STRIKERS ADVISED TO RETURN OR TO HUNT OTHER JOBS

Chicago, April 12.—The government intervened in the railroad strike today. Acting, it is believed, under orders from Attorney General Palmer, United States District Attorney Charles F. Clyne issued the following ultimatum to the strikers:

"Go back to work, withdraw your demands, and adopt other measures for securing an adjustment of your grievances, or quit work and permit others who are willing to work to do so."

"The railroads must be permitted to employ men to take the places of the strikers and the latter must refrain from all coercive measures. No more strike meetings may be held. The trains must run."

The ultimatum of United States District Attorney Clyne was delivered following a meeting he held with A. F. Whitney, vice president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, and Edward F. Corrigan, assistant chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. They refused to discuss what took place at the meeting, but it was learned from reliable sources later that the ultimatum had been delivered to the strikers.

The Government's pronouncement is expected to affect the strike situation throughout the country, inasmuch as the Chicago situation is the heart of the strike. It is believed that Federal prosecution of the strikers will follow.

In the meantime, it was reported that 18,000 railroad shopmen employed here and at Michigan City, Ind., are preparing to join the strike within twenty-four hours if the railroads do not cease employing strike breakers. This was regarded as serious, inasmuch as the possibility of the 400,000 railroad shopmen throughout the country joining the strike is involved.

Brief Resume of Strike Situation

The "outlaw" railroad strike continued to grip the East, seriously impeding the traffic of all kind on all roads. In the Central West thousands of men have been thrown out of work because of industries shutting down for lack of power, fuel and materials.

In the Far West, the situation was not reported so acute, although Los Angeles reported the strike of between 6,000 and 7,000 trainmen, tying up traffic.

In the wealthy suburbs about New York the mayors have organized volunteer crews of brokers, lawyers, bankers and business men to man the trains to the city on mornings and bring them back in the evening.

New York, April.—Striking railroad workers in New Jersey agreed to refer the strike to the new Railroad Labor Record Board.

Th leaders will request their men to return to work at once pending settlement.

Chicago Men Obdurate

Chicago, April.—Striking switchmen in the Chicago district will refuse to accept a wage increase from the railroads, even if one is offered, unless it is accompanied by recognition of their "rebel" union, the Yardmen's Association.

General Strike Hints

Washington, April.—Reports that an effort is being made to expand the railroad strikes into general strike reached the Department of Justice from agents in the field. It was reported that agitators are attempting to extend the strike organization to embrace other industries.

Situation at Cleburne

Cleburne, April 13.—Normal conditions were restored in the railroad yards here when thirty-nine Santa Fe switchmen returned to work.

The local freight embargo was lifted today.

Embargo at Oklahoma City

Oklahoma City April.—Oklahoma City experienced virtually its first direct contact with the railroad situation when the Rock Island railroad this morning declared an embargo on all freight shipments here. That other railroads entering the city would declare similar embargoes appeared likely according to company officials.

Tulsa Is Tied Up

Tulsa Okla., April.—Freight traffic in Tulsa was virtually brought to a standstill today when practically ev-

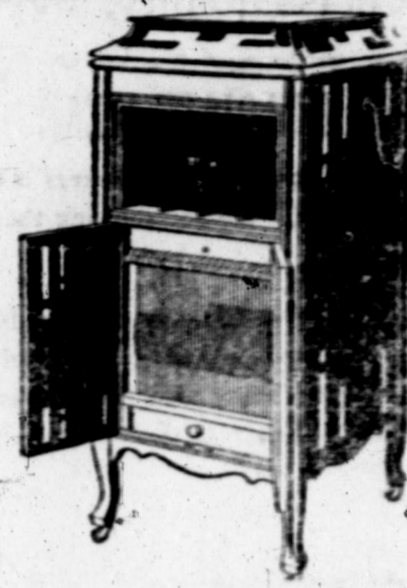

"LET THERE BE LIGHT"

"And God Said, let there be light: And there was light."

