PAT NEFF'S SPEECH AT ABILENE

A FEW EXTRACTS FROM THIS GREAT SPEECH.

Much Extravagance in Texas Government and Promises if Elected to Cut Down Expenses.

The Record is for Pat Neff for Governor of Texas, first, last and all the time. And we ask every one of our readers to read the following extracts of his speech carefully. We have known Pat Neff personally for twenty-five years, and we can assure you that he is honest in what he says and means every word of it. When he says he will do a thing he will do it if it be in his power. Read the following:

One of the most forceful political speeches ever delivered in this section by a candidate for governor of Texas was heard Friday night at Abilene, when Pat M. Neff of Waco brought his candidacy before the people of this section.

The speaking was presided over by President J. D. Sandefer of Simmons College, who introduced Judge J. M. Wagstaff, who in turn introduced the speaker of the evening. Judge Wagstaff said: "Pat M. Neff was speaker of the lower house of the 28th legislature which was only a short time ago, and I want to tell you the speaker of the house has more to do with the economy of the government than any other ten men in the house. While speaker of the house he succeeded in holding the expenses of the government of this state down to \$6,000,000, while one of his opponents in the same position succeeded in keeping the appropriations down to a figure slightly under \$40,000,000. The expenditures of the state government is something appalling. I have examined the records of Mr. Neff both in the house and as a citizen, and can assure you that he can give you an honest and economical government."

Mr. Neff, being introduced, said in part:

"Deeply grateful am I for the kind words of presentation. There are four states in this Union that are destined to be the centers of the United States. One is Illinois, bordering on the broad expanse of the great lakes. One is the state of New York, the outlet to Europe. One is the state of California, which opens its gates to Asia, and the one that is biggest and better than them all is Texas, facing 500 miles on the Gulf, a highway to South America and a feeder to both the Atlantic and Pacific oceans. The Creator never created a greater land than Texas nor endowed one with more.

"After travelling over the state in my campaign I have learned a great deal of the size of Texas. I have learned that it is larger than the whole of the German empire, that it is 212 times the size of Rhode Island and six times larger than New York state. Every man, woman and child in the world could move to Texas and each be given a nice lot to live on.

"I am a native of the black land section and am proud of my state. Viewing Texas as I have from various angles I have come to the conclusion that the man who occupies the governor's chair holds the second highest office beneath the American flag. Last July I announced myself for the office of Governor. I did not confer with anyone about it. I did not confer with any politicians in regard to my candidacy. I announced on my own responsibility and commenced taking my candidacy to the voters of Texas, as never before by any candidate for governor. I have filled eleven speaking dates in the Rio Grande section never before touched by a candidate for Governor of Texas. I have filled seven speaking dates west of the Pecos River never before canvassed by any candidate for Governor. I have spoken in 14 places south of San Antonio and as far as the Laredo section never before reached by any candidate for Governor. In Leon county, rather centrally located and in one place they told me that I was the first candidate for Governor that had spoken there since Sam Houston, 65 years ago. I have filled more than 80 speaking dates in places that never

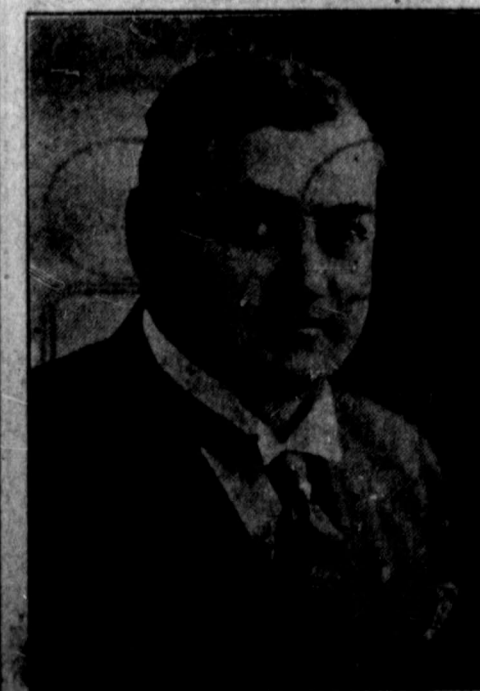

saw a candidate for governor before. "I am taking my candidacy to the people. I have no campaign manager. About all that a campaign manager does is to stand between the candidate and the people. I came to the opinion that if I did not have sense enough to manage my own campaign I did not have sense enough to be a candidate for governor.

"The other candidates have big headquarters. I was in Dallas some time ago and peeped into one of the headquarters which occupied a half of a floor of one of the big hotels of Dallas. The campaign manager makes promises to the select few and tells the governor of Texas what he has to do after he has become governor. The headquarters is the place where the slush fund is handled.

"When I become your governor next January I will go in the office with no fetters on my feet and with no muzzle on my mouth. I am trying if I can become Governor on my own merits and without a barrel of money rolling after me. I am trying to demonstrate to the boys that come after me, your boys, and some boys who may be at the foot of the ladder that they need not remain at the foot of the ladder of life.

"I will not discuss the prohibition question. Prohibition is written into the law of the land and every citizen bows to the law. I have always been a prohibitionist.

"I will not discuss woman suffrage. It is practically a settled question. The only thing that remains to be done is the passage of laws to perfect the woman suffrage law. I have always been in favor of woman suffrage.

"The question of education has always been of interest. Our forefathers wrote into the constitution that if the government did not provide for education it was an act that would be just cause for a revolution. There were 2,000 school houses shut in Texas all last season. There were 50,000 boys and girls in Texas last season who looked at the closed doors of a school house. There were 200,000 boys and girls in Texas last season who did not have access to a school worthy to be called a school. There are 500,000 school children in Texas with no high school facilities.

