The ideal weather prevalent during the past thirty days has been such as to be of the best advantage to the cotton farmers in gathering their crops.

Prices paid for the staple on the Clorado market during the week were slighter lower than for the previous week. It is estimated that an average of 20 cents, middling basis, has been offered during the week. Wednesday cotton was selling at from 20 cents to 21 cents. Seed declined \$5 per ton during the week. Thursday morning farmers were being offered \$25 for the seed at the gins.

The crop is by no means moving as fast as would be the case if farmers could obtain sufficient help. Many farmers of the Colorado territory have not yet secured pickers at all. #### **DOES A COTTON CLASSER PAY?**

Thursday of this week a farmer drove into the market with two bales of cotton. It looked like cotton that had been selling for 30 cents. He was first offered 30 cents, then bids were raised to 34 cents. The farmer declined to sell until his cotton was classed. The government classer pronounced it to be middling, the staple to be 1 3-16 inches, and its market price to be around 40 cents. The extra length entitled the owner to about \$25 premium per bale.

On Friday another bale of the same grade and staple sold for 35 3-4 cents. This bale was not classed. The owner preferred to save the 50 cents cost of classing. He saved the classing and lost on his bale \$22.25-McCurtain (Okla.) Gazette.

The ordinance does not effect the ped- if you want to hold it, it will be indling of ice cream, fruits or vegeta- sured. bles. Neither does it affect farmers selling their produce on the streets. Ranger could not possibly have needed such an ordinance more than Colorado does. Street vendors are continually crying their wares from the street corners in this city, enjoying a prosperous trade through conditions made possible by the local tax peyers of Colorado. 'Why not ehminate them entirely, or else exact a reasonable tax equity from them? These peddlers should not be accorded better treatment from the town than the business men who make their home in the city.

According to information received by the Record Tuesday, the city council issued instructions to the marshal Monday that traffic ordinances of the city must be enforced. During the past two months there has been much complaint of speeding in the city, especially on the streets of the residence section and after dark, a practice which places life and limb in jeopardy. It is also claimed that the driving of cars along the streets after dark without lights, or insufficient lights, is continually practiced. ### **COTTON PICKERS NEEDED**

West Texas and the Panhandle and other supplies. Plains sections of the state are still badly in need of cotton pickers according to numerous inquiries. Mitchell County alone can use 1000 cotton pickers, according to an estimate of the Colorado Chamber of Commerce.

There are two sources of labor now open to the West Texas and Plains farmers, according to information received by the chamber. The first is the small available surplus in the lower coast country of Texas where the cotton crop is largely. gathered, and the second is the labor supply of Tamaulipas, Nueva Leon. Ccahuila, and Chihuahua, the northern border states of Mexico. The available supply of labor in the lower coast country is not large, according to indications from that' territory, though there are some sections where cotton picking is entirely completed and considerable numbers of laborers have been released.

Regarding the labor supply of northern Mexico, a wire from the Laredo Chamber of Commerce to the Texas Chamber of Commerce of Oct. 2 says:

"Advise all interested in securing Mexican labor to wire or correspond with Mexican Consul and U. S. Commissioner of labor at Laredo, in order to get official confirmation of labor supply available, terms and instructions. The situation changes almost daily and advise securing official confirmation each day or for each customer."

By signing an affidavit that the laborers will be used only for agricultural labor, the Mexicans may be brought across the border for a limited time of several months without the payment of the head tax of \$8.00, and the literacy test is also waived. An attorney-in-fact may act for one or more farmers in bringing these laborers across the river, provided the latter does not charge a fee per head for securing the laborers. Full information may be obtained from J. E. Trout, inspector in charge, U. S. Department, Laredo, Texas.




