JUDGE AND COMMISSIONERS BACK FROM INSPECTION TOUR.

County Judge Hall, the four commissioners and the county road supervisor returned Friday night from an inspection trip over the public roads in Nolan, Fisher, Jones, Haskell, Knox and Taylor counties. They made the trip in order to obtain direct information as to how road building and maintenance problems are being met in other counties.

The official party left Colorado Wednesday morning of last week, going from here to Sweetwater where they conferred with Judge A. S. Muzey of Nolan County. From there they went to Roby and were shown over some of the Fisher County roads by members of commissioners court. Judge Hall stated that one of the best sections of road they found on the trip was that from Roby to Rotan in Fisher county. They drove to Anson late Wednesday, spending the night there.

Thursday the Mitchell county officials were taken in charge by the Jones County commissioners and taken for inspections to several road building projects in the county where a study of machinery employed and dirt and gravel formations used was made. Another good piece of road was found between Anson and Stamford.

They arrived at Stamford Thursday at noon and were guests of the Stamford Chamber of Commerce at luncheon. Judge Hall and Homer D. Wade and Porter A. Whaley of Stamford were among those to deliver speeches at the luncheon.

From Stamford the party drove into Haskell and Knox Counties, and then returned to Colorado, coming by way of Abilene and Taylor County for an inspection of the roads there.

Judge Hall stated Monday that he and the county commissioners were highly pleased with the information as to road construction and maintenance obtained on this trip and would no doubt be better prepared to meet these problems as they came up in the future. Upon leaving Colorado it was their intention to go as far as Dallas County, but the Judge states

LIVESTOCK AND AGRICULTURAL CONDITIONS HERE BETTER

The livestock and agricultural conditions of Mitchell County are better than any county between Colorado and El Paso, according to Theo. H. Lampe, of Kansas City, Mo., representing the Lee Livestock Commission Company, who spent the day in Colorado Wednesday. Mr. Lampe was returning to Fort Worth from an inspection tour of Southwest Texas and reports that the physical condition of the cattle industry is excellent throughout the entire territory. Range cattle are fattening fast and the spring calf crop will be at least normal, he stated.

"In traveling from El Paso to Colorado I was impressed with the fact that you have the best county of them all," Mr. Lampe stated, when seen by a representative of The Record. "I am surprised to find here such a progressive and prosperous agricultural section. Your cattle and ranges, insofar as I have seen, are also above the average of West Texas."

Mr. Lampe stated that in former years his firm handled large consignments of cattle from Mitchell County pastures, the major number of which were fattened for the butcher market on pasture in southern Kansas.

Boosters Launch Campaign Tuesday Night Looking to Damming of Lone Wolf Creek

Tentative plans for the consummation of a project damming Lone Wolf Creek were made Tuesday night at the March meeting of the Colorado Booster Club and committees were appointed to ascertain every feature of the proposed project, including dam site, estimated cost and the most practicable way in which to finance the undertaking. The meeting was attended by 114 business and professional men of the city and every expression given in the several addresses delivered boomed with optimism and the speaker pleaded for a more adequate water supply for the city from some source.

Among those to deliver addresses on the subject were P. C. Coleman, C. M. Adams, A. J. Coe, L. W. Sandusky, Dr. D. R. Hardison, J. E. Greene, Thos. E. Smith and J. M. Thomas. That the pleas of these men for an adequate supply of lake water was appreciated was indicated by applause from time to time. A letter from Judge C. H. Earnest, who was in El Paso at the time, in which he expressed the desire that he be counted in on any project having for its purpose the good of the city, was read.

A few of the speakers expressed the opinion that the best way of financing the proposed lake would be through stock subscribed by individuals and firms forming a stock company. The majority, however, endorsed a bond issue as being the only practicable way in which to raise the funds for the project and when the question was put by one of the speakers the gentlemen present endorsed the latter plan almost unanimously.

J. H. Greene, member of the City Council, in making an appeal for a more adequate water supply for Colorado, stated that it was a fact established several months ago that the present source of water supply is wholly inadequate. "Did you know,"

Mr. Greene stated, "that it has not been so very long ago when you were with in thirty-six hours of being out of water, and that the City Water Department is now forced to keep a man on the job at the wells almost all the time in order to keep water pumped into the mains as fast as it is used?"