Tremendous indeed that brief history of the birth of the heavens and the earth—the emergency of the universe from chaos and darkness into light and form and order.

The real beginning of life on the earth came with the Light. The conservation of life on earth depends upon Light. Without Light, creation would inevitably return to that dismal estate described in the opening verses of Genesis: "And the earth was without form and void; and darkness was upon the face of the deep."

The history of the spiritual man is paralleled by the story of the physical creation. His real life began with the dawn of that inner light termed conscience. Out of the darkness of the brute world he emerged, fighting his way higher in the scale of being as the shadows were dissipated by knowledge and experience. The whole spiritual life of man, even as the physical, is dependent on light. Without it, he would return to depths of ignorance and degradation as certainly as the material world would revert to chaos.

And yet, at every stage of the world's history men actuated by self-interest have sought to bar human minds from the light. They have fastened the shutters of ignorance and drawn down the curtains of superstition—and all too frequently plunged the seekers after light into black dungeons of persecution. For a time, darkness has triumphed; but eventually the light has always broken through, as it must always break through. For "God said, Let there be light—and there WAS light."

As far back as the history of mankind goes there has been war between the torch bearers and the interests that profited by darkness. Socrates condemned to the hemlock; John beheaded; Jesus crucified; Galileo persecuted; Servetus burned; so goes the story of the eternal fight of selfishness and light. Thousands have been put to death by the powers of darkness, but the light has shone a little brighter with every martyrdom. The funeral pyres of the prophets have illuminated the path of progress.

Today the old fight still goes on. Selfishness still puts forth its power and cunning to shut out the light and perpetuate its privileges in the shadows. Greed shuns the light in the twentieth century as in the Middle Ages. But the light breaks through and the monsters that people the darkness disappear before its beams. Garrison and Phillips and Harriet Beecher Stowe turned the searchlight on corruption in high places, and slowly but surely civic rottenness is giving way to decency. Day after day the prophets of equity are streaming the light of truth on the sources of industrial unrest and social injustice, and the world is finding out those long hidden evils which hold back the spirit of human brotherhood.

THE WOMAN VOTE

The question of whether, in case of the ratification of the suffrage amendment, women will have the right to vote in the approaching elections is attracting wide attention.

The adoption of the amendment by the thirty-sixth state will give women the right of suffrage at once, but owing to laws in the various states which demand certain requirements of voters before they can cast their ballot, there is much doubt and confusion thrown about the situation.

In this connection word comes from Washington which gives some information on this subject which may prove enlightening as well as helpful to those who have not a clear idea as to the proper course to pursue.

It reads as follows: "Women in several states may be denied a vote in the coming presidential election despite ratification of the suffrage amendment before November, it is said at the headquarters of the National Woman's Party here, unless changes are made in registration laws.

"In order that women all over the United States may register for the coming November election under existing laws, ratification must be complete before May 1, 1920, on which date Georgia closes its registration. Excluding Georgia the next date is June 30, when registration closes in Rhode Island. Registration in all other states does not close until September or October by which time suffrage leaders are confident the amendment will be ratified.

"Other requirements, however, beside the element of time may nullify the women's vote next November in certain of the states, especially in the South, unless the legislatures are willing to make necessary changes in the laws. Payment of a Poll tax is required in eight of the

states; in Virginia over a period of three years before the election and Florida and Louisiana for the two years previous. Texas law call for the payment of a poll tax on January 1, Alabama and Mississippi on February 1 and North Carolina and South Carolina on May 1.

"Pressure will be brought to bear upon the legislature, where necessary, to have registration re-opened and the laws modified, it is said here but women political leaders hope the changes will be accomplished without difficulty. In states where women have not heretofore been given the privilege of fulfilling the necessary requirements, provisions should be made for them to go to the polls this November if the amendment is ratified in time, they assert."

It thus appears that the various states, or some of them at least, will have to clear the way so the women voters may have the opportunity to exercise their right of franchise.

