WILL CLAYTON WRITES.

Here is part of a letter written by Will Clayton to his father, J. F. Clayton:

Camp Mills, L. I., N. Y.

Many changes have taken place since I wired you the other day. We have been delayed on account of quarantine and will be mustered out in San Antonio.

We had orders to clear this camp by 9 a. m. June 4. We could not get our paper work in shape by that time, but was ready to leave by 4 p. m. Then the order was changed. We would not go by train to Texas, but would go by water to Galveston. This did not meet with the approval of the men and it was about all the officers could do to keep down a revolt. We loaded on this boat on the morning of June 10, and unloaded about an hour later. Was brought back to Camp Mills and quarantined for seventeen days.

When I do get discharged, if ever, I will go to Del Rio and if I can rake up enough money I will come up and see you. I will go to Old Mexico to live the rest of my life. I have a job promised me in Del Rio. I may take it and I may not. I have no intention of living in the United States over two years at the outside.—Bill.

ORDER FOR BOND ELECTION.

State of Texas, County of Mitchell: Whereas, on the 11th day of June 1919, a petition was presented to me for an election in Common School District No. 12 of this county on the question of issuing bonds to provide funds to be expended in payment of accounts legally contracted in constructing and equipping a public free school building of wooden material, and authorizing a tax upon all taxable property within said district sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal at maturity said petition bearing the requisite number of signatures of property tax-paying voters of said district and being in every respect in conformity with law; and, it appearing that Mitchell County contains a population of more than 8000, according to the last United States Census; and it further appearing that said common school district No. 12, has been heretofore on to-wit, the 9th day of April 1917, properly established in accordance with Article 2817, Revised Statutes of Texas, 1911; and it further appearing that said district as so established contains an area of more than nine square miles, and that no other district has been reduced in area below nine square miles by reason of the creation of this district; and it further appearing that said district No. 12 does not embrace any territory that was taken from any other school district (either common or independent) that had an outstanding issue of bonds at the date of such inclusion in this district.

Now, therefore, I, J. C. Hall, in my capacity as county judge of Mitchell County, Texas, do hereby order that an election be held on the 19th day of July, 1919, at the school house in said Common School District No. 12, of this county as established by order of the Commissioners' Court of date the 9th day of April, 1919, which is recorded in Book 1, page 15, Record of School Districts, to determine whether a majority of the legally qualified property taxpaying voters of that district desire the issuance of bonds on the faith and credit of said common school district in the amount of \$2000.00 the bonds to be of the denomination of \$100.00 each, numbered consecutively from one to twenty, both inclusive, payable twenty years from their date, with option of

redemption after ten years from their date, and bearing 5 per cent interest per annum, payable annually, April 10th of each year, to provide funds to be expended in payment of accounts legally contracted in constructing and equipping a public free school building of wooden material, and to determine whether the Commissioners' Court of this county shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually while said bonds or any of them are outstanding, a tax upon all taxable property within said district sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal at maturity.

J. M. Thompson is hereby appointed presiding officer for said election, and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding same, and he shall, within five days after said election has been held, make due return thereof to the commissioners' court of this county, as required by law for holding a general election. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following: "For the Bonds." "Against the Bonds." All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and of this county and who are resident property taxpayers in said district shall be entitled to vote at said election. The sheriff of this county shall give notice of said election by publication as required by law.

