CHAUTAUQUA TO COME NEXT MONTH

PROGRAM DEDICATED TO AMERICANISM AND PROMULGATION OF AMERICAN IDEALS

The Chautauqua at Colorado this season will be Friday, Saturday and Monday, September 17, 18 and 20, according to announcement made Tuesday by local citizens who negotiated with the Radcliffe Chautauqua System of Washington for the bill.

The program this year is dedicated to Americanism and the promulgation of American ideas and ideals. Various community problems will be taken up in the afternoons, while the lectures at night will deal with the citizenship from a National viewpoint. The Chautauqua director will be in charge of the program, upon which there will be a different speaker for each day accompanied by a splendid concert or entertainment organization. Two numbers of special interest have been included in this program.

Joe. H. Smoot, J. H. Greene and others of the guarantors who are bringing the Chautauqua to Colorado stated Tuesday that a meeting would be held soon at which time definite plans for placing tickets on sale and arranging other details would be formulated. The three days bill will cost approximately \$600.

Arrangements for the reception and entertainment of officers and men with the convoy are in charge of representatives of the Chamber of Commerce and City and County officials.

Under improvement during the week is one occupied by A. J. Buchanan in the First State Bank building. The walls are being replastered and the woodwork repainted and the offices will be made attractive in every respect.

There is an unusual demand for office space in Colorado, which is attributed to prevalent good times as affecting all lines of business and a most optimistic outlook for a bumper crop production and the many new enterprises to come to this city as a result of Mitchell County being an oil field.

SALVATION ARMY AUXILIARY HERE

SOCIAL SERVICE WORK ENTIRE ORGANIZATION AT DISPOSAL OF MITCHELL COUNTY

Charles H. Cope of New York, field representative of the Salvation Army, was in Colorado Friday and addressed a representative number of citizens at the Chamber of Commerce rooms in the interest of the social service work of the army, outlining the various types of cases the army is equipped to handle, describing the relief institutions of various kinds the organization maintains in the various large cities, and offered to place these facilities at the disposal of Mitchell County through an advisory board at Colorado.

The Salvation Army has well-equipped relief institutions for handling practically every line of specialized work that occurs. The most important of these are maternity homes and rescue homes, where the girl that has taken a mis-step or is in danger of doing so, can find loving care and a home in her time of trouble, as well as assistance in getting work in a good, clean environment after she is able to go out in the world again and earn her own living; houses for orphan and semi-delinquent children; missing persons bureaus for tracing persons who have left home and have been lost track of by the home folks; for locating men that have deserted their families; for securing information as to the welfare of boys or girls that have left home to work in the city after completion of school work; employment and free legal aid bureaus; girls' boarding houses, where girls can get good clean living accommodations with laundry facilities and other advantages of a regular home, three meals a day and the company of other girls at a total cost of between \$6 and \$7 a week; men's industrial homes, where the semi-cripple and the paroled prisoner, the man just out of the hospital in a weakened condition and in fact, anybody temporarily out of work will get a helping hand, an opportunity to earn his own living and to build up a little financial reserve.

These and many other institutions of the army are and always have been at the disposal of the people of this and every other country of the United States. The main reason why they have not been utilized in the past is because the people of the country did not know what the army was prepared to do in these lines of work, and also because there was no easy way of getting in touch with the army—in other words, there was no connecting link between the army and the people in the smaller towns and farming areas whom it could help.

Following the meeting organization of the Mitchell County Advisory Board was perfected. This board will cooperate with the army in placing at the disposal of citizens of Mitchell County such worthy cases as may come under its notice. And all these cases will be investigated and handled by the board through all confidence. The advisory board is as follows:

The duties of the board will be:

- 1.—To make a confidential report of the social condition of the county, and to forward it to the headquarters of the Salvation Army with a recommendation for action that the board may decide is advisable.
- 2.—To exist as a forwarding and auxiliary agency of the army, for bringing to its attention any cases arising locally which may come to the board's attention and which the board believes cannot be handled properly by existing local relief agencies.
- 3.—To give the army its advice and assistance in any undertaking which the Army will carry on in the county in the future, such as emergency relief, appeals for financial assistance, membership drives, etc.

BAILEY ATTACKED BY NEFF SPEAKER

ABILENE ATTORNEY REVIEWS THE RECORD OF BAILEY IN PEACE AND IN WAR

Colorado, Texas, Aug. 20.—H. R. Keeble, attorney of Abilene, delivered an address in Colorado Saturday afternoon in support of the candidacy of Pat. M. Neff for Governor. The speaker was introduced by L. W. Sandusky, local attorney. Mr. Keeble spoke from a delivery truck in the street just east of City National Bank building to 500 voters, mostly farmers, and was frequently applauded during his address.

Mr. Keeble, in an address here Saturday, launched into a discussion of issues of the gubernatorial campaign from the beginning of his address. He explained in detail Mr. Neff's land plank, his position toward labor and eulogized the record of his candidate as an officer in McLennan County. He was interrupted but once and this was at the outset of his address when reference to "the sophistry" of Joe Bailey was made.

