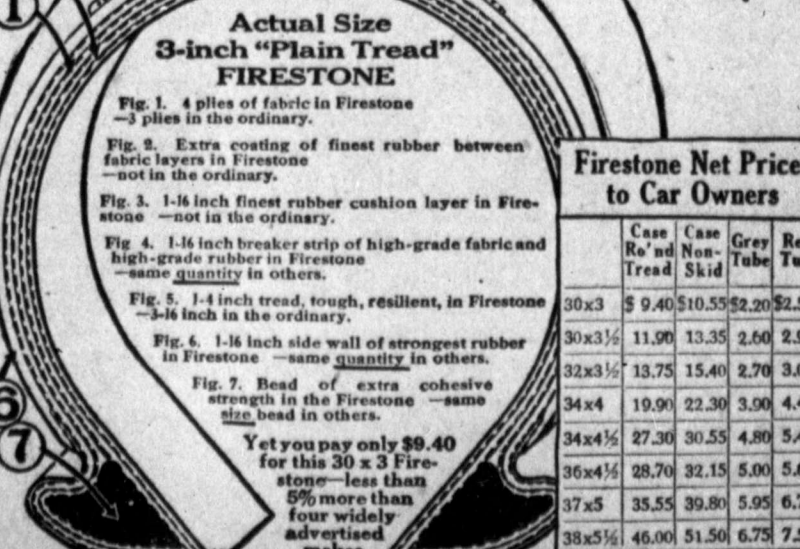

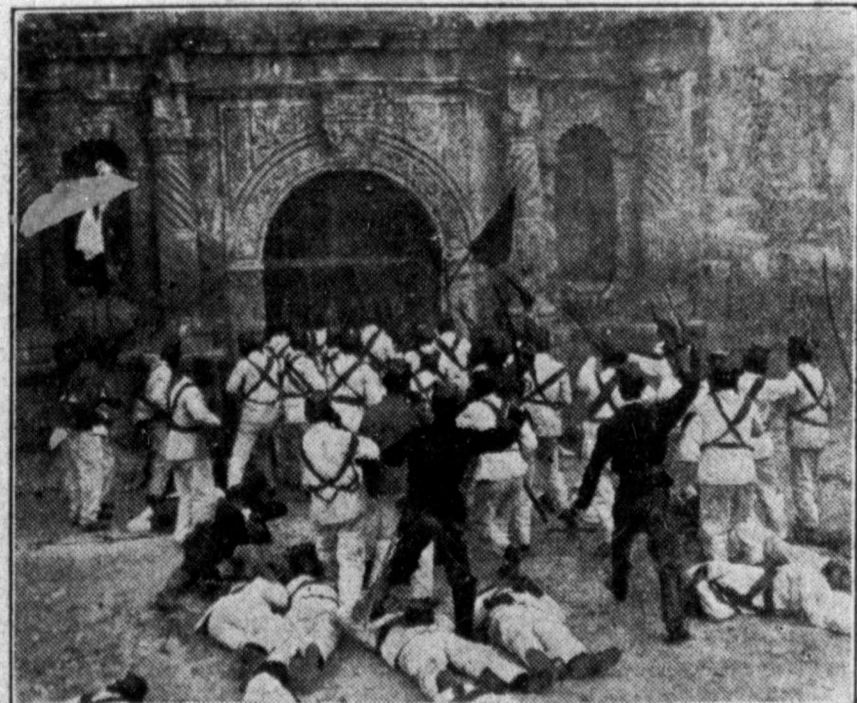

**CULTIVATION, HARVESTING AND MARKETING**

The occupation of farming comprises three distinct departments, namely, cultivation, harvesting and marketing. Much thought and attention have been given in the past to the first two. But it is only within very recent times that the last one has received any attention at all.

