DEMOCRATS CLOSE BIG CONVENTION

ELECTION OF SAN FRANCISCO
DELEGATION LAST WORK
OF MEETING.

TOM LOVE IS COMMITTEEMAN

Postmaster General Burleson Is Given
Place as Delegate From Tenth
District.

Dallas.—One of the most harmonious political conventions in the annals of Texas came to a close at the coliseum in this city Tuesday shortly after midnight, when the state democratic convention did those things that had been expected, and selected to do for the democracy of Texas.

A keynote of harmony and unanimity of the convention was sounded first by Judge Watkins in his speech accepting the honor of the chairmanship. Prolonged applause greeted the statements of Chairman Watkins that the convention stood squarely behind Woodrow Wilson and his administration, the league of nations, the enforcement of prohibition and the suffrage rights of women.

Most of Tuesday and a big part of the night was taken up with "marking time," awaiting the reports of committees and counting the complicated balloting for the election of six delegates at large out of twenty-eight candidates.

It was nearing the midnight hour when the wheels of the convention began to move to true form, and from then on things moved with veritable snap until the closing hour.

Postmaster General Albert S. Burleson was elected a delegate to the San Francisco convention from the tenth congressional district at a caucus of the district delegates after a three-hour fight against him. Most of the opposition was from women delegates on account of Burleson's attitude toward equal suffrage.

The convention, unanimously adopted, praised Woodrow Wilson and his administration and the Hobby administration. By almost a unanimous vote it sent an "uninstructed" delegation to San Francisco, but accompanied that resolution with one commending Mr. McAdoo most highly to the national convention. After a spirited discussion, the convention adopted a resolution, offered by Senator Davidson of Houston, candidate for lieutenant governor, recommending to the Texas legislature the enactment of a statute permitting women to vote in the coming primaries, whether they have paid their poll taxes or not, in the event the thirty-sixth state ratifies the national woman's suffrage amendment, or the enactment of a statute reopening the tax rolls prior to the primary election, so the women may pay poll taxes.

By unanimous vote the convention declared for an unimpaired league of nations and condemned the failure of congress to ratify it. It instructed the Texas delegation to vote against any candidate or platform plank for beer and light wine and to stand for a complete enforcement of the national prohibition amendment.

A resolution was adopted favoring a state tribunal which hereafter shall investigate and report to each succeeding legislature contributions and disbursements in all state campaigns.

Other resolutions adopted were: Condemning hoarding and speculation in foodstuffs, approving the right of collective bargaining, demanding frugal expenditure of government money, condemning the republican congress for lack of economy and for not revising the tax laws, commending the Texas legislature for ratifying woman's suffrage, asking the Louisiana legislature to ratify woman's suffrage, in favor of aid for crippled soldiers and for assistance in opportunity to secure homes to able-bodied former soldiers, favoring adequate appropriations for water ways and harbors, urging increased appropriations to aid counties and districts in building permanent highways, telegraphing the United States attorney general asking him to investigate the Red river boundary situation under federal receivership and protect Texas interests. This last was adopted after a question of its propriety had been raised by Railroad Commissioner Clarence Gilmore and after J. A. Kemp of Wichita Falls replied that no impropriety was involved and Texas interests would probably be greatly benefited.

The Delegation.
The following delegates at large were elected on the first ballot:
Cone Johnson of Tyler, Governor W. P. Hobby of Austin, Cullen F. Thomas of Dallas, M. M. Crane of Dallas, Marshall Hicks of San Antonio, T. M. Campbell of Palestine, Thomas H. Ball of Houston, Clyde A. Sweeton of Greenville, Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald of Fort Worth, J. A. Kemp of Wichita Falls, Barry Miller of Dallas, I. W. Stephens of Fort Worth, Mrs. Minnie Fisher Cunningham of Galveston, Miss Margie E. Neal of

Carthage, Mrs. W. E. Spell of Waco and Mrs. Jessie Daniel Ames of Georgetown.

The total vote cast was 1,247 out of a possible 1,409. Counties not reporting had a voting strength of 162 votes.

Contest for Delegates.
There was keen zest in the campaign for delegate at large—posts of honor sought by many more men and women than there were places to be filled.

The vote was taken by counties, each county voting for a selection of twelve names out of twenty-eight nominees.

Caucuses were called all over the coliseum and finally, after decisions were reached, the secretaries drafted a corps of assistants and spent hours listing and tabulating the votes.

At about midnight the calculations were completed and the selection of the sixteen delegates at large was announced.

Thomas B. Love of Dallas, was unanimously elected democratic national committeeman from Texas and given long and enthusiastic applause when he appeared on the platform. Cone Johnson of Tyler and Cullen Thomas of Dallas were also especially recognized in this fashion by the convention. Much applause was given Governor Hobby and each of the candidates for governor, and one of the greatest outbursts of the day came when the name of former Governor T. M. Campbell of Palestine was placed in nomination for delegate at large, after his home county had refused to send him to the state convention, as a result, it is said, of a purely local issue in Anderson county.

During the speeches of the candidates for governor came the most dramatic touch of the convention when Dwight Lewelling of Dallas withdrew from the gubernatorial race in favor of Pat M. Neff. Mr. Thomas and Mr. Looney were given demonstrations by their supporters.