Mr. Keeble addressed the voters as follows:

"Every since the early days of this campaign I have been going out as a private citizen at my own expense, doing what I can to bring about the election of Mr. Neff. Knowing his character and his record as I do, I have felt that I would be doing my country some service by advocating his cause. I believe that he stands head and shoulders above any candidate who has offered himself for Governor of this State within recent years.

"Mr. Neff stands for an economical administration for our State Government. We have now on the payroll of the State nearly four thousand officials who are drawing fat salaries and expense accounts. They are costing the people of Texas over five million a year and many of them should be dispensed with. Mr. Neff has promised to weed out these unnecessary tax eaters and from his record as County Attorney I believe he will do it. In that office he dispensed with nine assistant county attorneys and made the best record of any county attorney in the State with only three assistants. Mr. Bailey has made some talk about kicking out the politicians but his record does not justify us in expecting any help from him. While he was in the United States Senate, Senator Lorrimer was overwhelmingly convicted of graft and bribery. When the Senate voted to kick him out Senator Bailey voted against his expulsion and made a speech in his defense. If he is not willing to kick out a republican who was convicted of corrupt practices why should we expect him to separate any other politician from his job.

"Mr. Neff stands for the up-building of our public school system and promises to have enacted laws that will make it possible for the country boys and girls to have the benefit of a high school education. I cannot believe that Senator Bailey has our school system much at heart when he has spent the last twenty years away from the State. One of the greatest sources of revenue for our public school is the poll tax. Senator Bailey has not been sufficiently interested in our schools or our public affairs to even pay his poll tax except every other year.

"I believe that the great Democratic party of Texas is entitled to demand that its standard bearer should be a Democrat. Particularly should this be so on the eve of a Presidential election. The only way I know to judge of whether a man is a Democrat or not is by his utterances and his works. Certainly no man could claim to be called a Methodist who publicly denounces all the great works of that church, who publicly repudiated its creed, and who publicly vilified its leading bishop. Senator Bailey has stated that viewing the Democratic administration of the last seven years from top to bottom that he cannot endorse a single achievement. He has publicly stated

TENNESSEESOLONS RATIFY NATIONAL SUFF AMENDMENT

NASHVILLE, Aug. 20.—Tennessee was the thirty-sixth State to ratify the Federal Suffrage Amendment. The vote in the House was 49 to 47. The Senate ratified amendment last Friday.

Chairman Walker in an attempt to have the action reconsidered changed his vote to aye, giving ratification a majority of 50 to 46.

The constitutional change will become effective in time for 17,000,000 women to vote in the presidential election in November, unless the Lower House rescinds its action.

COTTON CLASSER EMPLOYED HERE

MITCHELL COUNTY ASS'N EMPLOYS COTTON CLASSER FOR PERIOD OF NINE MONTHS

Colorado, Texas, Aug. 20.—J. D. Herrall, of Colorado, was employed Saturday by the business managers of Mitchell County Cotton Marketing Association to represent the association here in the classification and marketing of cotton. Mr. Herrall was recommended for the place by the Bureau of Markets department, A. & M. College. He will assume charge of the Colorado office September 1, and is employed for a period of nine months.

"The services of a cotton grading expert at Colorado will mean much to cotton farmers, not alone of Mitchell County, but to those of adjoining counties, who because of the facilities of this office will bring their cotton here," stated W. A. Dulin, County Farm Agent, Tuesday. Mr. Dulin was active in the organization of the County Association and cooperated with the business managers in employing a cotton classer.

The duties of Mr. Herrall will be to render all the assistance possible to patrons of this office in securing the full market value of their cotton for both grade and staple. Farmers in bringing sample of their cotton to the classer will be informed of its proper grade and the market price for same and when negotiating with buyers will know just what the worth of their staple is, according to Mr. Dulin.

Mr. Dulin stated that when the local markets proved unsatisfactory it would become the duty of the classer to forward samples of staple to the U. S. Bureau of Markets at office in either Dallas, Houston or New Orleans with the request that the Bureau ask for offers. When cotton is sold in this manner, consignments will be made either through the classer or through some bank to be designated as depository or representative for the association.

Another requirement of this office is in the duty assigned to the classer to visit various smaller markets in the county with the County Farm Agent, from time to time, to promote interest in the work and also to write to markets in adjacent counties, advising them of the service offered by the local association. The classer will also teach farmers the advantage of growing better staple cotton.

The Mitchell County Cotton Marketing Association was organized some time ago in the election of the following business managers:

NEGRESS WIELDS GUN EFFECTIVELY

BERTHA CHAPMAN ACCUSED OF SHOOTING AND MUTILATING ANXIOUS SWAIN

Bertha Chapman, negress, was released from custody late Wednesday afternoon under bond in the sum of \$300 to await action of the Grand Jury on the charge of assault with intent to murder, as the result of a shooting affray in the negro district late Tuesday night.