The United States Government graded the states of the Union recently and Texas stood close to the head of the list in wealth. Texas produced a billion dollar crop last year. She was the first state that ever produced a billion dollar crop. There are only two states in the Union ahead of Texas in population. And where does Texas stand in education? Does she stand third or fourth from the top? Texas stands 38th from the top in education—a state whose forefathers fought, bled and died for an educational system. I am a friend to education. The one thing that a government should guarantee is an education to all the boys and girls that they might more easily combat the battle of life.

"When I become governor of Texas, I promise to open every school house in Texas to the boys and girls and give them teachers with a salary commensurate with the task that they perform.

"There is one really big business in Texas. That is agriculture. When agriculture goes on the rocks Texas goes back. I am in favor of the government of Texas lending a helpful hand to work out a marketing system. "When you have some eggs or butter to sell you drop into a few stores and take what they offer. If any factory was to sell its output like a farmer sells his products it would go into the hands of bankruptcy in no time. I used to sell cotton right off the wagon. I'd drive onto the public square and the cotton buyer would climb up on my wagon and cut open my bale of cotton and pull out four or five pounds and tell me all about the grade, etc. He knew what grade my cotton was. He knew the price of my cotton, he knew everything about my cotton. I sat there and held the lines—you needn't laugh—you don't know any more about your cotton than I did.

"Texas has no marketing system. Last July I was in Dallas and wanted a piece of watermelon and dropped into a cafe and paid 30 cents for a little piece that wasn't more than a taste. The next day I was in Wood county and saw 72 loads of watermelons on the streets in one town and I could have bought all of the 72 loads for 30 cents.

There is no one thing that will do more for the marketing system and more for the schools of the state than good roads. I am for good roads.

"There are 132,000 acres of uncultivated land in Texas and a large part of this is tillable. There is one man (Continued on Page 4)