During the speeches there were fewer flings at Mr. Bailey than some had thought would be the case. Mr. Lewelling spoke rather vigorously of the "political death" of the former senator and others referred to the absence of stretchers, the number of democrats not in hospitals, etc.

As to Poll Taxes.
When the Lynch Davidson resolution for women voting regardless of poll taxes was offered, Senator W. L. Dean of Huntsville said that all the women ask is to vote on equal terms with men; that they are not asking for special privileges. After some further debate for the resolution John W. Woods of Fisher county, former Speaker of the Texas house, expressed the same thought voiced by Senator Dean and added that some women had not been patriotic enough to pay their poll taxes. There was a voice from the crowd "Look out," and a number of hisses.

A woman near by shook her finger at Mr. Woods and said that there are a good many "men like you who won't give the women money to pay their poll taxes." The continuation of her remarks was lost in the wave of laughter, in which Mr. Woods joined.

It was 11:25 o'clock when State Chairman M. H. Wolfe of Dallas rapped for order. Governor W. P. Hobby and Mayor Frank W. Wozenorraft and Dr. George W. Truett of Dallas, and Mrs. Percy V. Pennybacker of Austin, occupied prominent places on the platform.

The invocation was by Dr. Truett, who is pastor of the First Baptist Church of this city. He invoked divine blessings on the chief executive of the nation in this important hour of the country's progress, and on the chief executive of this state and those that are joined with them.

The address of welcome was delivered by Mayor Wozenorraft.

Text of Platform Adopted.
The following platform was adopted:
The loyal and intrepid democracy of Texas in convention assembled celebrates the triumphant vindication of its principles and policies over those foes and forces whose leadership stood for reaction in time of peace and inaction in time of war.

With unexampled unanimity and enthusiasm, from border to border, overwhelming endorsement has been registered, without equivocation, or reservation, of the patriotic purposes, lofty vision and epoch-making accomplishments of the democratic national administration, at home and abroad, amid the most perplexing problems in the history of the republic.

As the day approaches when he shall soon lay down the burdens of office, we send affectionate greetings to Woodrow Wilson, with the prayer that he may be granted lengthened years, and with the assurance that his name is written among the immortals because of all he dreamed and wrought for the betterment of the country and mankind.

But pride in national leadership and rejoicing because of partisan triumph are sobered by the sense of responsibility as we face the problems and perils of tomorrow.

Reaffirming our adherence to the time-honored fundamental declarations

Straw Vote at Woodmen Conference Gives Neff Majority for Governor

ANOTHER GOOD RAIN

On Tuesday night about 11 o'clock a heavy storm cloud rolled up from the northwest, and the wind blew, the lightnings flashed and the thunder rolled, and also the rain fell. The wind was terrific for a short time although we have heard of no damage done. The rain was not very heavy, being about .85 of an inch—just right for young cotton that is up, and just right for that which is about to come up. Probably seven-eighths of the cotton crop is in the ground, and as much as half of it up. With this shower, the cotton crop is almost assured, unless some calamity should happen. It is up to the farmer now to keep it properly cultivated to insure him a bountiful return. Old Mother Nature has done a wonderful part so far and you can depend on her to continue doing her duty. If the farmer will do his, he will be rewarded.

Still Another.

Before we could get the above in print, another trash mover fell Wednesday night, to the amount of 2.42 inches, making a total for this week of 3.27 inches; and a total so far this year of 13.07 inches.

We have not talked with many farmers, but the general opinion is that at least 25 per cent damage was done to the crops, by washing out and being covered up. Some, of course will have to replant, and the excellent stand, in some instances will be reduced.