According to evidence introduced at an examining trial held before Justice Nunn Wednesday afternoon, George Minnefee, local negro man, was shot through the legs and one arm and wounded on his arms and face by a supposed sharp instrument. Dr. T. C. Ratliff, who attended the injured man Tuesday night, stated that he considered his wounds as being serious.

It developed that George had been paying attentions to Bertha and had proposed marriage. This, it appears, was declined by Bertha. George then pressed his claims with threats. It was then that the crisis came, for the woman resented proposals of marriage, mingled with threats of violence, according to the evidence, and wielded a gun and opened fire. The man fell in the yard and was hurrying for shelter under the house when attacked with a club of some sort. It is said that the instrument that was employed in the destructive work on the negro's head and face was a garden hoe. Five exploded cartridges were found in the yard at the place Wednesday morning, it was stated.

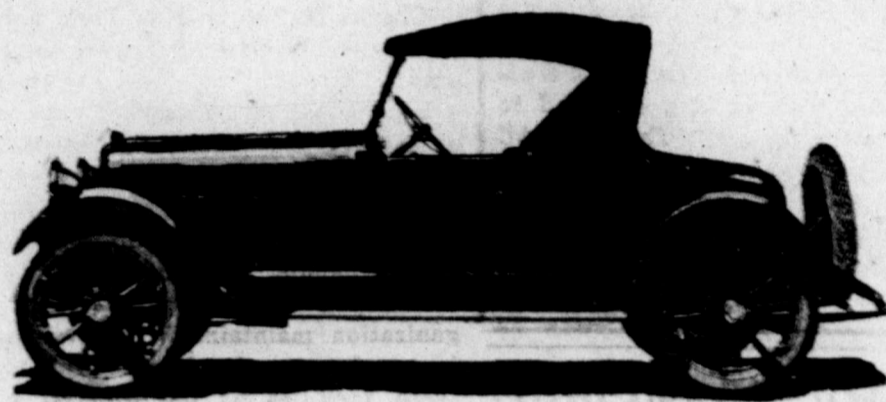

CATTLEMEN OF WEST TEXAS FACE SERIOUS SITUATION

Texas cattlemen are facing a serious situation which has its bearing on the country's beef supply, due to their inability to get loans, according to A. C. Williams, of Fort Worth, assistant secretary of the Cattle Raisers' Association, who was in the city this week. He said that the money stringency was bringing about the depletion of existing herds in many sections of West Texas and Eastern New Mexico and preventing the building up of new ones.

"More good pasturage is going to waste in the cattle country than for many years," Mr. Williams said. "Range conditions in Texas and elsewhere have been ideal for the past year, and prices, though unsatisfactory, have not in general meant actual loss to the stockmen. The relatively low prices have been in goodly measure a result of the inability to obtain credits.

"The present financial situation, however, following on the heels of severe drouths in both the Southwest and Northwest, is bringing about a reduction of the cattle population which must in the end mean mounting beef prices and nation-wide economic loss.

"On this trip through West Texas and New Mexico, I have had occasion to observe that many pastures were unstocked or thinly stocked, and inquiry developed the fact that the owners were anxious to stock and had plenty of security but could not obtain loans.

"Many cattlemen whose ranches were stocked were being compelled to liquidate and thousands of cattle which should be normally used for breeding, or at least for development into finished beef, were being sold for slaughter.

"The sheep raising interests of the San Angelo country are even more seriously threatened than the cattle interests. This is due in part to the financial stringency, and is having its bearing on the cattle situation.

"The principal factor in the sheep men's problem, however, appears to be the virtual withdrawal of the wool buyers from the market. The wool crop this year in the San Angelo territory is estimated at between 8,000,000 and 9,000,000 lbs., an increase of about 3,000,000 over former years.

"Comparatively little of that has been marketed because the buyers having comfortable stocks on hand, are not offering anything like a fair price. The growers are endeavoring to hold, and have several million pounds stored at San Angelo and neighboring points."

BETTER COTTON NOT FOUND ANYWHERE IN THE STATE

The cotton crop in Mitchell County is just as good as the cotton to be found in any section of Texas, according to a statement made in Colorado Thursday afternoon by Judge Ed R. Kone of San Marcos, who was here to deliver an address to farmers and other interested citizens on the subject of cotton marketing.

Judge Kone stated that during the past several weeks he had visited practically every cotton growing section of the State, giving close attention to conditions as they existed, and that none of the crops seen by him were superior to those of this county.

"In many sections of North and East Texas," stated Judge Kone, "the weevils and worms are depredating the crops, doing much damage, while in other sections entirely too much rain has fallen, resulting in the crop either being lost to weeds and crab grass or not planted at all on account of the fields being too boggy to enter with a team. Pests are also invading many sections of the cotton belt in Central Texas," he said.

