COLORADO AFFILIATED WITH CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Local Chamber Sends Delegates To
Bankhead Highway Meeting

A called meeting of the Directors of the Colorado Chamber of Commerce was held in the assembly room of that organization Monday afternoon. The president Dr. P. C. Coleman being called away by a professional engagement, Secretary J. H. Green presided. A quorum being present, the first matter to be before the body was a presentation of the proposition of affiliation by the business interests of Colorado with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

That organization was represented by Mr. J. E. Farrow, a member of its executive staff, who went very fully into the plans, methods purposes and scope of work of this great body of West Texas business men. The entire details of the proposition were gone into and it was the unanimous vote of those present that it was an absolutely sound investment for Colorado and Mitchell County. Every member present subscribed for a membership. A committee composed of Messrs Whipkey and Van Tuyl was appointed to call with Mr. Farrow and meet the business men not present so that the membership in Colorado would as fairly and fully as possible be representative of its business interest. As a result of this action and subsequent canvass Colorado has entered the West Texas Chamber of Commerce with a membership of twenty, which will be increased by three or four others during the week who could not be seen Tuesday.

It was decided at the meeting to send two representatives to the Bankhead Highway Association meeting at Hot Springs and Sec. J. H. Greene and Judge C. H. Earnest were chosen as representatives to this meeting.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is now the largest and most influential commercial organization in America excepting only the U. S. Chamber of Commerce. It is carrying on an extensive publicity campaign to induce immigration and investment. It is securing new enterprises for this great section of the state. It has rendered through its traffic Bureau a most remarkable service to its membership towns and their people. It is aiding the towns in the solution of their civic problems, in the furthering of good roads campaign, the organization of girls poultry clubs, the inauguration and backing of the movement for the shipment of thousands of brood hogs into West Texas.

It is sponsoring a great conservation of water movement that when consumated will result in storing the waters of West Texas and the turning of vast bodies of land into the most productive areas in the world. It has put on an aggressive campaign for the establishment of a great A. & M. College in West Texas. It has launched a campaign for redistricting the State, and does not propose that a situation shall continue as it does now, whereby the vote of a West Texas Tax payer or citizen counts for less than a third of a vote which is cast elsewhere in Texas. In brief it has come to be the voice of West Texas, controlled directly by its membership and carrying a weight not possible to a single community. Its aim is service. Its departments are arranged for service and in this sisterhood of more than a hundred and fifty towns and cities Colorado will take rank with any of them. Following is a list of members.

A SERMON ON BAPTIST DOCTRINE
Jno. W. Pearce

Baptists have not separated themselves from Christian people of other faiths so much as people of other faiths have separated themselves from Baptists. The Baptist principle is, "The New Testament, the only law of Christianity." This does not deny the inspiration of the Old Testament, but does affirm its fulfillment in Christ. When Baptists write creeds they regard them of value only as they set forth the doctrines of the New Testament. Hence we regard the New Testament as authoritative rather than the creed.

The New Hampshire Declaration of Faith was incorporated by Dr. J. M. Pendleton, 1867, in his "Church Manual"; and by Dr. E. T. Hiscox, 1890, in his "Standard Manual." Recently it has been adopted by the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary of Fort Worth. This confession of Faith has been gaining ground while other Baptist confessions have been losing ground.

The New Hampshire Declaration of Faith, Article I of the Scriptures

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error, for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried.

Let us define inspiration. It is not genius such as was exhibited by Shakespeare and other writers of beautiful literature. Genius is a natural qualification but inspiration, in the sense spoken of in regard to the scriptures, is supernatural throughout. It is not illumination. Every Christian is illuminated in that he is led by the Holy Spirit to know the truths of salvation. Spiritual illumination is subject to degrees in that some Christians possess more than others. This is not so with inspiration. Inspiration is not revelation. Revelation is the act of communicating divine knowledge to the mind. Inspiration is the act of the Holy Spirit, operating through the minds of men, giving to the world a written record. The object of this act on the part of God is the inspiration not of the men but of the record. We may not be able to say just how the Holy Spirit operated on the minds of these men to produce these books any more than we may be able to say how he operates on the human heart to produce conversion, but we accept the one as we do the other on the testimony that appeals to faith.

