





**SCHOOL PATRONS.**

**Must the Standard of Our Schools be Lowered by a Short Session?**

There has come about some opposition by the patrons of the Colorado schools, requesting the Board of Trustees to discontinue six day week and resume the five day session, which existed prior to the resumption of the school on December 30th. In order that the Board may be fully understood in having the six day session every week, we desire to make the following explanation.

The Board realizes the inconvenience and hardship, to all who are interested; but hope that the public will be considerate and remember that conditions in every line of business and enterprise is not normal. You will recall the chaos this school and others, have endured during this school term, on account of an epidemic of sickness prevailing everywhere, which demanded for the safety of the public a suspension of our school for five weeks. This has retarded the advancement of all pupils, and placed them far behind with their school work, unless some provision is made to give the necessary advantages.

We wish to refer back to a few years of the Board's administration, for information. At one time the Board was confronted with a debt of about \$3000.00 in the operating expenses of the school funds, and you remember, it was necessary for the public to make free contributions in order that the school term could be extended for a period of eight months. This debt was created by a former administration, and being paid, the Board resolved that, in future, no such condition should arise, if in their power to prevent. From that time to the present the school has maintained its standard, and efficiency and has been financed with little trouble. Although the Board has suffered severe criticisms from many sources, regarding the physical condition of the school.

By our efforts and the pleasant cooperation of the patrons and teachers with conservatism, we were enabled to create a surplus fund in the school treasury, amounting to about \$2000. This was known as an emergency fund, and we did hope that ere long, the Board would be in better condition financially to relieve any strain of whatever nature might be presented to the School Board.

You are aware that the past two years have been strenuous, causing heavy losses financially among the tax payers of this district, a reduction of the rendition of all property, has decreased the assessment of taxes in this district below normal, creating from that source a deficit, which can not be overcome. Also you will note the State has not been able, as yet, to meet the apportionment made by the State Board of Education of \$7.50 per capita, and to those who read the items from the daily news papers, Governor Hobby has requested an appropriation of \$1,000,000.00 in order that this apportionment may be paid. So at this time, the Trustees are unable to ascertain the amount of money this district will receive for maintenance of the present session of the school.

With this financial condition confronting the Board, when school was resumed on Dec. 30th, it was the unanimous opinion of the Board that the school should be operated six days in the week, until one month's time was made up, giving the pupils all the advantages possible. Unless

the school is conducted in this manner the result will be, that the pupils will only receive about seven months schooling. This matter was presented to the faculty by the Superintendent, and he reported the matter met with favor from the teachers, realizing that the request from the Board was an emergent one, and was for the best interests of all concerned. The Board, during the suspension of the school, paid the salaries of the teachers, and are appreciative of their efforts, however, realizing the inconveniences which arise in every way.

We trust that the teachers and patrons of the school will appreciate the situation, and if it was not that we had a surplus of \$2000 for operating expenses, when the present session began, we would have been forced to suspend school with a six months session, under the strain of our present financial situation.

Therefore, we firmly believe, with this information before the patrons and teachers, they will heartily endorse the action of the Board, requiring six day sessions of the school, which is necessary for the best interests of the school and its students.

LETTER FROM GERMANY.

Ahrweiler, Germany, Dec. 21, '18 To the Colorado Record force: Dear Friends:—I thought you would like a few lines from a Colorado boy who has been through the war, so "here goes" for some of my experiences, where I've been, etc.

I am with the 117th Supply Train, Motor Truck Co. D, 42nd Division or better known as the "Rainbow" Division. I came over on the Mt. Vernon and landed at Brest, France about Nov. 12th, 1917. Our division held its first sector on the Luneville front, which was last winter and spring. It was there some of the supply train boys had their first experience with the German gas.

Our division was the first complete American division to hold a sector in France. Our next fighting was on the Champagne front, where we got ahead of the Germans by starting our barrage about 30 minutes before they intended to start theirs.

I was up there that night helping James H. Brown on a truck loaded with forage for the 150th field artillery, and had just delivered same and made our "get away" about 20 or 30 minutes before the barrage started. Soon we heard a rumbling noise and looked behind and we stopped our truck to listen.

From the Champaign sector we were next at Chateau Thierry where we put 'em on the run and gave them such a surprise they'll never forget.

The supply train boys were in some very close places there, but luck was with us and has been so all the way through it seems.

It gives you a peculiar feeling to hear the Boche planes overhead with that buzzing sound, all their own, and not knowing at what moment Fritz intends to drop his tail gate or "let loose" with that machine gun.

Next we were on the St. Meheil sector, where our boys took part and did gallant work. The Boche were again surprised, more so than the other time, I presume.

Great numbers of prisoners and vast war booty were captured and many square miles of territory and French villages were wrested from them.