Judge Kone has been a conspicuous figure in departmental circles at Austin for a number of years. Following the creation of the office of Com-

missioner of Agriculture, during the Campbell administration, he was elected to that office and held the place a number of terms. Retiring from the Commissioner's office he became identified with the Farmers' Institute and has since been an outspoken enthusiast of the purposes of the organization—primarily the betterment of marketing conditions for the farmer.

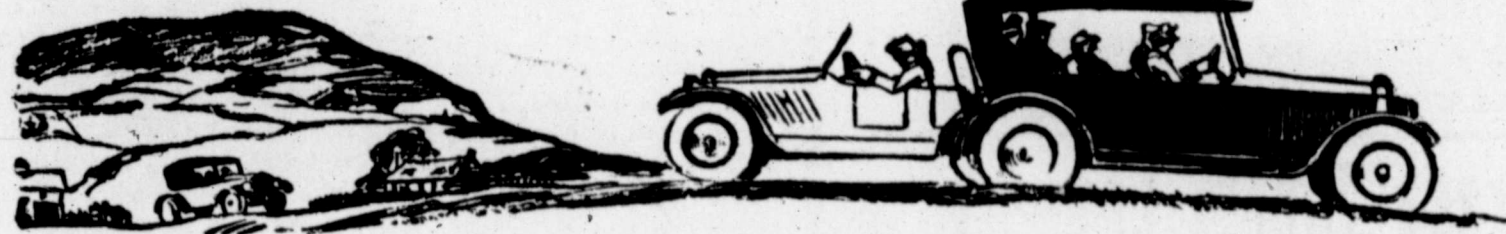

Chamber of Commerce Urges Better Cotton Seed

The Texas Chamber of Commerce in a bulletin urging better cotton seed for Texas, says:

"A little more than 2,500,000 bushels of planting cotton seed are purchased from the dealers annually by the Texas farmers, the greater part of which is mixed as to variety and quality. It is easily possible to increase the value of the Texas cotton crop from \$5 to \$25 a bale by the use of better planting seed.

"This great volume of new wealth can be brought into existence without any additional cost in money and labor. The way to secure this added value is to bring about co-operation between business men who handle seed and the farmers who plant cotton and have brought in supplies of pure seed of varieties adapted to the soil and climate, giving preference to those varieties that will yield a staple from one and one-sixteenth to one and one-eighth inches long. The supply of seed cotton of this character is limited and in order to purchase them in quantity, orders must be placed within the next two months, the earlier the better.

"Much of the difficulty in selling the large amount of low-grade cotton now on hand is due to its short or perished staple, not entirely to grade. It is becoming increasingly difficult to sell the extremely short staple cottons.

"If a community wishes to establish its reputation as a cotton market it should at once take steps to bring about co-operation of farmers and business men to the end of having a community grow one variety of good staple cotton.

"The time to begin such an effort is now and the way is to induce dealers to purchase good seed and the farmers to buy it.

"The influence of staple on value of cotton is strikingly shown in market quotations on cotton issued weekly by the United States Bureau of Markets, branch office at 303 1/2 South Ervay Street, Dallas, which will be sent free to any citizen of the state on application.

SCHOOL TO OPEN SEPTEMBER SIXTH

COLORADO PUBLIC NOW HAS TOTAL OF 17 1/2 AFFILIATED CREDITS

(By E. Frank King.)

The 1920 session of the Colorado Public Schools will open on the first Monday in September this year, being the 6th of the month. It will be noticed that this is an earlier date than the schools have opened in the past, but it is hoped that all patrons will arrange to place their children in school the first day. This is necessary in order that the school may get organized at the earliest possible moment and get into the real work.

The school buildings are being made ready for the reception of pupils. Two extra rooms are being furnished and fitted for the purpose of taking care of the possible increase in number of pupils. If it is necessary, two additional teachers will be employed and the school will be able to take care of all pupils, has greatly increased over that of last year. However, this increase even though the scholastic population may make it necessary to exclude all teachers this year. Announcements will be made on this point later.

The Scholastic State apportionment for the coming year is \$14.50; this is the largest apportionment in the history of the State and will give a very much needed financial aid to this school.

We have secured our corps of teachers, with the exception of a high school principal, unless it becomes necessary to put in two additional teachers, and this cannot be determined until after the opening of school.

It will interest Colorado people to know that the school has recently been granted the fourth credit in Latin. This is a distinction that only a few schools in the State enjoy and speaks well for the high class work that has been done by the school. The school now has a total of seventeen and a half affiliated credits. This is several more than the school has ever been accredited with in the past. This enables pupils who take the full course to enter without examination, not only the universities and colleges of Texas, but also any of the universities and colleges of the other states. We hope

to secure two and a half additional credits during the coming year, which will give us twenty.

Our graduates have, almost without exception, made good in the colleges and universities to which they have gone, and some have carried off honors. This is very gratifying to our home people and ought to make every citizen of Colorado a booster for the public school. The school is the greatest asset the town has, and no amount of money spent in its betterment could be put to a better purpose.