2ND MISSION COMES FROM PHILIPPINES

Body Headed by Senate President Quezon Reiterates Demand for Independence.

That the Filipino people are in earnest in their demand for immediate independence is indicated by the coming to the United States of a second Philippine mission to work for independence. Coincident with this announcement the War Department received a cable from Manila stating that the all-Filipino legislature had adopted resolutions reiterating its plea for immediate independence.

The second mission, like the first, is composed of the leading men of the islands and will work in the United States not only for immediate independence, but also to bring about "better understanding, greater confidence and closer economic relations between the United States and the Philippines."

The mission is again headed by Manuel L. Quezon, president of the Philippine Senate, who is well known in America, having been for six years resident commissioner to the United

States. Mr. Quezon and the Hon. Sergio Osmena, Speaker of the Philippine House of Representatives and Vice President of the Council of State, are the leaders of the Nationalist party, which has been in power since 1907.

While Speaker Osmena is not so well known in the United States as Quezon, he is considered one of the ablest men in the islands. Senate President Quezon recently referred to Osmena as "the greatest Filipino since Rizal."

The personal relations between Osmena and Quezon are probably without a parallel in modern politics. They have been the leading political figures in the islands for 12 years, yet there has never been the slightest indication of rivalry between them. Throughout their college life as well as their long political service each has refused to be a candidate for any position that the other aspired to.

During the years Quezon was the Philippine delegate in the American Congress he won the esteem and confidence of both the Republican and Democratic sides of the chamber. Whenever he spoke he was assured of a good attendance. One of the official short hand reporters once declared Quezon used the purest English of any member of the House.

Osmena, as president of the Nationalist party, is the leader of the national movement for independence.

"Osmena is the premier 'de facto' of the Philippines," said a leading Filipino

no journalist, now in America. "A very conscientious and tireless worker, thorough and persistent, a genius for grasping the big features as well as the smallest details of public affairs, cool headed, quiet by temperament and education, a deep thinker, an eloquent speaker, a polished writer, a keen observer of men—such is Osmena." Both Osmena and Quezon have been consistent advocates of Philippine independence, yet when the occasion demanded it they have never hesitated to champion the cause of America's good intentions toward the Filipino people.

AFFILIATION EXAMINATION

Supt. E. F. King
Colorado Texas.

The committee on Inspection, classification and affiliation of Texas High schools has authorized college entrance examinations to be held throughout the state on May 10, 11, 12, 13, 1920. Persons taking these examinations will pay a fee of one dollar, which will be used to defray the expense of printing and distributing the questions, of sending the papers to Austin, and of employing assistants as may be needed to grade the papers submitted.

The following persons may take these examinations.

1. Students in affiliated schools who have been taking non-affiliated subjects.
2. Students in classes which have submitted their work for affiliation this year. The school might fail to secure affiliation and the student might pass.
3. Students in non-affiliated schools.
4. Students in non-affiliated schools may use the units to absolve examinations and secure advanced standing in affiliated schools.
5. Teachers who desire to remove conditions by adding entrance units to the number allowed for certificate.
6. One or more units may be taken each year, and units obtained by these examinations will be valid for five years.

It is the purpose of the Department to open the doors of our higher institutions of learning to every person in Texas, who is prepared to do college work. Will you co-operate with us by being responsible for these examinations? If so, please notify the High School Division prior to April 20th of the number of sets of

questions which you may need. Please give publicity to these examinations through your local press.