There has long been a cry for diversified crops in the South. Little attention was paid to it at first, but conditions within the past year brought the farmers to a real desire to break away from the one-crop system. They were confronted immediately with the problem of marketing their products—a problem that has confronted and oftentimes dumfounded and discouraged every man in the past who has attempted to get out of the rut of raising cotton and corn only. It was no trouble for such a man to raise abundance of other crops but he frequently saw them spoil on his hands after they had been harvested through his inability to sell them. This inability may have grown out of ignorance of how best to pack his products so that they would keep and be attractive to the city consumer or it may have been through want of knowledge of the best centers in which

With all these agencies at work it will undoubtedly be brought about within the next few years that farmers will be as familiar with all the intricacies of marketing as they are now familiar with furrows, harrows and harvesters.—Atlanta Journal.

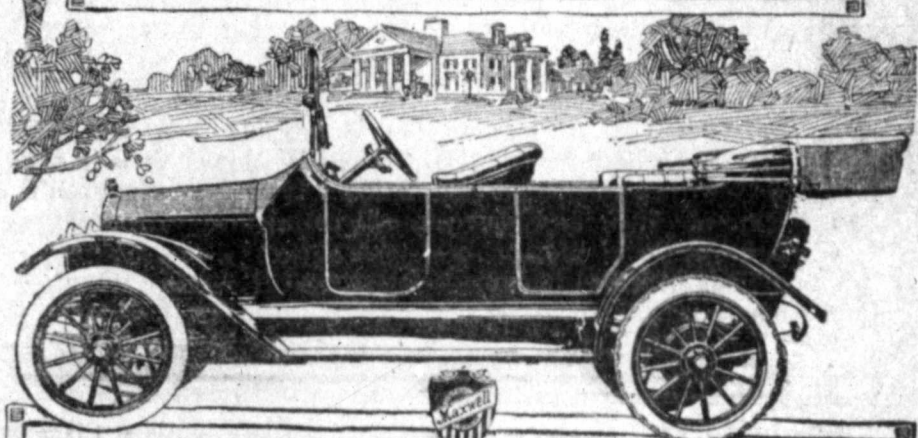

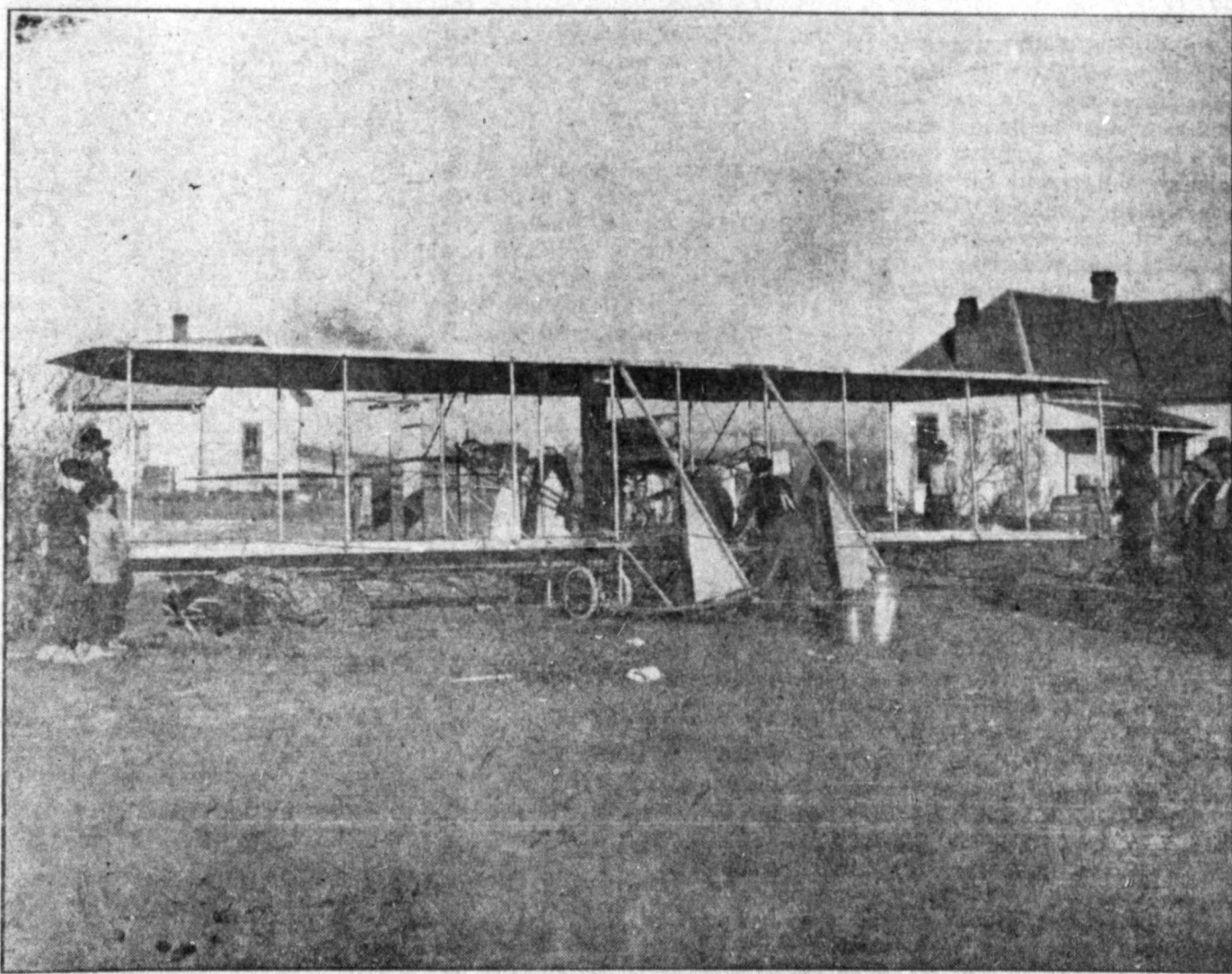

**INBREEDING IN EDUCATION**

"In round numbers," says a special writer for the San Antonio Express, in a recent issue of that paper, "2,500 students obtain instruction yearly within the walls of the University of Texas. Above 1,000 students go out into the state yearly, a portion with a full university course to their credit, the remainder having done one, two, or three years work in the institution."

"This leaven of advanced education being mixed and absorbed by the state each year makes incalculably for progress. There is danger of inbreeding in education, just as there is danger of inbreeding in people or in cattle."