Mr. Greene outlined some of the difficulties being experienced by the department in supplying water. Water is being pumped from five wells, he stated, and the expense of the city of keeping the equipment in good condition has proven a large one. "We are almost continually pulling sucker rod, replacing new parts to pumps, and meeting other necessary expenses, in order to keep the water supply up with demand, in addition to the expense of \$160 per month for power to operate the four electric motors," he continued. Mr. Greene explained that four of the wells were being pumped with motors and the other one with a gasoline engine. The water is being pumped from a depth of 180 feet.

Dr. Coleman went over the history of former proposed projects for damming Lone Wolf Creek, in which the Texas & Pacific railway were to cooperate with the city. The question of this dam has been raised the second time in former years and each time was permitted to die. "I believe that the dam should be built, whether Colorado experiences an unusual growth from the development of the adjacent oil fields—or from other causes—or not," the Doctor stated. He said that at the time the former project was proposed an estimate of Texas and Pacific engineers placed cost of the dam at \$12,500. He advanced the belief that it would now cost twice that amount.

In his address, Judge A. J. Coe suggested that the dam be built by subscriptions of individuals and firms

of the city, pledging his personal support to the extent of \$1,000. The Judge believed the dam could be easily financed through such a plan and that the investment would prove a profitable one to citizens of the city, especially those who are property owners.

The merits of Colorado as the location for the A. & M. College to be built in West Texas under provisions of a bill passed just as the regular session of the Legislature was adjourning, was introduced by L. W. Sandusky, and spoken to by L. B. Elliott. No official action was taken in this matter by the Club.

E. F. King, superintendent of schools, spoke of the crowded condition of the class rooms in both the high school and grammar school buildings during the present session and expressed the belief that even more scholastics would be enrolled in the schools next year. He stated that the present class room facilities were entirely inadequate even for the present needs and outlined that with an increase of attendance at the schools next year the city would face the inevitable of furnishing additional room.

The meeting to be held in May will be an open session, at which the ladies are to be invited guests of the Boosters and this event will be looked forward to with much interest. The next meeting of the club will be on Tuesday night, April 26th, at a place to be announced later.

CONTRACT LET TO REBUILD DERRICK AT LITTLE NO. ONE.

Contract to rebuild the derrick at Little No. 1, three miles southwest of Westbrook, has been let to the Wertzberger Co. of Ranger, according to D. J. Lewis, manager of operations at the well. Material for the derrick was shipped out of Ranger Monday.

This rig was burned down Sunday, March 13, and origin of the fire is yet unknown. Drilling will be resumed as soon as the derrick can be erected and tools strung, Mr. Lewis states.

EMPTY GRAVE CASE NOW ON TRIAL AT ASPERMONT.

Aspermont, March 21.—Stonewall County's greatest mystery, the famous "empty grave case," occupied the center of the stage today when J. Cochran, C. O. Hoggett and Wayne Ussery, the principal figures in it went to trial on indictments charging them with swindling several insurance companies.

B. J. Cochran supposedly died and was buried in Johnson Chapel Cemetery near here on March 10, 1919. His funeral sermon was preached by a regularly ordained Methodist minister, disinterested friends saw the body laid out for burial, later placed in a coffin and the coffin interred.

On October 13, 1920, following a grand jury investigation the grave was opened. In it was found an empty only. The coffin and the supposed corpse had disappeared. A week or so later Cochran was arrested on a lonely sheep ranch near Sterling City, Texas, where he had been living with his five children for many months.

He was identified and brought back to Aspermont where he made no attempt to deny that he was the B. J. Cochran whose body was supposed to have been buried in the Johnson Chapel cemetery. He declared that on March 8 an unknown Mexican came to his home in Stonewall county and engaged him in conversation.

A short while later he became unconscious and when he came to found himself chained in a wagon. He was taken to Western New Mexico and placed in a prison, according to his story, only to be later released. He found his wife on the sheep ranch near Sterling City. He declared it his belief that the Mexican had given him something to render him unconscious and then later had dug open the grave in order to carry him back to New Mexico where he was wanted on an indictment charging murder.

At the time of his supposed death Cochran was actually at liberty under a \$10,000 bond awaiting trial on a murder charge in Socorro County New Mexico. Following proof of his death his bondswen were released from their obligation. He also carried \$10,000 worth of insurance in three different insurance companies. These policies were paid to the widow and it is in connection with this feature of the "mystery" that the three men will face trial today.

Hoggett and Ussery are alleged to have made the arrangements for his "funeral."