MITCHELL COUNTY SCHOOLS GET \$8330 STATE AID

Judge Hall, County Superintendent of schools has been advised that the State had provided for aid to schools of Mitchell county in the amount of approximately \$8,330.00 which is, by far the largest amount yet apportioned to schools of this county and which amount is near the limit of which the State funds could be expended. There are various reasons for the big increase from the state for the school term of 1920-21. One is of course, the doubling of the State apportionment from its former amount of one million dollars. Another is that the apportionment to districts on the scholastic number was raised recently at a meeting of the state board from \$7.50 per scholar to \$8.50 per scholar, thus making the amount \$800 more for the schools of Mitchell county as the census gives the schools that number of student ages, (not including the three independent districts.) One of the biggest reasons for the large apportionment to Mitchell county and one that should be reorganized by the patrons of the schools is the fact that this large amount was derived directly through the diligent and efficient work of County Judge Hall. In the two years which Judge Hall has served this county in the capacity of County Judge and Superintendent of schools. He has never ceased to look after the counties interests and especially the rural schools. The apportionment of this \$8330 to the rural schools is as follows:

NO COTTON QUAREN-TINE FOR TEXAS

The Texas Situation is Put Before Conference and It is Thought Will not seriously interfere With Cotton Crop

There will be no state quarantine of Texas because of the pink boll worm, if the tentative decision arrived at at a recent conference between Governor Hobby and the federal horticultural board is allowed to stand and approved by Secretary of Agriculture Meredith. Announcement of the decision is expected to be made soon after another conference between the governor and the board members.

At a conference after the hearing the board decided that a quarantine of the whole state is not necessary and that a non-cotton zone around the nine counties now infested with the pink boll worm with strict federal quarantine regulations in these counties and full co-operation by the state authorities will be sufficient.

This decision may be changed and a statewide quarantine be ordered by the department of agriculture but in view of the tentative decision it is unlikely.

The hearing before the board was largely attended and Texas occupied the center of the stage.

Governor Hobby again made an eloquent and convincing speech against the proposed statewide quarantine. He showed there is no necessity for such a quarantine. The governor said he would call the Texas Legislature in special session to provide for the farmers who would suffer loss because of a quarantine. The state, he declared, will co-operate closely with the federal government to prevent the spread of the pest from the nine counties already infested.

Senator Sheppard brought out that there is no necessity for a quarantine of the whole state. It would be unjust he declared to put the whole state under restrictions and he felt sure the state under the present pink boll worm law can handle the situation satisfactorily with aid of the Federal government, representatives Hudspeth, Eagle, and Young spoke along the same lines all emphatically opposed to a statewide quarantine.

As the cotton crop is already planted in the nine counties, the opinion of the Texans is that the crop should be gathered under quarantine regulations and sold abroad through the port of Galveston.

The farmers of Texas have been on the anxious seat for some time on account of the possibility of Texas being quarantined by reason of the pink boll worm situation in several of the counties of the state. So serious seemed to be the situation, that the conference at Washington was called and the result is given above. Those in close touch with the situation seem to think that the danger of the entire state being quarantined is past, and that outside of some rigid restrictions locally in the counties affected by the pests no action will be necessary.

West Texas as is known, is not affected in the least by these pests, as is also a large portion of the cotton growing districts of the state, but it looked for awhile as though the entire state must suffer for the depredations in nine counties in Texas.

Governor Hobby and other Texas representatives made a strong fight for the freedom of Texas cotton farmers, and apparently have won.

In fact, he was taking our village by storm and having the time of his life, when in stepped the owner of the precious duds accompanied by the "law" of Lubbock county.

Last Saturday evening late, Will was called upon a very rushing business matter to Sweetwater and in order to further promote his exit from Colorado he hired a negro to take him in a car to that place. He was dressed in his overalls, old shoes and his old hat when he left Colorado that night, but upon arrival at Sweetwater, he came out of his room dressed to perfection. The negro who carried him to Sweetwater, just happened to have bought one of these blue silk shirts like Will had on and remembered where he done it.

The next morning after the negro chauffeur arrived at Colorado he heard that Greene's Mens Furnishing Store had been robbed of several suits of clothing, some shoes and shirts. Remembering the shirt Will had on at Sweetwater and that the one he had on like it was bought from this store, he went and told the owners of Will and his fine clothes, Messrs. Greene and Bennett of Colorado left immediately for Sweetwater where they soon learned that three negroes had bought tickets to Lubbock. If it is a fact that the productive capacity of the country is going to be taxed to the utmost for the next ten years, then it follows as a logical sequence that the capital stocks of the big corporations like oil producing companies will be a profitable form of investment. Nothing is surer in our opinion: Now the fly in the ointment is the continuously mounting high prices in the cost of living, and the prevailing conditions of labor unrest nearly everywhere in evidence.