We took part in the last and final dash for victory in the Argonne Woods and drove the Hun's so fast—why, it was just like taking candy 'way from a baby.

I saw the little village of Grand mentioned in Longfellow's poem, "Evangeline." It sure was "shot up."

Then came the news in a few days that the armistice had been signed—Oh, the joy it spread!—Then followed the news in a few more days that our division was among several others to go to Germany, to occupy certain towns, according to the terms of the armistice.

So here we are in Germany, among some of the most beautiful mountain scenery I ever saw.

All six companies of the supply train are located in Ahrweiler which is the rail head for the 42nd. The rest of the organization belonging to our division are not far away—some on the Rhine. By the way I had the opportunity of seeing this beautiful stream.

I passed through some beautiful country in Belgium and Luxembourg on my way to Germany.

DEATH OF MRS. R. H. LOONEY. One of Colorado's Earliest and Most Prominent Citizens Goes Home.

On last Friday the entire citizenship was saddened by the news of the death of Mrs. R. H. Looney.

She had been sick only a short time and consequently the news came as a shock to all who knew her.

Death is always sad, but when one is taken who means so much to her home, her church and the poor, and to society it seems doubly so.

The funeral services were held at the elegant home of the family where they have lived since she came to Colorado as a bride. Services were conducted by Dr. W. A. Williams, rector of All Saints church; and the body laid to rest in the Odd Fellows cemetery.

The pall bearers were R. P. Price, Joe H. Smoot, H. E. Grantland, C. M. Adams, J. M. Thomas, Ben Plaster, Lay Powell, D. H. Snyder, J. L. Doss, C. H. Earnest.

As a token of the high esteem in which she was held her casket was a bank of flowers, the silent messengers of love. The business houses of the city were closed during the funeral and burial services.

Even the colored people of the town felt the loss of a friend and all day Saturday they came to pay tribute to her.

Frances Elizabeth Looney was a native Texan, having been born in the southern part of the state on Feb. 25th, 1862. She came to Colorado with her husband as a bride and has lived here ever since, making their home on the same lot where their residence now stands.

Judge Looney was then a lawyer, afterwards a stock man, and now a large land owner and banker. But as prosperity came Mrs. Looney increased her charities, and multiplied her good deeds, and remained to her

old time friends, a friend indeed until her death. She was confirmed in the Episcopal church when she first came to Colorado, more than thirty-five years ago, and has always exemplified its teachings in her life.

To them six children were born, five of whom are still living—Mrs. Harvey Lindsay of Oakland, California; Hunter Looney of Colorado; Mrs. Marcus Snyder of Colorado; Mrs. Ed Rowley of Hillsboro, Texas; and Mrs. Lester Thomas of Fresno, Calif. Besides her six children she leaves a husband, four brothers; one in Fort Davis, two in New Mexico and our fellowtownsman, J. C. Prude; a sister in California; twelve grandchildren and a host of friends to mourn her loss.

Never has Colorado given up one who was a greater benefactress, as when called to give up Mrs. Looney. Her mind was alert, her sympathies deep and her purse open to all in distress. The good she has done can only be told when the day comes when we are judged by the deeds done in the body, because she was quiet and unassuming, and many acts of charity were performed by her of which no one knew.

She was a charter member of the Standard Club, and every member feels she has indeed lost a friend and will miss her cheery presence, as well as her intellectual contributions to their work; and her wise council.

To those who loved her and whose hearts will be saddened because of her absence, we point them to Him who said "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: Yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labors; and their works do follow them."