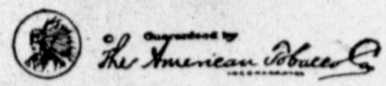

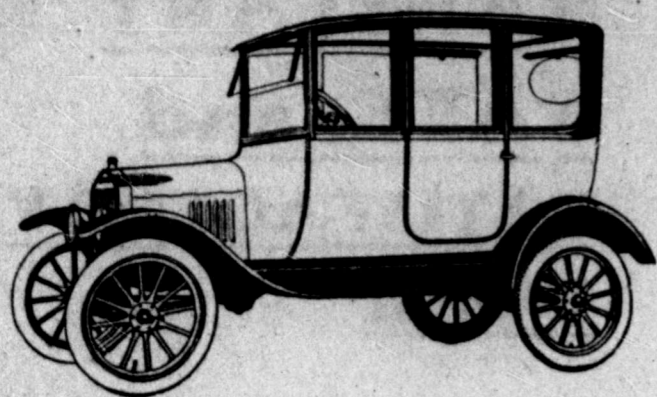

THE ROAD BOND ELECTIONS ALONG BANKHEAD HIGHWAY.

Work must be started on the proways in Reeves County before July posed system of hard surfaced highway, in order to participate in the big sum of Federal aid money appropriated in Texas, according to D. E. H. Manigault, district highway engineer for West Texas.

For that reason officials of Reeves county road district No. 1, are preparing to start operations with a rush immediately after the election on the \$100,000 bond issue to be held next Saturday, March 26. They are taking it for granted that the people of the Pecos district, which includes the east half of the county will grasp the opportunity to secure the expenditure in the county this year of three dollars for every one that they raise by means of bonds and have a fine road system at the same time.

Bonds to the total of \$1,100,000 have already been voted by seven counties west of Big Spring in order to get their share of this big slice of state aid money. All these counties are along the Bankhead highway, and the completion of this system of roads will direct hundreds of tourists through this territory annually as the Bankhead Highway extends from Washington to San Diego, Calif., and strikes numerous big cities such as Richmond, Atlanta, Birmingham, Memphis, Little Rock, Hot Springs, Texarkana, Dallas, Fort Worth, El Paso, Douglas, Phoenix and Yuma.

The counties voting these bonds are as follows: Howard, \$300,000; Martin, \$60,000; Midland, \$125,000; Reeves, \$115,000; Jeff Davis, \$8,000; Hudspeth, \$50,000; and El Paso \$282,000.

The Toyah district in Reeves county has voted \$80,000 in bonds, \$68,000 of which will be used on the Bankhead highway.

To match this the state and federal funds have put up three dollars to one, and will give the Toyah district \$204,000. In the Balmorhea district county Judge James F. Ross has just secured the consent of the state attorney general to the issuance of the full \$35,000 in bonds voted at an election at last year, and the state is to match this with an equal sum for the purpose of building a road from Saragosa to the Head Springs.

In order to complete the Bankhead Highway from the river to Hermosa, which is the district line, to connect with the Saragosa highway and to put out feeder toward Fort Stockton in order to attract tourists from that direction and to do other road work the Pecos district officials are asking that the taxpayers authorize the issuance of \$100,000 in bonds in the belief that the state will match this sum with three dollars for one for all work done on the designated routes.

The matter comes before the voters at a special election to be held at the court house next Saturday March 26th. County Judge Ross says that it will entail a tax of approximately twenty-five cents on each \$100 tax valuation for the first year and

about twenty cents for the next and succeeding years.

In payment for this cost the county avoids the necessity of collecting a tax estimated to cost fifteen cents per hundred dollars valuation as a road maintenance tax and has a permanent system of roads, that will attract many tourists here, while it will mean the expenditure of thousands of dollars in Pecos and bring employment to many.

The petition asking for the election was signed by seventy-one of the leading business men and ranchmen, among their number being the heaviest tax payers of the county.—Pecos Enterprise.

Mr. Manigault has made three visits to Colorado during recent weeks in the endeavor to have plans started for completing the highway route through Mitchell County. Several miles of the highway in the western end of the county are in need of repairs and last August and September during the excessive rains, became practically impassable.

The county has done some work on this road recently, but the assurance that it would be placed in first class condition, under government specifications, was not given the engineer, according to a report made by him to the Chamber of Commerce.

"Iatan Flat in Mitchell County and Roscoe Flat in Nolan County are two of the worst places along the entire highway between Fort Worth and El Paso." Mr. Manigault, stated upon his last visit to Colorado. He commended those counties west of Mitchell that are voting bonds and going to the task of completing the highway without unnecessary delay.