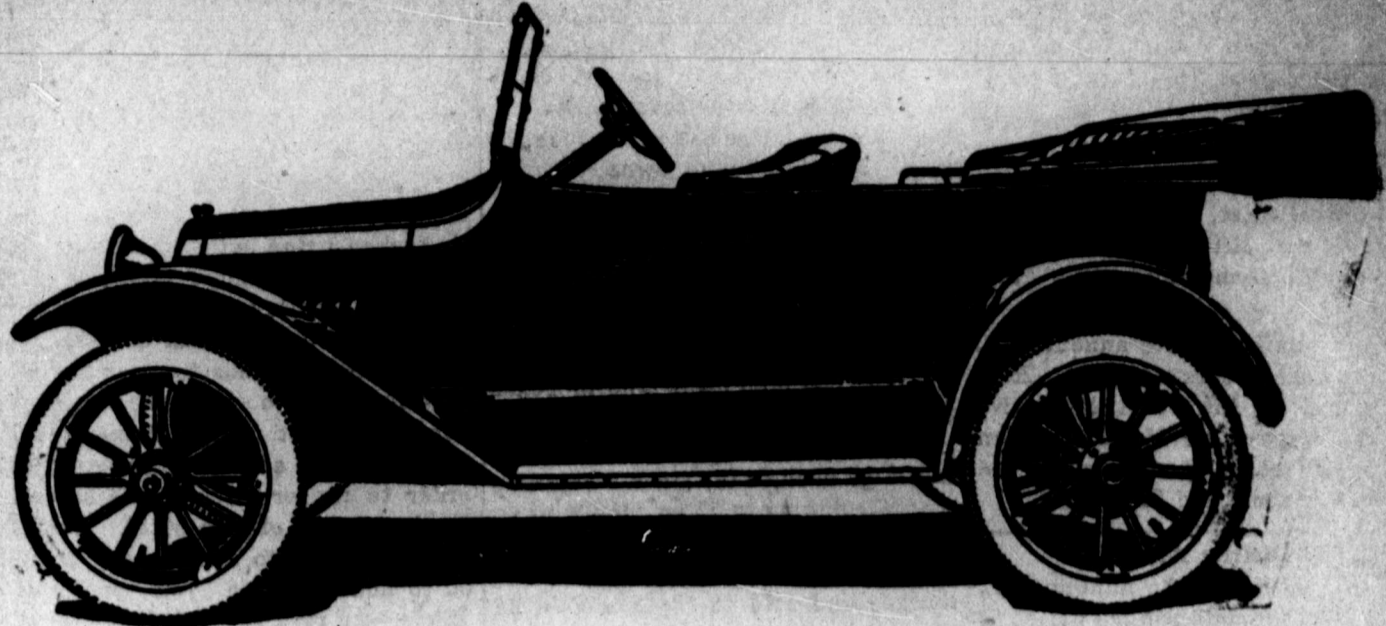

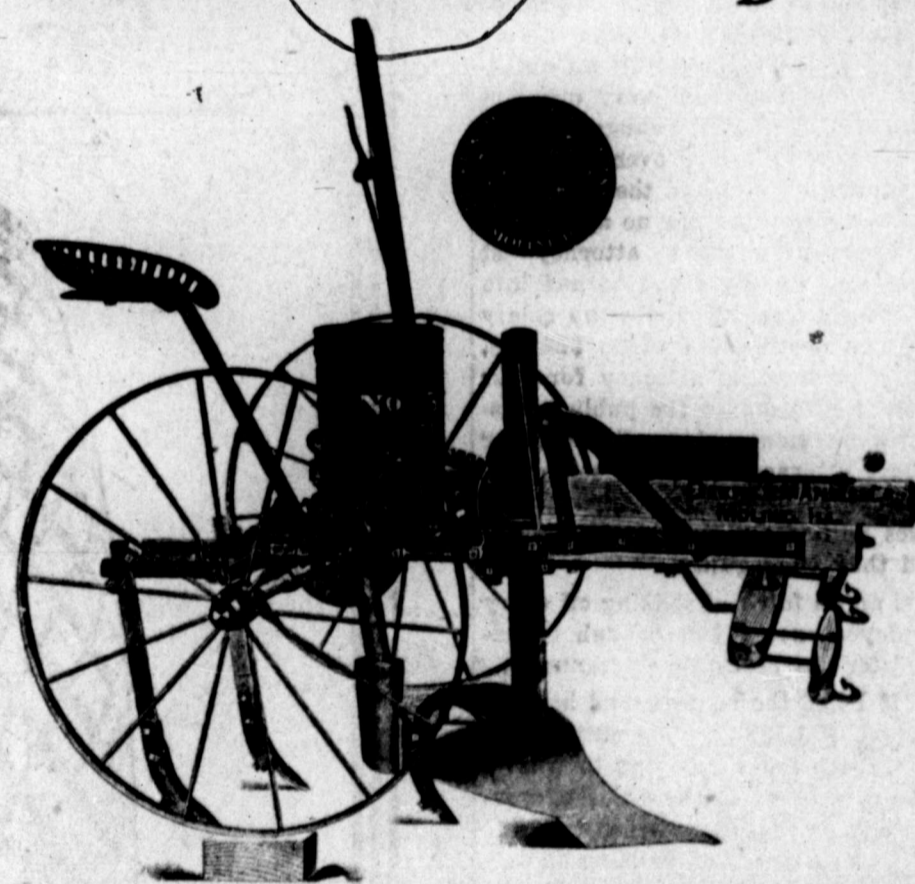

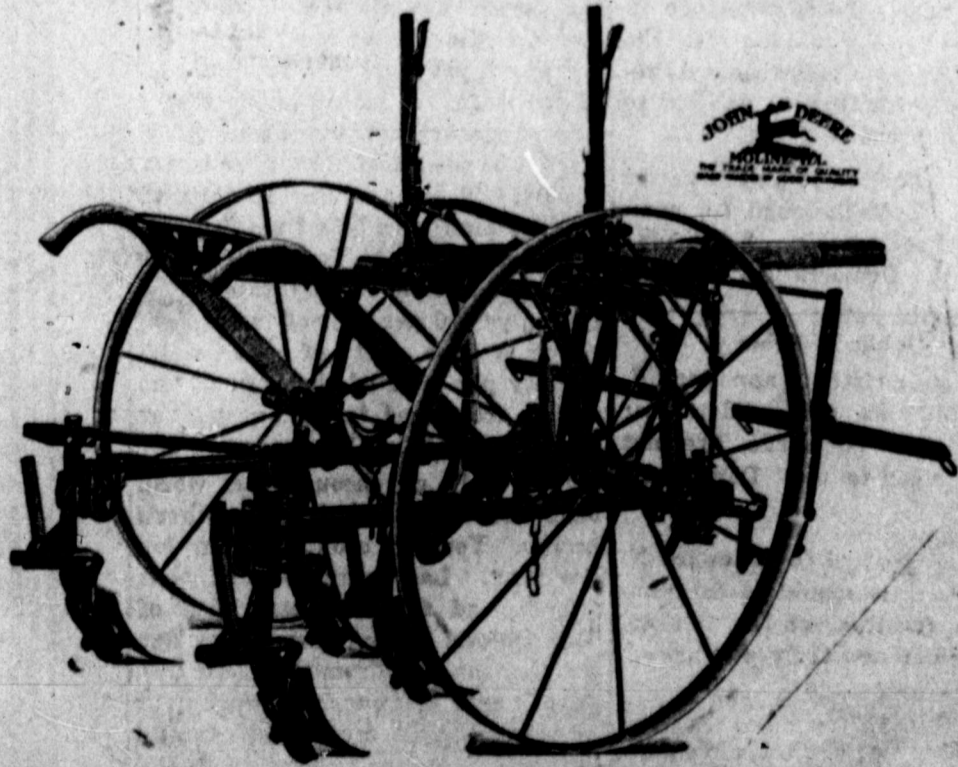

who is not a citizen of Texas and never has been, who owns 3,000,000 acres and a large part of this is tillable land and not one acre is in cultivation. The owner does not cultivate it, does not improve it, does not live on it, he just holds it for speculation. Another man owns enough land in Texas to make a state as large as Rhode Island and he does not cultivate it, but just holds it for speculation. There are 500,000 families in Texas who do not own any land in the state. I am in favor of a law that if a man owns land in Texas and is not a citizen of Texas, and if he don't sell the land in ten years it would go back to the state. The time should come when these men who do not live in Texas, and do not use the land, that it should be put on the market and sold to the home loving people of the state. I am in favor of increasing the home owners and decreasing the tenants. I am in favor of loaning money to the people so that they can buy land. I'm not in favor of giving the people anything. Every man should work for a living and earn what he gets. But I am in favor of lending the state's money on long time and at low interest in order to help the people own their farms.

"The constitution says there shall be a uniform and systematic form of taxation. We have no taxation system in Texas. There are some counties in Texas that do not contribute one dollar to the running expenses of the government. There are 21 counties in Texas that not only get back all the money that they pay into the state treasury, but get in addition to that \$788,000.