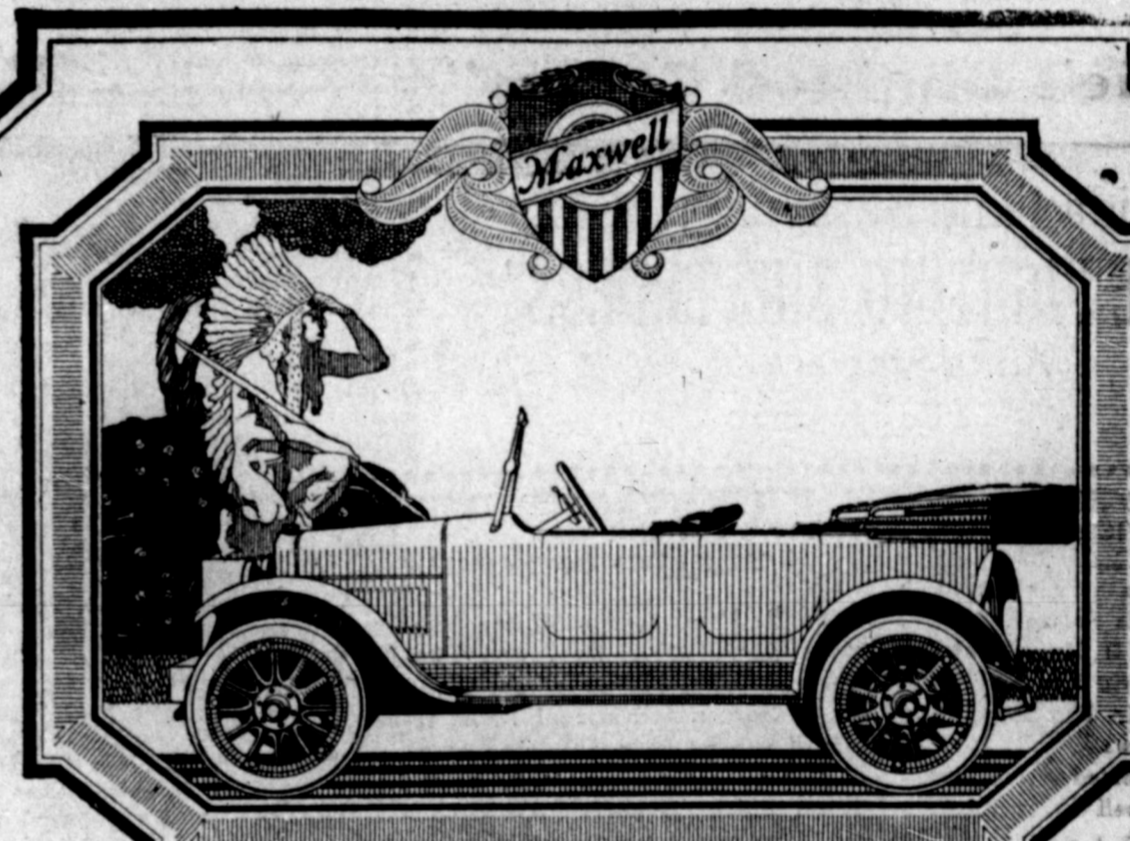

ABRAHAM LINCOLN AT CHICAGO.

Chicago, May—The convening of the Republicans in Chicago, June 6 to nominate a candidate for President recalls afresh at this time the Republican convention opening here 61 years ago which nominated Abraham Lincoln. This was the second national Republican convention and the first of the many which have since been held in Chicago.

The convention assembled on May 16, 1860, and Lincoln was nominated on May 19, the third and last day. After his election feeling aroused by the slavery issue ran quickly into civil war.

Relics of the campaign of 1860, including the old painting of the 'rail splitter,' are preserved by the Chicago Historical Society. E. E. Wood, field secretary of the society, has just prepared what he regards as the most complete account of the events of the convention of 60 years ago. In this he calls attention to Addison G. Proctor, of Ann Arbor, Mich., who, Mr. Wood believes, is the only surviving delegate of the convention.

Chicago in 1860 was a prominent city of 110,000 not quite 25 years old. It had won the convention by the offer to build the largest assembly hall in the country and fill it at every session. Accordingly the "Wigwam" arose at the southwest corner of Lake and Market streets, occupying a space 100 by 180 feet. It was a temporary wooden structure costing a little over the estimated \$5,000. The balance was made up by charging 25 cents admission on its formal opening the Saturday before the convention.

