Jaycee Shirley Frazier had a crew at the stadium laying down lime to make the yardlines stand out for the classic. Up in the bleachers, Jaycees Grover Hallmark, Ben McKinnis, Tommy Magness, Kelly Coats, Francis Bond and President Ben Lancaster were busy numbering seats.

Eastland County was the recipient of a special award at the recent American Cancer Society District Annual Meeting in Fort Worth.

The award was for "Bettering Their Best" in the 1965 Crusade. Delegates from the Eastland County Unit at the meeting were Mrs. Juanita Warden, Miss Margie Maddox, and Mrs. Roscoe Hopper, all of Ranger, and Dr. J.H. Caton of Eastland.

Delegates from the 21 counties comprising District 13 of the ACS Texas Division reviewed the progress being made in the three-fold cancer control program of the American Cancer Society.

"We could be saving 41,000

women a year with full utilization of all techniques to fight uterine cancer." Dr. Morphis of Fort Worth told delegates. "As it is, this form of cancer, in all its stages, result in only 56 percent survival of the 44,000 women who will develop it this year."

Dr. Morphis was the Key speaker at the luncheon meeting, which was also addressed by Clifton Read vice president of Education and Information of the ASC in New York. Mr. Read also reiterated the desperate need for early diagnosis to effect cures, but he emphasized that the enormous amount of research being done in the country today is the one and only hope of conquering cancer.

MAYBE FROG LEGS COULD BE IRRIGATION BY - PRODUCT

"Every night the bobcats, coons and fox eat all they want of them."

Oscar Schaefer, Cook Community farmer and rancher, was telling Eastland County Farm Agent J. M. Cooper about the tremendously large number of toad frogs that collect in his peanut field at every joint of the aluminum irrigation pipes where a mite of water seeps out to make a nice, moist, cool spot for them in the deep sandy soil.

"My son and I move the pipe to a new location most every morning. I see the tracks of the animals where they have come in from the pastures to feast on the toads" he continued.

There are presently some 25 peanut farms in the county being irrigated.

Agent Cooper, starting to tap over the pipe on a recent visit to see the irrigated peanuts, was startled to see

so many of the frogs hop out from under it.

"Yeah, there's a hat full at every joint. I didn't know we had so many of them until we started to irrigate. Down in the field across the road before we turned the hogs in and where we have the well, I'll bet there was a pick-up load".

Both Cooper and Schaefer think maybe the pigs ate their share of them also.

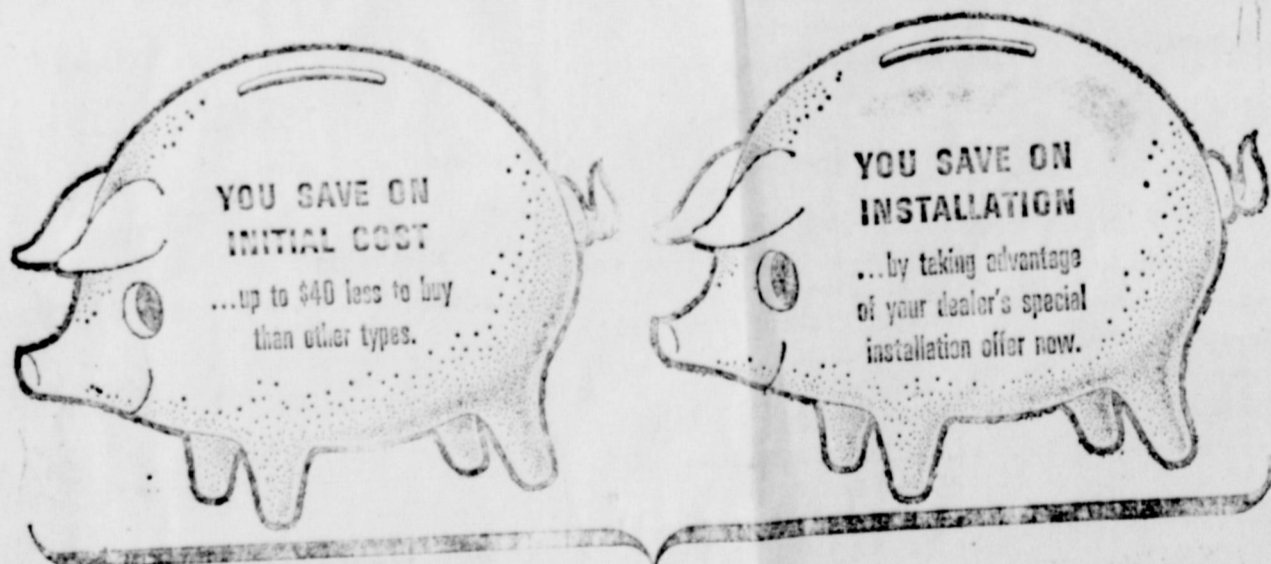
