Carbon Wolverines Win Bi-District

Carbon Clips Gustine; Meet Talpa-Centennial

Wolverines Play Talpa Centennial At Coleman Friday Night At 7:30

The Carbon Wolverines, coached by Coach Dale Key, won the Class B six-man bi-district game Thursday night, as they rolled over the Gustine Tigers 22-14 at Comanche. Carbon will now meet Talpa-Centennial in the regional play-off at Coleman Friday night. Junior Half-back Ronnie Hughes raced for three of the Carbon touchdowns. His first touchdown came midway through the first quarter when the junior speedstar dashed for

40 yards into the end zone the second touchdown was a 25 yard run. Hughes then made a one-yard plunge over the one-yard line early in the 3rd quarter for the final touchdown. Alvin Allison booted the extra points each time. Carbon now has a standing record this season of 11-0, while Gustine finished with a 9-2.

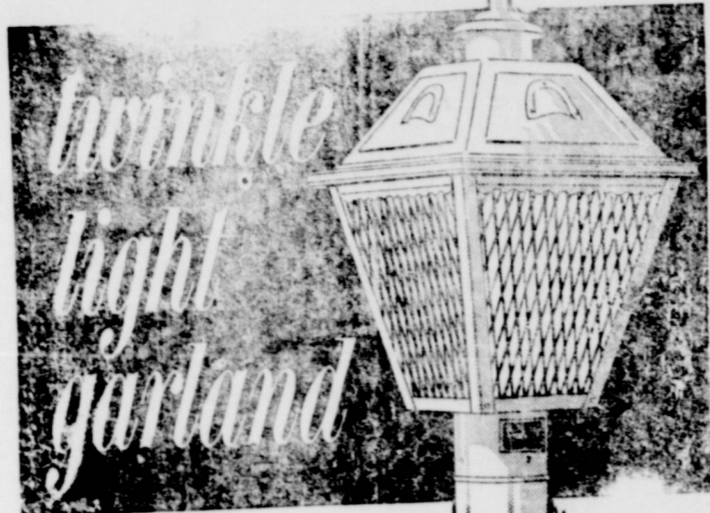

Farmers Vote In Favor Of Quotas

Eastland County peanut and cotton farmers voted in favor of quotas on those commodities for 1966, but declined by a small percentage, the "transfer" of cotton quota proposition in the Tuesday referendum balloting held at six polls in the county. Gilbert Meredith, County ASCS manager has reported.

Turn-out was considered good in view of the fact that the referendum was held early this year — and fell right in the middle of peanut harvesting time," Meredith said. Only about 200 of the some 300 eligible peanut farmers voted, and about 60 of the some 200 eligible cotton raisers turned out he said.

Peanut harvest is considered to be about 60 per cent complete in the county, Meredith says.

The first of the three propositions, peanut quotas for 1966, carried almost unanimously, with 193 voting for and six against in county voting.

Cotton raisers voted 52 for, nine against, for the '66 quotas (carrying that proposition locally as well as nationally), but voted 39 for and 21 against the out-of-county cotton allotment transfer proposal. It was close in the county with 65 per cent voting for, but a 66 and two-