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In view of the many days now spent in hearing delegates contests, this convention of 60 years ago offered something novel. There were no contested delegates. There were, however, some "contests" states. Whether to admit Maryland, Virginia, Kentucky and Texas was a question that occupied most of the first day and was still undecided when adjournment came for the day.

The next day the convention decided to admit the "border states." The platform committee then brought in its report. It was amended to include a reassertion of the 'self evident truths' of the Constitution. At adjournment little remained beyond choosing the candidates, and Mr. Wood characterizes that night as tumultuous one filled with band music and processions until almost day. Enthusiasm for Seward, well worked up in his behalf, was at high tide. Greeley telegraphed his paper that Seward's nomination appeared certain. Incidentally, remarked Mr. Wood, this convention was the first at which the telegraph was employed.

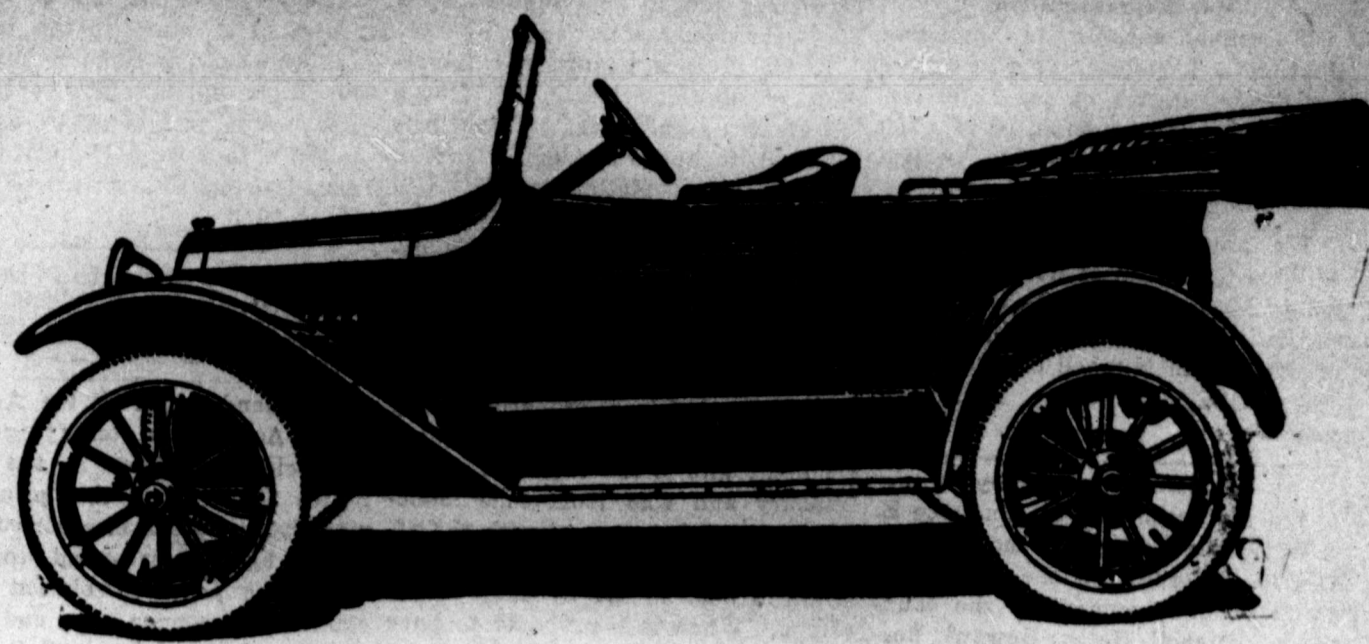
How Lincoln came into the nomination is now for many a familiar story with Lincoln next best at 102, and Seward led on the first ballot 173 1-2 233 necessary for choice. A few more votes came to Seward on the second ballot, bringing his total to 184 1-2, while Lincoln jumped to close quarters with 181. The taking of the third ballot showing Lincoln going strongly to the front.