"The landowners of Texas pay 61 per cent of the expenses of the government and do not own half of the property. I know the strong arm of the Texas government is able to make every piece of property bear its pro rata part of the expenses. Your government for the last few years has been extravagantly administered. Your money goes for hired hands. How many hired hands do you have to run your government? You have on the pay rolls tonight at the last count, and they say they have added a hundred since the last count, 3845 employees, with a pay roll of \$5,000,000 a year.

"The different departments at Austin overlap each other so much that they can't tell where one begins and another ends.

"I have never held but two offices. I was one of three men of 164 members of the legislature who never missed a roll call during an entire session and voted on every question submitted. I was the youngest speaker who ever presided over the house of representatives and the first from whose ruling there was no appeal.

"I was prosecuting attorney at Waco for six years and turned into the public treasury above my salary and the expenses of office \$24,788. While prosecuting attorney for four years I turned into the public treasury more money than all the other county attorneys of Texas combined, during the same time trying 422 cases with conviction in all but 16, and they were guilty.

"I am in favor of striking off every employee except just enough to administer the Texas government.

"If I had the courage and honesty to save \$24,788 just by cutting expenses, it's not a patching to what I am going to do in the office of governor in cutting down expenses.

"I am in favor of building factories in Texas. I can't understand why we send 3,000,000 bales of Texas cotton out of the state and then have the factories send the cloth back. Texas is the largest wool market in the world, yet there is not a wool mill in the state. A man told me that a suit of clothes contains about \$7.50 worth of wool and that it sells for \$75.00. If there is any stealing to be done along this line, I am in favor of it being done in Texas. Texas is the largest cattle raising state in the Union, yet 70 per cent of the slaughtering is done out of the state. Twenty per cent of the hogs of the nation are raised in Texas, yet our smoke house is in Chicago.

"We only go through this world once and every man is his brother's keeper. You owe a duty to your fellow man. Last year 5000 of your friends and fellow Texans died of Tuberculosis alone. Two years ago the National Government found that 34 per cent of your boys were unfit to bear arms on account of physical defects.

"The government of Texas protects the cows from the ticks. The government of Texas protects the hogs. The legislature is now in session to protect the cotton of the state. But what is Texas doing and what has she

done for the protection of your boys and girls? I stand for protection of the children, I think a human being is greater than a calf or a hog. When I become governor the squeal of a pig will never be heard above the cry of a child.

"Every hour I sit in the governor's chair I will have deeper concern for the children of Texas than for the white faced calves of the plains.

"I am going through this world just once. I have just a little ambition that when I step out of this world into the great beyond, I will have left the world a little better for something that I have done. I am not seeking the governor's office to wear a robe of power, not to walk the path of honor, and not to seek fame. If I know myself I seek to be governor in order to render an unselfish service to the people of this state. Bounded to this as I am to Texas and prompted to human action you people of Texas can rest assured that if you honor me with this office it will never dim the glory of the Lone Star. I will never be found working in timber too high to be seen, but will be working in the clear white light in the open prairie of your state. I promise I shall be honest for there are those in Texas who think me honest, I promise to be true, for there are those who think me true, I promise to be strong, I promise to be brave, I shall serve and forget the rich and poor, shall be humble, I will look forward and not backward, up and not down, out and not in. I will laugh and love and live as your governor.

"The growth of weeds and mesquite and cat-claw and other like brush on any premises in or on any street or alley in this city is declared a nuisance, injurious to the health and comfort of the inhabitants of the city, and the owner or person in control or possession of any premises in this city, or using or occupying same is hereby required to keep such weeds cut down and burned, and such mesquite and cat-claw and other like brush dug up, and burned or removed from such premises, and from that portion of any street or alley upon which such premises may be situated, between the line separating such street or alley from said premises and a line extending along the middle of such street or alley and lengthwise with the same; and each day that said weeds or other growth herein specified shall be allowed to remain on such premises or in such street or alley, shall be a separate offense.

Penalty for the failure to carry out the above mentioned ordinance, is punishable upon conviction, of a fine of \$100.00, and each day thereafter. You are given until July 1, 1920, to fully comply with the above notice.

The City Marshal is hereby ordered to see that this ordinance is carried out, and to report any person who does not comply with same.

It has been held by the Courts that tenants occupying rent houses must cut the weeds on said lots. All citizens are asked to help the officers to carry out this law for the protection of our homes from fire.

PROHIBITION AMENDMENT HELD TO BE VALID

Washington, June 7.—Both the Federal prohibition amendment and the enforcement act passed by Congress were held constitutional today by the Supreme Court.

The court dismissed petitions filed by the State of Rhode Island to have Federal officials enjoined from enforcing prohibition in that state.

The court also dismissed injunction proceedings brought by the state of New Jersey to prevent enforcement of prohibition within the state.

The court dissolved injunctions from Manitowac Products Co., of Wisconsin, and of St. Louis Brewing Association, and by the Kentucky Distillers and Warehouse Co., of Louisville.

Also the laws to enforce prohibition were held to be valid and constitutional. This was a sweeping victory for the pros.

