TRIBUTE PAID TO PIONER CHRISTIAN BY CHURCH PAPER

The following beautiful tribute is taken from the Baptist Standard: "Deacon J. J. Robertson and Mrs. Robertson of Crystal Falls have been married for fifty-four years. At the age of fifteen Brother Robertson entered the Confederate Army, and served throughout the war. He came to Texas before General Smith surrendered at Shreveport, so "Uncle Jack" says he has not surrendered yet. Mr. and Mrs. Robertson were married in 1868, and settled near Paris, Texas. In 1877 they moved to Stephens County and located near the present site of Crystal Falls. They both were converted in 1885 and were baptized on the same day by Rev. Moss Martin.

Brother Robertson was present at the organization of the Stephens County Association and was chairman of the committee on nominations. At a later session he was made moderator and has served for over a quarter of a century. For thirty-six years they have been members of the Crystal Falls church. They have four living children, Mrs. Dr. Ball of Abilene, Mrs. Ernest Keathley of Colorado, Sterling Robertson of Abilene and Richard Robertson of Crystal Falls."

Plans for a big Farm Bureau rally at Colorado at which prominent speakers of the organization are to be present are being worked out, according to information given The Record Monday by officers of the Mitchell county bureau. The exact date for the rally has not yet been determined, this depending upon setting dates for convenience of the speakers who are expected.

"This will be a rally occasion for the farmers of Mitchell and adjoining counties, as well as those business and professional men who are interested in the Farm Bureau," J. C. Hooker, president of the Mitchell County Bureau stated Monday afternoon. "We plan to have authoritative speakers on the various questions that we plan to solve through this organization and it will certainly be well worth while for any man interested in the farmer and stockman to attend this meeting."

Executive officers of the Chamber of Commerce, in session Monday afternoon, pledged support of the chamber to the Mitchell County Farm Bureau and extended its assistance in completing details for the rally at Colorado. "The interests of the farmers of this territory are the interests of every business and professional interest in Colorado," R. O. Pearson, who presided at the meeting during the absence of the president, Dr. P. C. Coleman, stated following adjournment of the meeting. W. A. Dulin, county farm agent, said that the rally would be held early in June, should tentative plans now adopted materialize.

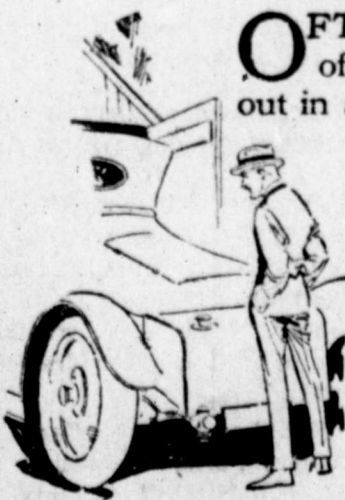

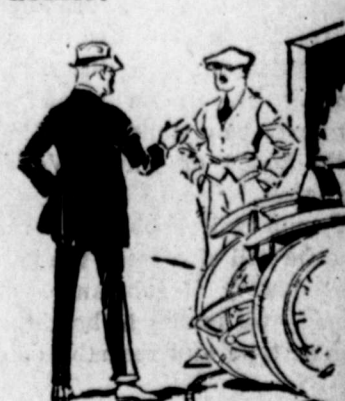

TRIED AND TRUE RECIPES

(The Record has arranged to run this column each week of "home tried" recipes, for the benefit of our housewife readers; and we hope for the benefit of their husbands and family also. Every one of these has been tried and written by a West Texas woman. Different departments will appear from week to week. If these are cut out and pasted in a scrap book, the entire series will make quite a collection, and will be fine for reference.)

HOW TO COOK A HUSBAND.

A good many husbands are eventually spoiled by mismanagement in cooking, and so are not tender and good. Some women keep them too constantly in hot water; others freeze them. Others put them in a stew; others roast them and others keep them constantly in a pickle. It cannot be supposed that any husband will be good and tender managed in this way, but they are really delicious when properly treated. In selecting your husband you should not be guided by the silvery appearance, as in buying mackerel, nor by the golden tint, as if you wanted salmon. Be sure to select him yourself as tastes differ. Do not go to the market for him, as those brought to the door are best. It is far better to have none than not to learn how to cook them properly. It does not make so much difference what you cook him in as how you cook him. See that the linen in which he is wrapped is white and nicely mended, with the required number of strings and buttons. Don't keep him in the kettle by force, as he will stay there himself if proper care is taken. If he should sputter or fizz do not be anxious; some husbands do this. Add a little sugar in the form of what confectioners call "kisses," but no vinegar or pepper on any account. A little spice improves them, but it must be used with judgment. Do not try him with anything sharp to see if he is tender. Stir him gently the while, lest he stay too long in the kettle and thus become flat and tasteless. If thus treated you will find him very digestible, agreeing nicely with you, and he will keep as long as you want.