John O. Crawford of New York City, is secretary and treasurer.

Texas offices of the Company are located in the Colorado National Bank building in this city with R. A. Collins, manager. They control approximately 20,000 acres in leases in Mitchell county and have drilled three wells into the pay sand. To this company goes the distinction of drilling the discovery well in the Mitchell County field, the T. & P. No. 1, which came in last July for an initial production of 129 barrels. Five other companies are operating in the Colorado territory.

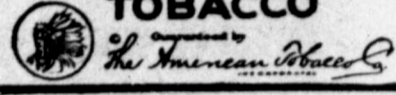

Mitchell County Farmers Being Given Benefit of Best Varieties Cotton Seed

Farmers of Mitchell County will plant pure bred cotton seed this year, according to W. A. Dulin, county farm agent. 2,300 bushels of such seed have already been received at Colorado and Loraine for distribution among the cotton growers of the county. Of these consignments, 2,000 bushels are of the Lone Star variety, 200 bushels of the Bennett and 100 bushels of the Acala varieties. 1,000 bushels of the Lone Star seed and all of the other two varieties were delivered to the Colorado National Bank at Colorado and the remainder of 1,000 bushels of Lone Star to the First State Bank at Loraine. These banks financed the purchase of these seed in order to cooperate with Mr. Dulin in placing pure bred seed for planting within the reach of all farmers of the county.

All of the Bennett and Acala seed have been placed, Mr. Dulin stated Tuesday, and several hundred bushels of the Lone Star seed have been bought by farmers in various sections of the county. The banks are handling the seed without profit, agreeing last fall to finance the purchases and sell to the farmers at actual cost. Mr. Dulin states that the banks will actually lose money in the transaction, since they are assuming the loss occasioned through shrinkage and waste in handling the seed.

"All three of these varieties of cotton seed are guaranteed 99 1/2 per cent pure," Mr. Dulin stated, "and the fact that the cotton growers of Mitchell County may commence with this year to planting their cotton acreage with pure seed should be of more than usual interest. It was clearly demonstrated on the Colorado cotton market during the season just closing that the pure, long staple varieties of cotton marketed here commanded a better price. This is a fact that no one may consistently question. If the farmer is assured of greater returns from his cotton crop by planting pure seed, it seems to me to be the one practical thing to do.

"Last year," Mr. Dulin continued, "we watched experiment tests of these varieties of cotton, as compared with some of the other and more commonly grown varieties and in every instance the farmer growing the pure bred staple made a better profit with the same labor and investment. This year we plan to make a comparison of the three varieties of pure cotton to be planted, noting carefully the peculiarities of each as adapted to the soil and climatic conditions of Mitchell County, with the purpose in mind of co-operating with the farm-

ers in solving the question as to which is the better variety of cotton for us to plant. It may develop that the variety that produces the best staple here will not be found as much adapted to the soil or the climate as some other, or that it may not be as resistant of the high winds and storms frequently prevalent in this section of the State during the growing and harvesting seasons. We plan to encourage an equitable solution of this question and do everything possible to the end that Mitchell County farmers be induced to plant the very best seed available for their immediate section."

In speaking on the subject on acreage reduction in Mitchell County this year, Mr. Dulin estimated that the cotton acreage to be planted in 1921 would approximate 90 per cent of that last year. "There are some farmers who will eliminate cotton entirely this year," he stated, "while others will very probably increase their acreage to this crop. A large per cent of the growers, however, express their intention to reduce the acreage." The Texas Farm Bureau in an official bulletin recently issued, estimates that cotton acreage in Texas will be reduced 20 per cent this year.

In discussing action of the bankers of Parker and other Central and Eastern Texas counties who recently served notice on the cotton farmers that their institutions would not advance loans during 1921 for financing cotton crops, recommending that the farmer devote his cultivated area to watermelons, peanuts, grain and sorghum crops for hogs, dairying, etc., Mr. Dulin stated that there was not a county in the state that would grow better watermelons for commercial purposes than Mitchell county. "We can grow just as good melons here as Parker or any other Texas county," he stated. "The reason that we are not growing melons on a larger scale for the market is simply because we are not planting them. If we would plant a large acreage to this crop it would be an easy matter to contract our entire output, even before the crop matured. This is what those Parker County melon growers are doing, and there is no reason why we can not do the same."

Several hundred bushels of the Lone Star seed are yet available, and farmers desiring these seed should arrange to take them at once, Mr. Dulin stated.