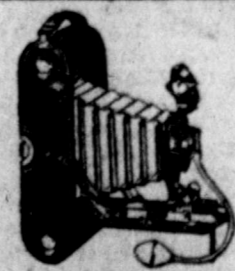

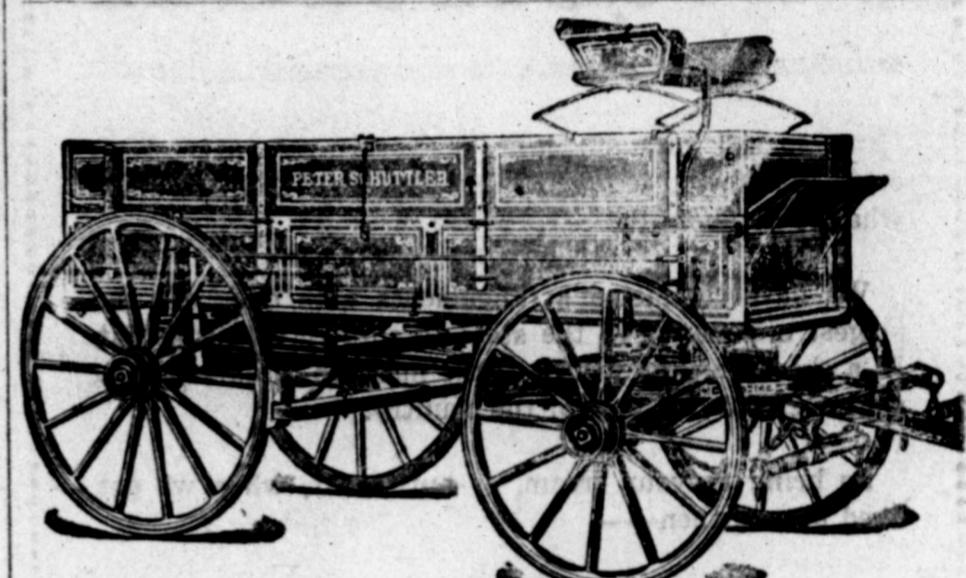

HICKS FORECAST FOR JUNE.

The second storm period of June, runs through the 9th, 10th and 11th. Major storm causes are almost entirely absent from this period. We see nothing at this distance to indicate more than normal June weather for this period. Thunder storms are quite likely, with more or less sheet lightning, as befits the summer solstice season.

The third storm period, regular, runs through the 14th to the 17th, inclusive. Thermal and barometric changes will appear in the west by the 14th, indicating storm conditions. Low areas will start eastward, accompanied by cloudiness, locally, continuing a day or two in most sections and longer in some parts. Some severe storms need not surprise readers of these forecasts. Indications for seismic disturbances center on the 16th, and if quakes do not relieve the strain, tornadoic or hurricane phenomena will be almost certain for some sections.

The fourth storm period, reactionary, runs from the 20th to the 22nd inclusive. The first indications of storminess will appear in the west about the 20th, passing eastward regularly and reaching Atlantic regions about the 22nd or 23rd. We see no indications of anything more for this period than normal summer storms, as low areas pass eastward.

The fifth storm period for June is regular, running from the 25th to the 28th, inclusive. This period will be one during which cloudiness, foginess and rain drizzles will be prominent where real storm conditions develop. We do not see cause for expecting anything unusual for summer storms, except it be here and there a hard "blow," followed by the rising of black cloud banks in the west.

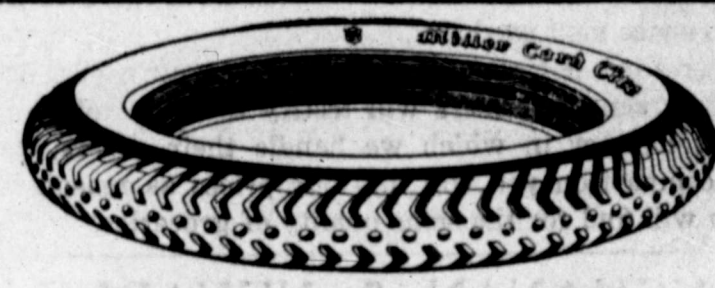

IT IS BADLY NEEDED.

The Colorado Sanitarium which was opened a few weeks ago has been running to its full capacity. It was opened with provision and accommodation for only four patients. Last week it was necessary to provide for eleven patients. More rooms were provided and equipped and all patients comfortably cared for, and we are assured that it will be enlarged and equipped from time to time as the demand arises.

From the view point of the Record the greatest handicap and inconvenience in connection with the success of the newly launched institution is the road—better say lack of road—from the Moeser old place to the Sanitarium; and this is the only way it can possibly be reached. The Record believes that both the town and county appreciates the efforts put forth by the promoter of this sanitarium commensurate with the good to the community it bids fair to do. We believe that the town and county could jointly provide some means for working and improving this little stretch of road, and thus make the place more easily accessible in automobiles. As it is at the present time it is not only very rough and trying to passengers and cars, but no less than dangerous unless automobiles be driven by adept chauffeurs.

As we understand it the sanitarium is open for all Doctors' patients needing hospital nursing and care. And so far as we are informed every doctor in the county is anxious to see the hospital be maintained and prosper. Therefore we believe the entire citizenship of town and county, regardless of one's choice in physicians, is interested in seeing the sanitarium live long and do well.

A suitable hospital in Colorado for

carrying for the sick and taking care of the surgical cases means more than merely having the sick ones at home and among friends. It means less expense to those who would necessarily, otherwise, have to go away. It means the expense of the cases, in dollars and cents, being spent at home. The sanitarium fees paid here go to nurses and other up keeps. These nurses, employes and owners, must buy dry goods, groceries, etc—a part goes to the laundry, a part to the grocer, a part to the milk men, a part to the scrub woman, a part to the drug store and so on, on the other hand were the patient to go elsewhere, none of the expenses would return to Colorado.