There is a question now to be considered that should engage the interest of everyone. That is, who is going to furnish rooms and board for the teachers this year. Our elected teachers have been writing me to know about rooms and board. So far I have nothing to answer them. If any one has a desirable and convenient room and will furnish board, please write me, stating your terms and what you have to offer. The time is short and I very much desire to have places to which I can direct our teachers when they arrive in Colorado. State the number of teachers you are willing to room, or to board, or to room and board. If our people do not take an interest in this matter, it is altogether possible we may lose some of our best teachers at a time when they cannot be replaced.

When the faculty is completed, a list of the names of teachers will be published together with their assignment.

An Imperative Duty.

The people of Colorado are face to face with a problem that an imperative public duty demands they meet. This problem is the apparent uncertainty that the ladies and gentlemen who have been employed to come here and teach in the public schools during the session soon to open may not have available to them permanent boarding places of the kind desired and to which they should be entitled. The housing problem in Colorado is becoming acute, as was evidenced recently when an official of the public schools made a personal canvas of the residential section in the attempt to find rooms and board for some of the teachers. He was turned away from practically every home at which he called. There were hardly none that would agree to spare an extra room or two in their homes for the teachers, and these did not care to furnish both room and board.

The Colorado High School is an affiliated institution and ranks among the best in Texas. There are only 35 other high schools in the State to rank as high as our school in the several credits. The Record does not believe there is a public spirited citizen in the city but who feels proud of this distinction. Maintenance of the school in its present affiliation demands a continuation of the policy of the School Board to employ only the best talent available as instructors in the various departments, not only of the High School but the primary and intermediate grades as well. The scarcity of good teachers and the resultant universal demand for their services throughout the Southwest means that they must be accorded proper consideration by the community they are to serve if resignations by members of the faculty are to be avoided and the employment of inferior teachers to take their places not made mandatory. The school board has been fortunate in securing the services of the best talent obtainable, and we must not overlook our duty to the children of Colorado and the posterity of Colorado through a spirit of seemingly indifference in the question of placing at the disposal of these teachers good environs in which to live.

We remember that for several months last year some of the teachers were unable to obtain permanent boarding places, which made it necessary for them to room here and there and take their meals at a down town cafe. We should not permit a repetition of this condition.

The duty of Colorado in meeting this situation lies not alone in supplying suitable rooms and board for these teachers. They should be supplied them, and at a price in equity to all concerned. The school teacher does not receive a salary commensurate with his worth to the school and the community and is, as a general rule, not financially able to pay fabulous prices for board and lay

up a reserve fund from his monthly wage check. And, continuing, we might add that the teacher is not in any respect an object of charity. He is, as a rule, an open hearted, public spirited citizen, possessed with the desire to pay for everything he gets. The school teacher is a prime asset to the community he represents.

There are several homes in Colorado that could easily spare one or two rooms to these teachers. If your home is one of these, get in touch with the superintendent of the public schools or the Chamber of Commerce.

The old adage that there are two sides to every question was evidenced here Saturday from the political stump. There was a Neff speaker, followed by an anti-Neff speaker.

One of the developers operating in Mitchell County announced the first of this week that they had three rigs in transit to Colorado. We may expect to soon see rigs going up at every point of the compass from this city.

The Radcliffe Chautauqua, coming to Colorado in September, is being endorsed by critics everywhere as representing the best in educational and social entertainment. Colorado should show its appreciation of the chautauqua by extending to those citizens who are bringing it here a most liberal cooperation.

School will open two weeks from Monday and the small boy will be forced to give up his haunts of pleasure for an environment entirely different. In the school room the scenery to be looked upon by him will be drawn on the blackboard, instead of by nature out in the open, and he will submit to the rule of the rod instead of the survival of the fittest, as obtained among him and his associates on the street.

In the days following Civil War times we are told that when a man desired to borrow money he went to the country and sought out a planter, with whom to negotiate the loan. And now it seems that if those times are to return, to some extent at least, especially so if this county harvests the bumper cotton crop this year that every indication now suggests. Just watch bank deposits here this fall and ascertain for yourself who will carry the largest check books.

Cullen F. Thomas of Dallas said in an address at Plainview Friday: "Bailey has no word of praise for the American heroes, Emma Goldman, Victor Berger, Eugene Debs and Bailey were all opposed to war." In his address here Saturday, H. R. Keeble of Abilene, said: "Woodrow Wilson returned from France as much a casual as any young man who fell in France, and yet Bailey would stab him in the back." As between the two candidates, whom shall receive your vote for governor?

The Dixie Lyceum Course, coming to Colorado this year for benefit of the High School, is represented as being better than the lyceum here last year. And the lyceum coming to this city last year was a wonderful success in all respects. The various features furnished entertainment of a class not often available to people of the smaller towns and was a success in a financial way. After all expenses were paid in full, a balance of \$173 was left and went to the library and laboratory funds of the school.

