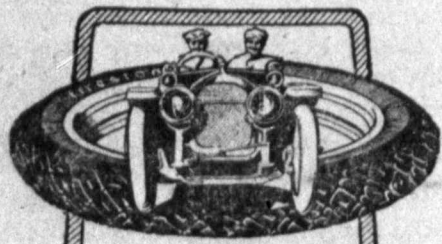

WOULD CUT "OBEY" FROM MARRIAGE CEREMONY.

Chicago.—The commission of seven bishops, seven pastors and seven laymen of the Protestant Episcopal church appointed to revise the ritual of the church, has determined to eliminate the word "obey" from the marriage ceremony, it was learned here. The commission will report to the general convention of the church at St. Louis October 11th. Radical changes are proposed in the 10 commandments, the burial and baptismal services and in arrangements of various prayers. The tenth commandment, as an example, will be shortened to "thou shalt not covet anything that is thy neighbor's" if the commission's report is adopted.

If the credit system were set aside and every man paid as he goes, conditions would change appreciably at once and grow better at no distant day, observes the Greenville Banner. One of the banes of the present, is the credit system. It hampers progress all along the line. Men who pay, pay in some degree the bill for the fellow who does not pay. A cash system would, it is true, cause some trouble for a time. Many who have gone on credit all the time would find it more difficult to rake up the money required but eventually this class would be in better financial condition. Only the fellow who never pays would get it squarely in the neck where the man who formerly trusted him got it. Statistics show that of those who buy on a credit forty per cent never are able or never do pay in full, and seven per cent never pay. This would be wiped out and new conditions would soon prevail. To go on a cash basis it would be necessary to wipe out many old accounts but this is what is eventually done any way. To wipe them out all at one time, would merely be a quick method of getting rid of a bad and unprofitable system.—Fr. Worth Stock Reporter.

TWENTY-SIX YEARS AGO.

Points and Conditions That Obtained When Colorado Was in Her Swaddling Clothes.

(From the Colorado Clipper of Nov. 6th, 1890.)

After wetting the tatters and pasting them down, we have been able to extract the following items from an old Colorado paper of date November 6th, 1890, which was given us by our friend, Harry Landers, Sr.:

There were three banks in the town at that time—the Citizens' National, the First National and the Colorado National. F. M. Burns was vice-president of the Citizens' National and A. Pruitt, cashier. Winfield Scott was president of the First National and H. P. Smoot, cashier. R. L. Ball was president of the Colorado National and E. H. Cooke, cashier.

The First National had then a capital stock of \$100,000 and a surplus fund of \$45,000. The paper was so badly torn we could not decipher the capital stocks and surplus of the others.

Burns, Walker & Company on Second street, was the leading dry goods firm of the city. Harness & Co. were receivers and shippers of wool, cotton and feed stuff. Lapowsky & Bro. were then serving the dry goods patrons. Drs. J. W. Pearson, E. T. Terrell and N. J. Phenix had cards in the Clipper, which was then edited by H. C. Townsend, who died only a short time ago out on the Pacific coast.

Fred Schroeder was conducting the largest meat market in the city; Waldo & Webb were soliciting business in the hardware line, while J. S. McCall declared he carried the largest wholesale and retail stock of groceries to be found west of Fort Worth. Adams & Hill were claiming their share of the dry goods business, and Fred Meyer was even then making the best boots to be gotten anywhere (he does the same trick yet when not functioning with justice and juggling fines).

Earnest & Shepherd were doing a land office business, while R. L. Boren and Andrew Van Tui were competing with them and carrying insurance on the side. Martin, Byrne & Johnson, contractors and builders, made a specialty of public edifices. C. C. Blandford took delight in showing the style and finish of his celebrated saddles and harness. T. Q. Mullin & Co. specialized in insurance.

A big bazaar had just been pulled off the week before with the two-fold object of "giving pleasure to the community and benefit of the Baptist ladies' building fund." Entrance fee one dime; children half-dime. It was a function of much class, as there were nine booths, presided over by the very elite of the community. In looking over the patronesses and assistants of the various booths, the names of many residing here today appear. Some of them, misses then, are now called "Grammer" by the second generation removed; some are still "Missed."

Two selections from the marriage licenses will offend no one nor invoke the shades of passing years:

Mr. Joe Stokes of the Espuela ranch was married at Coleman, on November 5th, to Miss Emma Mason, of that city. Mr. Jeff Isaacs of Snyder stood by as best man. They arrived Thursday night and will stop at the St. James hotel a few days before proceeding to their home at Dockums.