The Record believes that the Hon. Commissioners' Court and the Hon. City Council could justly represent the interest of the people of the county and town in making a better road over the hill to this sanitarium. It would cost but very little in comparison with the enormous good it would be to the ones driving over the road, going and coming, visiting their friends at the hospital.

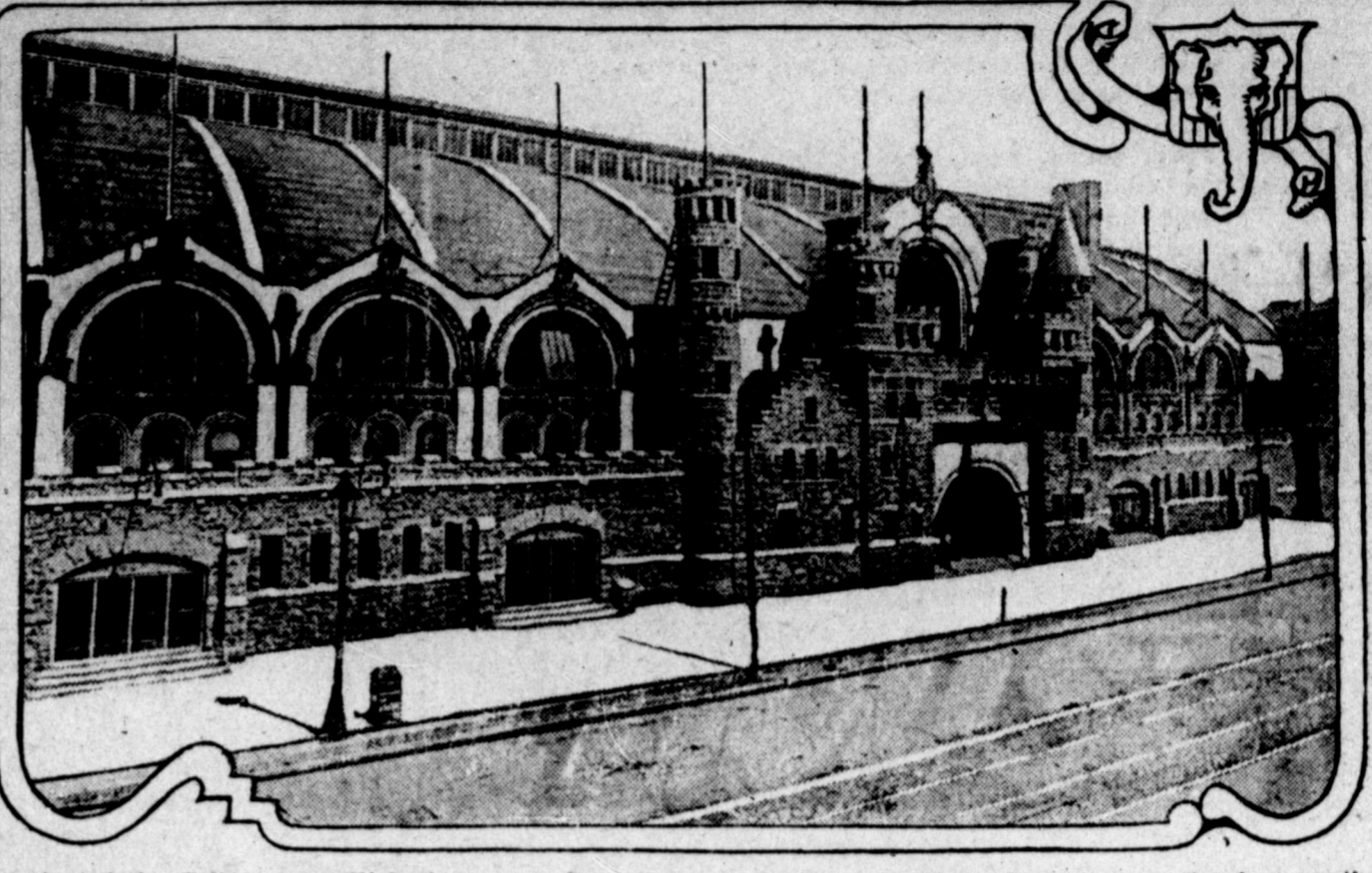

noon, heard the keynote address of Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, temporary chairman, appointed committees on rules, permanent organization, resolutions and credentials, and adjourned.

Evidences of Republican harmony as regards general policies, with a shrill cry to "turn the Democrats out," were the outstanding features of the demonstrations in the brilliant first session of the Republican party convention, starting at 11:34 o'clock today, and continuing until 1:38, when it adjourned until 11:00 o'clock Wednesday morning.

Henry Cabot Lodge, the studious Senator from Massachusetts, was the rallying host of the delegates, and with all the dramatic force he could summon he sent up the battery of the 1920 national campaign.

Lodge's keynote speech was heartily received by the delegates, not with wide demonstrations, but with sound approval between long times of silent listening.

His scathing sarcasm in reference to President Wilson's foreign policies brought forth laughter and some hooting.

At five different points he return-

ed to Wilson and his declaration that "even Presidents of the United States must obey the law," was rendered in ringing terms, for, by this time, the speaker had determined that he had found full sympathy in the audience. Criticism of Wilson loomed big in the coming campaign. Lodge's speech showed as plainly as if he put the statement in words that the Republicans have decided on a campaign of great big interest.

Will Hays, chairman of the nation-

al committee received one of the greatest demonstrations of the day when he swung his gavel and called the convention to order. He was cheered for several minutes.

