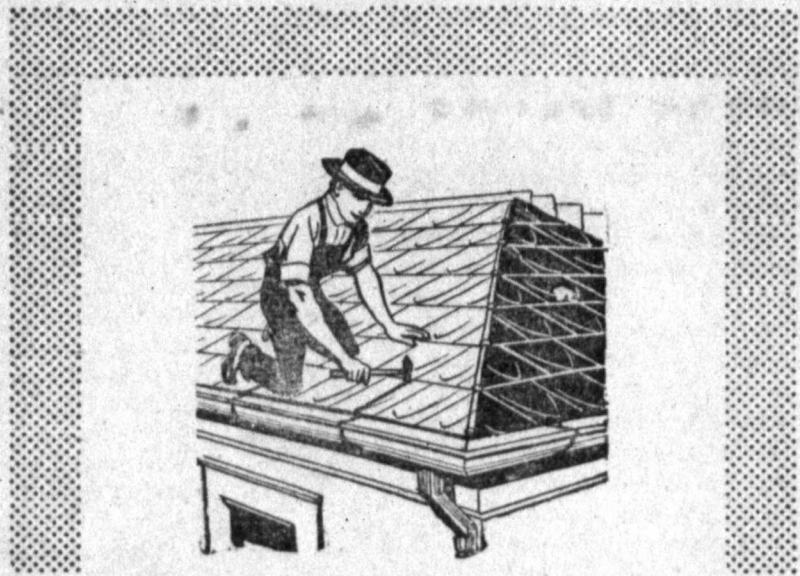

A GOOD TIME TO ACT.

The good old reliable Texas & Pacific railroad has been so rushed with business the past season that its sidings have been inadequate for the handling of its numerous trains. Extra sidings are being put in at nearly every station of any importance and even between whiles. Colorado is no exception to the general congestion. Another track is being put in between the scale track and the compress track, the full length of the latter. With the increasing weight of its freight locomotives and longer trains, the road must either lengthen its present sidings or put in new ones for the handling of the great number of trains. Everything is in readiness for the rails on the new siding in the local yards.

And just here is a most timely opening to call the attention of the railway authorities, the city council and all others at interest, to the great need of extending the Radford spur track so that it will serve four more useful and

important industries. The big new gin plant was erected with the idea of being served by the proposed extension. The Watson gin, the ice factory and the coal and grain business of A. L. Scott, are handicapped for lack of transportation facilities which the extension of this spur not more than 200 feet would give.

R. R. EMPLOYEES DEMAND A SETTLEMENT

Washington, Aug. 23.—The employes' committee today showed marked signs of unrest in the delay of the negotiations between President Wilson and the railway executives in considering the strike situation.

The leaders of the men expressed fears of their ability to hold the men much longer.

The meeting of the employes this morning grew into an uproar by minority speeches demanding immediate action, unless the roads accept President Wilson's plans.

President Wilson plans to see Senator Newlands and Representative Adamson late today and expected to receive another call from the railroad executives sometime before tomorrow. Many indications here are that the railroad presidents were considering the eight-hour day on condition that some assurance would be given that future disputes would be arbitrated.

TO DRIVE RUMANIA AND GREECE TO WAR

London, Aug. 22.—Events in the Balkans, following each other with dazzling rapidity, tonight threaten to drag two more nations, Rumania and Greece, into the maelstrom of the European war.

The crisis has admittedly been reached in Bucharest, while Greek troops, by engaging the Bulgarians in a bloody battle in Greek Macedonia, may lead the Athens government to enter the arena, even against its own desire.

A startling new phase of the situation reached the public eye for the first time today with the news that Rumania has completely mobilized her army of 800,000 and that Russia has landed troops at Saonika to cooperate with the British, French, Italians and Serbians.

Both these important developments, now weeks old, have been religiously withheld from public knowledge by the entente-censors. The news was allowed to leak out without comment by officials. It only serves to indicate the terrific battle of diplomacy which has been raging in the little Balkan capitals for the last year.

NEW MONEY TO BE CIRCULATED SOON.

The banks of the United States will soon be handing out bright new half dollars, quarters and dimes. Bankers have been advised that the government is minting a new half dollar, quarter dollar and dime. They will all be artistically decorated, according to reports reaching the local banks, it being declared that the government is contemplating the most elaborate engraving for the new money. They are also very patriotic in design. The half dollar on one side will have the statute of liberty, with the American flag flying in the background, engraved. The other side of the coin will be decorated with the figure of an eagle perched on a mountain crag. The quarter dollar, on one side, will bear the figure of an eagle in full flight. On the other side will be the figure of liberty, with an olive branch in one hand and a shield on her arm. The dime has on one side a bundle of rods and a battle axe, while on the other side is engraved the head of liberty, with the winged cap. The issue is expected to reach here within a short time. It is the first time in some years that a new issue of half dollars, dimes and quarters has been minted.