When we ask for philosophical proof that God is the author of the scriptures, we are brought face to face with the fact that the highest ethical standard ever given to the world is that which is contained in the scriptures. When we ask for historical proof that God is the author of the scriptures we are brought face to face with the fact that the planting of Christianity has preceded the establishment of the highest forms of civilization. When we ask for the testimony of the Old Testament we find that the phrase, "Thus saith the Lord" or its equivalent occurs two thousand times. When we turn to the New Testament we find over six hundred references

to the Old Testament. In referring to the "Holy Writings," in which Timothy had been instructed, the apostle adds "Every scripture inspired of God is also profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for instruction which is in righteousness." (2 Tim. 3:16) We are compelled here to understand the apostle's phrase "holy writings," to refer to the Old Testament. Then does it not naturally follow that the phrase "Every scripture" is a broader term and includes the New with the Old. Then should we not interpret every Scripture of the Old and New Testament because they are inspired of God are profitable?

Now then, we affirm that this inspired record is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction. Unique in its simplicity. Glorious in its aspirations. Transcending all other records of instruction. And yet from the human standpoint written by men, some of whom, were considered by their contemporaries as being unlettered. This treasure contains the sayings of God, the sayings of good men, the sayings of evil men, and the sayings of the tempter. The Bible makes no claim for the truth of the reported sayings of evil men, but rather claims to make a true report and sets about to refute the statement of error. Hence the responsibility rests upon the eraser to interpret. This treasure, that is the original writings of the authors, is perfect in the sense that it contains no mixture of error. This inspired record is perfect in the sense that it is complete and inspiration has stopped and there remains nothing that could be added that would increase its value. It is perfect in its power to transform the destinies of men and to those who accept its precepts it promises to create within them a new heart and to lead them in humility of mind before the judge of the earth as blameless in His sight.

The scriptures reveal the principles by which God will judge us. Of what value are the standards of men when compared to the standards of God? The supreme thing in the life of every individual is the recognition of the Lordship of Christ. The Baptist position makes religion supremely an individual matter. Every soul has the God given right of self determination. Having recognized the Lordship of Christ he is spiritually united to all others who have been regenerated through faith in Christ. Then following his God given right of self-determination it is his privilege to unite with the group. Having united with the group or church, his God given right of self determination demands that he have equal authority with every other member of the group and that the group have no right to bind any man's conscience. When there is no harmony of conviction among the group this same law of self-determination will lead to the division of the group into two or more groups. In the words of Dr. J. B. Gambrell: "The most significant change occurring in the modern world is the complete reversal of the main current of world thought as to religious and civic affairs. The order of the dark ages has been turned upside down. The dogma of Popes, Sultans, Kaisers, and the overlords, in both church and state, that the common people are incompetent to determine their course, has been definitely cast aside for the doctrine that what ever concerns humanity must be appealed to humanity." This is in perfect accord with the principles for which Baptists have always stood. In this new day the eyes of the world are on the Baptists as never before. The true center of Christian union is now and always shall be the New Testament. As long as other denominations continue to sprinkle infants in contravention of the principle of self-determination and contrary to the plain teaching of the New Testament and seek to justify the act, by the fact that circumcision of infants was taught in the Old Testament, there can be no organic union between such denominations and Baptists, who regard the New Testament as the only law of Christianity. As a matter of fact there is no such thing as organic union among Baptists in the sense in which most other denominations regard the term, for the court of last resort, with us is the individual local church. All co-operation on the part of any local Baptist church with other individual Baptist churches is based entirely on the voluntary principle. We believe these things because we regard them as the plain teachings of the New Testament. We regard the New Testament as the New Covenant established by Christ and we accept it as the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried. God helping us we can do no other.

W. B. Yeary, Cotton Marketing Specialist of the State Department of Agriculture has returned to Austin from an extended trip of inspection and investigation of cotton conditions over the State, and finds general dissatisfaction among the farmers and business men as to grade and price placed on the cotton by the buyers.

Because of these conditions and the further fact that it is a strain on European consumers to buy heavy stocks of cotton which is costing them from 65 to 75 cents per pound for unland, as compared to 12 to 14 cents before the war when money was easy and plentiful, and observing that spinners all over the world attempt to stay out of the market as soon as they get a few weeks supply, in an effort to lower the price, Mr. Yeary is convinced the proper thing to do is:

"The farmers to cease selling; have their cotton graded, stapled and listed and refuse any offer below the farmer's price which is 45 cents basis midling, 7-8 inch staple." The field force of the department has been hurriedly campaigning the State for three weeks, urging this action, which is being readily agreed to everywhere, as result many offerings have been withdrawn from the market.

