### FARMERS DEMAND \$50.00 PER TON FOR COTTON SEED

(Continued from Page 1)

samples of your cotton, together with samples of cotton belonging to other farmers, to the office of the Bureau of Markets, at either Dallas, Houston or New Orleans, where the government representatives will act as a clearing house in finding buyers. Many of the leading cotton factors of the world are represented at New Orleans and it should not be difficult to find a market there for the quality of staple usually produced on the farms of West Texas.

In discussing the seed market, it was pointed out by members of the association that green cotton seed do not command a good price on account of the heavy expense incurred by the purchaser in turning them while drying. In many instances it was estimated that the cost of drying cotton seed in storage amounted to from \$15 to \$25 per ton. The drying process, it was explained, was to continually turn the seed with forks by laborers.

The association adopted plans for securing pickers through the recommendation that each individual member furnish the County Farm Agent or the secretary of the Chamber of Commerce at Colorado, a list showing the number of hands needed by him, together with information as to whether houses would be furnished to families, board to others, and the number of acres together with an approximate production estimate, etc. Both Mr. Dulin and the Chamber of Commerce are in receipt of letters from people desiring information about crop conditions in Mitchell County with the view of coming here for employment throughout the fall and both will cooperate with the farmers in securing labor, it was stated by Mr. Dulin and the secretary of the Chamber, who also addressed the meeting.

President J. C. Hooper stated that funds sufficient for paying the salary of the cotton classer had been subscribed by farmers of Mitchell County, that the board of managers had guaranteed the salary to the City National Bank of Colorado and that the bank in turn had guaranteed the payment of the salary to the government, under whose employ the classer would be. He urged, however, that every farmer of the county not then a member of the association become affiliated without delay and thus become actively identified with a movement that would mean more to the cotton growers of Mitchell County than any beneficial program started for several years.

The price per bale to be charged farmers for services of the cotton classer was not determined. Some members estimated that 50c per bale

would be sufficient to meet all expenses of the classer and his office. Action on this matter was deferred until a later meeting of the board of managers.

It was pointed out that the association would be conducted on a pro rata sharing basis and at the end of the season each member who had subscribed funds would be allotted a dividend, should the revenue coming to the office through the fee for classification of cotton total an amount surpassing all expenses. This it was estimated on a basis of 50c per bale, could be reasonably expected.

No designated fee is attached to membership, president Hooper stated. He explained that he was growing sixty acres of cotton on his farm and had subscribed \$15 toward the fund of \$2,500 necessary for the classer's salary. Most other farmers had subscribed to the fund on a similar basis he continued, while some had pledged the payment of even larger ratios. Farmers here Saturday to attend the meeting viewed the outlook with optimism when questioned as to the prospects for crops in their respective communities. An ideal season is in the ground and with a continuation of favorable weather conditions one of the best crops of both cotton and feed stuff for several years will be harvested this fall, they state.