The political cauldron will soon be seething. The whole country bids fair to be stirred up over pending issues during the coming campaign as perhaps, never before. The people of this country were never so opulent, nor never faced such tremendous problems. Personally, we do not care a rap which party is in power or who is president. What we want is good times and a reduction of taxes, as we are in favor of the candidate who will reduce them the most and who promises to solve the problem of unsettled labor and other vexatious conditions in the most expeditious and effectual manner.

The relations of the government toward industry involve the most serious questions which have ever engaged or will engage the thoughts, of students in public affairs, said Senator Cummins of Iowa in a recent speech in Chicago. Unless the people of the United States who work for a living are well disposed towards American institutions, unless they are enabled through the compensation of their labor to become good citizens devoted to their country, and willing to defend it, our foreign relations speedily will disappear. I venture the prediction that the issue which will determine political affiliation will concern the relation of the government toward labor. This is as it ought to be, for it is the attitude of the voters upon this subject which alone can solve this supremely important problem.

PRECINCT CONVENTIONS

In the opinion of the Reporter the people of Texas should lay aside what ever prejudice they may have for or against Mr. Bailey when they assemble for the precinct conventions May 1, and vote to endorse the national administration, because as democrats they can do no less.

The eyes of the United States are on Texas and what the Texas Democrats decide on May 1 will be largely instrumental in determining the action of other states in the presidential election, particularly those states where the party lines are less rigidly drawn than in Texas.

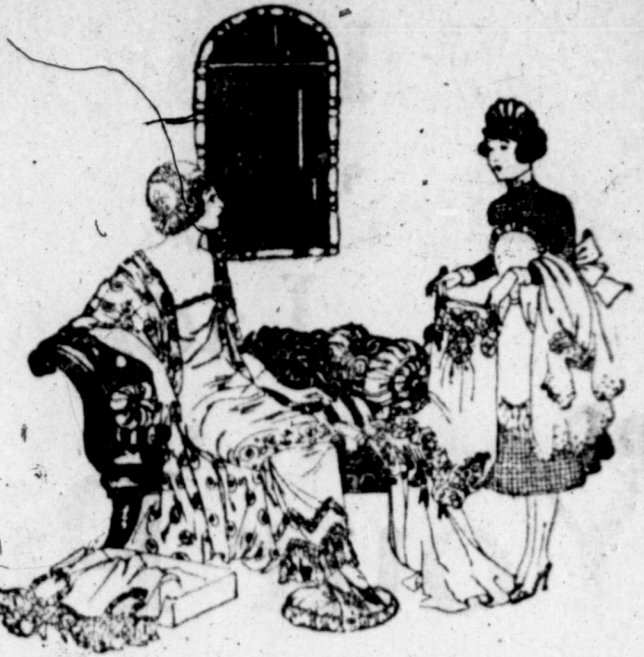

ery switchman in the various yards joined the nationwide walkout. Approximately 180 men left their jobs. **Extra Guards Around White House** Washington, April 13.—Additional police officers were placed about the White House today, and Secret Service operatives were also unusually active.

The White House refused to make any statement as to the reason for the additional guard.

It was learned however that advice had been received that agitators were on their way to Washington and precautionary measures followed.

Washington, April 13.—President Wilson today called a meeting for tomorrow of the Cabinet to discuss "the general situation."

White House officials would not say that the "unauthorized" railroad strike has prompted the call, but it was understood that this would be the principal subject discussed.

This is the first Cabinet meeting called by the President since he returned from his western trip last September "a very sick man." Since his illness he has seen only a few members of his official family.

Labor Board Name President Wilson, also announced the appointment of the Railroad Labor board provided for in the Cummins-Esch bill recently passed. This board is expected to be organized to cope with the present strike situation.

