

Majority Feel That President's Guldance Should Be Held-He Regards Pact As Sure to Come Soon.

"Woodrow Wilson guided us rightly before and during the war with Germany. We entered that war, everyone agrees, to end all wars. He says the league can do that. We want and get the league into operation as soon as possible. Forget politics."

Most Americans encountered on the tour have forgotten politics. Republican Governors and Mayors have introduced the President to his audience; the Major part of the local commfttees which have met him have been Republicans. They have all said: "We are nothing but Americans, Mr. President."

Mr. Wilson's arguments for the league, briefly summarized, are those: There can be no peace, either now or in the future, without it. There can only be a regrouping of nations and a new "Balance of Power," which is certain to lead to war. There can be no war in the future, with the league in existence, because no single nation would defy the united rest of mankind, and if it did, it could be brought to terms by an economic boycott, and without the use of arms.

There can be no reduction in the cost of living until the league is established, for nations will not go ahead with peace time production until they know that peace is definitely assured and that production of war

material is no longer necessary. There can be wonderful prosperity. with the league in existence, for relations of labor and capital all over the world will be made closer and more friendly, and the worker will receive a fairer share of what he pro-

These declaration of the president, logically and eloquently put, have left his hearers thinking and thinking deeply. And then Mr. Wilson has pointed out, the people themselves, as differentiated from senators and politicians, seem to want just what the president wants, which is America for

GREAT STORM DAMAGE ON GULF COAST.

(Tuesday's Dispatches) A dispatch from San Antonio says, telephone communication was momentarily restored with Corpus Christi Monday afternoon, and it was learned several deaths by drowning are believed to have occurred there.

It is reported water reached sec ond stories of some business buildings. It is reported that the downtown section is undermartiallaw.

Brownsville suffered no material damage from high winds accompan ied by the tropical hurricane which touched the Texas coast early Sunday The hurricane itself apparently did not hit the lower coast country. Point Isabel escaped without serious dam age. Many frame buildings in the lower Rio Grande Valley were raized by the wind. Weather men believe the hurricane curved out into the Gulf again.

Port Aransas, 25 miles from Cor pus Christi on the upper end of Mus tang Island was completely demolished by the hurricane, according to a wireless dispatch, which said "Port Aransas was completely demolished. Custom office an d all records lost.' There have been no positive reports of loss of life so far. Port Aransas had a population of 400.

The telegraph and telephone companies have taken up the task of untangling the wire system on the Tex as Gulf coast section from Corpus Christi to Brownsville. Meagre reperts do not mention any fatalities. The last word from Brownsville was

that it was still raining. Galveston has apparently recover ed from the effects of the storm which caused three feet of water in the busi ness district from tidewater. The seawall saved th e city from great

Street car service, the only Galveston public utility affected by the edge of the storm has been resumed. The water is entirely drained from the streets. Business is returning to normal and merchants are replacing stocks of goods.

Military relief trains from Browns ville with five thousand rations and one thousand beds arrived. Another relief train is now at Kingsville.


With troops patrolling the main streets and relief trains headed that way, Corpus Christi began slowly emerging form the wreckage caused by the hurricane, bringing death to an unknonwn number of persons and doing property damage running into the millions.

Over 3000 are homeless by the storm, but the oming of the relief trains, it is expected the homeless will be taken care of.

Volunteers began the work clearing the streets of wreckage. Re moval of the debris will take some time, as houseboats, fishing craft and flotsam of every description are piled high in al lthe main thoroughfares.

A Galveston man was arrested Monday by Federal agents when he called at the H. & T. C. freight depot to claim a car billed as sweetpotatoes and consigned to him. The contents of the car was found to have been mixed, containing sweetpotatoes and whiskey. Agents estimate the car centained 400 quarts of whisky, deposited in layers in the center of sweetpotatoes in sixteen barrels. HUDSPETH BILL GIVES BILLION FOR ROADS

A Federal appropriation of \$1,000, 000,000 to construct new highways in co-operation with the several states is provided in an amendment to the federal good roads law introduced by Representative Hudspeth. The measure appropriates \$250,000,000 a year for the fiscal years of 1921, 1922, 1923 and 1924. Hudspeth's measure stipulates that when bonds have been voted by counties and the Commissioners Court have designated competent engineers to superintend the good roads construction, the Secretary of Agriculture who administers the fund, chall immediately set aside from the federal fund a sum equal to that voted by the counties; also that this fund shall be immediately available. A provision that applies particularly to Texas because of the large sums recently voted in that State of the highway construction provides further that the first State voting as much as \$75,000,000 in bonds for the construction of public roads shall be first in the distribution of the Fed-

#### a Hand Grenade; Is Limit Baby Loans Rarest Souvenir of Great World War



Hammering the Hun line until it bent and broke, bearing the Kaiser and his clans down to inglorious defeat, the American soldiers used one weapon-in greater numbers than any other. It was a weapon they had never used before, one that had been obsolete for centuries-the hand-grenade-but when the brawny lads from the U.S. A. sent the old "eggs," as they were called, spinning into dugout and pillbox, the only Boches remaining on the ground were those ready to be buried.

Grenades were known to have been used five centuries ago. In 1427, at the siege of the Fortress of Casmaggiore on the River Po in Italy, the defenders used a primitive grenade, made of a glass bottle filled with powder. For a time, grenades were made out of heavy paper, then out of glass and then out of metal. With the close of the eighteenth century, the grenade began to be discarded and little use had been made of it until the Russo-Japanese war in 1904.

It remained for the Great World War to see the grenade developed into its present efficiency. The grenades used by the American doughboys were as carefully manufactured as their rifles. But the end of hostilities found a limited supply on hand and these were turned over to the Savings Division of the Treasury Department, the explosives extracted and they have been made over into savings banks.

Thus a weapon of war has been transformed into a "weapon of peace."