As the figures were being compiled D. K. Cartten (correct) of Cleveland, O., counting them up for himself, found that Lincoln needed only a few votes to win. The tabulation in fact at that moment was 231 1-2 for Lincoln and 180 for Seward, with 233 necessary for the nomination. Instantly Cartten was on his feet to announce the transfer of four Ohio votes from Chase to Lincoln.

The convention quickly broke into a scene of enthusiasm with few parallels in the long list of American political conventions. Further votes were changed to bring Lincoln's total to 354. The nomination was then made unanimous.

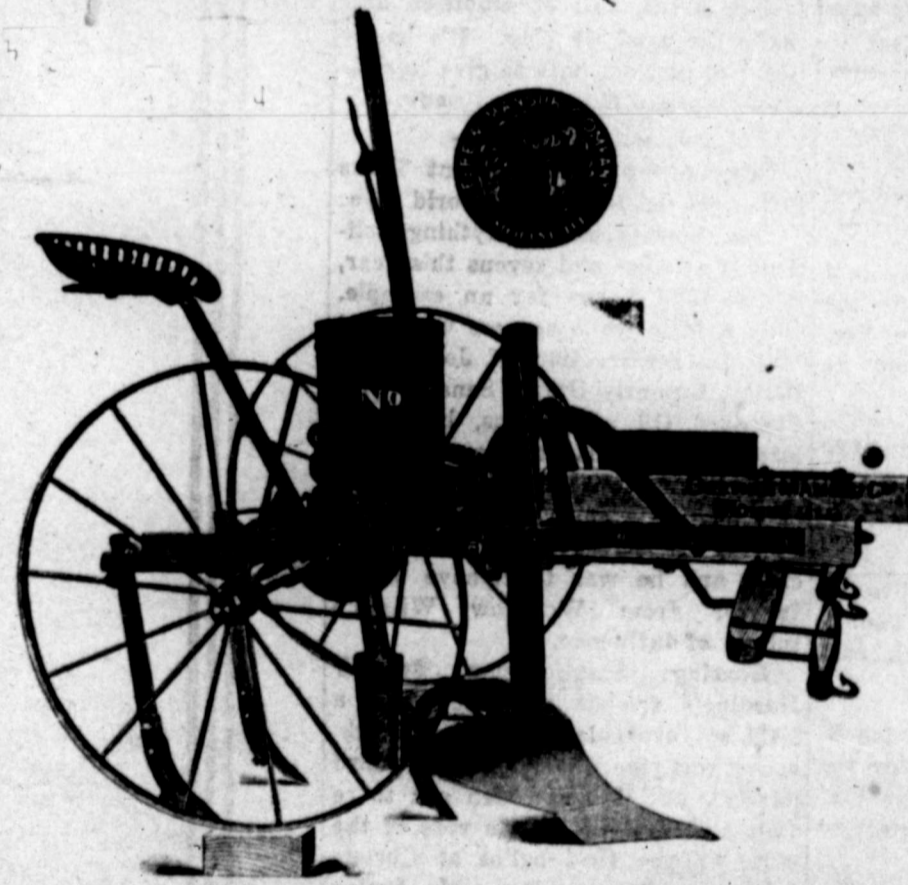

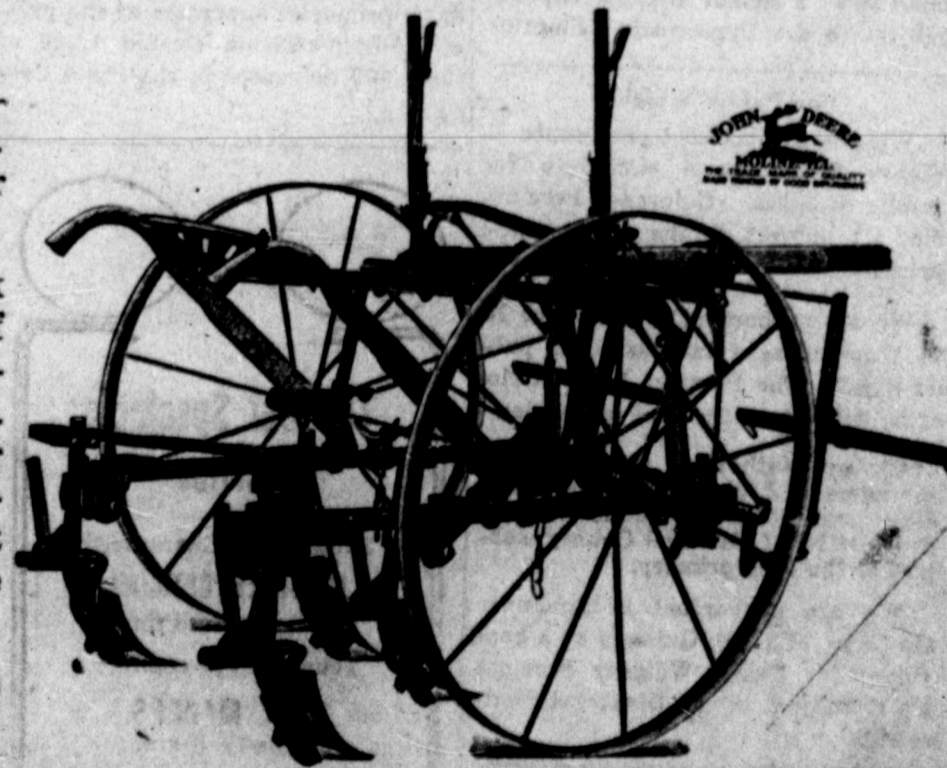

Both branches of congress have passed budget bills with differences which are now to be composed by a conference committee.

These differences are not important save in one respect. The House bill creates a budget bureau which is attached to the Presidential office. The senate of McCormick bill will create the same kind of bureau which is made a part of the treasury department, where it obviously belongs. It is enough to say on this point that the President is already overworked. But it is additionally to be said that the duties involved properly belong to the Finance Minister of the Government, who is the secretary of the treasury and who from time immemorial has been charged with the office of lumping the estimates and sending them to the Speaker of the House. When it is proposed to have these estimates thoroughly sifted and co-ordinated and boiled down to the lowest possible needs of each executive bureau and department before being submitted to the House, why should the Government's Finance Minister then, of all times, be put aside?

It may thus be reasonably supposed that the conference committee will not be long in reaching an agreement on this chief point of difference. Then, as Chairman Good of the House Appropriation as Committee says the greatest business enterprise in the world will at last have a chance to be conducted on business principles proved and practised everywhere else outside of Washington.

