## Oil In Mitchell Co. Struck the Golden Flood

Underwriters No. One Stuck  
"Pay" at 2410 Feet.

SIXTY-FIVE FEET OF RICH PRODUCING  
OIL SAND AND STILL GOING GOOD

Estimated 1000 to 2000 Barrels

BAILING 25 TO 30 BARRELS PER DAY  
FOR FUEL --- WILL SHOOT WELL  
IN A FEW DAYS.

The Underwriters Producing and Refining Company's Texas & Pacific No. 1, under the management of Steve S. Owen, the well known Oklahoma and Texas operator, struck "pay dirt" in the deep test ten miles west of Colorado.

Last week we had an announcement that a showing of oil had been found in the Underwriters No. 1 well, northwest of Westbrook in Mitchell county. The Record is glad to say, that this was not a mistake; but that oil in paying quantities, has actually been discovered. Of course it is as yet, impossible to tell as to the ultimate production of this well, but it is universally believed by experienced oil men—men who know—that it is going to be a good producer.

Wednesday morning this well was 2410 feet deep and more than 65 feet of this was in producing sand. The drill is still in the "production" and it is claimed the deeper they go the better it gets. This producing sand is much thicker than in most producing wells, and is said to be a thicker and more prolific than many of the wells in the Eastland field, and much finer than the Burkburnett field.

In talking with Superintendent Adams, who is an old hand at the game, we learned that they were now bailing from 25 to 30 barrels per day for fuel; that the drilling was carried on only in day time; and that drilling would continue until the producing sand was penetrated, after which the well would be shot with a heavy charge of nitro-glycerine. From all indications, and comparisons with other wells, it is estimated that after shooting and cleaning out it will easily produce 1000 barrels per day, and not improbably 2000 barrels. It is claimed that they now have a paying well, were it to be put on the pump, but the drillers say there is an abundant supply of oil in the formation in which they are now drilling, and that they are going to get it.

It is expected that they will get through the producing sand at any minute, and as soon as they do the well will be shot. Arrangements have already been made for the "soup" to come from Eastland.

One of the largest producing oil companies in the state has had this oil analyzed, and pronounce it with a paraffine base and 38 per cent gasoline, which makes it above the average as to quality. This statement is authentic, and can be relied upon.

The Record and the citizens of Colorado have always been very conservative in their statements in regard to the oil situation, but now that we have the golden flood at our door, we want the world to know it. Not a statement is made in this article, nor will there be one made by this paper, that can not be substantiated by men on the ground.

The opening up of this well will mean hundreds of new drilling contracts for Mitchell county, in fact rumors of a number of trades are thick, and in thirty days old Mitchell will be dotted with oil derricks, and the sound of the drill will be heard thru-out the land.

The daily papers all over the United States, will, today, carry the announcement of this discovery, and in less than thirty days Colorado expects to have a population of ten to twenty thousand.

Excitement is running very high with local people, and "lease hounds" are arriving on every train. While the prices on leases are steadily climbing, they are not considered high, compared to the outlook and prospects for a rich oil field.

A strong movement in real estate both at Colorado and Westbrook has already set in, and we predict a wonderful advance in values, not only in oil lands, but all business and resident property will be in demand at "any old price."

The Travellers Company, on Landers ranch, southeast of town are now drilling around 500 feet, and going smoothly and rapidly ahead. They have been handicapped by a caving formation, and a fishing job or two, but are now making good time.

Mayor C. M. Adams has just returned from the McDowell well in Howard county, and he reports it as a twin brother to the Underwriters in this county; that they are in about the same strata but the production is hardly so good as in the Mitchell county field. He says they are preparing to shoot the McDowell well within the next few days.

Never in the history of the West has the prospects for a bumper crop been more flattering than they are today. Already the plains country is harvesting a big crop of small grain.

In Mitchell county the cotton and feed crops are said to be 85 per cent perfect. Cotton men are putting the county's crop for 1920-21 at 40,000 bales, unless some kind of storm or calamity should come.

The increase of acreage in cotton in this county is placed at 30 per cent over last year. Not so much feed has been planted as was the case last year—some farmers not having planted any. Quite a bit of new land has been put in, and where farmers had land lying idle heretofore, they have now planted to cotton.