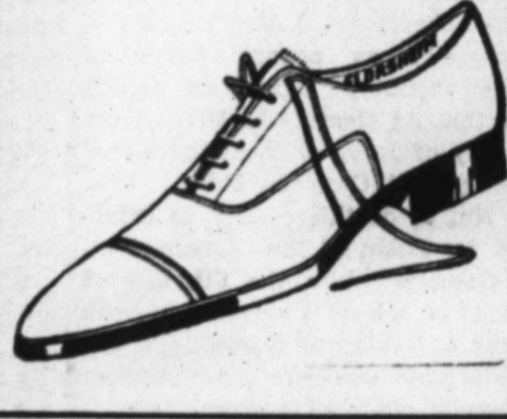

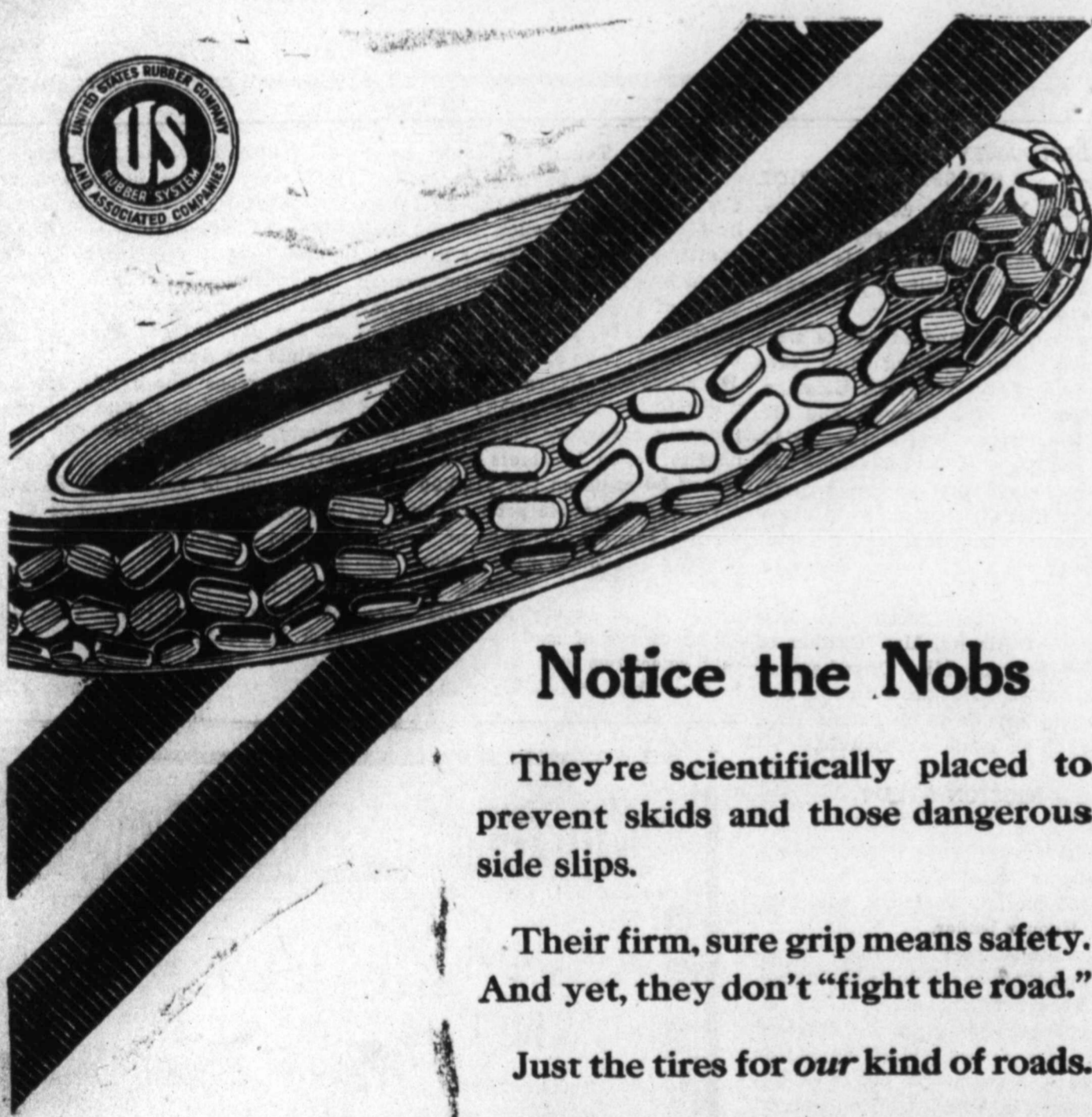

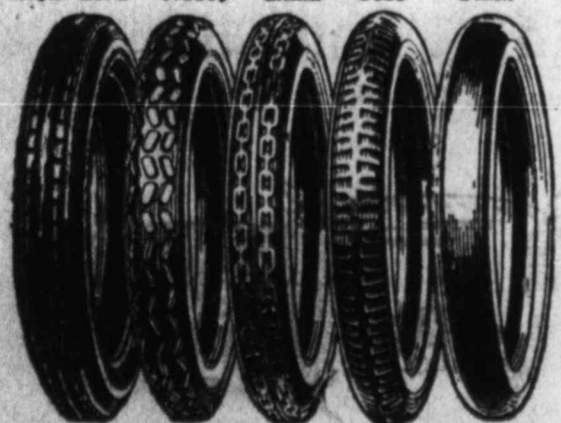

Give the toppers something that tastes better and makes the drinker feel better, and they will turn from intoxicants even as an Ar-