HERBERT HOOVER



Chicago, June 9.—The second session of the Republican convention got under way today with no startling changes in the standing of the three leading candidates, but with several new developments which may tend to show the way the political winds are blowing.

The most significant of these was the combination of the forces of Gen. Leonard Wood and Senator Johnson in the committee on credentials.

This combination succeeded in electing a Wood chairman of the committee and it also upset the action of the full National Committee and resented several Wood delegates who had been ousted by the full committee. Instances where the judgment of the National Committee has been disregarded have been very rare.

General Wood is expected to poll on the first ballot upward of 300 votes. Senator Johnson will get, it is conceded, approximately 200. Only 493 votes are necessary to nominate. Senator Lodge who was made permanent chairman today is a compromise between two elements. He has Wood leanings but is opposed to the nomination of Lowden.

The greatest burst of applause which the convention gave Senator Lodge in his keynote speech was when he said that a considerable number of republicans were of the opinion that the U. S. should turn down the league and all its works.

HOW EUROPE CAN ESCAPE COLLAPSE?

"We Must Aid By Extending Credits," Says Davison.

"GRAVE MENACE TO U. S. A."

"European Plague Would Involve America—Starvation and Disease Rampant."

Des Moines, Ia.—Speaking before the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Henry P. Davison, chairman of the board of governors of the League of Red Cross societies, said:

As chairman of the convention of Red Cross societies, composed of representatives of twenty seven nations that met recently in Geneva, I am custodian of authoritative reports recording appalling conditions among millions of people living in eastern Europe.

One of the most terrible tragedies in the history of the human race is being enacted within the broad belt of territory lying between the Baltic and the Black and Adriatic seas.

This area includes the New Baltic states—Poland, Czechoslovakia, the Ukraine, Austria, Hungary, Roumania, Montenegro, Albania and Serbia.

The reports which come to us make it clear that in these war ravaged lands civilization has broken down. Disease, bereavement and suffering are present in practically every household, while food and clothing are insufficient to make life tolerable.

Men, women and children are dying by thousands, and over vast once-civilized areas there are to be found neither medicinal appliances nor medical skill sufficient to cope with the devastating plagues.

Wholesale starvation is threatened in Poland this summer unless she can

procure food supplies in large quantities. There are now approximately 250,000 cases of typhus in Poland and in the area occupied by Polish troops.

"Worst Typhus Epidemic in History"

This is already one of the worst typhus epidemics in the world's history. In Galicia whole towns are crippled and business suspended. In some districts there is but one doctor to each 150,000 people.

In the Ukraine, we were told, typhus and influenza have affected most of the population.

A report from Vienna, dated February 12, said: "There are rations for three weeks. Death stalks through the streets of Vienna and takes unhindered toll."

Budapest, according to our information, is one vast city of misery and suffering, the number of deaths is double that of births. Of the 160,000 children in the schools, 100,000 are dependent on public charity. There are 150,000 workers idle.

Typhus and smallpox have invaded the four countries composing Czechoslovakia, and there is lack of medicines, soap and physicians.

In Serbia, typhus has broken out again, and there are but 200 physicians to minister to the needs of that entire country.

In Montenegro, where food is running short, there are but five physicians for a population of 950,000.

Returning to the United States a few weeks ago with all these stories ringing in my ears I found myself once more in a land whose gradarities were overflowing, where health and plenty abounded and where life and activity and eager enterprise were in the full flood.

I asked myself: "What if this plague and famine were here in the great territory between the Atlantic seaboard and the Mississippi valley which fairly parallels the extent of these ravaged countries and that 65,000,000 of our own people condemned to idleness by lack of raw material and whose fields had been devastated by invasion and rapine were racked by starvation and pestilence and if we had lifted up our voices and invoked the attention of our brothers in happier Europe to our own deep miseries and our cries had fallen on deaf ears, would we not in our despair exclaim against their heartlessness?"

"Only Three Ways to Help Europe."

There are three ways by which these stricken lands can secure supplies from the outside world. One is by payment, one by credit, and the third is by exchange of commodities. If these peoples tried to buy materials and supplies in America at the present market value of their currencies, Austria would have to pay forty times the original cost, Germany thirteen times, Greece just double, Czechoslovakia fourteen times and Poland fifty times. These figures are official and are a true index of the economic plight of these countries.

It is clear, therefore, that they cannot give us gold for the things they must have nor have they either products or securities to offer in return for credit. If only they could obtain raw material which these idle millions of people could convert into manufactured products they would have something to tender the world in return for its raw material, food and medicine. But if they have neither money nor credit, how are they to take this first step towards redemption?

One that the world may eat while the other half starves. How long do you believe the plague of typhus that is taking a hideous death toll in Estonia and Poland and the Ukraine and eating along the fringes of Germany and Czechoslovakia will consume itself to these remote lands?

Only last Saturday our health commissioner of New York, Dr. Copeland, called for the other side just to measure the danger and take precaution against such an invasion.

This is one menace at our threshold.

The other, more threatening, more terrible, is the menace of the world's ill will. We can afford to die, but to be despised forever as a greedy and pharisaical nation is a fate that we must not incur.

The French government has many serious problems to solve, but the French peasant is working and the French artisan, while still sadly in need of raw materials, has not lost his habit of industry and thrift. The most encouraging fact about France today is that her people are alive to the seriousness of France's problem and they are going forward bravely to solve that problem.

Italy, despite her great shortage of raw material, is looking forward and not backward. Italy can be relied upon to do her part.