It has become so in these days that if a fellow ever expects to seek the suffrage of the people for

any office he must have behind him a life record that is clean and useful. The record of former Senator Bailey, as being against the right of the automobile to travel the public highways; against passage of the Rural Free Delivery act; against the Federal Reserve Bank, making panics impossible; against the Land Bank act, permitting the small farmer to obtain Government assistance in the purchase of a farm home; against the law prohibiting the employment of small children in large factories of the East and North; against the Volstead act; against the Federal law extending the right of suffrage to women; against the principles of Americanism during the war with Germany, in that he refused to participate in any feature of the work for carrying the conflict to a successful termination and would not advise his friends to buy liberty bonds because he figured they might lose ten per cent on the investment, and, in whole, against Democracy, as reviewed here Saturday afternoon by Hon. H. R. Keeble of Abilene, makes this doubly true. And all these features of Bailey's record are substantiated by facts. Politics will serve to show a fellow up in the limelight more than any other agency.

that if Woodrow Wilson is a Democrat, that he never was, and that he could never vote for any man who held the same convictions as Woodrow Wilson. Senator Bailey has denounced all the great measures passed by a Democratic Congress including the Federal Reserve Bank Act, Farm Loan Act, the Child Labor Law, the Pure Food Law, the Rural Free Delivery Law and the Parcel Post Law.

"Senator Bailey does not endorse nor stand for a single plank of the platform written by the Democrats gathered at San Francisco from every Congressional District in the United States. He has opposed National Prohibition and has declared that National Woman Suffrage is a greater evil than National Prohibition. He is opposed to the League of Nations which Governor Cox has declared to be the paramount issue of this campaign. What good reason could any Democrat give for voting for Senator Bailey? Surely our party is not so poor in leadership and Statesmen that we must take this man who has been absent from the State for nearly twenty years, and who left the United States Senate under a cloud. The last time he held a commission from the people of Texas he betrayed them by secretly selling his influence to the great oil companies who had been outlawed from the State. His name was written in their secret code books. He borrowed vast sums of money from them without security and he was looked upon by them as their agent to quiet all Texas parties. I submit that Senator Bailey has no right to come back to this State and ask us to honor him with the highest office within our gift. If he wants to re-enter Texas politics he ought to start out again as a constable or a cotton weigher and let us find out and see if he can be honest with the people in a small capacity before we trust him again in a greater one.

"The Democratic Party glories in the fact that it entered, waged and won the greatest war in the history of the world. We believe that that war was fought in our own defense to prevent America from becoming a German Province. We believe that it was fought to bring liberty, justice and peace to all the down-trodden people of the world. We believe that America never waged a war more glorious in its aims and in its achievements. Senator Bailey opposed our entering that war. He criticized the administration throughout its course. He vilified our great President even after he was stricken and was helpless as a casualty of the war. He refused to lend his voice in the aid of any war activities. He did not send his boys to the front but they went of their own accord. And even while his own boys were across the seas in our Expeditionary Forces and dependent upon us at home for their ammunition and supplies, Senator Bailey refused to help sell Liberty bonds to raise the funds wherewith to clothe and feed our boys because he feared it might be a losing investment.

"The American army was rightfully sent across the seas but whether they were rightfully or wrongfully sent there, the fact remains that the boys were there and the flag was there, and while they were there in peril, Senator Bailey refused to aid in raising the funds to supply their

needs and to bring them back. If every American had pursued the same course the boys would still be there dead or as prisoners of war. I insist that no American with the war record that Senator Bailey has, has any right to ask for any honor at our hands but that he should, for the rest of his days, do as he did, then "hold his peace and keep his mouth shut."

Following his address here, Keeble left immediately by automobile for Roscoe where he was scheduled to speak Saturday evening. He is making several campaign speeches over this section of the State in the interest of his candidate.

When Keeble had completed his address, Tom Morrison, local citizen, climbed onto the truck and immediately commenced an address in reply to the remarks made by the Abilene man. Mr. Morrison is a Bailey enthusiast and spoke for thirty minutes advocating that his hearers give their suffrage to the former Senator in the run-off primary August the 28th.

PUREBREDS COMPETE FOR \$65,000 PURSES

Livestock Division at State Fair of Texas Breaks All Records For Amount of Prizes

With the State of Texas looking forward to one of the most prosperous cattle years of its history, the State Fair of Texas is not over-optimistic in predicting that the season of 1920 is going to be the greatest year in its history so far as the Livestock division is concerned. A total of \$65,000 in premiums, breaking all past records for this department, is the prize dangling before the eyes of the owners of show herds of America. In addition to this, tens of thousands of farmers and stock raisers will attend the Fair eager to pick up purebreds to improve their own cattle strains. This is a great

FILIPINAS GET BALLOT BEFORE AMER. SISTERS

Senora de Veyra Describes Status of Women in the Philippines.

