Under an act passed by the Legislature, in special session at Austin last week, the right of suffrage is extended all women of legal age in the State under provisions of the Federal Suffrage amendment. This act has been held constitutional by the attorney

Mr .Chesney stated the act was merely an extension of time in which women may pay their poll taxes and qualify under the Terrell election law. The last day for paying these poll texes is October 22. The 1919 poll tax forms will be used.

"In order to show our appreciation. the women voters of Mitchell County," stated Mr. Chesney, "we will issue to each of them, who has not previously paid a poll tax for the year 1919, two poll tax receipts at the same ime, provided hey call at the ax collector's office before the night f October 22. They may pay up these taxes for the past and ensuing year at the same time, thus qualifying their suffrage for elections in 1920 and next year.'



SPECIAL SESSION ENDS AFTER PASSING DRASTIC STRIKE LAW

The fourth special session of the Thirty-sixth Legislature adjourned sine die at Austin. Saturday, after passing the most drastic strike control legislation yet effected in the Southwest and providing election regulatory laws necessitated by National Suffrage ratification.. A bill to divorce cotton gins, packers and oil mills, a third measure advocated in Governor Hobby's program, failed despite a desperate last minute effort to put it through.

As finally passed, through adoption of a free conference report, the strike control bill, known as the "open ports bill" applies to all common carriers as well as docks and ports of Texas. The measure as sent to governor Hobby for signature gives the governor if he chooses, supreme control over areas affected by strikes, as specified. State rangers, both regular and special, may be used by the State in keeping order. The ranger rule would be supreme to local authorities and jail and prison sentences are provided for persons intimidating of interfering with workers taking the place of strikers.

AN IMPORTANT CAMPAIGN

"No more important campaign for promoting the welfare of the people residing in the rural districts of Texas was ever undertaken in this State " declared Speaker R. E. Thomason, of El Paso, at Austin recently, referring to the proposed educational amendment to the State Constitution to be voted on November 2nd, next.

-"School legislation, since the first law was enacted in 1876 by the 13th legislature," Mr. Thomason said, "has been of so haphazard a nature that a most unjust and unexpected condition is the result. To put the matter bluntly, we have, during the past forty-four years, unwittingly, to be sure, but neverless effectively, garbled the Constitution of the State of Texas to the extent that special privileges are now accorded the residents of large cities incorporated under the general laws, that are positively forbidden the residents of small towns and rural districts.

"Here in Austin, for instance, a free citizenry can go to the polls and decide upon what they consider a tax sufficient to furnish their children educational opportunities that will somewhat fit them to meet the unusual problems and responsibilities that are bound to be theirs in our present fierce, post war struggles for the survival of the fittest.

"But is it left to the citizens of rural communities to decide for themselves what advantages are necessary for their children, whose struggles in life will be equally as great? No; the law steps in with, 'thus far and no farther,' for the country child.

"We are constantly bewailing the influx of country people to the already overcrowded larger cities." Mr. Thomason continued. "Can you imagine a better reason for a selfrespecting, ambitious family leaving the rural districts than for them to encounter-wherever they dream of onger terms, better teachers, better school houses, a fighting chance for the children-a hated verboten sign staring them in the face from over the doorway of their delapidated little school house?

"I cannot conceive of the amendment failing," Mr. Thomason concluded,"when the voters become acquainted with the true facts, and realize that its adoption will result simply in adjusting our school laws to conform with the principle of our government for which men have feught and died. 'Equal rights to all and special privileges to none."