Married—in Fisher county, at the residence of the bride's father, Col. C. R. Breedlove, November 6th, 1890, Mr. William Robert Smith of this place and Miss Frances L. Breedlove of Fisher county, Rev. J. C. Burkett officiating. No cards. (Compliments to both, of course, follow).

But the most interesting information the old paper contains, is complete returns from the county election held the preceding week, in which there was great interest and a multitude of hungry candidates.

J. S. Hogg beat Webster Flanagan in the governor's race, 452 to 78. S. W. T. Lanham defeated C. W. Johnson for congress, 445 to 73.

S. H. Cowan was defeated by X. Ryan for district attorney by 268 to 142. J. N. Browning had no opponent in the legislature and polled 528 votes in the county.

C. H. Earnest, W. C. McCallum, J. W. Pearson and Joseph Bell were entries for the County Judge handicap in which C. H. Earnest received 175, McCallum 85, Pearson 144, Bell 85 and 48 scattering.

M. Carter had even then been bit-

ten by the bacillus politicus. He beat John G. Rix for county attorney by 70 votes, though there were 10 scattering.

Y. D. McMurry and J. E. Hooper vied in the lists for the office of district and county clerk, with the result that Hooper beat McMurry by only 67 votes. For six years from this time Mac got it back on the "other fellow" in other races.

R. C. Ware defeated Joe Lang for sheriff and tax collector by the close margin of 57 votes.

For the office of tax assessor there were ten entrants (think of it, with less than 600 voters in the county) with the names of some chronic offenders who abide with us till this day. Here's the list: B. F. Mills, Claude E. Marlow, C. C. Pool, J. M. Murchison, W. M. McDonald, S. N. Hardy, A. J. Coe, W. S. Stoneham, D. E. Walshe, J. R. Harrison. In this race, W. S. Stoneham took off the cap and bells.

Dr. E. T. Terrell, A. M. K. Sowell and C. C. Blandford contested for the honors and emoluments of the treasurer's office this year, with the result that Dr. Terrell carried off the honors 324 to 164 for Blandford.

The other offices are negligible importance in view of the living participants. John L. Doss received his first blushing political honors that year by being elevated to the dignity of the commissioners' court from precinct 1. Fred Lancaster and Chas. Sparks joined issues with two others for the constable's office, with the result that Lancaster went under the wire first—just a nose or two ahead of Chas.

In commenting upon the result of the election, the Clipper says editorially: "There was a great crowd around the polls all day, but despite the intense feeling the day was unmarred by a single disturbance of any sort."

AN OPPORTUNITY FOR WEST TEXAS.

At the State Democratic Convention held in August, a plank was inserted, providing for a branch of the Agricultural and Mechanical College West of the 98th meridian.

In the adoption of that plank, there was no intention to minimize the importance of the institution now located near Bryan, but to afford an avenue for investigations, that could not be given at that institution, on account of altitude, soil, and environments.

The territory west of the 98th meridian is almost as large as that of the New England States, and it is the fastest growing section of Texas.

This section is essentially a farming and stock raising country, as well as a cattle raising and breeding section.

The crops are of a variety, that the biggest test of adaptability, cannot be given in a country where the soil, climatic conditions and environments are so different, as that of West and South Central Texas.

Diseases among cattle that are common to the cattle in West Texas do not exist in South Central Texas, nor can the highest degree of treatment be given these diseases in that section.

Therefore, the boys in West Texas who attend the A. and M. College at College Station, cannot return and give the section from which they came, the best results of the work they do at the present A. and M. College. They must either find opportunities for their work at this college in the Southern and central portions of the state, or they must lose the advantages of their gain.

In addition to these things, they have been reared above the malaria lines. To take a course at the present A. and M. College, they are subject to infections of this kind, and the results are not satisfactory.

For these and many other reasons, many of the West Texas boys are going to the A. and M. College in Oklahoma, in order to get training that will be of the greatest service to them, in the future development of West Texas.

In addition to these arguments, it can be truthfully stated that Texas is large enough for another agricultural and mechanical college. It ought to be stated further, that the greatest advantages could come to the state from an agricultural and stock raising standpoint, as well as in others, if the state had four more such institutions. The German Empire which is no larger than the state of Texas is recognized as the greatest agricultural

country in the world. The reason for this is, that instead of one agricultural institution, she has nearly one hundred.