Some one seems to have convinced Mr. Bailey that he was engaged in rather a quixotic adventure in trying to persuade the Democracy of Texas or of the Nation to repudiate the Wilson Administration by putting the brand of heresy on it. At all events, Mr. Bailey labored hard, during his speech at Dallas, to make it appear possible to gratify his ambitions without destroying or at least seriously jeopardizing the Democratic party's hope of electing the nominee of the San Francisco convention.

PECOS SECTION IS CENTER OF A RUSH

Bell Well in Reeves County Gives Transpecos Big Boost in Oil.

Pecos, Texas, March 13.—The double tracking of the Santa Fe railroad from Carlsbad to Pecos to tap the rich Reeves County territory opened by the oil strike of the Bell well at Dixieland and the extension of the line to the south to connect with the Southern Pacific, thus providing a direct line from San Antonio and the southern Texas cities to the new oil wonderland was proposed by General Manager Ware of the railroad at a conference with oilmen here today.

Representative of the Texas and Pacific railroad were also here getting data on additional service needed by Pecos as a result of the jump of this city to the oil map as the new Eldorado. A regular Pecos sleeper on all through trains is to be asked of the T. & P. while the extension of the

schedule of the Chicago-Carlsbad New Mexico train of the Santa Fe to Pecos is to be asked of the Santa Fe. The influx of passengers and freight is already taxing the capacity of both lines as a result of the showing made by the Bell well. This showing has strengthened the confidence in the predictions of the geologists that a huge pool of oil underlies the lands along the Pecos River supplied from the big 7,000 square mile Toyah Basin, which is becoming known as the one possible rival of the Tampico fields in the United States.

Tent communities are making their appearance in the valley. The town of Irabell is the latest offspring of the oil boom. It is located on the Santa Fe near the Bell well and was named in honor of Ira J. Bell, head of the Dixieland Syndicate, drillers of the first producer between the Eastland and the Los Angeles fields.

Lease prices on Reeves county lands are soaring as Pecos has been forced to open the corridors of the county bidlings to provide beds for the hundreds of new arrivals, and the refusal of several bids of \$5,000 for leases adjacent to the strike made by the Bell well are reported. Lease prices have risen 200 per cent and more since the well came in, but this does not diminish the demand for the rights on lands for miles both north and south of Pecos. Bidding is active for territory in the vicinity the three deep test wells, the Laura well of the Sunshine Oil Corporation and the two proposed by the Penn interests near the Dixieland strike.

Many lease holders are delaying action awaiting the result of the swabbing out of the Bell well on Saturday.

Numerous contracts are being made to extend the drilling field in both directions of the Bell well, and a for-

est of derricks are making their appearance along the long anticline running 32 degrees north of the east through the well and crossing the line made my the King, Sunshine, Zone and other drill which run in a north-westerly direction.

HUNGER KNOWS NO ARMISTICE IN CAUCASUS

Colonel Haskell Reports to Near East Relief on Desperate Needs of Helpless.

"Peace may come elsewhere in the world, but hunger knows no armistice in the Near East," says Colonel William N. Haskell, Allied high commissioner in the Trans-Caucasus.

Colonel Haskell is in charge of all operations and disbursements of Near East Relief in the Caucasus.

"There is no fuel or shelter for the greater part of them during the terri-

ble winter in the mountains," he says, "and the existing food supply is entirely inadequate for the great number of refugees without resources of any kind.

"By a recent agreement between the premiers of the republics of Armenia, Azerbaidjan and Georgia to cease hostilities and settle all differences by arbitration one obstacle to relief work in the Caucasus has been removed and makes accessible a great number of destitute people who otherwise would perish this winter.

"Two hundred thousand destitute Armenians and Tartars can now be reached in the districts of Karabagh, Shusha and Nakhichevan, in the southeast section of the Trans-Caucasus, and we are planning to extend our work there.

"Around every station along the railway are gathered groups of hundreds of homeless people lying huddled together on the ground, the majority of them too weak even to try to help themselves.

"This is especially true in view of the existence of 248,000 destitute inhabitants of Russian Armenia who possess homes, but no food, as well as 150,000 Greeks, Russians, Persians, Syrians and Yezidis who have been driven out of parts of Transcaucasia.

"One hundred and forty thousand Moslems, whose villages were destroyed in the course of five years of constant warfare, are helplessly encamped in the open around villages of their former enemies, begging infinitesimal quantities of flour, which they mix with dirt to give the illusion of nourishment.