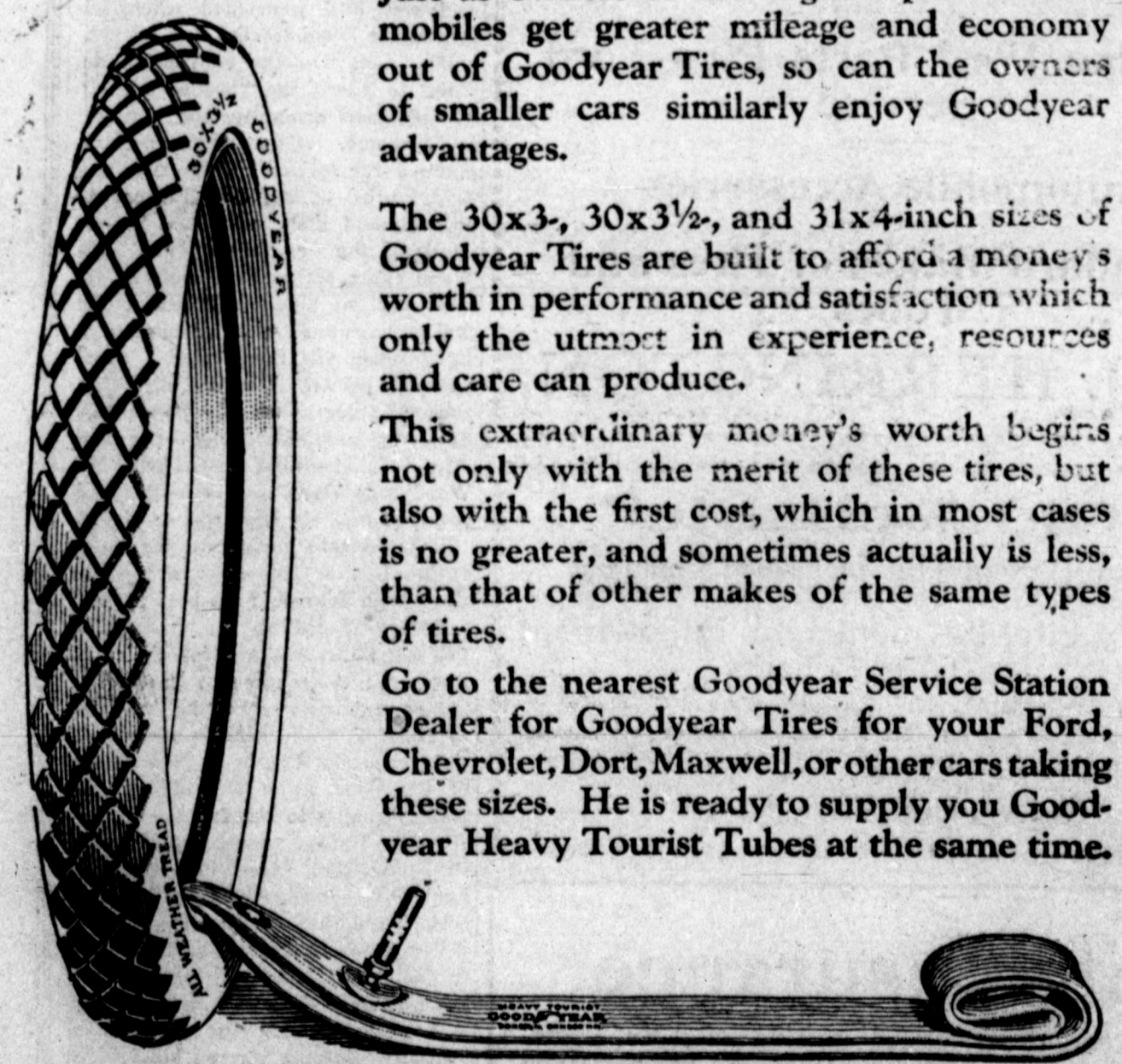

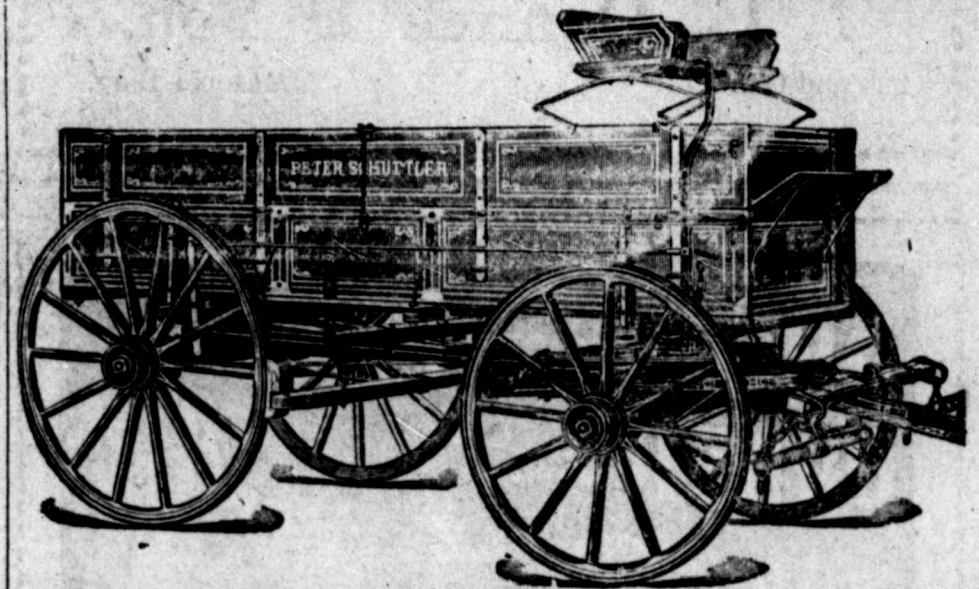

tions of the democratic party through its long history, we recognize that empty platitudes and ancient shibboleths will not meet the complex needs of humanity in these days of world readjustment to new conditions and reform of ancient abuses.

The democratic party stands for the rights of private property and will protect from confiscation and spoliation all capital honestly acquired and administered.

The democratic party declares that private monopoly in this republic is intolerable and indefensible, and we invoke all the power of government, in all its departments, to curb corporate greed, as it corners markets, hoards food supplies and speculates on the necessities of life at the expense of the consumers of the land.

We believe in an economic readjustment by which those of our citizens who toil with their hands to feed and clothe the world and meet the needs of our commercial and industrial welfare should receive a fair and liberal return for the products of their labor. Such returns should be sufficient always to provide better living conditions and opportunity to provident men and women to acquire their own homes.

We commend the democratic national administration for recognition of the rights and interests of our producers and laborers, and heartily indorse the right of labor to organize for the protection of its interests and the advancement of all fair and just demands, and approve the principle of conciliation, arbitration and collective bargaining as necessary and proper to secure cooperation and adjustment of controversies between employers and employees. Recognition by capital of these fundamental truths and suppression of conscienceless profiteers in its ranks, and continued efforts by organized labor to weed out "reds" and "radicals" who seek its control is the surest preventive of industrial unrest and incipient "bolshhevism," which is a menace to capital and labor and the public welfare.

The democratic party has unreservedly favored the league of nations as the one hope of the world to maintain the world peace and to terminate the insufferable burden of great naval establishments and military machines. It was for this that America broke away from traditional isolation and spent without stint her blood and treasure to crush autocracy as it sought to override the world.

We condemn the failure of the United States senate promptly to ratify the treaty with the league of nations unimpaired as a colossal crime against civilization. We but voice the demand of the best thought of the world in urging ratification of the treaty without delay and without reservation that impair its essential integrity.

Thus, and thus only, may the partisan purposes of paltering republican politicians at Washington be defeated and thus regain this nation's moral and spiritual leadership of the world.

The democratic party, throughout its history, has advocated simple, economical government, and while it justified vast expenditures made by the nation during the war as necessary for its protection and for speedy victory, it now demands that there shall be prompt return to frugal expenditures of money by every department of government, state and national.

