One Induction, 15 Physicals Set In January

The local Draft Board, Eastland, has a call for only one man for induction for January and 15 for physical examinations, for which married men will be called, Jewell Reeves has announced.

State draft boards a r e scheduled to induct 1,475 men into the armed forces in January, according to State Selective Service Director Colonel Morris S. Schwartz.

The January quota for induction will be filed with single and childless married men 19 through 25 years old and volunteers who have not attained the age of 26.

No married man with children, or an expected chid, wi be sected to fill the January call.

"Draft boards must have the information about children, of course, and an unborn child must be certified by a physician. Otherwise, a young husband and father may find himself selected," Colonel Schwartz sand.

Irrigation For Peanut Farming On Increase In Eastland County


GORMAN — In sandy Eastland County, where undependable peanut production depends on unpredictable rainfall, farmers appear on the brink of an irrigation explosion.

The reason is simple — more peanuts, three to four-fold.

"Too many years we missed making a crop. We never duce more cash — about \$2 million in a good crop year than any other crop in Eastland County The deep sand limits variety of crops. The crop now under harvest is 32,000 acres.

Warren said only three or four farmers irrigated last year and the number increased to 22 this year. Further expansion hinges on locating adequate water and financing.

There is water below the surface, but farmers said characteristics of the sand would give a water witcher the (willing) trying to logate