Texas can never attain the high state from an agricultural and stock farming standpoint, that nature intended that she should be, until more opportunities for practical agriculture and stock raising are afforded.

Texas has one hundred and sixty-eight million acres of land, and less than one-fourth of this great empire is in cultivation. It is time that this percentage be greatly reduced.

There is more than one-half of this uncultivated area in West Texas. An agricultural college in this section of the state would aid materially in this direction.

These things being true, the opportunity for West Texas to join hands co-operate to the fullest extent and work to the end that the 35th legislature enact the platform demand providing for a branch of the A. & M. College in West Texas into a law.

There is ample time to discuss the

location of the institution.

The next step is to get the legislature to pass a bill providing for this institution, or West Texas will sleep on her rights; she will miss an opportunity; she shall be remiss to her duty if she does not do everything possible to take advantage of the opportunity now offered.—Homer D. Wade in Stamford Leader.

ENOUGH OF CARNIVALS.

The following from the Roscoe Times is an emphatic echo of what the Record said of bringing carnivals and shows to Colorado under the wing of any local organization, every word of which we earnestly endorse:

"But like all carnivals, this one had some bad features. Two or three purely gambling schemes, such as the revolving wheel and other chance devices, were allowed to operate unmonitored. A crowd of women of very questionable character constituted a part of the personnel of the outfit. A number of negro girls, who evidently possessed neither morals nor modesty, were here daily and nightly disporting themselves in a manner that was far from elegant. It is a little strange that while a decent negro who wants to work for a living would not be allowed in Roscoe overnight, a bunch of the lewd and idle variety, who make their living otherwise than by honest toil, are invited into our confines and permitted to remain a whole week.

The carnival came under the auspices of the fire boys and they realized about \$120.00, we are informed, as their part of the proceeds, but the fire boys are not solely responsible for the carnival, not by any means. The Times, which ran an advertisement of the affair and published gratis a write-up of it, acknowledges its share of responsibility. The citizens of the town who gave it support and encouragement are likewise responsible. We are nearly all in the same boat.

* Now this is what we want to say. We believe that the city council should provide the fire boys with all the fire fighting equipment that they need, out of the city funds. If necessary to raise the tax rate slightly in order to do this, we believe the tax rate should be raised rather than to raise the money through the carnival route. We understand that the carnival took in something over eight hundred dollars in Roscoe. The larger part of this was taken out of our town never to return. The morals of our people were not benefited very much by the presence of the carnival. Without blaming anybody more than we do ourself, we hope that another carnival will not be brought to Roscoe soon. It is much cheaper to furnish the fire boys with all necessary equipment by the taxation route, and if they need a little money for accidentals we believe that can be easily raised. The Times is not going to share in the responsibility of another one.

DESTRUCTIVE RAIN AND HAIL

On Friday afternoon, twenty-four hours after the visitation of rain and hail in the section southeast of Ira, a party of Colorado business men, a preacher and a Record representative, visited the scene. The center of the heaviest rainfall and hail seemed to be the farms of Frank Taylor and Mr. Shaw, the latter a tenant on one of George Goodwin's farms on the county line. The rain began to fall about 3:30 on Thursday afternoon, and soon afterward the hail fell in solid sheets, beating out every lock of cotton, every leaf, and washing the ground clean of everything. Not a lock of cotton was left on the ground. The rain fell in such torrents that all the debris and hail were washed into the gullies and low places. Twenty-four hours afterward, the hail was in many places more than two feet deep, while the bottoms of all the surface tanks were covered with it.

On the farm of Mr. Shaw the bark was beaten from the young fruit trees and watermelons looked as if they had been pitted by confluent smallpox. The green blades on the feed were shredded as if by a hackle. The work of destruction in many fields could hardly have been more complete. Fortunately, the area covered by the hail and heavy rain, was not a large one. Mr. Goodwin estimated that a mile and a half by two miles would cover the more serious damage. Much of the cotton however, out of the hail area, was discolored by the rain and dirt.

It is bad enough for a farmer to witness the slow perishing of his crop by a drought; the calamity is a cumulative one. But it is far worse when after the crop is made and ready to gather into barns, to have it swept away before one's eyes, in the short space of an hour. There is little comfort or consolation possible, in the face of such misfortune. But the farmers who suffered most in this visitation, are made of the spartan stuff that acknowledges no defeat. The ground had not dried before they were at work with renewed energy to make good their battered crops, and within a few months will come to accept their recent loss as only an incident of the farming business that could neither be foreseen nor prevented.

