Oversubscriptions to Be Rejected and Privilege of Redeeming in Three Years Reserved.

Washington, April 13 .- Terms of the Victory Liberty Loan were announced today by Secretary Glass. They are:

Amount \$4,500,000,000, oversubscriptions to be rejected. Interest 4 3-4 per cent for partially tax exempt notes, convertable into 3 3-4

per cent notes wholly tax exempt. Maturity four years with the Treasury reserving the privilege of redeemin the notes in three years.

The 3 3-4 per cent notes to be issued later also may be converted subsequently back into 4 3-4 per cent

The 4 3-4 per cent securities are to be exempt from State and local taxation excepting estate and inheritance taxes and from normal rates of Federal income taxes. The 3 3-4 per cent securities are exempt from all Federal, State and local taxes ex-

The terms of the loan are as fol-

The Victory Liberty Loan, which will be offered for popular subscription on April 21, will take the form of 4 3-4 per cent three-four year convertable gold notes of the United States, exempt from State and local taxes, except estate and inheritance taxes, and from normal Federal income taxes. The notes will be convertable at the option of the holder, throughout their life, into 3 3-4 per cent three-four year convertable gold notes of the United States exempt from all Federal, State and local taxes, except estate and inheritance taxes. In like manner the 3 3-4 Adults 22c, War Tax 3c ...... 25Cts per cent notes will be convertable in-

to the 4 3-4 per cent notes.

Children, 9c, War Tax 1c .....10Cts The amount of the issue will \$4,500,000,000, which with the deferred installment of income and profits taxes payable, in respect to last period covered by the maturity dates of Treasury certificates of indebted. ness now outstanding, will fully provide for the retirement of such certificaes. The issue will be limited to \$4,500,000,000 except as it may be necessary to increase or decrease the amount to facilitate allotment. Oversubscriptions will be rejected and allotments made on a graduated scale similar in its general plans to that adopted in connection with the first Liberty loan. Allotments will be made in full on subscriptions up to and including \$10,000.

The notes of both series will be dated and bear interest from May 20, 1919 and will mature on May 20, 1923. Interest will be payable on Dec. 15, 1919, and thereafter semiannually on June 15 and Dec. 15, and at maturity. All or any of the notes may be redeemed before maturity at the option of the United States on June 15 or Dec. 15, 1922, at par and accrued interest.

The interest rate of 4 3-4 per cent is the highest borne by any of the war issues. Financial interests have urged a 5 per cent rate, but Secretary Glass indicated recently that he regarded such a rate as excessive, and speculation as to the rate recently has revolved about 4 1-2 per cent. The 3 3-4 per cent rate of the tax exempt notes, into which the 4 3-4s are convertable is 1-4 per cent higher than the tax exempt first Liberty bonds, which mature in thirty years.

The Houston Post has the following to say editorially about the outlook in West Texas:

Thanks to the visits of the rain clouds during the winter and spring months. West Texas is transformed. People and prosperity are returning and the plains are coming into their own. The history of that section during the last three years is dra-

When the long drouth had become unendurable for a large part of the population, last year there was a hegira from the West into the rain belt, thousands of thrifty farmers and business people abandoning their homes and business enterprises. Crops having failed and the grass burned up in the relentless heat of the sun, the country became incapable of sustaining the population, and only those who were financially able to take another chance with the West remained. Many little towns, according to news reports, lost 50 to 75 per cent of their inhabitants, homes became vacant and stores closed. The plains were dotted with "deserted villages."

But all that is in the past and the West today presents a wonderful new scene. Thousands of people are now coming into West Texas, mostly by train. They seem to have their pockets lined with the "long green," and they are starting out to farm, ranch or merchandise without thought of the past and the great scary tales which described conditions here eight months ago. And among this large number of home-seekers are people who went out in prairie schooners with the avowed purpose "never to return." They did not keep their

So rapidly are the settlers returning and bringing others with them that there is a great scarcity of houses for homes and business purposes and there is such a condition as has not been witnessed since the palmiest days of the Oklahoma land lotteries.

This wonderful transformation of a deserted country into a commonwealth of constantly increasing population is the result not so much of the discovery of oil as of splendid rains which have fallen throughout the winter and spring assuring bountiful crops this summer and fall.

The restoration of prosperity in West Texas is greeted with deep satisfaction throughout the remainder of the State. The country needs the products of West Texas; needs the live stock, the grain, the alfalfa, the poultry and eggs and milk, and the many other agricultural products which come in such abundance in favorable years . The outlook of the whole state is brightened when rains