OVER FIVE MILLION DOLLARS SURPLUS POSTAL REVENUES

Washington, Aug. 18.—A surplus of \$5,200,000 from the postal service during the fiscal year ending June 30 was reported to President Wilson today by Postmaster General Burleson. Secretary McAdoo declared this is the third time since 1836 surplus postal revenues have been reported and that all three years have been under the present administration.

OVER HALF MILLION CARS IN ONE YEAR.

July 31st the Ford Motor company completed its 1915-16 year with a production of 533,921 cars. This volume of output and its distribution mark an achievement without any parallel in the history of the automobile industry. The building and distribution of these half million cars has brought a proportionate growth in every department of the Ford institution and this enlargement culminated in the opening Aug. 1 of new direct company branches in twenty-eight of the larger cities of the United States. When the Detroit factory established a goal of 500,000 cars Aug. 1, 1915, the Ford company had completed a production for 1914-15 of 300,000 cars and shared over \$15,000,000 with their retail buyers. Now the year recently closed has again seen the fulfillment of predictions in spite of an increase of 66 2-3 per cent in the market set over the output of the previous twelve months.

To build these cars the number of employees at the parent Ford factory has been increased to more than 33,000 at the present time, while the pay rolls of the branch factories and branches have grown to more than 12,000 names.

The quantities of raw materials entering into a half million production of Ford cars are beyond the grasp of the average individual. First, there are 200,000 tons of vanadium steel heat treated by special Ford processes, 2,000,000 tons each of wheels and tires, 51,950,250 square feet of rubber cloth material in the tops, 2,587,500 square feet of plate glass in the windshields, with other stock in proportion. The volume of these materials has brought about methods in their handling and manufacturing operations which have worked distinctive Ford savings in production cost, and these, combined with new methods of distribution, have made possible the remarkable reductions in Ford prices announced Aug. 1.

LOCATING MOTOR NOISES.

"At the Chalmers plant in Detroit we have just completed the construction of four "Silence Rooms" as a further step towards the reduction of noise in gasoline motors. These silence rooms, solidly constructed with 21-in. brick walls, form an added operation to the many processes of production, and insure an absolutely silent motor for every car.

Following the assembly of a Chalmers Six motor, it is taken to a large room where all motors are "run in" under electric power. When the first stiffness is taken out of the motor it is removed to another department where it runs from four to six hours on its own power. In this department and in the tuning-up process which immediately follows, all gear noises, oil and water leaks, generator and tapet noises and compression troubles are quickly attended to. When the motor leaves this room it is running as quietly as a well constructed watch and to the ear of the layman has reached perfect trim. But the trained experts in the new "Silence Rooms" have yet to place their O. K. on the product. In each of the four sound-proof rooms is a dynamometer stand, on which a motor is placed. The one door in the room is closed and the inspector spends fifteen minutes with each motor before making his decision as to its fitness. The slightest noise is easily located by these master mechanics in the confined space, and the motor either passes on to the final assembly or is sent back for further tuning up, according as his decision is made.

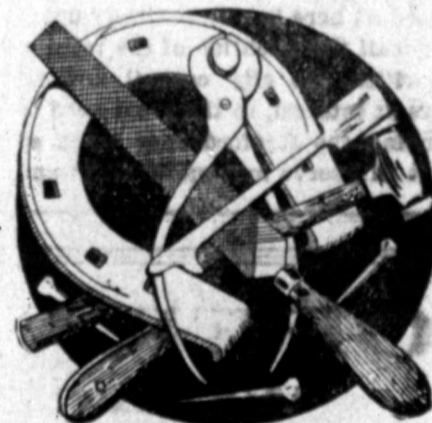

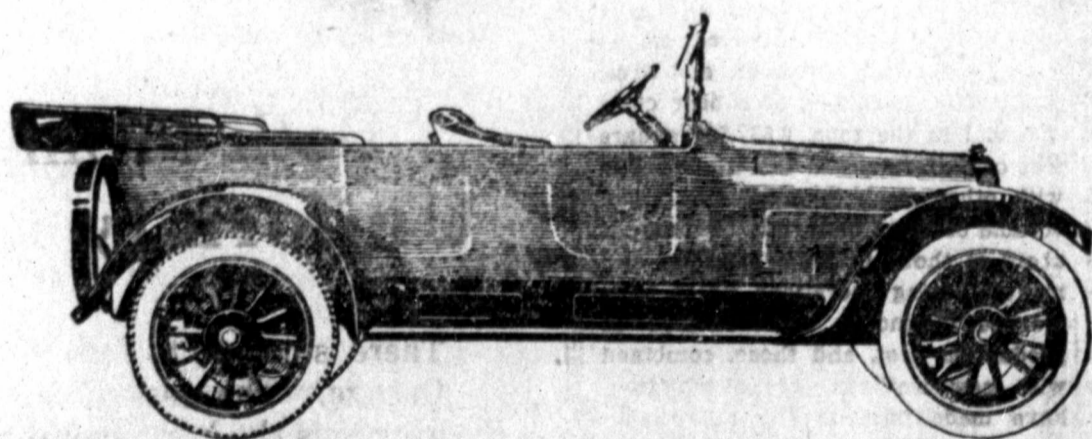