The republican majority in congress, criticising war expenditures and promising, if elected, to bring the country back to a status of effective economy, has wasted time and energy for more than a year in vain and extravagant investiga-

tion, costing \$2,000,000, revealing nothing beyond the incapacity of republican politicians to cope with the gravest problems. It has repealed none of the war legislation, which harasses business, nor initiated a single constructive measure to help business. It has ragged against profiteers and the high cost of living, but has done nothing to check the one nor decrease the other.

We condemn the failure of the present congress to respond to the often-repeated demands of the president and secretary of the treasury to revise the existing tax laws. The continuance in peace times of taxes hastily devised under the pressure of imperative necessity to produce revenue for war purposes is indispensable and can only result in lasting injury to the whole people and the throttle of our economic life. The republican congress has persistently failed through political cowardice to make a forward step toward a readjustment of tax laws, which is denounced before the last election and is now afraid to revise before the next election.

With equal suffrage for our women by provision of federal constitution, we recommend the timely action of the Texas legislature in ratifying such provision, and we welcome the women of Texas to partial suffrage rights under state laws, and look with confidence to the day near at hand when women, alongside of men, shall exercise all of the duties and privileges of citizenship.

By constitutional amendments, state and national, the manufacture and sale of alcohol as a beverage, in any quality or kind, is prohibited. We favor existing or any additional necessary laws, civil and criminal, to carry out the will of the people thus expressed and the enforcement thereof, without fear or favor.

Our delegates to the national democratic convention at San Francisco are instructed to vote as a unit against any platform, plank or candidate favoring violation or nullification, either in spirit or letter, of our constitutional provisions by authorizing the sale of beer and light wines, or otherwise.

The magnificent record of our soldiers and sailors in the great world war has reflected glory and honor upon our flag and people, placed our country in the forefront of the nations of the earth and transplanted the seeds of American ideals into every land.

A grateful nation should care for its wounded, disabled and incapacitated heroes with generous care and aid its able-bodied defenders in every proper way, especially by opportunities to acquire homes.

The democratic party stands for clean politics and fair elections. We heartily indorse the pending investigation by the United States senate of campaign expenditures by candidates for the presidency. We further favor a speedy enactment of additional legislation that shall minimize the power of money in all elections.

We favor creating a state tribunal, clothed with ample power, whose general duties shall be hereafter to investigate and make reports to each succeeding legislature of contributions and disbursements in all state elections, either on issues or the selection of candidates.

We heartily indorse the administration of Governor William P. Hobby, because of his fidelity to platform pledges, his loyalty to good government and its support of the nation during the world war.

The delegates to the San Francisco democratic convention from Texas are instructed to vote as a unit upon all questions coming before the convention.

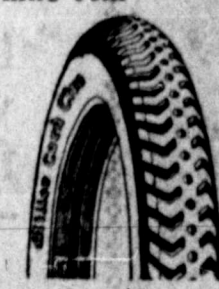

OUTLOOK BEST IN YEARS.

San Angelo, Texas, May 23.—West Texas was thoroughly soaked Saturday and Sunday night by a slow rain that was still falling Sunday morning. At Mertzon, Barnhart, Big Lake, Ozona, Juno Comstock, Rock Springs, Carlsbad, Bronte, Robert Lee, Ballinger, Rowena, Miles, Christoval, Eldorado and other points almost three-quarters of an inch was received.

All moisture has soaked into the ground and insures fine summer range for livestock and excellent conditions for planting crops.

Only a week ago similar good rains fell and the outlook in West Texas is now the best perhaps in history.

The rains from 7 to 10 inches general all over West Texas and even upon the Plains. In the small grain sections the crop is estimated 80 per cent perfect. Farmers are working 16 hours a day getting the crop planted and it is estimated that by Saturday night 75 per cent of this county will be planted. There will be an increased acreage in cotton this year and Mitchell county expects a 35,000-bale crop for 1920. Two-thirds of the planted crop is now up to a good stand. Nobody has been in town this week and if the rain will stay off another week the Mitchell county crop and prospects will be 100 per cent perfect. Everybody is planning for a big future, the merchants report increased business over last year for the same month.

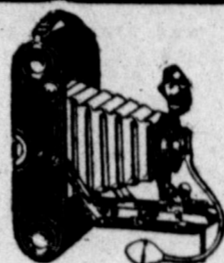
ANOTHER REASON.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION CLOSES

LARGEST RELIGIOUS ASSEMBLY IN COUNTRY PLANS FUTURE PROGRAM.

The seventy-fifth annual session of the Southern Baptist Convention, which has just recently closed in Washington, D. C., was marked by an attendance of over ten thousand, and was declared to be the most remarkable session of the convention in its history. Union Plaza of Washington has not been so crowded since war days as it was when the hosts of Southern Baptists bore down upon the gates of Liberty Hut, the Billy Sunday tabernacle, where the sessions of the convention were held. The attendance was so great that as many as three simultaneous overflow meetings were being held in different auditoriums of the city, Liberty Hut not being able to handle half the crowds. Texas, though on the Western outskirts of the convention territory, was represented by more than 1,000 delegates.

Texas Man Re-Elected President. Dr. J. B. Gambrell of Fort Worth, Texas, was reelected for the fourth consecutive year as president of the body, thus breaking a twenty-year precedent that no person shall serve the convention as president more than three years. His election is regarded as significant as indicating that Southern Baptists have not changed in their attitude respecting the Inter-church World Movement in declining to enter the movement. Dr. Gambrell has been the spokesman for the denomination in expressions concerning the Inter-church World Movement, and his re-election is recognition of his continued leadership among Southern Baptists.