"Suppose, for a moment, a state without higher institutions of learning to carry on the work begun in the common schools. Is it not clear that education would thus be reduced to narrow limits? The high school graduate becomes a teacher in the lower grades, and is eventually promoted to the higher grades and on to the high school. The high school then becomes officered and taught by its own graduates who have received no further training. There is no introduction of new thought, no widening of the horizon of knowledge or of methods, no new inspiration, or new ideals, and the machine's original impetus is overcome gradually by natural friction until the thing barely moves at all. It dies down like an unaided pendulum. You have inbreeding in education with all the deformities and weaknesses incident to inbreeding in the animal world."

"The higher educational institution of a state," continues this writer, "are the natural intermediaries between the common schools and the vast world of ideas and inspiration developed by the best thought and the highest paid talent in all the great educational institutions of Christendom. For example, a new and improved method of teaching modern languages is developed in some foreign country. It is the business of the higher educational institutions of a state to secure an exponent of this method direct from Germany for its faculty. This teacher teaches his students in the new method, they, in turn, go out as teachers in the state spreading the new method, and pretty soon it has permeated the whole educational system of the state. This is merely an example. It may not be a new method, but a new and original thought, or a new store of knowledge that is communicated in the same way. The point is that the higher educational institution maintains touch with the world of ideas and transmits new and advanced methods and fresh knowledge throughout all of its dependent institutions. It is as important to the vast school system of the state as the switchboard is to the telephone exchange. **CAUSE OF IMMORALITY.**