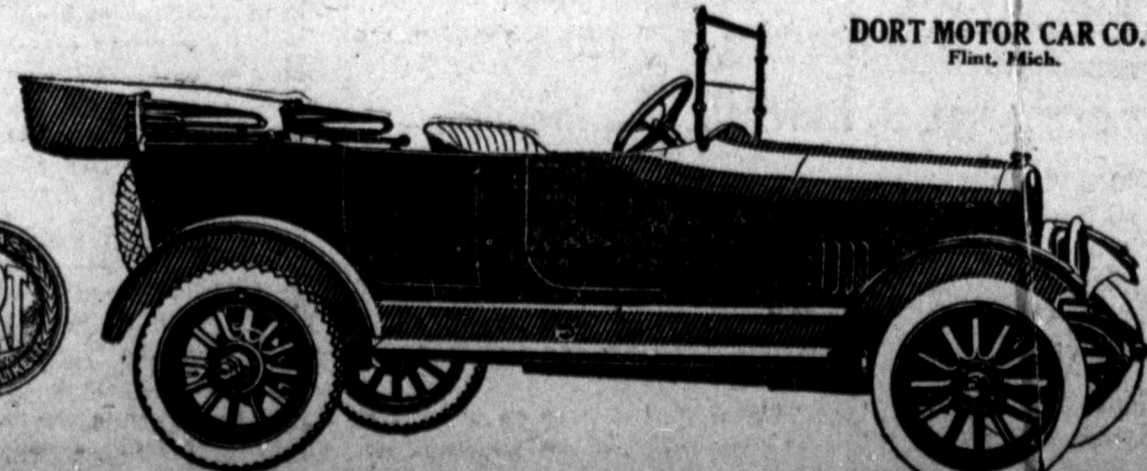

AFTER THE WAR.

There is not the faintest glimmer of hope in any part of the world's horizon of an early ending of the war—not anywhere the faintest cooling of the glow of peace.

There have been predictions that the war may end with the coming of winter, but they were not based upon any tangible evidences or legal reasoning. The most prevalent idea is that the struggle will be prolonged indefinitely, to the point of exhaustion.

Yet on both sides of the Atlantic there is a good deal of discussion of what is to be after the war and of the preparation that should be made in advance. Naturally Germany is much concerned for the recovery of her foreign trade, which has amounted to practically nothing since her merchant ships were driven from the sea and her ports blockaded, and it is said that even while war is in progress her shipyards are busy with the construction of vessels that are to be employed in the transportation of merchandise after the war. Russia is said to be looking forward to closer trade relations with the United States and the countries of this hemisphere as soon as peace is re-established and the expansion of her commerce in all directions. Great Britain, France and Italy have already been considering trade restrictions with the countries with which they have been at war and means whereby they may cripple the commerce of their enemies after they have ceased to fight them with the weapons of war.

In our own country we are talking of greater elasticity of the tariff system to meet trade conditions that will arise after peace is restored and are proposing measures to prevent the dumping of cheap-made foreign goods upon our market in competition with home manufacturers. The National Foreign Trade Council has proposed that in view of threatened change by commercial treaties and tariff regulations in foreign trade after the war the American tariff system shall be readjusted and adapted to the new conditions which may be anticipated. It is a long look ahead, but the Tariff Commission ought to be equal to the task which may be set for it and so exemplify the wisdom of its creation and justify the manner of its operation.

In the meantime would it not be well to let the matter of the protective tariff rest until the commission is organized and operative and until it is seen what are to be the after-effects of the European war upon foreign trade conditions? Whatever is done now it might be necessary to undo then, except in so far as it provides for elasticity of the tariff, already explained to some extent in retaining the sugar duties when it was found that we could not get along without the revenue and in the discriminating protective duties and restrictions proposed by the last congress.—San Antonio Express.