While the plant is young yet, it has a rich and healthy color and is growing very rapidly. The severe sandstorm of last Thursday evening did considerable damage to some of the more exposed crops, but not so badly as was at first reported. Where the cotton was on the ridge or had just been cleaned of weeds, it was badly burned, and in some instances was replanted, especially in patches. But where it was in the furrow, and especially where protected by weeds, it was not damaged.

The weeds are much more abundant this year than usual, and the shortage and high price of labor, are going to be a handicap to the farmer, especially where he has more crop than his family can handle.

Chopping is in full blast all over the county, and under the circumstances crops are fairly clean.

Taken as a whole Mitchell county promises to have the biggest crop of her history.

Dulin was elected Temporary Chairman. Report of the Secretary, A. C. Gist, was read and approved. A balance of \$87.68 was on hand from pooling and selling cotton.

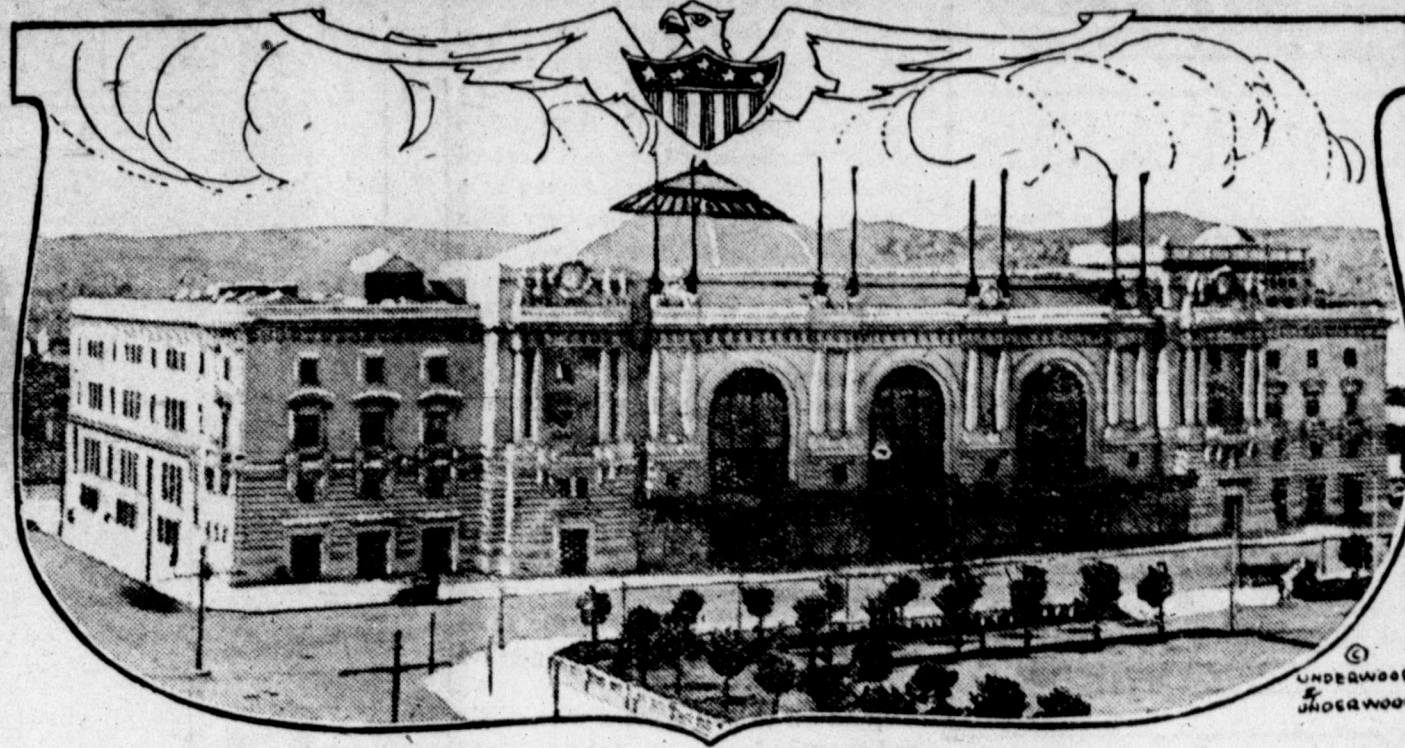

#### THE BEST THEY COULD DO.

Such a judgment as seems to be implied by the popular reception of Mr. Harding's nomination is not flattering to the gentlemen who brought it about. And yet the likelihood is they are not disappointed, nor convinced that they used their power unwisely. Their wisdom is to be tested by their opportunity, and their opportunity did not make a much better nomination possible. They would not have done better to name Senator Johnson: His nomination would have excited more enthusiasm, but it would have excited even more resentment. The nomination of either General Wood or Governor Lowden had been made imprudent by the disclosures respecting their campaign expenditures. They could have drafted Judge Hughes, but they would have had no assurance that he would not be deserted in California as he was four years ago. There was Mr. Hoover in the background. The nomination of Hoover would have excited enthusiasm, but a large part of it would have been outside the party; inside it would have provoked resentment. Besides his nomination would have nullified the pledge which the platform gave as a peace offering to Senator Johnson and those thirteen others Republican Senators. The nomination of Mr. Hoover would have by implication committed the party to the ratification of the peace treaty. The Republican party did not want to make that committal. Whatever the defects of Mr. Harding as a nominee, he suited the exigencies that had to be satisfied better than any one else who was available.

"The Democrats will escape the embarrassment of entering the campaign on the defensive, which is the natural and usual handicap of the party that has been in control of the government, if the San Francisco convention, in making its platform and nomination, adopt the strategy sketched by the president in the interview given to the N. Y. World. The President's statement, in tone and text, is aggressive to the last degree. Instead of defending himself against the assaults which Republican orators and platform speakers have made on him and his administration, the President seizes on them as an attempt to divert