The Filipino woman is destined to be in the world's spotlight more than ever before as a result of the news just received by cable from Manila to the effect that the Philippine senate has passed the equal suffrage bill giving women full political rights with men. This would indicate that the Filipina may beat her American sisters to the ballot box.

The Filipina has many admirers who predict she will make good if she gets the vote, just as she has made good in the very important role she has occupied in the family and business life of the Philippines ever since the introduction of Christianity in the islands three centuries ago.

"America's advent in the Philippines discovered a wonderfully interesting, responsive little being, the Filipino woman," writes one American concerning

the Filipina. "Mothering the only Christian people in the far east, she holds a place of authority, love and respect in family and social life that is not accorded to women in countries neighboring the islands, or in India, China or Japan."

A Filipina who is doing an important work for her people in the United States is Mrs. Jaime C. de Veyra, wife of the resident commissioner from the Philippines. Not only has she frequently addressed the wives of members of Congress in Washington as to conditions in the new Philippines, but she has visited various cities, speaking before women's clubs. The senora wears, in giving her talks, one of the beautiful gowns of her home land, a delicate pineapple fabric, hand-woven and hand-embroidered, shaped like a gauzy-winged butterfly.

"In many ways the path of the women of the Philippines is easy," says Senora de Veyra. "Laws made by her have combined the best of American and Spanish precedents, and she has come into her own with far less struggle than either her American or her Spanish sisters. Married women may hold property in severalty. They are guardians of their own children. These are vested rights and cannot be taken away from her.

"Professional opportunities are as good for women as for men in the land from which I come. The Filipina is by custom the dictator in the home. She is usually the keeper of the family treasure. Practically all of the small shops in Manila are conducted by women. Women are already members of the Philippine Bar Association—a thing still impossible in Great Britain. They are also successful as physicians."

Life is really a fifty-fifty proposition for women in the Philippines, according to the senora, who has taken such a prominent part in women's work there that she has sometimes been referred to as "the little mother of them all." She was the assistant matron of the Normal Hall Dormitory for Girls when she married. She speaks English fluently and puts her little talks "over" with real tact. She has four children. An evidence of her enterprise was her action last year in mastering shorthand so she might be "useful to her husband at home in the evenings in case he wishes to dictate a few letters or a speech."

MORE HOMES SHOULD BE BUILT IN COLORADO

That there is a demand for homes in Colorado that cannot be supplied is very evident from the letters of enquiry received almost daily by the Chamber of Commerce by people from various sections of the country who desire to move their families to this city to live.

Some of these letters are from men representing professional or industrial interests who express a desire to locate here, but declare a hesitancy in coming to Colorado in the absence of the assurance that homes may be procured. Because there is no visible solution of the housing problem in this city, there being not a vacant residence or apartment for rent to a man with a family, so far as information obtained by the Chamber of Commerce goes, the chamber faces a problem that can only be met through the building of more homes and apartments in the city.

The population of Colorado would be showing a gradual increase if homes could be provided for the people who want to come here. With this increase in population would also come an increase in wealth, repre-

sented in new industrial enterprises to be financed and operated by and to supply the needs of these new citizens.

HOW PROGRESS IS BLOCKED

One of the anomalies of present-day politics is the savage arraignment of President Wilson and his party by the Republicans for being too radical and the complaint by all of our radical parties that he and his followers are not radical enough. A leader who loses the support of both conservatives and liberals may be thought to be in a bad way, but such is not always the case.

Four years ago, Mr. Wilson was denounced by pacifists and jingoes, by pro-Germans and pro-British and by those who wanted to prepare for war on a large scale no less than by those who were in favor of doing nothing in that direction. It seemed for a time as though, with such opposition based on diverse grounds, he could have only a little strength at the polls.

Yet he carried thirty-one States and was elected by a plurality of 581,000.

Seven or eight liberal and radical

factions met in Chicago recently, in an attempt to organize a new party. Each had a particular grievance and a sovereign remedy, but all were in full agreement that the Democratic Party, notwithstanding its professions and performances, is as thoroughly encrusted in Toryism as the Republican Party, which makes no secret of its reactionary tendencies.

For example, there was a farmers party which presented many claims, unmindful of the fact that the only progressive legislation favorable to the farmer in a generation, such as the Federal loan system, the Warehouse Act and land mortgage banks, was enacted under the present Democratic Administration. There was a labor party full of resentment which took no account of what has been done in the last seven years to promote industry, such as the Eight-Hour law, the Child Labor Act, the Workmen's Compensation Act and almost a new code based upon the principle that labor is not a commodity.

Besides these, there was a party of the intelligentsia advocating Government ownership and control of transportation, mining and business in face of the most extensive essays in that direction ever known, which, adopted by the Democrats as war measures, have involved the country in expenditures of billions and are yet to be liquidated. Still another party of patriots was indignant over the decline of Americanism, forgetting that less than two years ago militant America stood with smoking guns in hand at the downfall of the last of the autocrats.

