Carbon Whips Putnam To End Season With Perfect Record

At the game at Comanche Thursday night, November 25, at 7:30, Carbon fans will occupy the grandstand on the south side and Gustine the north. Carbon will use the west side for parking and Gustine the east.

The Carbon High School Wolverines concluded their 1965 District 8-B football schedule with a perfect record Thursday night as they scored a 44-to-6 triumph over Putnam High's Panthers in a game at Chesley Field in Cisco.

Carbon will represent District 8-B in a bi-district play-off game with Gustine at Comanche on Thursday, Nov. 25, at 7:30 p.m.

The Wolverines of Coach Dale Key used their running game, which featured Halfback Ronnie Hughes, to win over Putnam. Hughes scored four touchdowns—one on a six yard run, another on a 68-yard jaunt, the third on the receiving end of a 75-yard pass play from QB Alvie Allison, and the last on an 18-yard run.

Tim Warren, senior halfback, scored twice—first on a 65-yard kickoff return and then on a two-yard buck. Allison kicked four goals for eight points.

Putnam's score came in the first quarter on a 63-yard pass play, Johnny Isenhower to Bob Isenhower. Putnam had eight first downs, completed 11 of 33 passes for 179 yards and gained 87 yards rushing.

Carbon completed three of five passes for 120 yards and gained 223 yards rushing.

A half-time feature was the presentation of Miss Ellen Shackelford as the 1965 football queen of Putnam High School. She was escorted by Roddy McDowell. Other candidates and their escorts were Connie Feely and Bob Isenhower, and Rhonda Knott and Pierce Shackelford.

Parents of the queen nominees are Mr. and Mrs. F. P. Shackelford, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Feely, and Mr and Mrs. J. A. Knott. The queen's bouquet was presented by Joe Shirley of the Panther team.

County Pecan Show Is Planned Next Month

The 13th annual Eastland County Pecan Show will be held on Dec. 10-11 at the Victor Hotel in Cisco, with the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association cooperating.

All entries of nuts must be entered by 12 noon on Friday, Dec. 10; however, they may be sent or left at either the County Agent's office in Eastland or at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce or at Ranger Chamber of Commerce prior to this time, according to County Agent J. M. Cooper.

Growers are limited to one entry of each improved or papershell variety. There is no limit on the number of entries of seedling or natives. These nuts must be left on display until 4 p.m. on Dec. 11, Cooper stated.

Judges for the event will

be from Texas A&M University Extension Service and the Texas A&M University Horticulture Dept. They will judge classes on size, color, appearance, shell thickness, cracking quality, kernel quality, attractiveness and other factors.

First, second and third place ribbons will be awarded for the following varieties: Mohawks, Burkett, Moran, Western Schley, Eastern Schley, Texas Prolific, Kincaid, Stuart, Comanche, Success, Barton, Delmas, Curtis, Onliwon, San Saba Improved, McCullery, Williamson, Hybrid Pecans, (Gov. Crosses), Sioux, Halbert, Aggie, Desirable, John Garner, Brake, Squirrel's Delight, Choctaw, Perique, Wichita, Apache, Aultman, Ranger, Humble, Caper No. 64, Money Maker, Seedlings of a named variety and Native Pecans.