Convention Addressed By Vice-President Marshall.

Vice-President of the United States, Thomas R. Marshall, in an address of welcome to the Baptists on behalf of the Government, pleaded for the fuller acceptance of Jesus Christ in the minds and hearts of individual men and women, and added that it was his conviction that peace would never come to the world unless founded upon the teachings and principles of the lowly Nazarene. In his address Mr. Marshall paid his respects to churches that had forgotten to preach the gospel and were trying to reform society by dabbling in politics and trying to reform the government. He declared that the true churches were the anchors of safety for the nation.

Letter From President Read. During the proceedings of the Convention the following letter from President Wilson was read:

THE WHITE HOUSE
Washington, May 12, 1929.

My Dear Dr. Tupper:
It is a matter of genuine and very deep regret on my part that I cannot personally greet the members of the Southern Baptist Convention now gathering to hold the Diamond Anniversary Convention in this city. It would be a great pleasure to me, if I could meet the members personally and express my deep concern in all the great interests which they represent. It is of special significance and timeliness that a great Christian Convention should be held in Washington, because the nation now faces nothing less than the question whether it is to help Christian people in other parts of the world to realize their ideals of justice and of ordered peace. And I am sure that the nation will listen with the greatest deference to the utterances of the Convention.

Cordially and sincerely yours,
WOODROW WILSON.

Final Report on 75 Million Campaign. Dr. R. L. Scarborough of Fort Worth, Texas, General Director of the Baptist 75 Million Campaign, made his final report on the results of the drive. The official figures reached a total of \$93,610,923. The expenses of the campaign for raising this huge sum were remarkably low, being less than three-fourths of one per cent. Following the report a committee, consisting of one member from each state, and headed by Dr. F. S. Groner, of Dallas, Texas, was appointed to make recommendations for the program during the next four years of the five-year campaign.

Truett Addresses 10,000 From Capital Steps.

The climax of the convention was reached in an address by Dr. Geo. W. Truett of Dallas, Texas, delivered from the steps of the east entrance of the Capitol, overlooking the spot where the presidential inaugurations are held. Dr. Truett spoke on Baptists and Civil and Religious Liberty to an audience estimated at ten thousand, which frequently cheered him during his references to the League of Nations and to President Wilson. "Standing in the shadow of the Senate Chamber," said Dr. Truett, "I declare that the moral forces of the country, without regard to political party, regard the delay on the League of Nations a national and world-wide tragedy. I can certify to men of all political parties that the moral forces of this country will not be silent until there is put forth a great league of nations that shall strive with all its might to put an end to the diabolism and horror of war. I thank God that that stricken man yonder in the White House pleaded and pleads yet that the Nation will take its part with others in bringing a new era wherein shall dwell righteousness and peace." In his address Dr. Truett recounted the fight Baptists have made and won for civil and religious liberty in America. "With the intelligent Baptist," declared the speaker, "religion is forever voluntary uncoerced, dictated by no power, civil or ecclesiastical."

Will Establish Hospital in New Orleans.

Following a report on hospitals and sanitariums, which was prepared and read by Dr. F. S. Groner, the general secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Dallas, Texas, the convention voted to help establish a hospital in New Orleans to cost \$1,500,000. Chattanooga, Tenn., was selected as the place for the convention next year. Dr. H. L. Winburn of Arkansas, will preach the convention sermon.

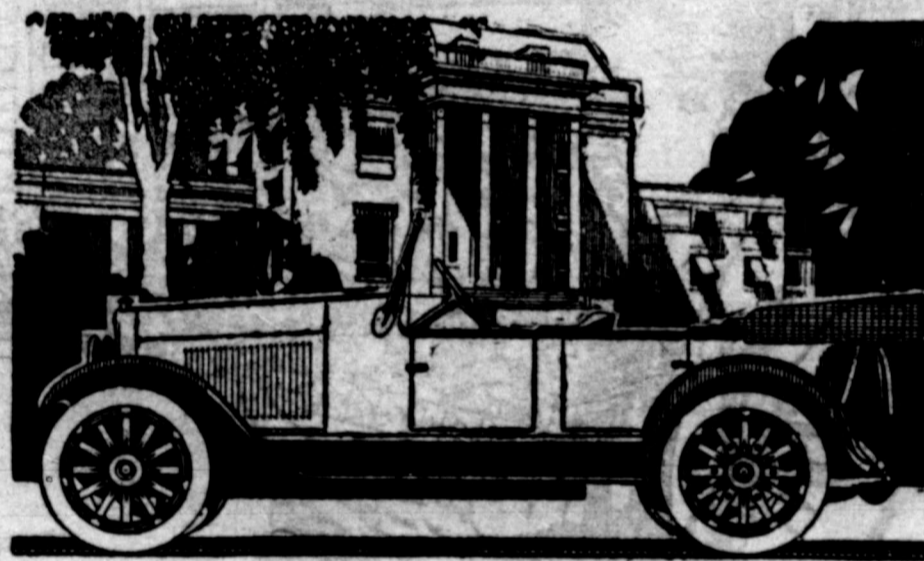
