EVERYBODY IS NOW FIGURING INCOME TAX

In Order to Be Helpful to Public,
Internal Revenue Bureau
Has Every Available
Officer in Field.

SEVERE PENALTIES IF YOU
DELAY BEYOND MARCH 15

With the due date for Income Taxes only a few weeks away, the collection of this far-reaching tax on 1918 incomes has started off with a bang. Everybody is figuring income tax.

Payments and sworn statements of income must reach Internal Revenue offices on or before March 15, and there are severe penalties for delinquency.

Residents of Texas are required to make their returns and pay their taxes to Alexander S. Walker, Collector of Internal Revenue, Austin, Tex., or to deputy collectors who are now doing free advisory work on Income Tax.

"Pay your Income Tax by March 15," is the slogan of the Internal Revenue Bureau, which has sent every available officer into the field to help the public to understand the requirements and to prepare the returns.

Who Must Make Return.
It is estimated that many thousands of single and married persons in this section of the United States who have never before made annual returns are required to do so this year.

Income tax returns must be made between now and March 15 by persons who come under the following classifications:

Any unmarried person whose 1918 net income was \$1,000 or over. Widows and widowers, divorcees and married persons who are living apart from their husbands or wives, are for the purposes of the Income Tax classed as unmarried.

Any married person living with wife or husband whose 1918 net income was \$2,000 or over. The income of both husband and wife must be considered, together with the earnings of minor children, if any.

Revenue Bureau Offers Aid.
Each person in the United States who is in either of these classifications must get busy at once if penalties are to be avoided. He should secure a blank Form 1040 A for reporting net income up to \$5,000, or Form 1040 if his net income exceeded that amount. Forms are being distributed by Collec-

tors and their Deputies, also by banks. By following the instructions on the forms a correct return can be prepared at home. If a person needs advice or aid, the Deputy Collectors in the field will furnish this without charge.

The new Revenue law places the Income Tax duty on citizens and residents. The Internal Revenue Bureau is sending its men to work right with the public to get the tax and the returns in. With active co-operation every tax due March 15 will be paid and every return required by law will be in the Revenue office on time.

Exemptions Allowed.
A single person is allowed a personal exemption of \$1,000. If he is supporting in his household relatives who are dependent upon him he may claim the status of the head of a family who has the same exemption as if married.
A married person who lives with wife or husband is allowed a personal exemption of \$2,000. The head of a family is entitled to claim a similar personal exemption.

An additional exemption of \$200 is allowed for each person under eighteen or incapable of self support who was dependent upon and received his chief support from the taxpayer.

A husband and wife living together are entitled to but one personal exemption of \$2,000. If they make separate returns the exemption may be claimed by either or divided.

Accuracy Required.
Absolute accuracy is necessary in making up income figures. Any person who is working for wages should find out exactly how much he received during the whole year 1918. Fees, bank interest, bond interest, dividends, rents received and all other items must be reported correctly. Mere guesses are not accepted, for they are unjust alike to the taxpayer and the Government and defeat the proper administration of the law.