SOUPS.
Vegetable Soup.

Small beef bone in one-half gallon of water; let boil slow until beef is tender; take out of the water and pick the meat to very small pieces; then have one medium size onion; two Irish potatoes; small bit of chopped cabbage; small can of tomatoes; salt and pepper (red or black) to taste. If the beef did not have enough fat on it to make soup rich, add butter. Put all this in the beef water and cook until vegetables are tender; then add water (boiling) to make as much soup as wanted. I sometimes add one cup of sweet milk with pinch of soda. This is very good for sick people with cabbage left out, and well strained.

Soup for Invalids.

Take the white meat of cold chicken; mince fine; add teaspoonful of fine flour together with broth. Season with salt, pepper and a pinch of parsley leaves is fine. If broth is not at hand, use new milk. Serve hot on toast. Garnish with lettuce.

FISH AND FOWLS
Salmon Loaf With Rice

One can salmon; two cups rice; two eggs, beaten; juice of half a lemon; salt and pepper to taste. Mix lightly with fork; bake in covered dish one hour; serve with tomato sauce, made by stirring and slightly thickening a cup of cooked tomatoes, seasoned well. Peas may be used instead of rice, in which case serve with a cream sauce.

Chicken Pie

Cook chicken until it falls from bones; remove the bones and place meat in baking dish and pour in sauce made of three teaspoons melted butter; three tablespoons flour; five cups broth; one cup milk. Over this spread a batter made of two cups flour; two teaspoons baking powder; two tablespoons shortening; one egg; one cup milk, and a pinch of salt. Bake until golden brown.

MEATS AND GRAVIES
Pot Roast With Prunes

Three-pound rump roast; one pound prunes; one-half cup Karo; one-fourth cup vinegar; one-half teaspoon of alspice; one tablespoon salt. Have pot well heated, sear roast on each side, soak prunes over night, then put prunes and liquid in bottom of vessel over which roast is placed on wire frame and steam until done.

Pork Roast With Irish Potatoes

Any size roast placed in pan after it has been rolled in flour and sprinkled with black pepper and salt; then slice raw Irish potatoes around roast and put pan in a larger vessel in which water is put. Let cook until steam tenders the roast.

VEGETABLES
Potatoes and Green Peppers

Line the bottom of a baking pan with Irish potatoes sliced thin, then a layer of onions, and a layer of green pepper, and so on until the pan is filled. To this add one or two cupfuls of sweet milk; piece of butter; black pepper and salt to taste. Bake until tender.

Sweetpotato Cones.

Mix three cupfuls of mashed sweet potatoes, yolks of three eggs; one heaping tablespoonful of butter and a pinch of salt; beat until smooth. When cool form into cones; roll in the beaten whites of two eggs, then in cracker crumbs; put into a well-greased pan and set in hot oven to brown. Before removing from oven place a heaping teaspoonful of meringue made from the white of one egg and one rounded teaspoonful of sugar on each and brown.

School Bond and School-Bond Tax Election Order.

On this the 20th day of April, 1921 came on to be considered a petition legally drawn and designed by 95 tax-paying voters of the Colorado Independent School District, praying that this board order an election to be held in the said school district for the purpose hereinafter set forth.
It appearing that the above mentioned petition has been signed by at least twenty property tax paying voters of said district, and it appearing that election prayed for should be ordered, therefore the School Board of the Colorado Independent School District orders an election as follows:
An election is hereby ordered to be held at the court house of Mitchell county in the city of Colorado, on the 26th day of May, same being Thursday, 1921, polls to be opened at 8 o'clock a. m., on said date and closed at 6 p. m. of same date. Said election to be held as nearly as possible in conformity to the general election laws of the State of Texas. F. A. Winn is hereby appointed manager to hold said election and he shall appoint two judges, also two clerks to assist him in holding this election.
The election herein ordered is to determine whether the School board of the said Colorado Independent School District shall be authorized to issue bonds to the amount of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) to bear interest at the rate of five per cent (5 per cent) per annum from date of issue, and become mature at the expiration of forty years from date of issue; provided that said school board or their successors in office may have the privilege of redeeming any or all of these bonds after the expiration of ten years from date of issue; also this election shall be to determine whether an additional tax of ten cents on the one hundred dollars, \$100, valuation of property in said school district, making with the tax that has heretofore been voted a total of sixty cents (60c) on the one hundred dollars valuation of property in the Colorado Independent School District for school purposes, to provide interest on said bonds and to create a sinking fund to redeem said bonds when mature, shall be levied.
The above mentioned bonds shall be for the purpose of raising a fund to purchase a site on which to build

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30
Relating to the amending of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas; abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners; providing for the supervision and management of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legislature.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
Section 58. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the prison system under the supervision, management and control of such officer or officers as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.
Sec. 2. The above constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "For the amendment of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners." All those opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "Against the Amendment of Article 17, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."
Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.
Sec. 4. The sum of \$5,000.00 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.