the mind of the country from the consideration of certain aspects of their performance at Chicago. What it is that he thinks they most wish to conceal, the President makes very clear. He reads their declaration on the subject of the League of Nations, not as an insistence on the Lodge reservations as safeguarding qualifications on the membership of the United States, but as the revelation of a fixed purpose on the part of the party's dominating minds to keep the United States out of it, and to wreck what has been accomplished. Heretofore most Republican Senators and most Republican leaders outside of Congress, as notably Mr. Taft, Mr. Root and Judge Hughes, have protested that it was the earnest desire of themselves and their party to have the United States enter the League of Nations, and in accordance with that assurance they have defended the Lodge reservations as necessary to make its entrance both safe and effective. The President cites their platform as proof either that they have recanted that purpose or that they have deceived the country by professing that purpose without having had it. Dal-

THEY DON'T WANT MUCH.

After a stormy session the American Federation of Labor, in session at Montreal, endorsed the League of Nations without reservations. The Federation adjourned and Mr. Gompers and the executive council left for Washington to put into operation the program framed. The first move will be launched against the Democratic national convention to obtain incorporation of the federation's program in the party platform, which is as follows:

- Ratification of the peace treaty.
- Government ownership with democratic operation of railroads.
- Curb on profiteering and high cost of living.
- Jailing of food and clothing profiteers.
- Right to strike and abolition of compulsory arbitration and anti-strike legislation.
- Hands off in Mexico by the United States.
- Indorsement of the Irish Republic.
- Right of collective bargaining.
- Advances in wages wherever necessary to maintain the standard of living.
- Shorter work day if necessary to prevent unemployment.

SPECIAL SESSION ADJOURNS.

The third called session of the Thirty-Sixth Legislature, adjourned last week. Its labors were praised by the Governor in an oral message to the legislature through the committees which are always appointed to notify the executive that the session has come to an end. The governor said that a legislature is deserving of the highest commendation and gratitude which saves the cotton industry, which brings substantial aid to and saves the schools, and which comes to the rescue of and saves the cattle raisers of the state, he having referred to the perfection of the tick eradication law.

Every one of the primary purposes for which the Governor called this session were met. It enacted a pink bollworm law, it provided \$4,000,000 to aid the schools of the state to end the teacher shortage, and it provided \$1,000,000 to increase salaries and make improvements at the higher institutions of learning. These were the subjects included in the Governor's proclamation convening the sessions. Other notable additions included the gas pipe line bill and the tick eradication amendment.