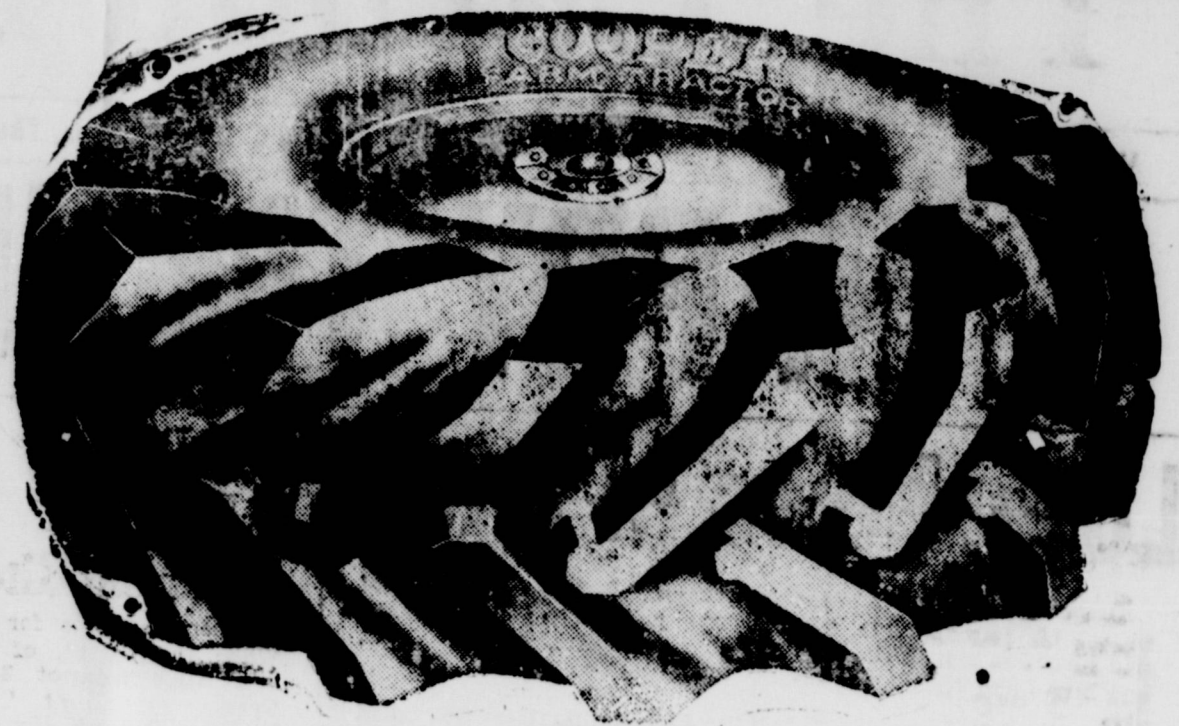

FHA Loan for \$112,000 Okayed for Rec. Area

The approval of a \$112,000 insured loan by the Farmers Home Administration to develop a recreational area near Rising Star, Texas, was announced today by H. P. Cole, County Supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration, Eastland, Texas.

The proposed loan for the Lakewood Recreation Center project will convert the existing facilities into a modern recreational center. The proposed Lakewood Recreational Center will consist of a

modern club house and living quarters, swimming pool, golf course, water facilities, sanitary facilities, and picnic area.

The loan was obtained by the Lakewood Recreation Center, a nonprofit organization of 230 rural families. In addition, income will be received from fees charged to members using the recreation area. Funds will be provided by the First State Bank of Rising Star, Rising Star, Texas.

The facility will serve the communities of Rising Star, Cross Plains, and surrounding areas. Approximately 5,000 people live in the area to be served and approximately 700 will use the facilities each year, association officials estimate.

Construction of the project will provide 1,864 man-days of labor for landscape architects, engineers, machine operators, pipe layers, electricians, plumbers, welders, carpenters, and other laborers, and remove 27 acres of farmland from production. Some 11 people will be employed in the construction of the facilities. Approximately 1 new job will be provided in the operation and maintenance of the recreational facility.

Under the insured loan program the Farmers Home Administration makes and services the loan and guarantees repayment of the money borrowed along with interest.

"Recreation projects of this type boost rural areas development," Mr. Cole pointed out. Such endeavors bring new jobs to rural communities and provide much needed recreational facilities for urban and rural families. In addition, these facilities help develop the type of rural community that encourages young people to remain in their hometown, attracts industry, and promotes tourism. These projects also utilize land not needed for crop production.

The Farmers Home Administration loan will be repaid over a 40-year period.

Officers of the corporation receiving the loan are: R. D. Needham, President, Cross Plains, Texas; J. A. Rutherford, Secretary - Treasurer, Rising Star, Texas; L. B. Forbes, Member Rising Star, Texas; A. A. White, Member, Rising Star, Texas; W. E. Tyler, Member, Rising Star, Texas; Dave Lee, Member, Rising Star, Texas; and Jack Jackson, Member, Rising Star, Texas.

This is the 6th loan to be made to a rural group in Texas for the development of a recreational area. Loans of this type were authorized by the 1962 food and Agricultural Act. Loans made were for a total of \$302,000.