No fault is to be found with conservatives who honestly believe that the country is going to the dogs under progressive laws. Their state of mind is understandable. They are in favor of things as they are, or as there were, because, whether right or wrong, they have profited by the situation.

But what are the mental processes of liberals and radicals who turn as violently upon liberality, even radicalism, as any junker, and who devote all their political energy to the destruction of public men and party organizations that, to say the least of them, have open minds?

There is need in this country of a great party of progress, one fully responsive to popular thought, one naturally inclined to experimentation one not slavishly committed to ancient forms and prejudices, and above all, one capable of assessing a new idea without regard to the dollar-mark. We cannot hope to have such a party if in every attempt to move forward it finds the road barred by the impracticables who, refusing all compromises, become the faithful promoters of privilege and standpatism.

THE CHANGING TIMES IN WESTERN TEXAS

It is a calamity, no doubt about that. But there is one way to look at it that makes it the happiest calamity that has ever happened to our country. Twenty-five years ago, one car would have carried all the grain in the country to market. And it would have been loaded with bundle stuff to fill it up. There was a little grain stored up for a pig or two, and a few chickens, and a few acres of row crops for the cattle, but none for the markets. Yes, that was less than twenty-five years ago.

Twenty-two years ago two row binders cut every stalk of feed in our whole country. Today there are twenty-one combination reapers and threshers at work in our harvest fields sending the grain by thousands of bushels directly from the field to the granary. There are a score or more individual threshing machines and community threshers at work, and scores of self-binders and headers. Tractors are plowing across the fields until the whole country looks like a network of stem railways. In every direction the smoke of the engines is curling up over growing straw piles, and newly built granaries are dotted around all over the country.

There is a car shortage. There is something wrong somewhere. There seems to be enough passenger coaches to get us all out of town when we want to go. But the wheat and oats will soon be piled up all over the country. One reason for the car shortage is that the Panhandle is producing grain by the millions of bushels today, as compared to a few sacks of chicken feed a few years ago, and the trouble is the folk who run the Government and the railroads and distribute the cars around over the country, do not know where the Panhandle is. They do not realize what the people of the Panhandle are doing. They still think the Panhandle of Texas is the Llano Estacado they saw marked up in the north west corner of the map of Texas when they were schoolboys. They think this is a desert land where it takes a section of land to feed one steer and that the country is still the home of prairie dogs, rattlesnakes and owls. Poor little dogs! There are hardly enough of them left to wag a welcome to such folks. And he is a lucky summer visitor who captures a set of rattlers as a souvenir of his Panhandle visit.

Nay, the prairie dog towns mark a race that is past. And cities like Amarillo, Canyon, Plainview, Hereford, Lubbock, Dalhart, Stratford, Texline, Panhandle, Canadian, Miami, Pampa, Higgins, Wheeler, Shamrock, Claude, Clarendon, Goodnight, Lelia Lake, Hedley, Memphis, Childress, Wellington, Quanah—these are the towns that have taken the place of the prairie dog towns. And out in the fields for miles around these cities of the Plains may be found one of the best classes of citizens, both men and women, and the children, too, in all this Nation. For years they have been studying the soil, the climate and the plant life, and year by year they are learning nature's combinations for this special part of the Plains. And year by year they are taming this new wild country and breaking it like a cold, for use for men.

This accounts partly for the car shortage. The people of the Panhandle and West Texas are conquering the soil. They are succeeding in their great work beyond the belief of the outside people. They are not only making crops but they are making new records. They are making history. They are making wealth. Texas. Twenty-five years ago this same land was worth 3c per acre. There was no car shortage then. Women came and made homes for men. Children were born. Schools and Sunday schools became necessary. Little towns were created. The country grew as the people grew. The towns grew as the country became developed. Demand called the railroads into existence and now the great rich fields of grain are calling for a way to reach the people. The harvest is nearing the end. Tens of thousands of bushels of wheat and oats are ready for the markets. And no way to reach them. The farmers need their money. The rest of the world needs the food that is tied up in the crop. Cars, cars, cars, are what the people need now. Cars to move their crop and to make room for more. Cars to carry the grain to the people who need it.—Phebe K. Warner.

Five Inches of Rainfall in Colorado During the Week.

Heavy rains continued to fall at intervals at Colorado and over Mitchell county throughout this week up to Wednesday afternoon. A total of 5.61 inches fell at Colorado during the week ending at that time. At several places in this part of the State the rainfall was reported very heavy. Roscoe reports 8 inches and at Sweetwater the fall is said to have totaled 10 inches for the week.

The Colorado river reached the highest water mark for a period of one year, the rise being estimated at 15 feet. The high stage in the river was reached Wednesday night and Thursday morning the water was receding.

Considerable damage to railroad property over West Texas is reported. The Texas & Pacific has bridges out both east and west from Colorado and are running stub trains to handle passenger and mail traffic.