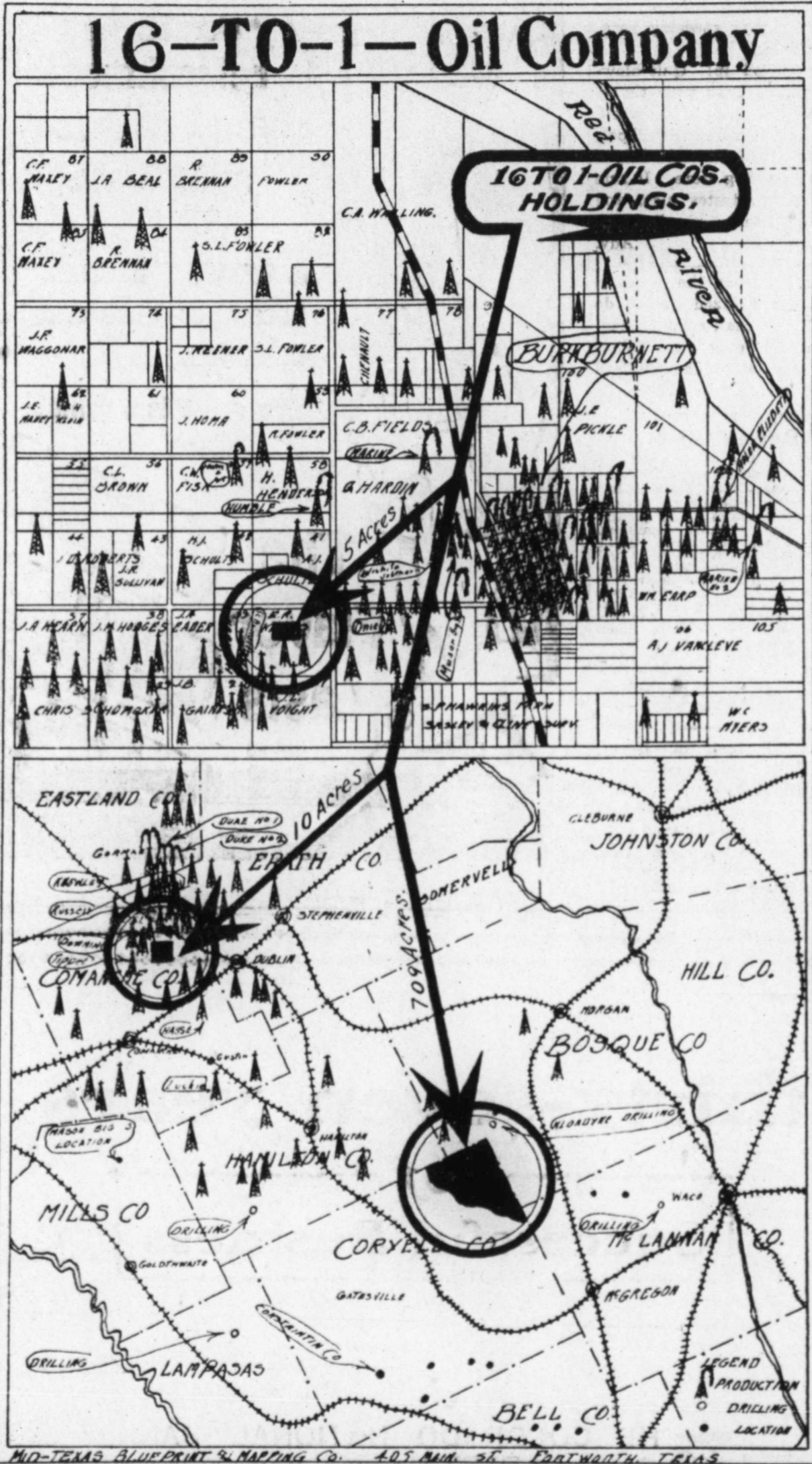

Colorado High School, Supt. E. F. King. Visited by L. E. Dudley, February 12, 1919.

Approximately \$150 worth of books have been added to the library of the Colorado High School, and a like sum has been spent for additional laboratory equipment since it was last visited by a representative of the Department of Education. In view of the straightened circumstances financially under which this school, in common with the other schools of West Texas, has labored during the continued drouth, this improvement is commendable. The library for the elementary school, however, is not yet up to the standard prescribed for affiliated schools. The high school library, too, needs to be further strengthened especially in the history and English departments.

An excellent spirit of order and industry was observed throughout the school. The teachers without exception are competent; the students interested in their work.

While domestic economy has not been provided for, a slight beginning has been made. Three sewing machines have been purchased and are being used to advantage by the girls of both the grades and the high school under the supervision of the respective teachers.

The third and fourth year English classes made a very satisfactory showing. The instruction gave evidence of careful planning and drove toward a definite goal. The students were led to an appreciation of the finer points of the classics by means of suggestive questions.

The fourth unit is requested in Latin. This subject is required of all first year students. The large class displayed unusual enthusiasm, and a fair knowledge of elementary Latin grammar. The second and fourth year classes presented well prepared lessons. The class in Vergil is not proficient in scansion, but in translation and constructions the work is creditable. The natural method is employed to add interest.

The first year Spanish class was not ready with a well-prepared lesson. The instruction, however, is strong; and there was evidence for concluding that the lack of preparation was exceptional. The direct method is employed. Only two students are taking the second year work. They were able to give a good account of themselves.

About five weeks were lost on account of influenza. The time is being made up by teaching on Saturdays. This should ordinarily be avoided, as the strain of six days school work in succession is hard on both teacher and pupil; but it seems the only thing to do here, inasmuch as it is impracticable to continue the school into June for the reason that the boys are needed on the farms and ranches.

Recommendations: 1. That each grade of the elementary school be equipped with a book case and at least \$25 worth of suitable books.

2. That the high school library be placed under the supervision of the English teacher, catalogued, classified, and made as attractive as possible.

3. That conditioned upon the approval by the examiners of specimens of written work to be submitted from the four year set Latin, the two years of Spanish, and the class in solid geometry, the following units be allowed: Latin, 1 additional; Spanish, 2 original; Solid Geometry 1/2 original.

SOLDIERS LETTER.

Caubrets, France, Jan 23, '19
Dear Parents:—I will write you again to night. I am just fine and dandy. Am having a grand old time up in the Pyrenees mountains. I am now about eight miles from Spain at Caunterets, France. This place is a summer resort for tourists from all over the world. I like here just fine. I am now doing M. P. work. My company is scattered from Bordeaux down this far. There are only six of us here doing M. P. duty from my company, but there are about a thousand soldiers here every day. They get a seven day furlough and come down here for their trip.