England is meeting the problems of reconstruction just as those who know her past should have expected her to meet them.

"Plan to Aid Central Europe."

It is not for me, perhaps, to give in detail a form for solution, for the world's ills, but as I have been asked many times, "what would you do?" I am glad to give my own answer. Accordingly, I would ask:

1. That congress immediately pass a bill appropriating a sum not to exceed \$500,000,000 for the use of central and eastern Europe.

2. That congress call upon the president to appoint a non-political commission of three Americans, distinguished for their character and executive ability, and commanding the respect of the American people. Such a commission should include men of the type of General Pershing, Mr. Hoover of ex-Secretary Lane. I would invest that commission with complete power.

3. I would have the commission instructed to proceed at once, accompanied by proper personnel, to survey conditions in Oriental and eastern Europe, and then act for the restoration of those countries under such conditions and upon such terms as the commission itself may decide to be practicable and effective. Among the conditions should be provided that there should be no local interference with the free and untrammelled exercise by the commission of its own prerogative of allocating materials. Governmental politics should be eliminated; unreasonable and prejudicial barriers between the various countries should be removed, and such substantial guarantees as may be available should be exacted in order that the conditions imposed should be fulfilled. As to financial terms, I should make them liberal. I would charge no interest for the first three years; for the next three years, 6 per cent, with provision that such interest might be refunded if the economic conditions of the country were not approaching normal, or if its exchange conditions were so adverse as to make payment unduly burdensome. I should make the maturity of the obligation 15 years from its date, and I should have no doubt as to its final payment.

5. Immediately the plan was adopted I would have our government invite other governments in a position to assist to participate in the undertaking.

6. To set forth, in my opinion, I should add that in the final instruction the American people through their government, should say to the commission:

"We want you to go and do this job in such a manner as, after study, you think it should be done. This is no ordinary undertaking. The American people trust you to see that it is done right."

"I would also say to the commission: 'Use so much of this money as is needed.' Personally, I am confident that with the assistance and cooperation which would come from other parts of the world the sum of \$500,000,000 from the United States would be more than enough to start these countries on their way to self-support and the restoration of normal conditions."

The whole plan, of course, involves many practical considerations, the most serious of which is that of obtaining the money, whether by issuing additional Liberty bonds, an increase in the floating debt or by taxation. But I think we could properly say to the treasury department:

"We know how serious financial problems are. We know the difficulties which are immediately confronting you; we know the importance of deflation and we know that the government must economize and that individuals must economize, but we also know that the American government advanced \$10,000,000,000 to its allies to attain victory and peace. Certainly it is worth making the additional advance in order to realize the peace for which we have already struggled, for nothing is more certain than that until normal conditions are restored in Europe there can be no peace."

Above all things, I would say that whatever action is taken should be taken immediately. The crisis is so acute that the situation does not admit of delay, except with the probability of consequences one hardly dares contemplate.

The situation that I have spread out here is far beyond the scope of individual charity. Only by the action of governments, our own and others whose resources enable them to cooperate, can aid be given in sufficient volume. I am also confident that our action would be followed by the governments of Great Britain, of Holland, of the Scandinavian countries, of Spain and Japan, and that France and Belgium and Italy, notwithstanding all of their losses, would help to the best of their ability.

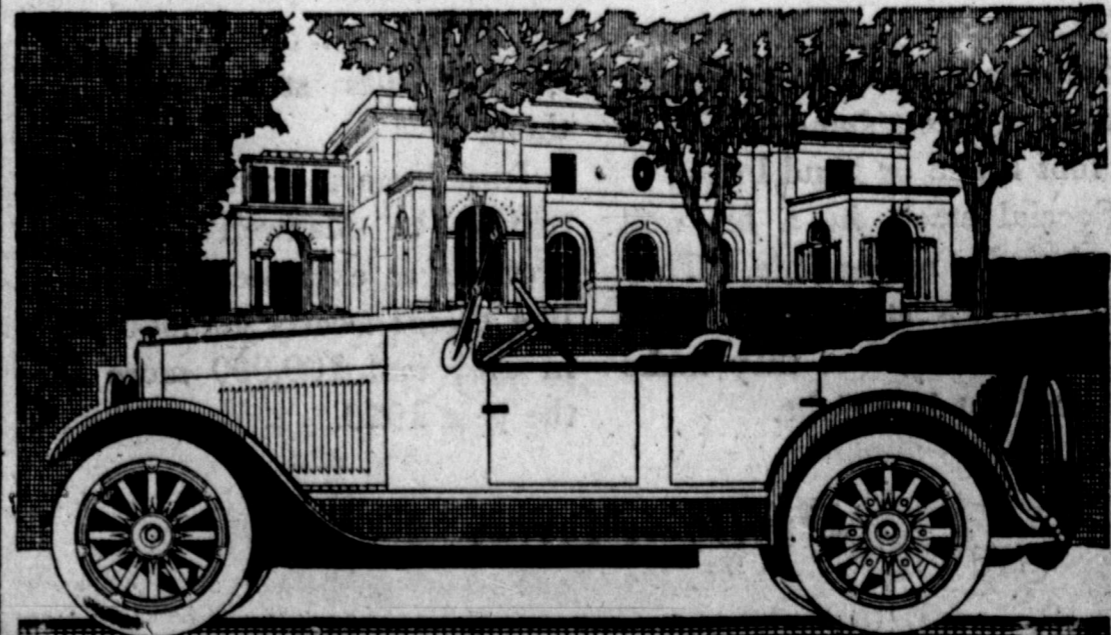