Dr. Albert H. Mowrey, professor of social diseases in College of Medicine, Chicago, combats the findings of the Vice Commission, which investigated the cause of vice among working girls of this country two years ago, and which claimed "insufficient wages" the chief cause of their going wrong. Dr. Mowrey gives the results of his exhaustive investigation in these words before a recent medical convention in that city:

"Immorality among women, particularly among young women who have to earn their own living, has increased the past ten years at the rate of 25,000 per annum. This increase has not been traceable only to the slightest degree and in exceptional cases, to insufficient money on which to live. On the other hand their immorality has kept even pace with their mending but unstable fortunes. Unaccustomed prosperity, the indulgence of unwonted pleasures, have caused the downfall of the vast majority of women and girls.

"Cigarettes, the auto, the tango, cabarets, modern wearing apparel, the lust for jewelry, are the principal contributing causes," claims the doctor. "The women and girls who are wholly cut off from the indulgence of these things, even though earning barely sufficient to keep body and soul together, are not beset by the all-compelling temptations these things accompany." He declares the homely girl or woman, forced to work in order that she may live, content with the clothes and pleasures her wages will justify, is hedged around with a bulwark of protection against the aggressions and insults of human brutes. Prosperity, with no necessity to work and no necessity for a good character in order to get work, is the stumbling block over which the great majority of women in cities fall to destruction.