It sure does snow up here. I have seen more snow since I came here, than I had ever seen before; but it is not very cold. The wind never blows at all, and the snow stays on the high peaks all the year. I tell you it is a beautiful scenery here. I can see clouds down below me in the valley from the top of the peaks.

COLORADO PUBLIC SCHOOL.

Colorado High School Visited by Inspector from Department of Education.

One day last week Prof. L. E. Dudley, visitor of schools for the State Department of Education, visited our school, and we are handing you herewith for publication, his report to the Department as to conditions he found here, a copy of which was mailed to the superintendent and one to the school board. We believe this report will be of interest to every patron of the school. We ask that it be read carefully that each may get the correct opinion of this man whose business it is to visit the schools, observe the work being done, to find out the needs of the school and to make recommendations looking to the betterment of the same.

The improvements he suggests are recognized as needed, and the faculty and Board have realized these needs before they were suggested by any one, but financial conditions have not permitted their adjustment up to the present.

Notice especially the recommendations he makes that the school be granted additional credits of affiliation; one additional credit in Latin, two in Spanish, and one half in solid geometry. One more credit in Latin will give us four in that subject, and that is the highest granted to any school. We only offer two years in Spanish and therefore could ask for only two credits in that subject. No school gives more than half a year to solid geometry and the Department allows only a half credit to any school in that. When these credits are secured, the school will have eighteen credits in all. That is several credits more than the school has ever been granted before, and the records prepared by the State Department show no school of our size to have as many.

The faculty and the board are, and we feel sure the patrons will be gratified to read the Visitor's estimate of our school and the work being done. The credit for the present high standing of the school belongs to the competent and faithful teachers who constitute the faculty, the diligent boys and girls of the student body, and the men of splendid business sagacity who constitute the school board.

We earnestly request the cooperation of every patron in everything pertaining to the best interest of the school to the end that such improvements as are herein suggested may be

made, and that still others may be added.

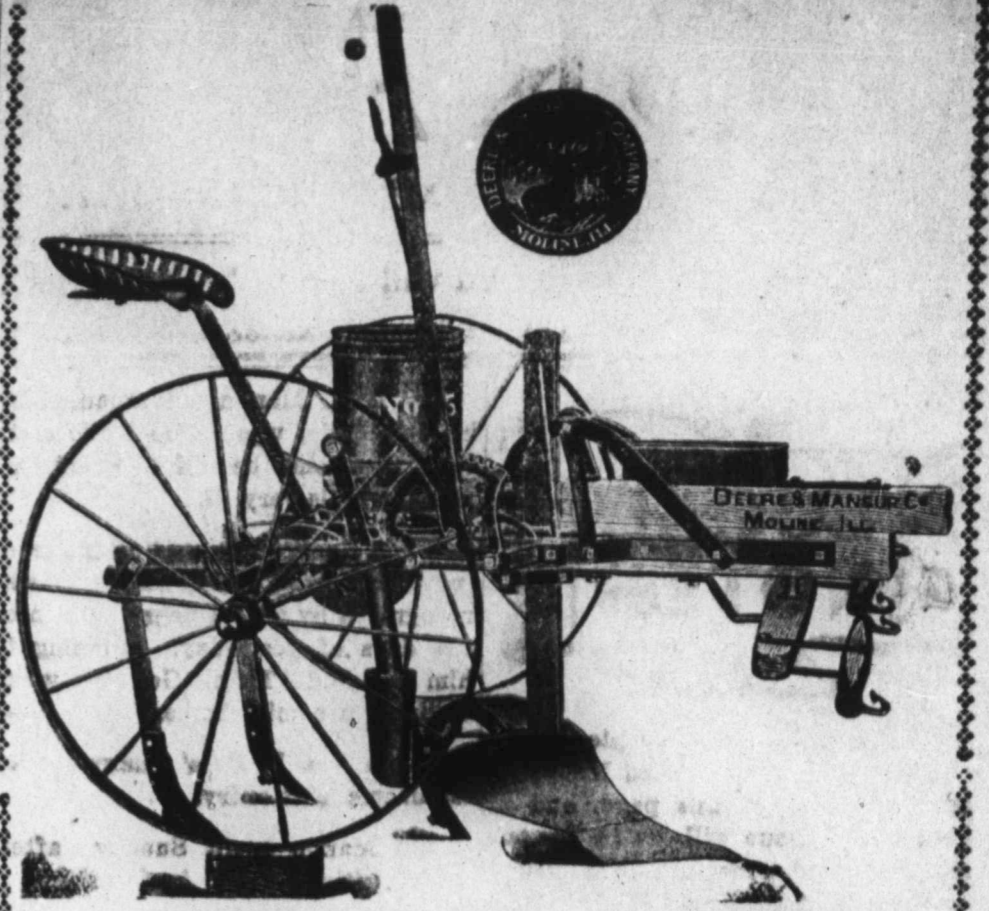