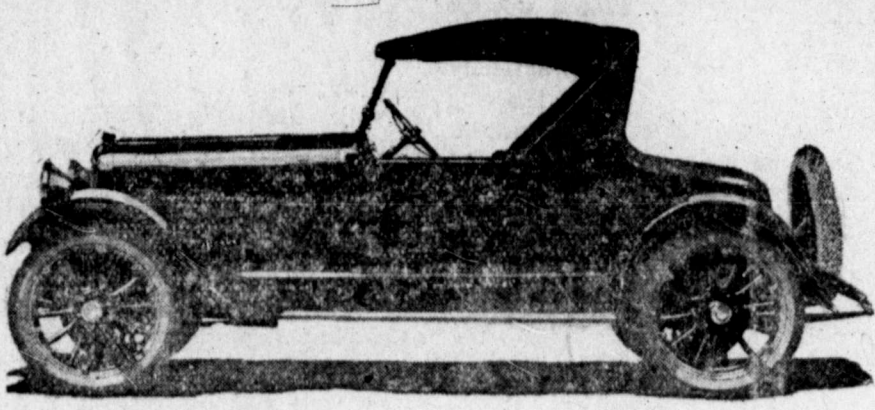

**SALVATION ARMY OFFICIAL VISITS COLORADO LAST WEEK**  
O. N. Verenius of Chicago, representing the Research Department of the Salvation Army, was in Colorado Friday and Saturday to meet with the Mitchell County Advisory Board of the Army in the interest of the State convention to be held at Fort Worth Friday, September 10. Mr. Verenius stated that more than 150 acceptances to attend the convention had been received by Ben E. Keith, president of the State advisory board.  
In speaking of the State convention and of the relation of the various county boards to the people of Northwest Texas, Mr. Verenius said:  
"Mayor W. D. Davis will make the address of welcome and the principal address will be delivered by Mrs. Commissioner Thomas Estill of Chicago, who is in command of the western territory of the Salvation Army, and Brigadier Fletcher Agnew who is responsible for the 1920 home service program of the Salvation Army."  
"Lieutenant Colonel George Wood, chief divisional officer of the Army, in the Southwest, will tell of the work of the Army in Texas, Oklahoma, Western Louisiana and Southwestern Arkansas, all of which is under his jurisdiction. Other prominent Salvation officers will be present at the convention which will last throughout the day."  
"The reports of each county as shown in the confidential studies now being compiled by the county advisory boards will be presented, at the convention and a program of service outlined that will be carried out faithfully by the various boards in cooperation with the Salvation Army."  
"The county advisory boards in Texas represent a constituency of more than 1,000 of the leading men and women in this State who are devoting a considerable portion of their time in an effort to alleviate social distress in the communities in which they reside."  
"Already all these boards are functioning in perfect order and it is believed by Colonel Wood that as a result of the experience gained at the convention, the advisory boards will be able to render even better service than at present."  
"Discussion of the needs of the State as applicable to the Salvation Army will form an important feature of the convention and the business and professional experience of the men comprising the State and County boards will be at the service of the Salvation Army in this respect."

### TWO AND A HALF MILLION COME TO HOLDERS OF THIRD LOAN BONDS NEXT MONTH

Dallas, Texas.—Owners of Liberty Bonds of the third issue, bearing 4 1/2% interest, according to Dinsmore W. Hume, Federal Director of Savings, number 719,210 in this district. The total value of Liberty Bonds bought in the district was \$114,210,050. The latest thereon at 4 1/2% will be due and payable at any bank on September 15; it will amount to \$2,469,462.50 for this, the eleventh reserve district, according to Mr. Hume. A like amount of interest on the same bonds will be paid in six months later, on March 15, 1921. Bankers are frequently finding bonds issued in 1917 and 1918 from which no interest coupons have been clipped.

### BOOKER T. WASHINGTON'S DAUGHTER URGES NEGROES TO EARN, SAVE, INVEST

Dallas, Texas.—Portia Washington Pittman, daughter of the noted negro leader, Booker T. Washington, wife of W. Sidney Pittman, a negro architect in Dallas, insists that now is the time when negroes, above all others, should earn, save a part of their earnings, and invest in government securities. "Negroes are now earning more than ever before in their lives," she said. "They should save and invest it so it will comfort and give them the funds they need so much when age or sickness or death overtakes them. 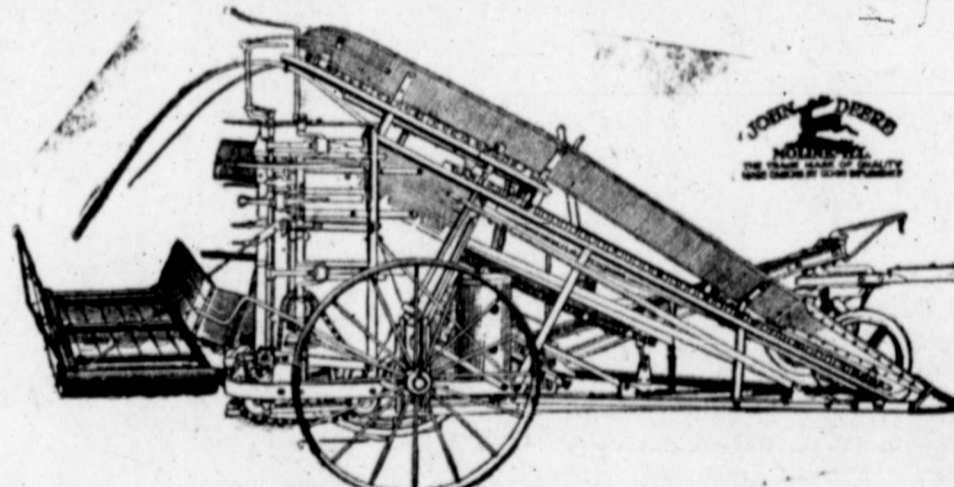