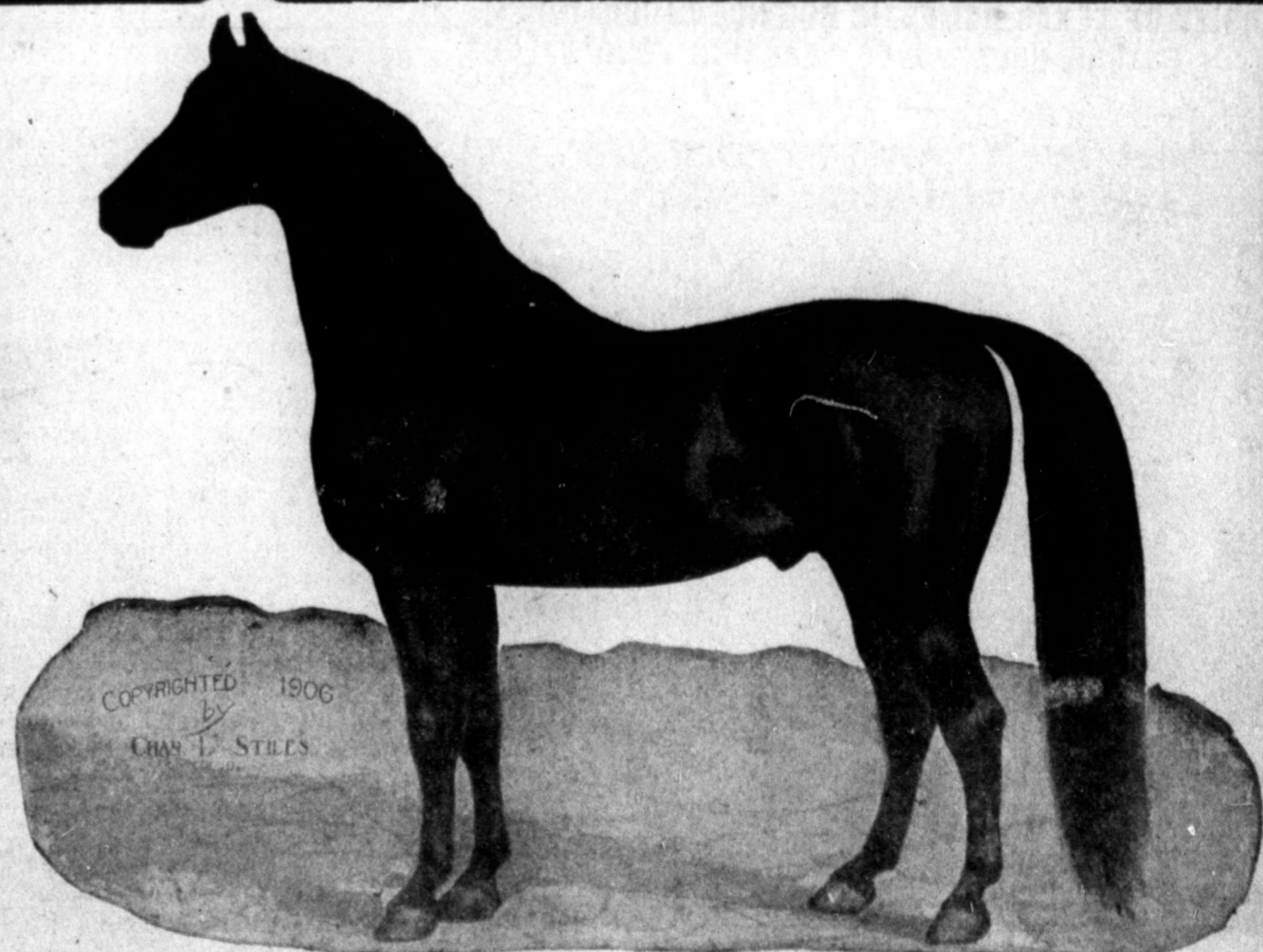

**KILL THE RATS.**

We hear a great deal of late about the rats becoming a plague to the country. They not only destroy farm products and poultry, but they breed and carry the death dealing tick to cattle and the bubonic plague to man. The time has come when people should awaken to the fact that the rat must go. The common wood rat has increased so within the last year that their nests can be found in every cactus bunch and catchaw thicket. These nests not only protect rats from hawks, owls and other enemies, but they afford a breeding place for ticks and a lurking place for rattlesnakes. A man with a kerosene torch can kill hundreds of them in a day by applying the torch to the trash at each entrance of the nests. In this way, you not only get the rat, but you get the tick and rattlesnake at the same time.

The prairie dog poison made by the formula now being used by our ranchmen has proven to be the best known poison for rats. A few grains of the poisoned maize placed near a rat hole, will surely kill him, for it is well known that rats take to this poison more eagerly than prairie dogs.

Where rats have made their dens under houses and barns, and where there is danger of poultry getting the poison, it is best to procure a box, cut a rat hole in it and place the poison on the inside. In this way, a chicken cannot get the poison and the rat can be depended on to go into the hole. A little poison put into a piece of pipe large enough for a rat to crawl through will serve the purpose.—Sterling City Record.

We still insist that there is a right and a wrong way in which to do everything, and we believe that in most homes the laundry is done in the wrong way. Why have every other modern convenience and cling to the old time tub and rub board that breaks ones back and wears out the clothes. Every home cannot have the up to date fixtures needed, but every home in Colorado can patronize our up to date, clean, sanitary laundry.—Colorado St am Laundry.

With the advent of Italy into the European war game, the Balkan states of Roumania and Bulgaria will likely be drawn in, which will in turn stir up the war party in Greece, which has all along desired that nation to join the Allies. Although no formal declaration of war by Italy against Austria has yet been made, none is necessary. In fact hostilities on the border between the troops of both nations are in progress. Unless the Austro-German army in the east can deliver a crushing blow to the Russian army before Italy begins its invasion of western Austria, there will be small chance of checking the Italians with what forces Austria has now on the Italian frontier. With Italy, Roumania and Greece in the fight with fresh troops, the outlook for Austria is not very bright. Germany is not in position to come to the aid of her ally, as she has her own hands full. With the whole of Europe fighting this summer and nothing being produced on which to feed the armies, exhaustion will put an end to what reason and humanity have failed to do.

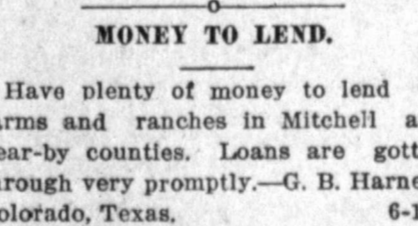