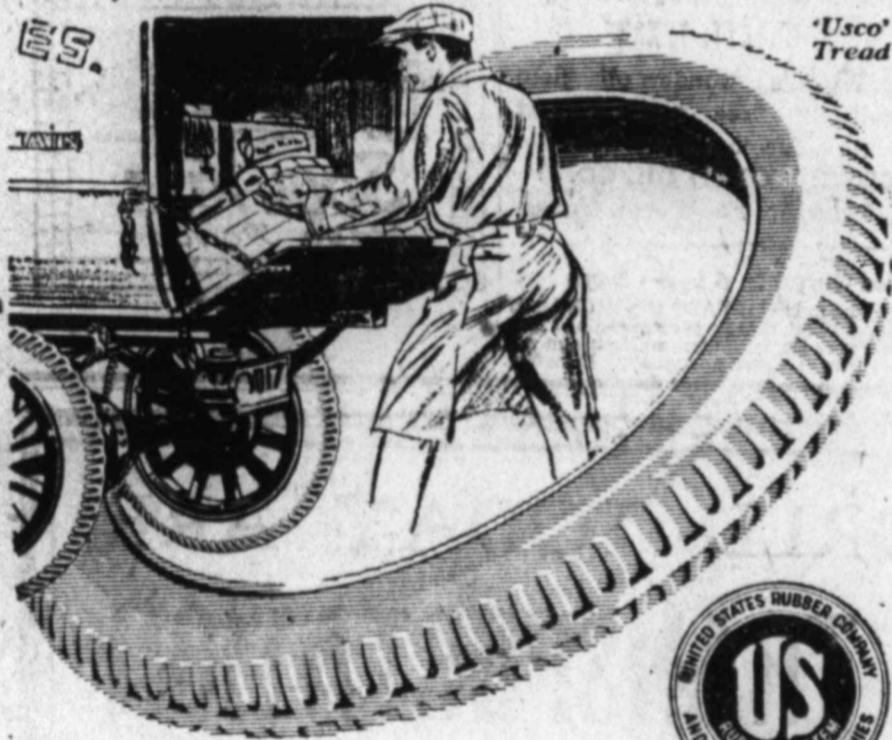

CRANFILL'S CHRONICLE.

Dr. J. B. Cranfill of Dallas Reveals Some of the Glories of the Government Ownership Heresy and Freely Speaks His Mind Concerning It.

The other day when I lifted the receiver on my Government-controlled and Postmaster-Generaled telephone, I received a prompt answer from the operator, called my number, secured an answer from the number called, and pursued a conversation from beginning to end without being cut off!

Mind you, I mean no reflection whatsoever upon my excellent friends who are in charge of our telephone system here in Dallas. Under the circumstances they are doubtless like the organist in Arizona, "doing the best they can," but in view of our telephone experience here in Dallas I do not hesitate to declare that I am thoroughly caught up on Government controlled public utilities, beginning at the telephone service, clear on through to the railway lines, and comprising every utility and industry that we have.

Really, while until recently I was resigned to the postoffice because my excellent friend, B. M. Bugerr, is postmaster, and because we had a Texas man as Postmaster General, yet since the advent of Government owned telephones, and the suggestion of Mr. McAdoo that we are to have five years more of misdirected Government control of railway lines, I am now in favor of buying the postoffice from the Government and running it by private enterprise.

Permit me, as a quiet, humble and I hope, intelligent, citizen of the United States to say that this heresy of Government ownership of public utilities is the baby of which Bolshevism is the grown-up man. An Associated Press report gave the other day the net losses on the operation of railways during the last year by the mis-Director General of \$150,000,000. While I do not wish to adversely criticize Mr. McAdoo, whom I esteem most highly and whom I sincerely honor, yet at the same time if there is any possible inconvenience that the traveling public and the shippers have not suffered under the Government controlled railway administration I cannot now think of the item.

So long as we were in a tragedy of war and carnage I, for one, was willing to bear anything. All American patriots were willing to go to the extreme limit, even to the sacrifice of their lives, for the preservation of liberty and freedom on the earth, and along with the millions of our fellow-citizens I bore the disappointments and inconveniences of war conditions without a murmur. However, all of that is over now, and speaking again as a quiet citizen, I feel that the Administration at Washington has made a colossal and an inexcusable blunder in the attempt to prolong the commandeering of the railway lines, and other control of utilities beyond the period (I mean the actual period) of the war. There has never been a more high-handed procedure in the history of our country than the taking over after the armistice was signed of the telegraph and wireless lines by Postmaster General Burleson. Of course, it may be that he knows something we do not know. I am simply speaking from the point of view of the men down in the ranks of common men, uninitiated into the intricacies of federalization, but looked at from my standpoint there has never been any step taken since I have been old enough to know that was so unwise and, as I believe, so unpopular as this one.

The people of the United States are not ready for Socialism, and, please God, they never will be. If there ever was a time when we should turn our faces like flint against the growing tide of I. W. W. treachery and Bolshevistic riot, plunder and murder it is now. We have dethroned the German Kaiser, but we are not ready to enthrone an American Kaiser, no matter in what garb or under what flag he comes. We have had nothing quite like the suggestion that reached to our sister city of Houston the other day, that Mr. Burleson was going to advance their telephone rates. The first thing the Postmaster General handed to Dallas was the increase in the cost of moving telephones in Dallas from \$1 to \$15. This, of course, is not much, being an increase of only 1,500 per cent.

Coming back to the big issue, which is the question of Government control of our railway lines, I am bold to add that if the national Democracy takes up this heresy as its slogan, it had as well fold its tent and silently steal away into private life now. The latest report is that there is no

possible chance for Mr. McAdoo's suggestion to get by even the present session of Congress, and I hope the Democratic majority we now have in both the Senate and House of Representatives will put a crimp in the McAdoo suggestion immediately, so that railroad Government ownership will die in embryo.

