At Evian the Rod Cross opened a ch. dren's dispensary in the garage of an old hotel. It is known as the American Children's Hospital. Ten days before a general hospital was opened at Evian with 70 beds. It is already overcrowded with cases of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever and whooping cough. American doctors twice daily examine an average of 250 children arriving from behind the German lines and send contagious cases to the American hospitals.

Every contagious case thus stopped may mean that an epidemic will have teen prevented somewhere in France. An American dentist opened a den

tal dispensary in an old hotel at Evian, using a chair improvised from wine Larrels. His first patient was an underfed boy from Long. The boy's family of seven had been living two years and a half in the cellar of their home, which had been wrecked by the Germans.



Most of the opposition in the past has been impossible to work the roads and the plumbers have advertised that streets come from a lack of understanding of its value to our own communities. Public improvement would proceed at a much greater rate if we followed the policy of courage

RUB BACKACHE AWAY. and wisdom, instead of that of fear and folly. It is an axiom of common experience that the building of good roads increases the value of the land in the communities through which they are constructed. The United States Department of Public Roads gives as an example a farm of one hundred acres which was offered for sale for \$1800. The owner fought against road improvement, but later, when the road upon which this farm was located was improved, he refused \$3000 for the land. It is quite true that a good road will not improve the fertility of the farm, but it is also true that it will improve the site value in its relation to markets, schools and towns. Just at this time the question of good roads is of special importance, for we now have an opportunity to secure one of the State Highways. But in order to secure this it is neces-