The members are: Representing the public; George W. Hanger, Washington; Henry Hunt, Cincinnati; R. M. Barton, Tennessee.

Representing the railroads; Horace Baker, J. H. Elliott and William L. Park.

Representing the employees; Albert Phillips, A. O. Wharton and Forrester.

The board is authorized to meet in Washington at once to take up the grievances of the railroad employees. The nomination went to the Senate at noon today and prompt action by that body is expected.

Court of last Resort Under the transportation act the Railroad Labor Board is the court of last resort in disputes between the roads and their employees. Its first work after considering the present strike will be to take up the whole railroad wage question, which has been pending for nearly a year.

The board is to establish permanent headquarters at Chicago and its members will devote all of their time to the work. They will receive salaries of \$10,000 a year, each.

Workers Back in Muskogee Muskogee, Okla., April.—Switchman on the four railroads entering Muskogee who struck Saturday were all back at work Tuesday morning.

Washington, April 14.—It was officially stated that Attorney General Palmer informed President Wilson's Cabinet that he has "confident evidence" that the moving spirit behind the Nationwide railroad strike is the Communist International working through the I. W. W.

It is predicted that the Government would cause a large number of arrests if the Attorney General's statement to the Cabinet can be sufficiently backed by evidence now being gathered. The Attorney General also told the Cabinet that there is a movement to extend the railroads into a general strike.

St. Louis, April 14.—Federal investigation into reported I. W. W. and other radical activities in the switchmen's strike in the St. Louis district was started.

According to J. S. Eubanks, president of the "outlaw" association, arrangements were made to provide the Department of Justice with complete rosters and reports of the Yardmen's Association.

Reports from all over the country indicate a general improvement in the railroad strike situation.

East—Passenger service greatly improved; great many more trains running; freight service still tied up to considerable degree.

Central West.—Improvement marked; men returning to work in small numbers; brotherhood chiefs announce that "backbone of strike is breaking;" railroad officials predict early return to normal conditions.

West.—through passenger service is seriously impeded; five trains reported held up on transcontinental roads.

Large Cities Face Shortage of Food Washington, April 14.—With the food production of the country isolated by the railroad strike, the big population centers of the country are facing a threatened food shortage, while producers stand to lose hundreds of thousands in money, according to figures from the Bureau of Markets here today.

Strike Condemned by Eight Unions Kansas City, April 14.—The convention of eight union railroad trade organizations is on record here today as opposed to the switchmen's nationwide "rebel" strike.

Grand Jury Called to Investigate

New Orleans, April 14.—United States District Judge Rufus Foster today called a special session of the Federal Grand Jury to consider the cases of the eight "outlaw" strike leaders arrested last night by Federal agents and charged with interfering with interstate commerce, violating the Lever act and interfering with the mails. Judge Foster announced the grand jury would be instructed to investigate every possible phase of the strike here.

Washington, April 14.—President Wilson and his Cabinet discussed the railroad strike for more than an hour today and apparently reached some conclusion, but there was no intimation as to its nature.

Other members intimated that definite decision had been made one way or another as to Government intervention.

Palmer Calls Conference

Palmer went direct from the White House to his office and immediately summoned for a conference his assistants, who have been keeping in close touch with the strike situation.

Soon after the Cabinet meeting, the President telephoned the members of the newly-named railroad labor board asking them to come to Washington and be prepared to function as soon as their nominations had been confirmed by the Senate.

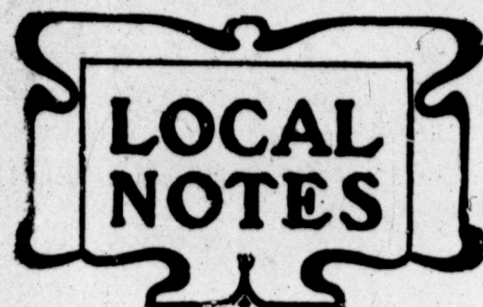