That there were many other bills passed is evidenced by the fact that 310 bills were introduced during the session. A number were killed outright, quite a few expired on the calendar and scores were purely local measures, all of which were passed.

More than \$6,000,000 was appropriated by this special session. Of the cash appropriations the largest was \$4,000,000 to supplement the available school fund.

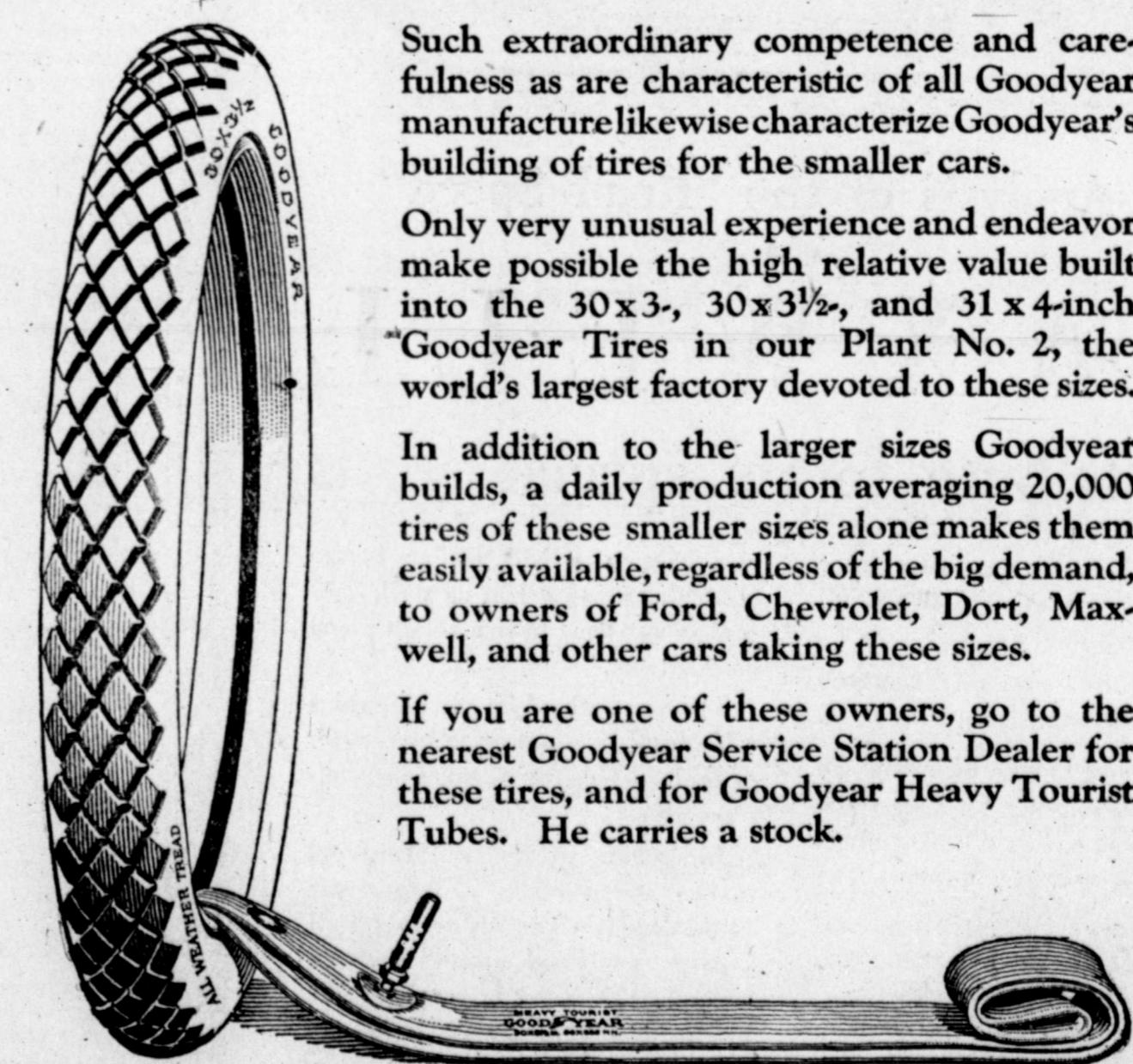

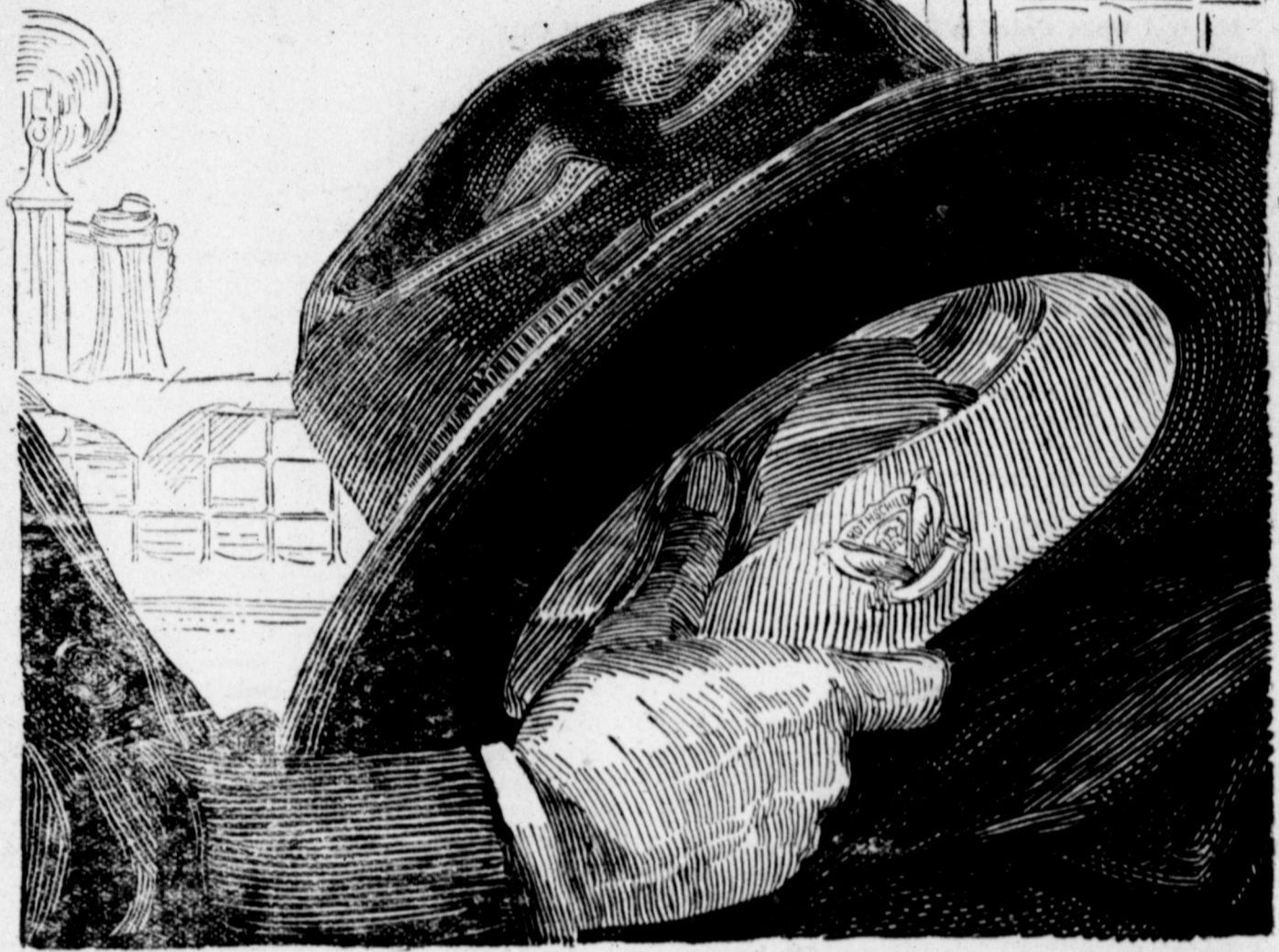