Mr. Burleson has made a mistake. It is not a fatal mistake. It is one that he can easily revise and permanently correct. He has mistaken the temper of the American public, as well as the temper of his own Texas public. I am not going to ask Albert when I shall kiss my wife or use my telephone. Moreover, I do not want to have to go to Mr. McAdoo, or his successor, to ask permission of the Government every time I want to hop a train and take a railroad ride. Neither do I desire to have my telegraph blanks counted out to me by some little saphead of a Government lackey when I want to send a telegram.

From the inception of the American Republic this Government has been conducted upon immutable and imperishable doctrine of individual progress and achievement. It is what we call in commercial life "initiative." In politics and war it bears the badge of "Dash" and "Courage." While the interests of the great public should be safeguarded against the encroachment of merciless trusts and soulless corporations, yet at the same time our progress and development as a nation will be gauged wholly by the strength and prowess of the individual man. Government ownership of public utilities, Socialism, I. W. Wism, Bolshevism and Devilish all contravene the very thought and conception of republican institutions. Happily for us, but tragically for them, Russia has furnished an illustration of what devilish tragedy may spring from the doctrines promulgated by the Socialists and kindred traitors to free government, and of which the public ownership of railroads, telegraph lines, telephone systems and the like is the first step. So my word to Mr. McAdoo is that it will not do, and my exhortation to our own Albert Burleson is that the sooner he restores the utilities he has commandeered to their rightful owners, and rereads and begins to practice some of his personal-liberty doctrines he used to proclaim down in his own Congressional district, the happier he will be, and the more likely he will be to remain an honored Cabinet officer under a future Democratic administration, because if his ideas become the fixed doctrine of the Democratic party "there won't be no such animal." Unless there is a change in the national Democratic program the time is hastening on when there will be just two parties in America, one for orderly, conservative, constructive, patriotic government that believes in respecting the rights of property, and the other party made up of all the odds and ends of political heresy and Bolshevistic devilry that can be compounded together.

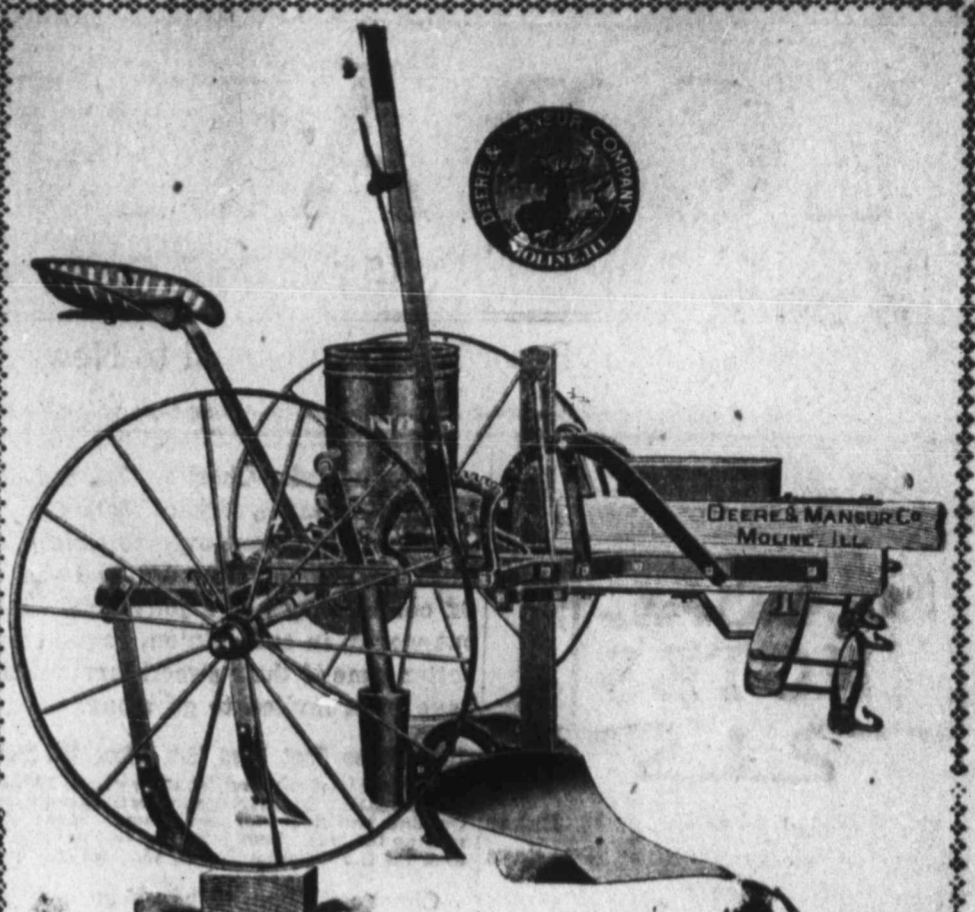