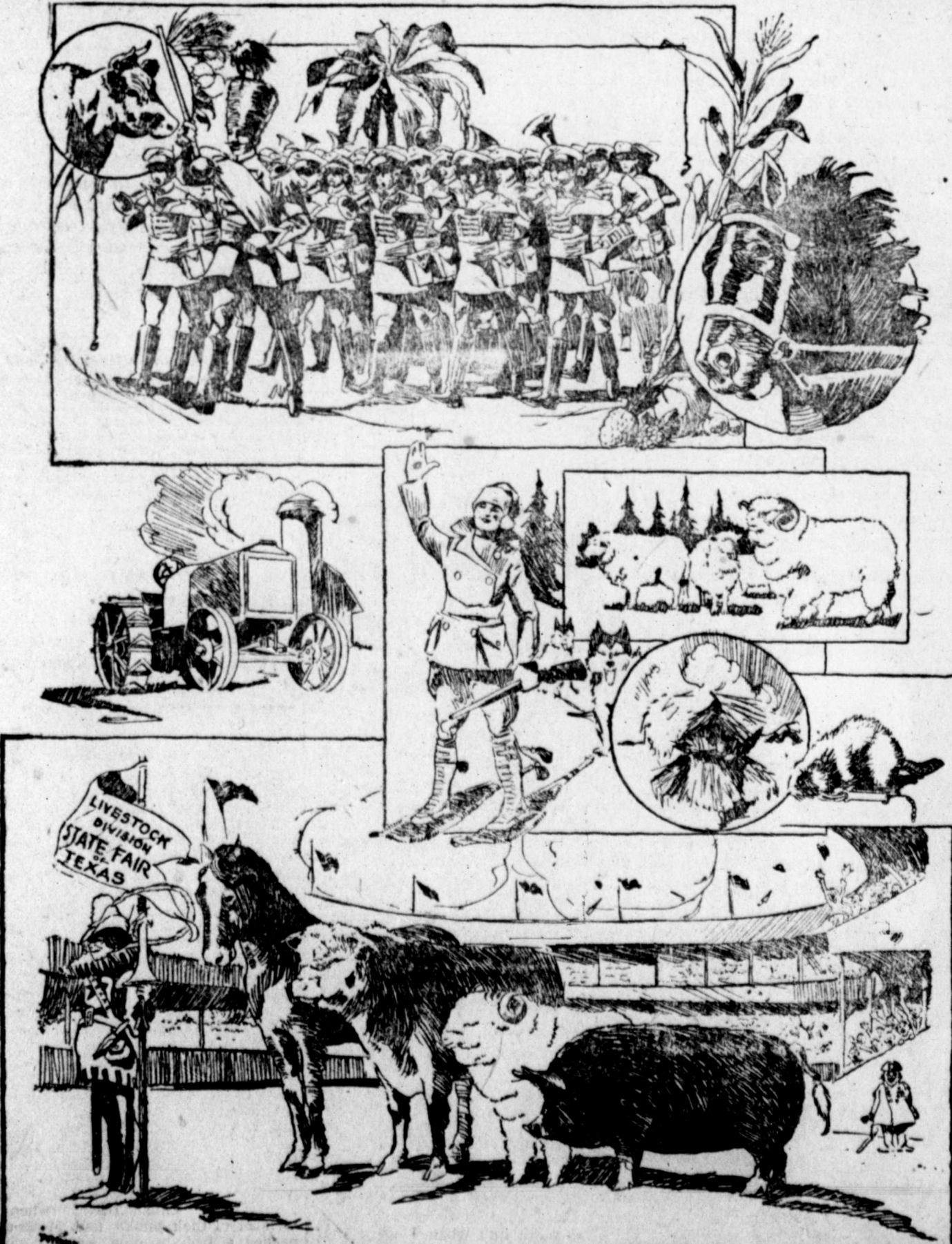