kansas boy with a chill on him turns from the sunny side of a fence to a furnace.

The discovery, like most great discoveries, was made accidentally. I saw a boy trying to take a bone from a dog, but the canine resisted and showed its teeth fiercely; finally the boy tossed a chunk of meat to the dog, and then, with a wag of its tail, the cur surrendered the bone without a sign of protest and gave attention to the meat. With this great idea burning in my brain, I set about to find a beverage that tastes so much better, and makes the drinker feel so much better than rum, that the person who once tries it will never again seek exhilaration at the flowing bowl; and my labors were gloriously rewarded, for verily I found the restorer of nerves and bodies in the delightful acidulated lactal fluid, the wonderful product of the churn, the snow-white beverage known from sea to sea as BUTTERMILK. MARKETING COTTON.

The time for harvesting and selling another crop is fast approaching. There have been some radical changes in world conditions during the past year, and Texas has placed upon her statutes during this time some laws which materially and beneficially affect the handling of cotton.

Before the war, we were selling cotton on an average for about 12 cents and sold it as fast as gathered. It taxed the financial ability of the spinners and buyers of foreign countries to buy a year's supply while we gathered the crop. It taxed the ships of the world to haul it as fast as we gathered it. The war has greatly lessened the ability of the spinners and buyers in foreign countries to buy and pay cash. They could not buy a year's supply while we are gathering the crop as in the past, even at 12 cents. Then, how can we expect them to do so under present conditions at 35 or 40 cents? There are not as many ships in the world for hauling freight now as there was before the war by millions of tons. We can clearly see that it is a physical impossibility to sell and ship the coming crop as fast as gathered. We must remember cotton exporters buy very little cotton unless they can sell it, and they cannot sell unless they can ship. If they do buy and hold a small amount they cannot pay as much for it as they would if they could ship readily. It does not require a cotton expert, banker, or politician to see that the South can not follow the practice of selling her cotton as fast as gathered, unless she does so to speculate at pre-war prices of about 10 or 12 cents. The most illiterate can see that it is an impossibility to maintain prices near the cost of production and attempt to sell the next several crops as fast as gathered. All agree prices must be maintained to prevent bankruptcy as the crop has been very expensive to make.

Many farmers are in debt to banks and merchants who need their money. They would like to collect their debts as fast as cotton is gathered and the farmers would like to pay. But we have a condition confronting us which is no theory or dream. It is the result of a world war, and we must not feel that because hostilities have ceased normal conditions have returned. They have not and will not for several years, and we all hope that so far as prices of cotton are concerned they never will.

The last Legislature of Texas enacted some wise laws which will enable those in debt to meet their obligations without selling their cotton and without throwing the banks in a strain of danger. In the past there was no law in Texas whereby warehouses and cotton yards must issue negotiable warehouse receipts, or receipts which would pass from one person to another, because of the guarantee of the State behind it.

The weights and Measures law provides that every person weighing for the public must give bond to the State for correct weighing. The Uniform Warehouse receipt act provides that if a farmer takes his cotton to a cotton yard or warehouse and calls for a negotiable receipt, the manager of such yard or house must him such receipt which must state the weight and grade of the bale of cotton. Bond is also required to be given the State that the bale has been correctly graded and will be protected from damage or loss. This law places a bonded weigher and grader in every market place in the state.

Thus a small bank can make loans to farmers on cotton and if it gets overloaded, the receipts can be passed on to the Reserve Bank or other large banks, trust companies, or individuals who have money to loan on the safest of collateral. This should be of special advantage to the country banks, since the Comptroller has ruled that Section 5200 of the National Banking Laws will be strictly enforced, which prohibits a bank from loaning more than 10 per cent of its capital and surplus to one person or firm. The bank's deposits can be loaned to the farmer in place of the speculator, which is much safer to the banks. It will aid materially in preventing more cotton from going on the market than can be shipped, and thus maintain prices and prevent slumps.