"It is generally admitted in the Caucasus that the Americans of the Near East Relief already have saved the lives of at least 20,000 babies and children and of 500,000 adult refugees and destitute. This work still is continuing."

"In an effort to procure funds to carry on the work and save the lives of these hundreds of thousands who otherwise will die of starvation and exposure Near East Relief, of which Cleveland H. Dodge is treasurer, is making an appeal to the American people.

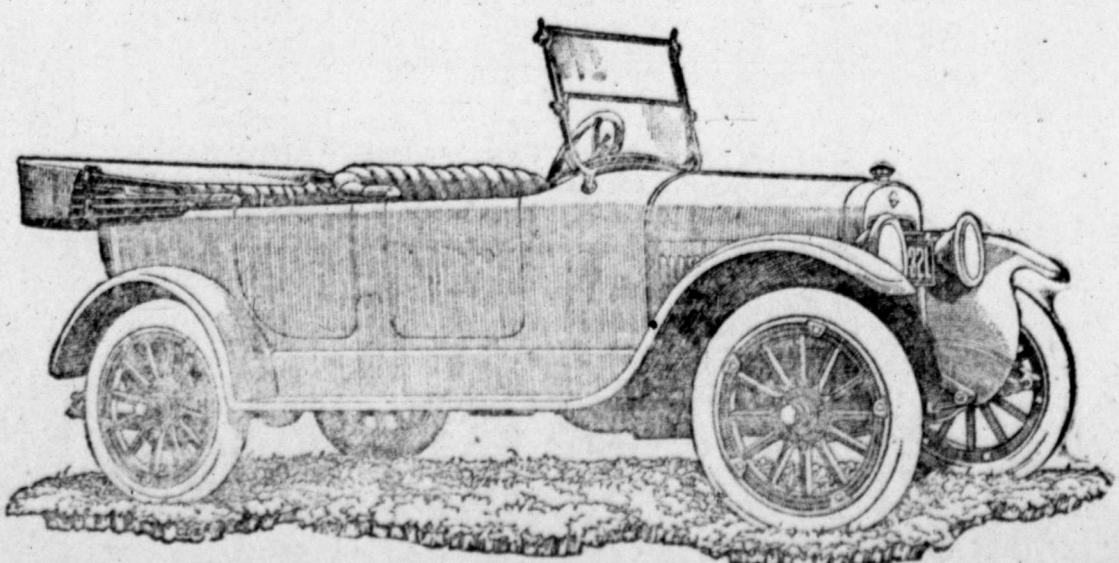

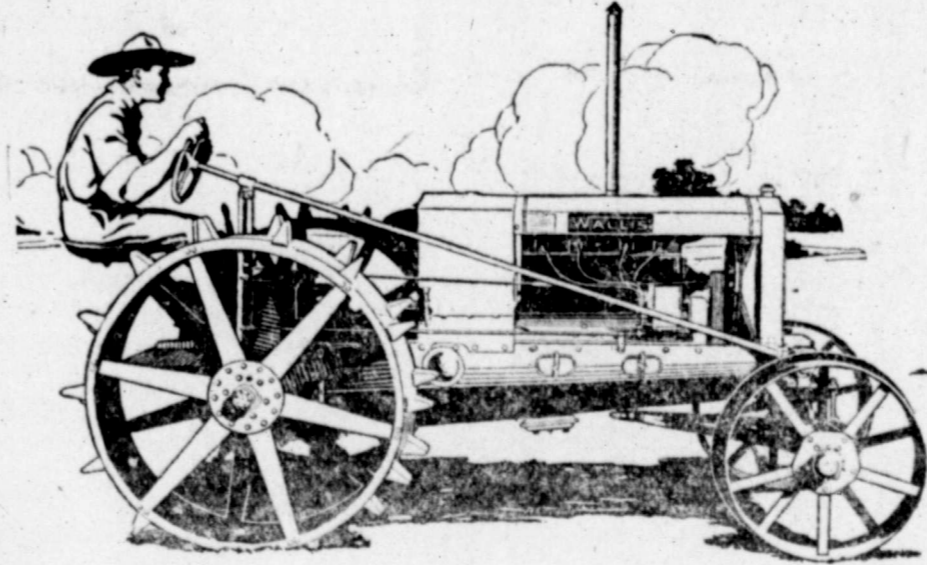