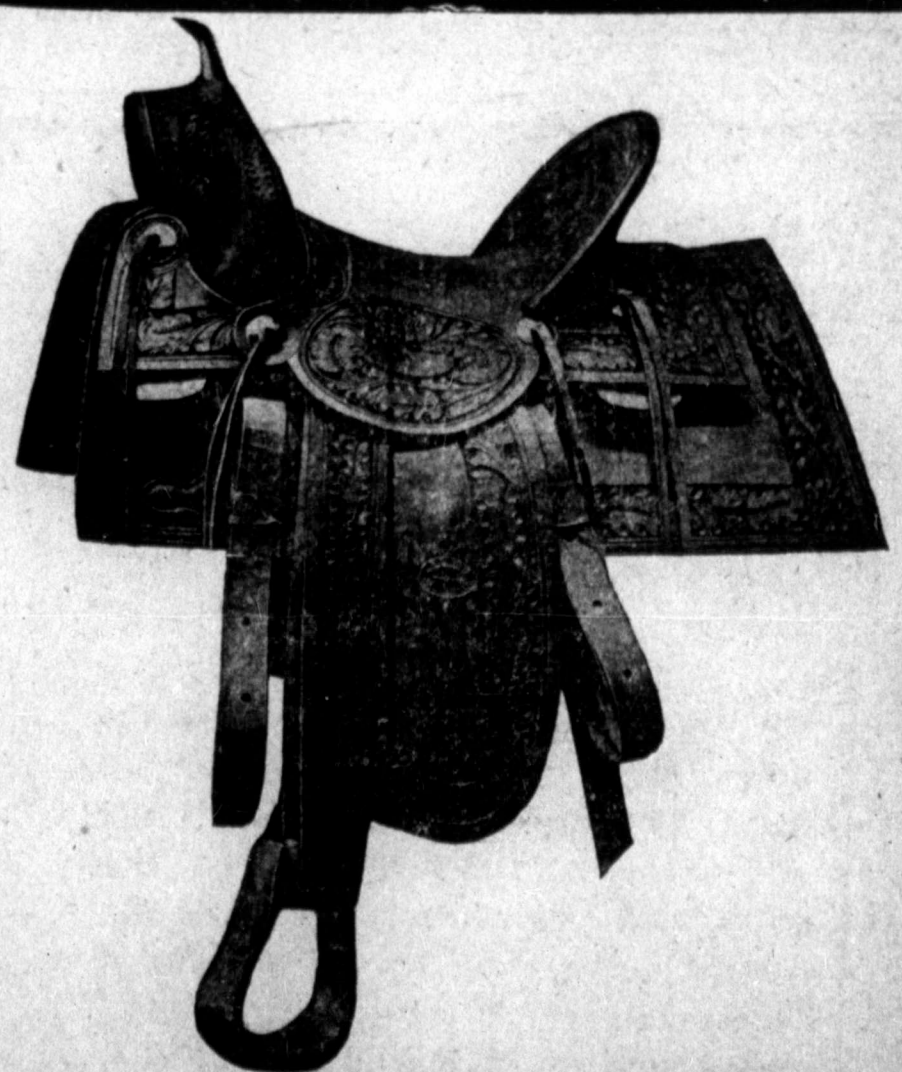

Two years ago today middling cotton sold on the streets of Colorado for 7 1-8 cents the pound; the best corn for 83 cents and red oats for 50 cents while the best soft wheat commanded only \$1.05. The wise men who assumed ability to look deeper into the commercial grindstone than their fellows, gave it out that these prices were the direct result of too much cotton and too little grain; that another year of the same farming system would further depress the price of cotton and raise the price of grain. We have had not only one but two years of the same system of farming, and with every farmer trying to raise all the cotton he could, there is prediction that the price of middling cotton will reach 20 cents before the end of this year. As for wheat, corn and all other kinds of feed—how do they account for the steady rise in prices on the basis of production. In this instance the fact of supply has less to do with the high prices than that of simple demand. The continuance of the European war combined with the stiff demand at home, have stimulated the price of cotton and all kinds of food stuffs. Nor will the cessation of the war depress the price of cotton. A greater commercial war will be waged not only between European nations for their lost trade, but the conflict will be directed against this country, as well. The present prospect is that everything that the earth produces will be in active demand for several years to come.

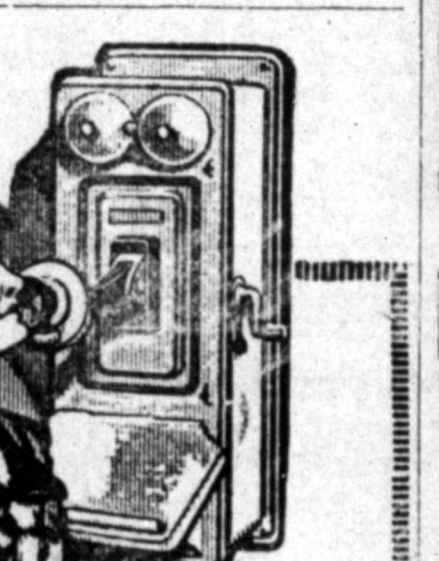