With the above conditions and changes confronting us, our banks, merchants, and farmers should lose no time in getting ready for fall conditions and prevent inconvenience to their business. The \$100,000,000 Export Finance Corporation which is being organized is no doubt one of the things we need, and I hope it will be organized, but it may not get into operation before the latter part of the season. We should prepare to take care of the situation until it is ready to do its function.

Cotton is the property of the farm-

er. It is his duty to finance and protect it, and maintain a profitable price. Since the merchant and bankers are partners of the farmer, and benefited by profitable prices, it is their duty to aid him as far as they can to maintain such prices, which will require cooperative effort. Let us strip this cooperation of all of the unnecessary burden to any one so far as we can to accomplish the desired results.

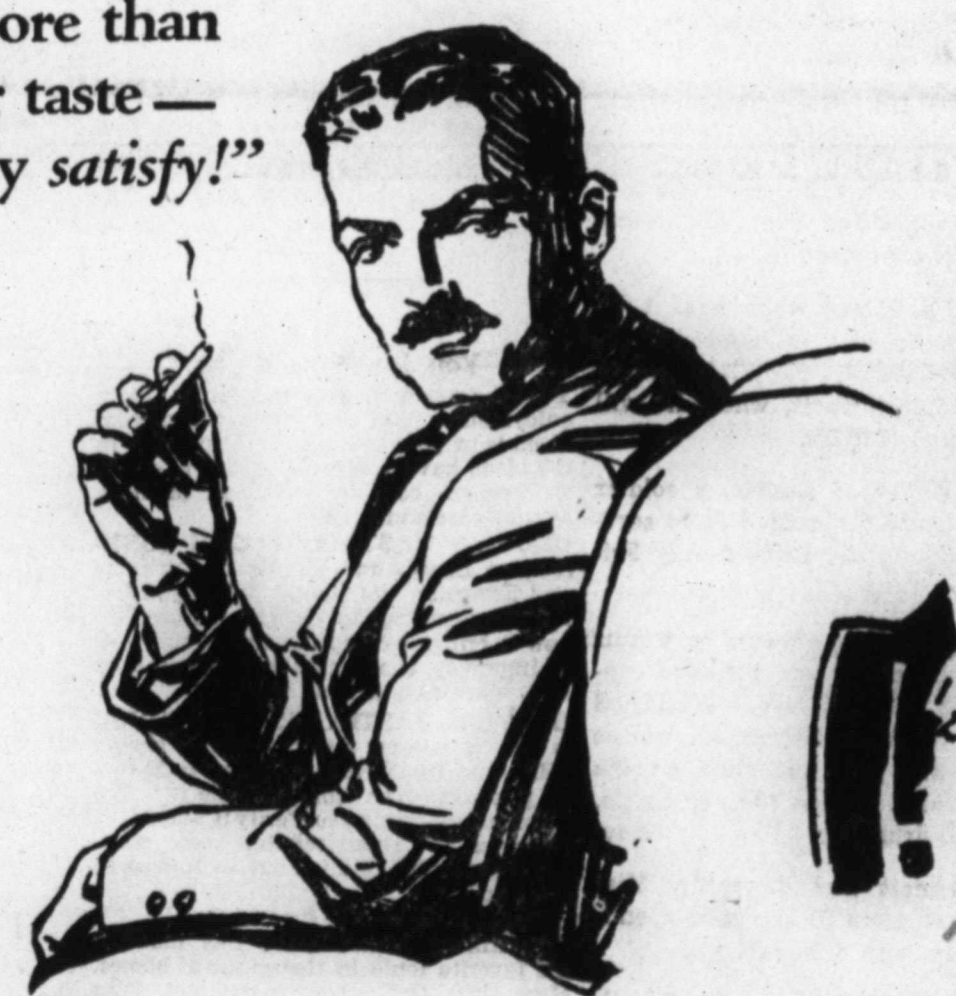
